Hartford Seeks to Bar More Racial Troubles



Hartford Police Close in on North End Violence Suspects

41 Arrested In Second Disturbance

HARTFORD (AP) — Hartford officials took precautions today in an effort to prevent a third straight night of violence in the city's predominantly Negro North End.

Some 41 Negro and Puerto Rican youths were arrested after a furious period of looting and bottle-throwing and rioting Tuesday night.

Blue-helmeted police used tear gas on several occasions to disperse unruly crowds in a 10-block area. They barricaded hands of youths who hurled missiles at police and passersby.

Mayor George B. Kinsella set up a meeting with city officials to discuss the possibility of imposing a curfew in the state's capital.

About 14 policemen were reported hurt and nearly a score of store windows were broken in Tuesday night's outbreak.

State police and National Guard leaders were alerted and remained on standby, but assistance from both groups was not required. Several state troopers attached to the Criminal Intelligence Division toured the areas in plainclothes, however, to survey the situation.

The barrage of rocks and bottles erupted before 10 p.m. The bulk of the disturbance was put down in about an hour as police charged behind the barricades, firing tear gas to disperse the youths, many of whom were 14 and 15 years old. Rioters incidents continued over a four-hour period.

Police were pelted with rocks and bottles from apartment buildings as they charged into the gangs of youths.

Two of those arrested were charged with inciting to riot, in addition to breach of the peace. They were George Foster Bay and Ronald J. Weaver, both 20. Bay is a member of the Communist Party and the Hartford Communist Renewal Team.

City officials could offer no explanation for the Tuesday riot outbreaks. The trouble spot, along a street that runs from the corner of Main and State streets, was soaked with gasoline and set afire, but damage was limited.

About 250 members of the Ohio National Guard remained on duty last night as riot gear patrolled the area. The trouble spot, along a 12-block area of West 3rd Street, was the scene of racial disturbances last July and rioting which was put down with National Guard help in September 1966.

The latest unrest in the predominantly Negro area began building up after Robert Wilson Barbee, 41, a Negro, of Friday, Ohio, was shot in the back twice Sunday night as he fled from vice squadmen Robert S. Collier, 30, wearing plainclothes, had stopped Barbee, apparently.

Higher Wages, Room Rates Approved by MMH Trustees

New employee salary schedules, new and improved fringe benefits and an increase in room and board charges averaging \$8 per day were all approved at a meeting last night of Manchester Memorial Hospital's Board of Trustees.

The hike in room and board charges will be used to pay costs of the salary and fringe benefits increases and to prepare for a major expansion of the hospital in the near future, hospital officials said.

In announcing the increases, Jacob F. Miller, president of the Board of Trustees, stated, "The hospital must continue to pay fair and equitable salaries, thus remaining competitive in the labor market and must prepare to meet the long-range financial needs of the institution."

Per-day room and board charges will be increased by \$11 in the Berenson 7th Units, \$8 in Intermediate Care and \$6 in Self-Care Units.

Despite these rises in the cost of patient care, Manchester Memorial Hospital's room and board charges will continue at or near a low for all 35 of Connecticut's general hospitals, predicted Edward M. Kenney, MMH administrator.

Ribicoff Asks More For Model City Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, pleading for Senate approval of \$300 million more than the House voted for the model cities program, declared today it "is the foundation on which we can build a better urban nation."

The Senate scheduled a vote for today on whether to uphold the appropriation Committee's recommendation of \$277 million to the program in the current budget year.

Ribicoff, a Connecticut Democrat leading the fight for the additional amount, said the House figure amounted to "renunciation of the most imaginative piece of legislation in recent years to deal with urban problems."

Police said a man leaped out of a truck passing a picket line at the Pennsylvania Turnpike and shot Dale M. Younkis, 37, of Somerset, Pa., in the stomach.

Queen Elizabeth Christens Liner With Her Name

CLYDEBANK, Scotland (AP)—Britain's newest ocean liner was christened Queen Elizabeth today. The monarch whose name she bears launched her into the River Clyde with the crack of a mace of champagne on her bow.

Up to now the ship had been known only as Q4. Her predecessor, the old Queen Elizabeth, is going out of service soon.

"May God bless her and all who sail in her," said the queen, and an emotional roar erupted from 50,000 throats as the liner guided down the slipway, sending a huge wave rolling across the river.

A massive cloud of dust and a screech of drag anchors rose up as the 60,000-ton liner ground smoothly into the water. Seven tugs bustled around to bring the ship under way.

By naming the liner after herself the queen maintained the tradition of Britain's Atlantic queen, John Brown's Shipyard, where the new liner was built.

Lower Texas Coast Hit

Record Tide Seen In Beulah's Wake

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Raging Hurricane Beulah raked the lower Texas Coast today and the Weather Bureau said it could jam tides of historic height against the Corpus Christi bayfront and nearby inlets.

The hurricane's eye at a late hour passed over Boca Chica, a narrow peninsula at the mouth of the Rio Grande and was 12 miles north-northeast of Brownsville.

It was not apparent at that time whether the eye would continue inland or turn toward the Gulf of Mexico.

"She's about the biggest, nastiest storm I've ever seen," said the veteran pilot of a Navy hurricane hunter plane after flying through the eye.

Winds were estimated at 160 miles an hour at one point, but the Weather Bureau said the storm was expected to weaken slowly since some of its perimeter was over land.

Tornadoes spun off by the hurricane caused three deaths at Palacios, midway between Houston and Corpus Christi on Matagorda Bay. Another person was missing and five suffered critical injuries. State police said four tornadoes struck at Palacios, three homes suffered destruction and several automobiles were wrecked.

The tornado deaths brought the toll from Beulah to 27 and possibly 28 since it was reported in the Atlantic Ocean days ago. The storm's approach started a massive flight from the coast Tuesday with 20,000 or so residents seeking safety inland.

All along the mid-Texas Coast, winds and rains heralded the approach of Beulah. The Weather Bureau said the hurricane will set rains of up to 10 inches for 50 miles inland and warned of rain deluges as well as destructive tides.

For comparison, famous Hurricane Carla, which struck the Texas Coast Sept. 11, 1961, had winds estimated at 175 m.p.h.—only slightly higher than Beulah's at her peak. At Beulah's peak, winds of 231 m.p.h. were recorded at the station. The 20,000 Texans who fled inland or sought other shelter did so. Engineers estimated winds of up to 250 m.p.h. struck the Florida Keys in 1933. Mt. Washington, N.H., recorded winds of 231 m.p.h. when it passed over the mountain in 1916.

Other major hurricanes included the Sept. 12-17, 1926, one which killed 4,000 in the West Indies and Florida; Oct. 27, 1965, had winds of 175 m.p.h. as it struck Chetumal, Mexico, with 1,500 dead; and Oct. 18-19, 1942, at Bengal, India, where hurricanes are called cyclones.

Hurricane Janet on Sept. 28, 1955, had winds of 175 m.p.h. as it struck Chetumal, Mexico, before instruments were blown away and 200 m.p.h. The same hurricane had estimated winds of 200 m.p.h. when it passed over the island or sought other shelter elsewhere.

3 Egyptian Boats Sunk by Israelis

TEL AVIV (AP)—Israeli tank gunners sank three Egyptian patrol boats carrying about 40 armed and helmeted soldiers today after Egypt twice tried to ferry them down the Red Sea Canal, an Israeli armed forces spokesman said.

About 35 Egyptians in uniform jumped from each craft into the canal after tanks fired on them at dawn and again about 2 1/2 hours later, sources said. They were seen struggling in the water and several casualties were reported.

An Egyptian official in Cairo denied the Israeli claim, charging that the Israelis opened fire without provocation on Egyptian positions across the canal. He maintained no Egyptian boats were on the waterway.

Israeli observers in Tel Aviv accused Egypt of attempting to create tension to coincide with the opening session of the U.N. General Assembly in New York. The incidents occurred near the Red Sea end of the 116-mile

Red Guards' Atrocity Chinese Catholic Burned on Cross

HONG KONG (AP)—Pro-Maoist Red Guards in Shanghai burned a Chinese Catholic on a cross and then stoned him, a Red Guard said today.

The 65-year-old Chinese businessman, who recently returned from Shanghai, said the Red Guards first arrested the man late in August when they saw him wearing a crucifix.

The Red Guards then took him to a school building they were using as a barracks and tried him on charges of following "running dog religion" instead of the thoughts of Chairman Mao Tse-tung, he said.

A big crowd of students and Red Guards at the trial shouted throughout, "Kill him and crucify him!" the businessman said. After a trial, the Christian was tied to a cross in the school yard.

First they threw sticks and stones at him. Then some Red Guards heated iron rods and burned him, he said. The businessman said that it took his name, and the Christian's agonized screams finally brought Communist Chinese authorities who forced the Red Guards to give him up. The man reportedly died later at a Shanghai hospital.

B52s Pour Bombs On Red Artillery

SAIGON (AP)—High altitude B52 bombers and low-sweeping jets piled more than a half-million pounds of explosives today on Communist artillery and mortar positions that wounded more than 100 Marines in 24 hours of heavy shelling near the demilitarized zone.

Military headquarters reported one Marine was killed in the firing from the big gun emplacements on sandbagged fortresses near the zone dividing the Vietnam.

The focus of the Communist attacks were the deeply entrenched Marine bases of Con Thien and Gio Linh just below the DMZ.

Associated Press correspondent Edwin Q. White reported from Marine headquarters that shelling was so intense that road traffic to the two points was suspended and all supplies were forced to move up medical evacuation helicopters.

The Communist gunners used everything from high mortar fire to long-range Soviet-built artillery placed 10 miles and more to the north.

More than 800 shells have hit the two U.S. points in the past 24 hours and every few minutes there were reports of more shelling. The giant, eight-engine B52s were used in an attack on the headquarters of the general workers union at Cu Tien, Aug. 19.

The report, distributed by Nationalist China's official Central News Agency, said news of the attack was contained in leaflets secretly distributed.

Chinese Nationalist Premier C. K. Yen says Communist forces all the support the Nationalist Chinese can give them. In a summary of his seminar report to the legislature, he delivered Friday, Yen also said that the Nationalists have intensified preparations for an attack against the Communist mainland.

The outbreak followed a series of firefights across the waterway which the Middle East agreement to keep the canal free of traffic when they sent six small boats loaded with soldiers down the canal. # Mechanical Moles Dig First Frisco Subway

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)**—Two mechanical moles are burrowing quietly under Mission Street for San Francisco's first subway.

From the days of horse-drawn street cars, San Franciscans have traveled on the surface—except for tunnels through Twin Peaks. It's been by cable car, trolley, trackless trolley or bus, linking with ferry boats or bridges.

Subway tubes, scheduled for completion in 1969, will be part of the 75 miles of the \$1-billion San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit District. The system will tie three counties together with 75 miles of subway, surface, elevated and underwater high-speed rail lines.

It includes five miles of twin and four-bore tubes under San Francisco. The first of 18 tunneling machines and shields that will operate under San Francisco's streets began boring in mid-July.

The 95-ton twin was lowered in September to the most splattered bottom of a four-story hole that marks their starting point at 16th and Mission streets. It will trail a safe 100 feet behind its companion as they cut mile-long twin bores to 26th and Market streets near the Civic Center.

The rest of the San Francisco tunneling will be carried out under eight other contracts. No other has begun. Some are still to be let. Stations, all to be built by cut and cover operations, will follow all other contracts.

Two blocks from the start of the first tunneling operation, doctors are examining groups of mechanical operation stretches over 100 feet from the shield to the end of the conveyor belt. Altogether it weighs 200 tons.

# Inventors Display Wares; From Skeeters to Splints

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Robert Chymbar has a pair of shoes that are four-feet long.

They're special shoes, of course. Used to slide across the surfaces of lakes. Sort of like wearing a personal pontoon bridge.

Chymbar calls them "Skeeters." He invented them.

They're on exhibit here this week at the third annual International Inventors and New Products Exposition. The show has drawn some 1,200 inventors from 23 countries with 15,000 products, inventions, ideas and applications.

Not too far from Chymbar, Robert L. Thomas of East Point, Ohio, is exhibiting a "personal asphyxiant"—a device that permits a person to smother without having to look around for an asphyxiant.

The device basically is a long tube into which a cigarette is inserted after being lit. As the cigarette is consumed its ashes fall into the tube. When the smoker is done, a slide at the top of the tube is closed and the cigarette puts itself out.

The closed tube can be put into the pocket and carried about with its load of ashes until it is convenient to empty it.

A machine that will punch out three dozen cookies or doughnuts, shaped and ready for the oven, is exhibited by Charles Downing of Janesville, Wis.

"The average small baker does his shaping by hand," says Downing, a former baker. "This machine will put him in competition with the large bakeries."

They're plumbers, milliners, carpenters, almost anything," Shaohua says, "who get an idea they think will improve things. They develop it and then they bring it here in hope of finding a manufacturer."

How many do connect? "At last year's show, manufacturers paid out about \$5.5 million to buy various inventions and ideas," he says. "This year we're expecting the figure to hit \$20 million."

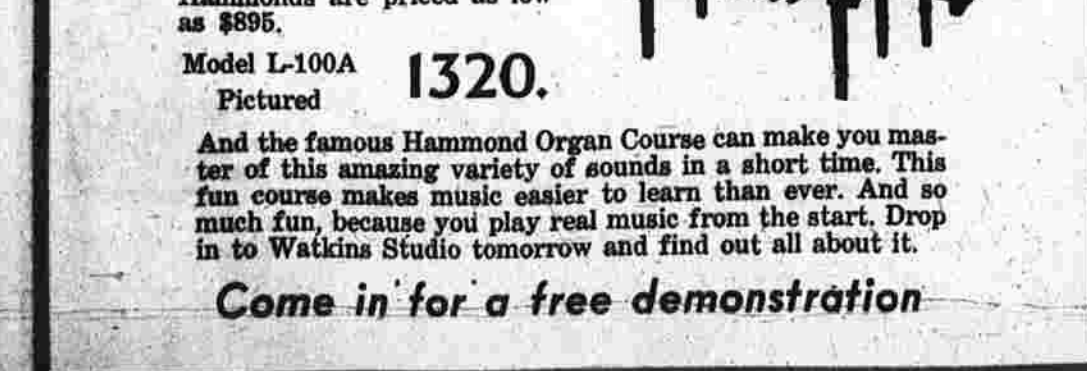

# Trinity Covenant to Mark Its 75th Anniversary

Trinity Covenant Church will observe its 75th anniversary Oct. 27 through 29. A banquet will be held Friday, Oct. 27 at the church. Dr. Milton B. Engstrom, president of the Evangelical Covenant Church of America, will speak at an anniversary service Sunday, Oct. 29 at 4 p.m. in the sanctuary.

John Johnson resigned as pastor late in 1963 and the church was without a pastor from October 1963 to March 1964, when a young man from Sweden, C. J. A. Vegner, accepted the call. His stay was brief and Pastor Bjorkman again ministered to the church.

Many pastors continued to serve the church between 1964 when Pastor Anders resigned, and 1968 when the Rev. R.E. Green was called. Pastor Green and his family occupied the parsonage, which was built in 1928. The Golden Jubilee of the church was observed in 1942. At that time the sanctuary was renovated by providing choir space, paneling the walls, and installing stained glass memorial windows. Pastor Green resigned in 1948.

An interim minister served until July 1944, when the Rev. Raymond Johnson came to Manchester. In 1948 an addition was built which provided Sunday School rooms, an office and study for the pastor, and a kitchen. Pastor Johnson resigned in 1949, followed by the Rev. Carl Helgeson from 1949 to 1962, and the Rev. G.A.

Home meetings were becoming unsatisfactory and the group wanted a place of their own, even though the American Methodists gave the use of their church for Sunday afternoon services, and Chensy Bros. made Cheney Hall available to them for Sunday evenings.

When William H. Childs offered them a lot on Spruce St., the congregation accepted and set about to erect an appropriate building. # Montreal Gun Moll Dies Trying to Escape Police

**MONTREAL (AP)**—Machine gun moll Molly, the 29-year-old mother who liked to take her children along on bank holdups, died a gangster's death Tuesday — on the run and with a sawed-off shotgun and pistol by her side.

As police rifle and machine-gun fire ripped into the side of a bus and died. It was not known if the bullets or the crash killed her.

Police said Molly — her real name was Monica Proietti Smith — was able to handle a machinegun "like a commando."

The 50-pound woman was sought for questioning in 20 holdups last year. Police said that on many of them her two children were by her side to throw off suspicion.

Molly's underworld specialty, detectives said, was driving getaway cars and before she rammed the bus, Molly had raced at speeds of more than

100 miles per hour, jumping from street to sidewalk and against the flow of oncoming traffic.

The gun battle began after three bandits entered a credit union in Montreal North and robbed it, then fled in Molly's car. Constable Andre Godin spotted the auto, and opened fire through his car's window. Four other police cruisers took up the chase.

After commandeering another car from Adrien Tremblay, a Montreal city construction inspector, the gunman took off again, slugging Tremblay and taking \$30 from him.

**Gitar-Playing Indian Hippies' Latest Rage**

LOS ANGELES (AP) - To the Western eye, the instrument seems absurd, the bulbous gourds on each end making it look like some miked-up barrel. But from the 18 strings of the star Indian-born Ravi Shankar can evoke harmony and dissonance that astound the ear.

His appearance last week at ABC's "Hollywood Palace" added to the clamor over soft-rocking, string-wielding Shankar, of whom Life magazine proclaimed, "The 'Star' sound rocks the U.S." The musician is getting what appears to be a saturation campaign, including dates at the Monterey Pop Festival, Hollywood Bowl, Expo '67 and this week at Philharmonic Hall in New York's Lincoln Center.

The rage over Ravi's reggae-free improvisations that can last two or three hours - was started two years ago when Beatle George Harrison became enamored with the sitar sound. He made a pilgrimage to India to study with Shankar, and Indian tones began seeping into the Beatle numbers.

This caused Shankar to become elevated to minor sainthood in pop music. Teeny-boppers, flower children and other juvenile types began appearing at Shankar's American concerts, bestowing on him the homage usually reserved for guitar players in tight pants.

The attention alternately pleases and appalls Shankar.

"I see no harm in using the sitar for pop music," he explained. "It is a versatile instrument that can be used for many things, just as the guitar can be played by everyone from Segovia to folk singers."

"But I would hate to see the sitar used solely to produce a pop sound. That is why in my concerts I stress the fact that it can be used for the classical form."

He may or may not be getting the message across to his most devoted followers, the hippies. They apparently enjoy his music for its fantasmagorical sound, rather than its classical quality.

"I love hippies," Shankar declared outright. "I love them not because they are admirers of my music, but because of their philosophy, their awareness. But one thing I do not approve: their use of drugs."

"I learned from my guru that true contentment must come from within, and so I do not believe in smoking or drinking. Many of the hippies who come to my concerts are obviously stoned. They use so much marijuana or LSD that they cannot possibly appreciate the music."

"Often during the performance they will light up - and usually it is not tobacco. Then I must stop and announce that smoking is not allowed. I only want them to give me a chance to present my music properly, and for that I must have a couple of hours of sobriety."

Ravi Shankar is a 5-foot-8 man of 47 with curly black hair and a broad, brown face with deep, dark-rimmed eyes. He is enormously disciplined and can sit cross-legged playing the four-foot sitar for three uninterupted hours. Both his religious training and his lengthy career prevent his being overwhelmed by his newfound fame.

"Since the age of 9 I have been traveling," said the musician, who toured Europe and the United States as part of a dance troupe. At the age of 15 he turned to the sitar and led a monastic life of 12 punishing hours daily practice until he mastered the instrument. For almost 20 years he has toured western capitals, playing his ragas to increasing crowds.

"Usually I would return home to India after four or five months," he said. "But this time I will stay a year, returning in February or March. They ask me at home why I spend so much time outside."

"It is for this reason: I feel responsible for starting the sitar movement in this country, and I would like to see it properly appreciated."

Besides his concerts, television and records - recent release: "East Meets West" with Yehudi Menuhin - Shankar has founded a school in Los Angeles where he teaches Indian culture as well as the sitar. He also will score "Charlie," the next film by Ralph Nelson ("Lilies of the Field").

Among scores: the "Father Pancho" films of India's Satyajit Ray; "Alice in Wonderland" for British television; the forthcoming "Chappqua" of Conrad Rooks.

### Party Whips Count 'Troops' To Insure Votes on Floor

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican Whip Lawrence C. Hays said today that he is counting his troops and making a mental note of the absenteeism.

On the Democratic side, Whip Hugh Briggs stood at the rear of the chamber with two aides, making a list of Democrats present and voting.

The vote on an amendment to the foreign aid bill complete, Hays and Briggs disappeared into their respective cloakrooms to telephone absent members and urge them to come to the floor.

A similar scene takes place in the House during most major legislative battles. Hays and Briggs, as whips of their parties, have the job of getting enough members to the floor to uphold their parties' positions.

There have been whips in Congress since the turn of the century, and the British Parliament had them since 1770.

The term stems from the "whipper-in" who was the man in a fox hunt responsible for herding the hounds from leaving the pack.

Arends, 71, silver-haired GOP member who is the senior GOP member of the house has been his party's whip for longer than any man in history. An effort to replace him in 1965 failed and he is considered solidly entrenched now.

Boggs, 53, holds his position by speaking to the majority leaders and the majority leader himself. Arends who is elected by the GOP membership. The youngest member of the house when elected at 28, the Louisiana Democrat has held his post since 1952.

Each operates through deputy and assistant whips. Arends has three deputies—Reps. William H. Bates of Massachusetts, Jackson E. Baker of Ohio and Bert L. Talcott of California. Under them are assistant whips serving states or regions, 14 for the Republicans and 19 for the Democrats.

Arends picks his deputy and assistant whips. "They're loyal," he said in an interview. "I don't think I've got a loafer in the bunch."

The assistant Democratic whips are picked by the state or region they serve, and usually by the senior Democrats from the area. In some southern regions, it is difficult to get an assistant whip who favors the party position or who can do much to line up votes.

While Arends has to contend with up to 80 potentially balky members on one issue, Democrats have 90-80 Southerners plus some conservative border states who frequently oppose the whip and the Republicans to oppose administration proposals.

Twice this year, in a measure to increase the national debt limit, Republicans were solidly opposed, as Democrats had to rely on Southerners to get the bill through. The first time they failed, but the second time they succeeded.

Republican policy, like that of any party in power, follows the lead of the White House.

On major issues, both party whips poll their memberships, through the assistant whips, to see where the votes lie. Then they can use what Arends calls "persuasion" on the doubtful members.

When crucial amendments come up on the floor, the whips put in "whip calls" to summon their members. Arends and Boggs estimate they can get their troops to the floor in about 15 minutes.

So far this year, however, Republicans have apparently had more success at this than Democrats.

"The underdog tries harder," Arends said. "We're out to

STOCKBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Norman Rockwell, the folksy artist whose conception of the four freedoms inspired Americans in World War II, is pointing his talented brush toward things more controversial.

"Things have changed and so have I," says the lanky patriarch remembered by most for his more than 360 a year a day Evening Post covers.

After 47 years of recording the foibles of the American public with painstaking accuracy and a little humor, Rockwell and his wife, Mary, are turning their brushes to more topical themes.

### Party Whips Count 'Troops' To Insure Votes on Floor

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican Whip Lawrence C. Hays said today that he is counting his troops and making a mental note of the absenteeism.

On the Democratic side, Whip Hugh Briggs stood at the rear of the chamber with two aides, making a list of Democrats present and voting.

The vote on an amendment to the foreign aid bill complete, Hays and Briggs disappeared into their respective cloakrooms to telephone absent members and urge them to come to the floor.

A similar scene takes place in the House during most major legislative battles. Hays and Briggs, as whips of their parties, have the job of getting enough members to the floor to uphold their parties' positions.

There have been whips in Congress since the turn of the century, and the British Parliament had them since 1770.

The term stems from the "whipper-in" who was the man in a fox hunt responsible for herding the hounds from leaving the pack.

Arends, 71, silver-haired GOP member who is the senior GOP member of the house has been his party's whip for longer than any man in history. An effort to replace him in 1965 failed and he is considered solidly entrenched now.

Boggs, 53, holds his position by speaking to the majority leaders and the majority leader himself. Arends who is elected by the GOP membership. The youngest member of the house when elected at 28, the Louisiana Democrat has held his post since 1952.

### Disruptive Child Problem Plagues Strike Negotiators

NEW YORK (AP) — In the old days the so-called disruptive child was hauled out of the classroom and into reform school. But what do you do with him in a more enlightened age? The issue is one of the hardest to crack in the AFL-CIO United Federation of Teachers strike against the New York City school system.

"Disruptive child is a very poor term," says Richard L. Albert, assistant superintendent in charge of the office of special education and pupil personnel services. "It has to be spelled out more clearly so we all know to what we're addressing ourselves."

"If something is done that interferes with the education of others or himself, then he is disruptive. It's a broad-based definition. When you begin to define it, then you have problems because you're applying it in the context of different people, each of whom has a different set of standards, acceptances and rejections."

The UFT has sought the power for teachers to rid their classrooms of disruptive children. The Board of Education has proposed an independent panel to review complaints by teachers about disruptive pupils.

Several teachers have complained that they have been beaten up by pupils.

"We have yet to see any documentation of a teacher being beaten up in school," says Jeff Greenup, an official of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and member of a city-wide committee to study the problem of the disruptive child.

Negro and Puerto Rican groups have opposed the UFT's stand on disruptive children. Lydia Thaxter, a school district coordinator, says this is because such children have been suspended from classes in "countless numbers."

"The problem has really been growing," she contends. "The union now asks for permission for teachers to have the authority to put children out of the

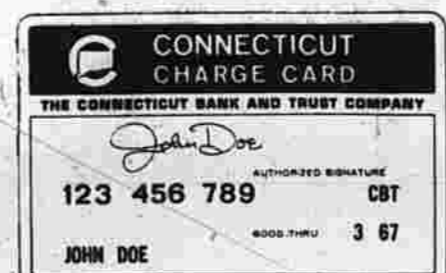

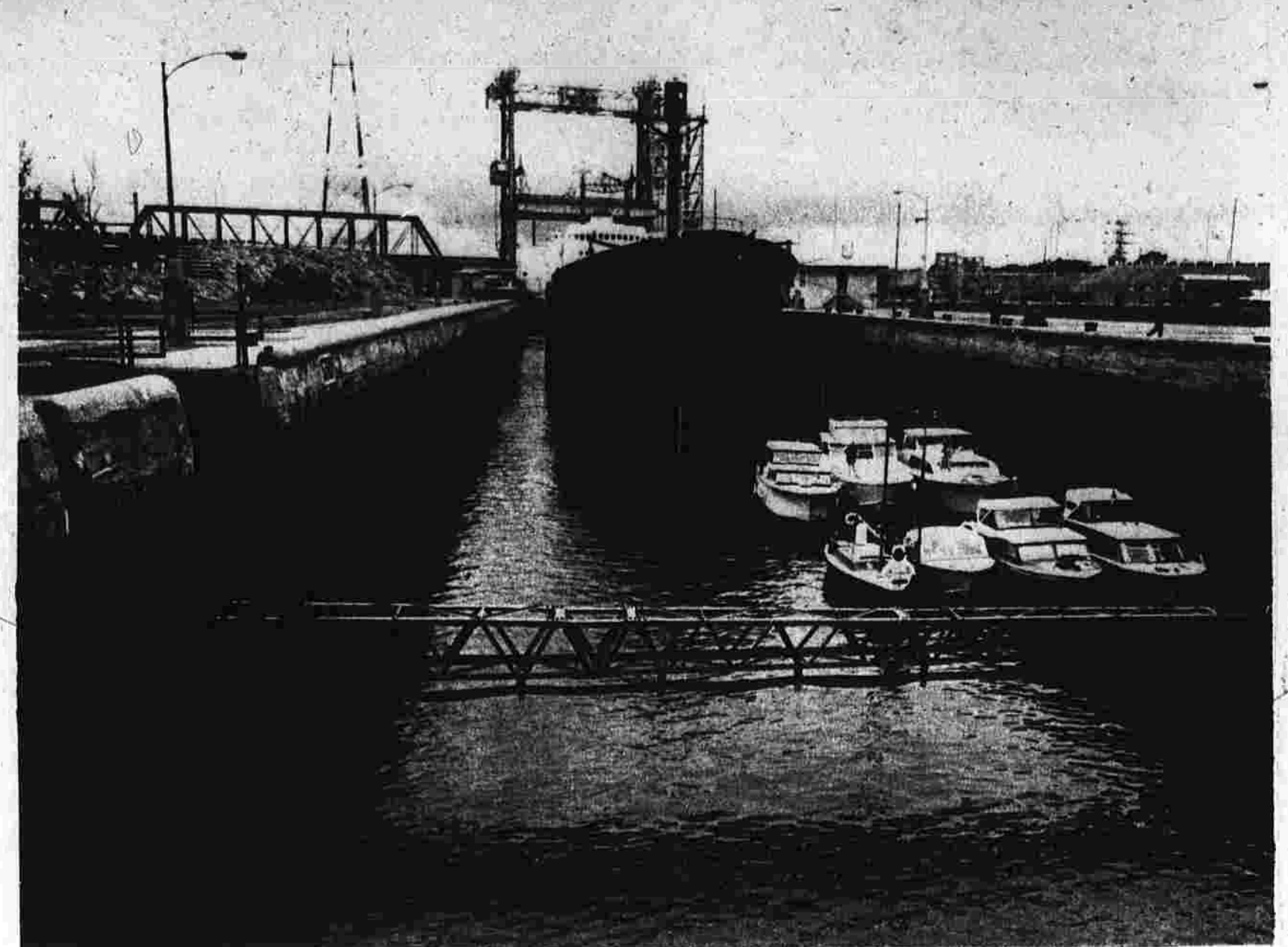

**Quick To Say Yes**  
 A Manchester "Happening," which is occurring more and more frequently lately, has drawn the fire of the town's knowledgeable planning director.  
 "A problem we run into with most developers," the planning director said recently, "is their readiness to agree to anything, when seeking a zone change, a variance or a special exception, and their efforts to back out of these agreements when construction time nears."

**Warime Economy**  
 Every now and then the people of Connecticut are reminded anew that present prosperity of this state depends in great measure on the economy that comes from war or the threat of it.  
 A recent series of stories by the Associated Press recites an impressive set of statistics which indicate the degree to which employment in Connecticut depends on defense spending, heightened by the war in Vietnam.  
 The reporter who wrote it found no very impressive evidence, however, that the state's major defense industries are in a position to shift production quickly to purely civilian goods.  
 The prospect of a sudden and drastic cutback in military spending produces a range of reactions from spokesmen for defense industries. That reaction goes from complete pessimism by the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics in Groton to reassurances from United Aircraft which accounts for so much of the employment in this area.  
 What the statistics do not show, and cannot show, is the real indirect effect: a mass drop in defense spending would have on the numberless small employers which are satellites of the major industries.  
 When you consider the state's prime contracts the second wave effect becomes obvious. Prime military contracts to Connecticut industries amount to \$5,218 per person. California is a distant second at \$3,285 per person.  
 The likelihood is great that spending for military purposes will continue at a fairly high rate even if the Vietnam war ends. No one seriously contemplates the prospect of completely ceasing. This is the cushion against which all estimates of the state's economic position are made.  
 But even with that consideration, it is obvious that a vast adjustment will have to be made to ensure prosperity without the boost of wartime military contracts.  
 These questions arise: How much can be done to plan for a non-military economy? How much has been done?  
 With a few exceptions, there seems not to be enough concrete evidence of accomplishment in this direction. More should be tried.

**NFL Octopus**  
 Several years ago a national magazine carried a cartoon that showed a clergyman, in the midst of a Sunday morning sermon, stopping to look at a small piece of paper in his hand. The punch line was "I have just been handed a third quarter score."

 One of the latest gimmicks dreamed by the organization is the endorsement of a varied group of grocery items as part of the official NFL training table. Not only edible items, but in a rare moment of thoughtfulness toward the fans, they made available for a price—a cushion and poncho set, emblazoned of course, with the colors of your favorite team and the emblem of the NFL.  
 But nowhere in the business world has professional football made its mark with the impression like that in television. Just take last weekend.  
 Our—and they now belong to all New England—Red Sox were embroiled in a game with Baltimore. A game that held great import in the hectic American League pennant race. It was not televised.  
 Offered instead for the edification of area sports fans were a couple of professional football games. Neither meant much as the two-section pro league had just begun its season's endless succession of exhibitions, championship games and playoffs, extra playoffs and super playoffs.  
 There was when baseball had the sports world to itself in the early fall—through the World Series, at least. Football had begun but didn't burst into full bloom until mid-October. It was THIS sport until just before Christmas when it bowed out, except for a brief reprise for the Bowl Games.

At the weekly luncheon of the board Tuesday noon, the advisability of restricting the Negro population in a certain area on the West side was discussed. The members say that the Negro population of the city is growing so rapidly that something will have to be done."  
 Something was done in Milwaukee, as in every other city which is having racial troubles now. What was done was morally and humanly wrong. And any such wrong has a price tag—although it may be invisible to those who commit the wrong.

 SAN DIEGO, Calif. — Today's private views and backstage maneuvers of Jesse Unruh, the shrewd and powerful Speaker of the California state assembly, can only increase political unease in the White House. Once considered President Johnson's most important ally in California, Unruh is off the LBJ standard. He now sees Mr. Johnson's presence on the 1968 ballot menacing continued Democratic control of the Assembly, has quietly moved from "hawk" to "dove" on Vietnam, and has renewed his old alliance — in letters a year ago — with Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

More important than what he thinks is what Unruh is doing: quietly sounding out opinion about forming an uncommitted delegation of officeholders — dominated by Congressmen and legislators. These were the first and last words spoken in the President's behalf. State Chairman Charles Warren, rambling on and ignoring Mr. Johnson, industrialist Martin Stone, vice chairman of the party's new Advisory Committee, delivered a withering blast at the President's Vietnam policies.

Indeed, aside from Wyman, the only prominent Democrat here openly cheering the President is maverick Sam Yorty, of Los Angeles. But Yorty is a passionate blood enemy of Wyman, and a close ally of Unruh, reflecting the chambered complexity inside California's Democratic party. It fairly defies any effort to assemble an LBJ coalition one year before the Presidential campaign.

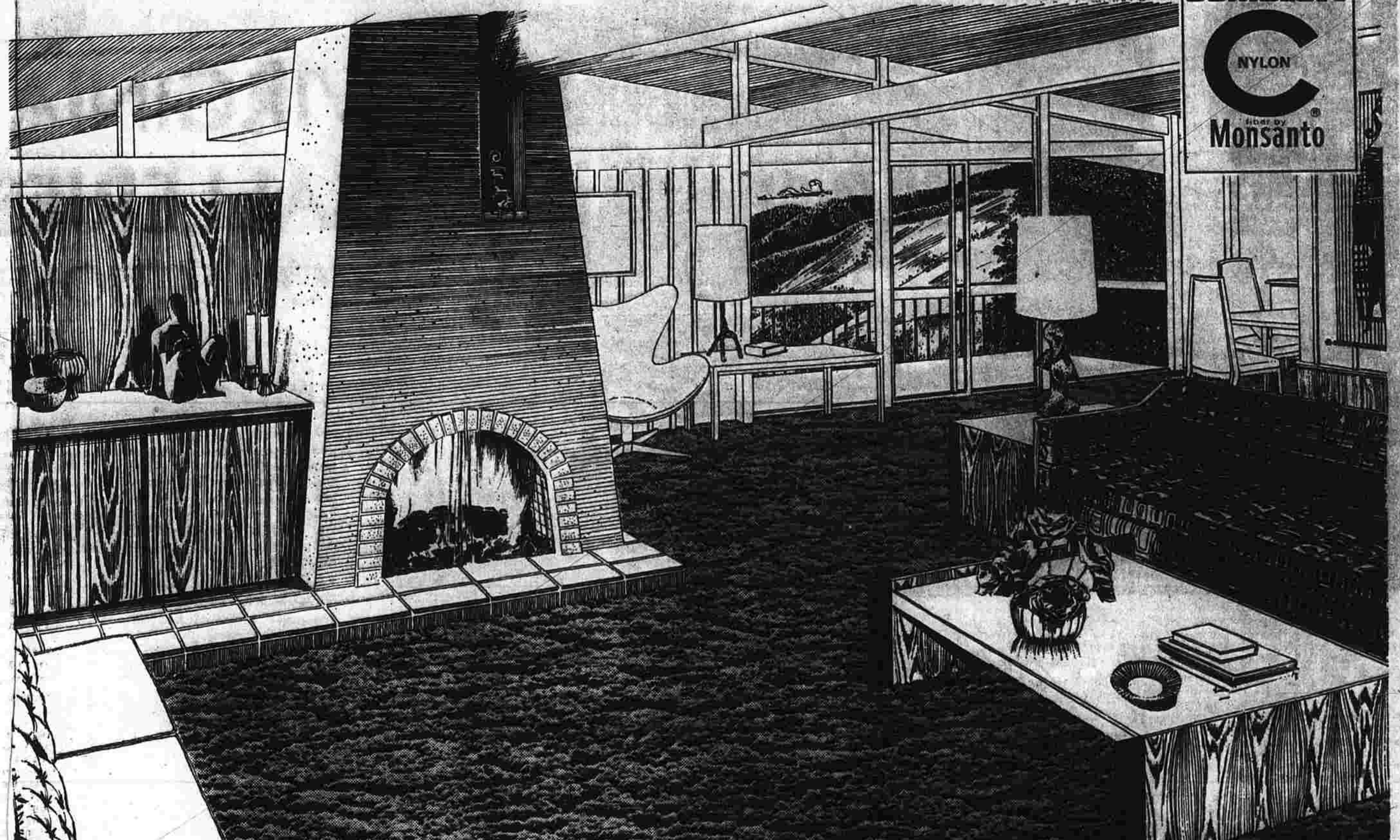

### Controversy Swirls Around Migrant N.J. Labor Camps

BRIDGINGTON, N.J. (AP) — The old Negro woman shook her head as dust swirled around her from a battered station wagon, loaded with migrant workers heading for a night on the road after another long day of toiling in the fields.

"These poor vineheads," the woman muttered, "they need the Lord."

The scene is southern New Jersey, heartland of 1,770 migrant labor camps in the state. The harvest is just about over. But after a year of turmoil, controversy swirls around the plight of the transient workers.

"These poor devils," said a member of Gov. Richard J. Hughes' special task force on migrant labor. "The trouble is they have no one to represent them. They work for the summer, make a few dollars if they're lucky and head back South."

Hughes created the task force after widely publicized complaints in the summer of 1966 about living and working conditions for migrants. He pledged to improve the lot of the migrant laborer.

State Migrant Labor Board, an agency weighted with farmers, migrant laborers and representatives to the state Labor Department.

The department threatened to close a handful of camps it characterized as the worst violators. Complaints included rat and roach infestation, overcrowding, unsanitary conditions and polluted drinking water.

As Hughes was returning from his duties as one of President Johnson's observers at the South Vietnamese election, the state labor commissioner, Raymond F. Male, abruptly canceled the court action, saying the abuses had been cleared up.

Critics cried "whitewash." Hughes conceded some of the criticism might be justified and pledged sweeping overhaul of the living and inspection codes along with broad new enforcement powers.

About 5,000 Negro migrants from the South come to New Jersey every summer to harvest tomatoes, onions, berries and a wide variety of other fruits and vegetables. They are joined by thousands more laborers from Puerto Rico who work under contracts made with that commonwealth.

Some farmers say that it is useless to try to fix up the farm camps. They claim the migrants only reduce improvements to ruin, tearing out screens and ripping toilet seats from their hinges. As for wages, one farmer said, "suppose I give my workers more money. They'll only go out and drink it away."

Anti-poverty workers and civil rights leaders, the leading critics of the farmers, counter that the migrant is exploited on every side, even to being charged double for a bottle of a favorite brand of cheap wine. The critics complain that crew leaders, most of them migrants who rose from the ranks, charge as much as a dollar for a 2-cent pint.

Another common practice, critics claim, is for crew leaders to arrange credit for migrants at stores where exorbitant prices are charged, and the crew chief gets a kickback.

The governor's task force has been holding hearings throughout the summer but Charles G. Yerask, chief of the State Migrant Labor Bureau, said migrants have been generally reluctant to talk to officials about

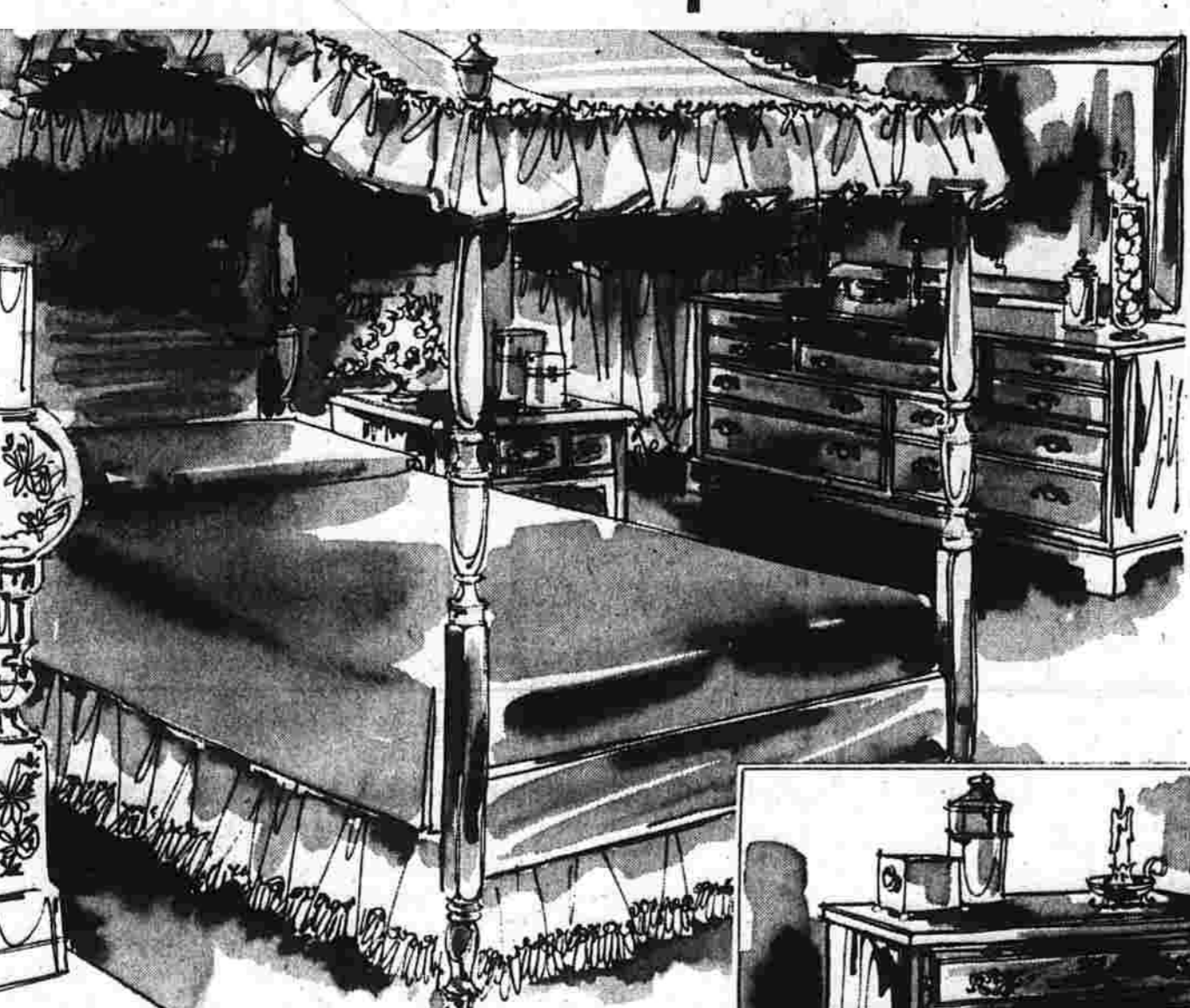

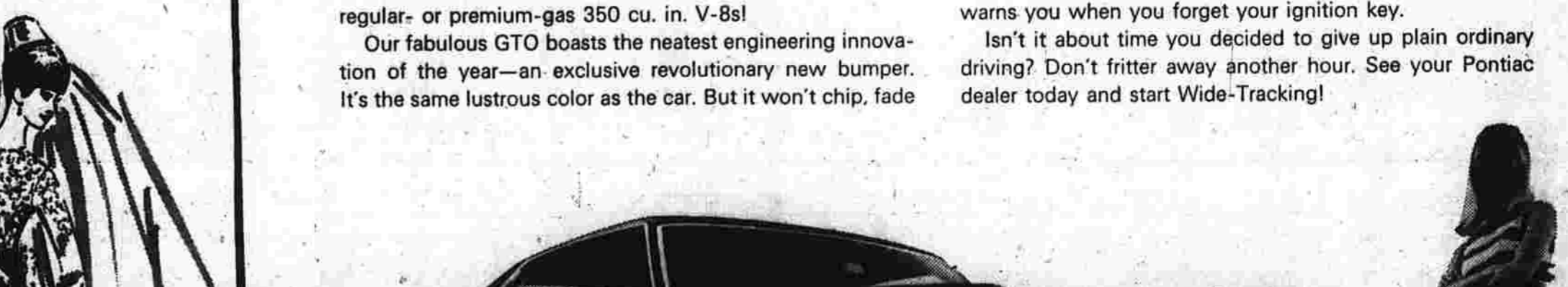

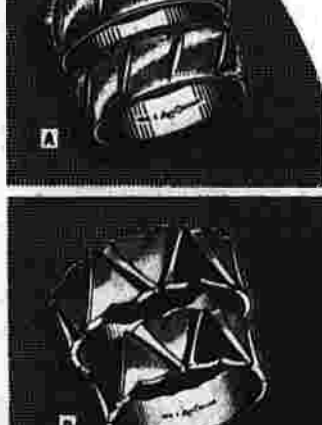

Martin Block, Ex-Disc Jockey, Is Dead at 64

INGLEWOOD, N.J. (AP) — Martin Block, the disc jockey whose mellow voice made "Shake Believe Ballrooms" a radio "hit" for two decades, died Tuesday in Inglewood Hospital following surgery. His age was given as 64.

The same persuasive line of patter that put him in the 1940s-50s "radio" bracket, attracted faithful listeners once estimated at two million persons. At the height of his career, his program was beamed abroad by the Voice of America, amassing him with overseas fan mail.

The "ballroom" show developed by accident during the trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the kidnapping-murder of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's infant son.

Bad Weather Takeoff Delay Typical at State Airports

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — Every bus operator in this state "here we sit like him" in the panic calls when diversions get off.

Sound familiar? If you're part of the flying public trying to get to New York airports from Bradley International Airport, you'll know the frustration.

With rest rooms incapable of handling diverted masses, restaurant facilities are also placed on a standing-room-only basis. A classic example of what can happen when the diversion panic button is pushed occurred when a heavy travel day for the public, planes sat on the end of the runways at Bradley engines running and people waiting for 30 minutes.

A typical delay in takeoff caused by saturation of air space in New York airports can handle a limited number of flights, and too many flights are trying to land. This forces air traffic control to institute flow control that holds planes on the ground for an hour or more. The problem is so bad that the FAA has warned that next year a minimum delay of one hour can be anticipated at New York airports during the peak air traffic period.

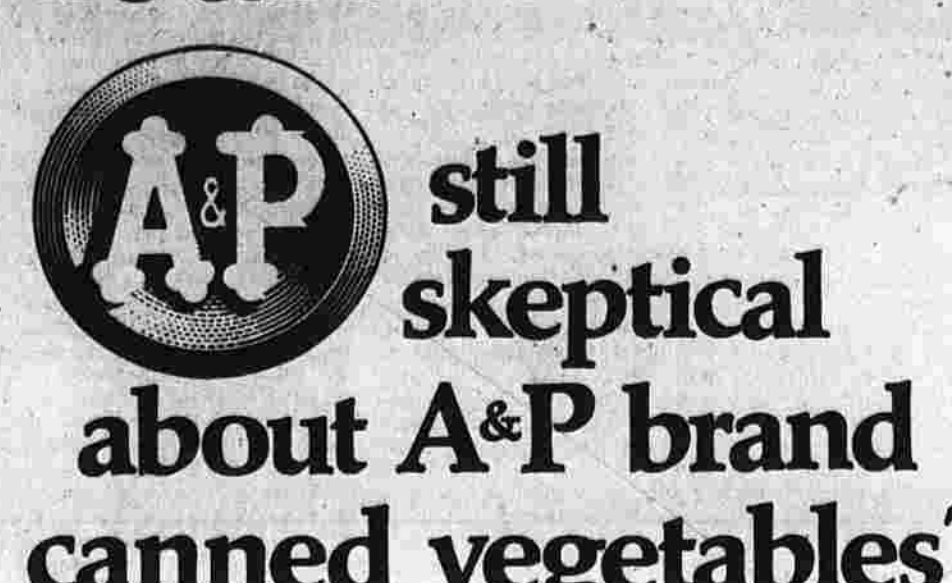
Area Weather WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — Weather conditions in the Northeast continue to be quite placid. The U.S. Weather Bureau reports, "Beautiful summertime weather will prevail today over the region as high pressure returns throughout most of this month. High pressure once again covers the Northeast as well as most of the eastern half of the nation. Over southern New England we can expect mostly sunny skies today with temperatures generally in the upper 70s to low 80s.

The area of high pressure is moving slowly eastward and the return southerly flow as it passes to our east will bring moisture from the South our way. We can therefore look for partly cloudy skies tonight and Thursday with more humid conditions prevailing Thursday along with three aircraft takeoffs per hour to the New York area.

"The small plane needs only 3,000 feet of runway at the most. The solution is to build general aviation strips paralleling the 'long runways,'" Matt said. Donald Sullivan, vice president of Air Kaman, the fixed base and fuel operator at Bradley, said the "diversion situation is getting so bad that we anticipate daily emergency fuel stops by the international jets trying to get into the landing pattern for New York."

In New Mexico Flash Fire Kills 6 Mental Patients

LAS VEGAS, N.M. (AP)—Six men died early today as they apparently attempted to escape a sudden fire at the New Mexico State Hospital for the mentally ill. Another 102 men and women patients walked to safety.



Asst. Director Thomas Barnett said the men, all from Albuquerque, apparently were trying to flee the building but were overcome by smoke. He said one man mistakenly locked himself in a room. Barnett said the men may have "become confused."

The fire broke out shortly before 1 a.m. MDT in a first-floor day room in the north unit of the hospital complex. The dead were on the second floor of the unit.

Hospital officials identified the dead as Peter Babic, 78; Guy Gibson, 78; Cecil Baudridge, 28; Wes Clark, 70; and David Abercrombie, 71. Identification of the 32-year-old sixth victim was withheld pending a post-mortem.

Hospital Director James W. Wegner said the hospital unit almost was filled to capacity. He said the unit housed severely disturbed patients but none had physical disorders.

"When I got there," Barnett said, "you couldn't see down the halls, the smoke was so thick. He said the lower hall was 'filled with a very odd smelling smoke,' but he couldn't see any flames.

Wegner said damage to the structure itself is probably minor with most of the damage coming from smoke. The building is being repaired.

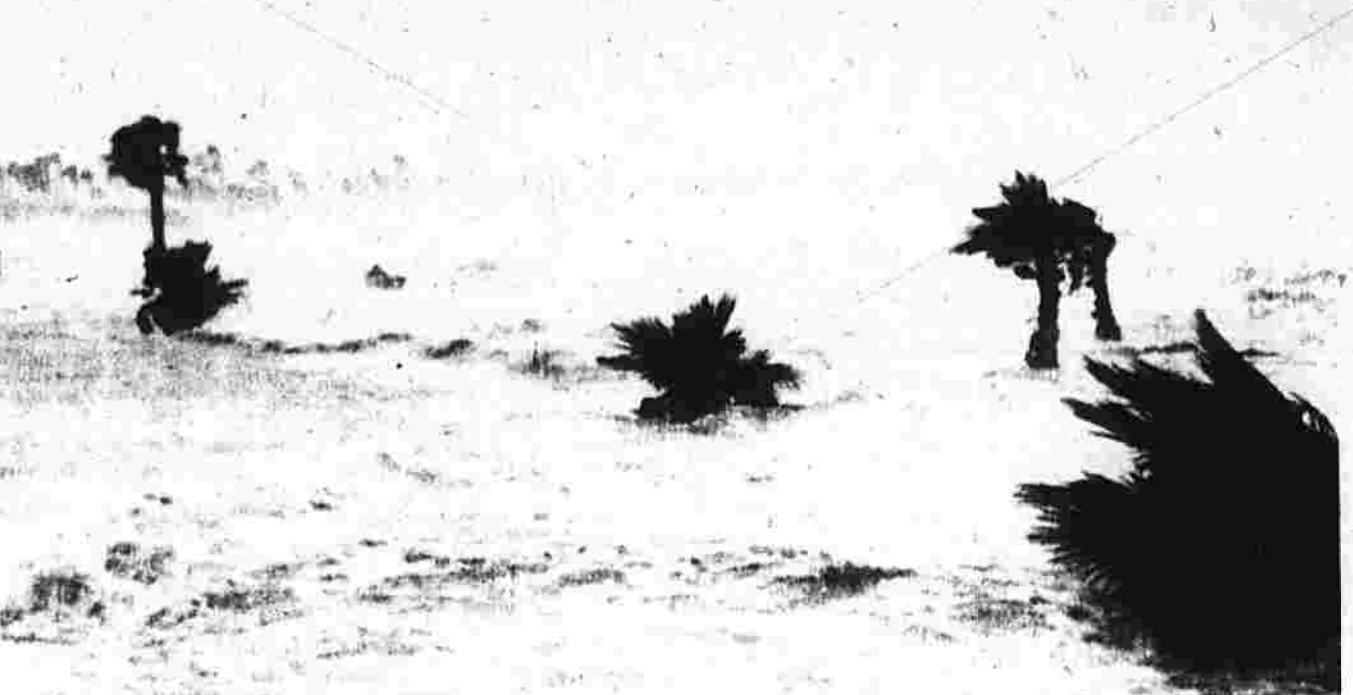

Allies Aim Big Guns At North Beulah Goes Inland; Damage \$500 Million

SAIGON (AP)—Continued North Vietnamese shelling of the city of Hanoi today killed six more Marines and wounded 41, and U.S. forces in the city of Hanoi today killed six more Marines and wounded 41.

The U.S. command also announced that week's casualties—236 Americans killed, mostly in the war of attrition along the DMZ. Communist losses were put at 1,774 killed. The South Vietnamese said they sent 215 dead.

Eight-engine B52 bombers went back for two pre-dawn raids near Con Thien today after they and jungle-skimming fighter-bombers tried to pin down the Communist firing positions and destroy them Wednesday.

Goldberg dealt with a wide range of world problems, including the Middle East, but his main stress was on Vietnam.

He asked North Vietnam's allies, presumably including the Soviet Union, "what would they do or refrain from doing, and how would they then use their influence and power" to bring peace if the United States halted the bombing of North Vietnam.

Goldberg noted that Hanoi had indicated a cessation of the bombing "could lead to negotiations but he said that Hanoi has not made a definite commitment nor has any of its allies."

He expressed hope that Hanoi would agree to a cease-fire if the bombing were stopped.

He said he had sought such a message directly from Hanoi with little success, he said. "On its part, the United States would like to consider and discuss any proposal that would lead promptly to productive discussions that might bring peace to the area."

He then asked: "Does North Vietnam continue to believe that the United States will not use force to bring about a cease-fire and the Israelis will be destroyed?"

The battle began at 7:55 a.m. local time when the Egyptians opened up with small arms and machine guns, gradually intensifying their barrage to recoilless rifles, tanks and heavy artillery, the spokesman said.

Israelis returned the fire. U.N. observers requested a cease-fire and the Israelis refused.
