

Housemembers Suggest

Look at Viet Policy Needed by Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress needs to take a formal look at U.S. policy in the Vietnam war, 50 House members suggested today.

The 46 Republicans and 4 Democrats proposed a resolution asking Congress to decide "whether further Congressional action is desirable in respect to policies in Southeast Asia."

As they prepared their move: —Arthur J. Goldberg, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, said Sunday he does not believe Soviet rejection of his bid for help in getting North Vietnam to the conference table has wrecked peace hopes.

—Sen. Karl Mundt, R-S.D., said Saturday night the United States indirectly told Red China several years ago it would face massive retaliation, including nuclear firepower, if it entered the war in Vietnam. The State Department said no one has been threatened and the White House declined comment on Mundt's remarks.

—Sen. Joseph S. Clark, D-Pa., said Sunday night the Soviet Union might send pilots to fly the MIGs it is supplying North Vietnam.

—Walter P. Reuther, president of the United Automobile Workers, advocated a pause in bombing of North Vietnam "for a period until I think that we have done everything reasonably possible to exhaust the possibilities of new initiatives that might lead to the conference table."

Signers of the latest move in Congress to test U.S. policy in Vietnam range in political philosophy from conservative to liberal.

Rep. Paul Findley, R-Ill., said: "This resolution arises, in my opinion, from deep-seated conviction that the congress itself should deal at this time with questions of basic policy in regard to the Vietnam war. It provides the means through which the Congress can discharge responsibilities in foreign policy clearly placed upon it by the Constitution."

The resolution, if approved by the House and Senate, would call upon congressional committees to consider the questions and report their findings to the two branches.

Findley, a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said he senses "a great uneasiness among members of Congress, many of whom voted

U.S. Drops Leaflets On North Viet Towns

SAIGON (AP) — As the blast some 240,000 leaflets were dropped in a village just above the border warning of "the terrible rain of death and destruction" caused by B52 bombing attacks in the area.

Meanwhile, Gen. William C. Westmoreland, the U.S. commander in Vietnam, said because of allied victories over the last two years, "We are now in a position from which the picture of ultimate military success may be viewed with increasing clarity."

He told South Korean troops in Saigon the allies "have taken tremendous strides toward military victory over the past two years."

In the border battle, Communist gunners fired more than 300 rounds today at Con Thien, a U.S. Marine outpost, just 2 1/2 miles below the demilitarized zone. Marine commanders refused to give up the post, say it holds a commanding position overlooking Communist infiltration routes down from the DMZ, where North Vietnam reportedly has perhaps 35,000 troops.

The B52s mentioned in the leaflets have been trying to take the Communist pressure off Con Thien.

Quads Born

FUKUOKA, Japan (AP) — Girl quadruplets were born yesterday and reported doing well, although birth was premature by 45 days and each weighed only 3.3 pounds.

The mother, Mrs. Mutsuko Mizushima, 28, was also reported in fine condition.

Doctors at National Central Hospital in this southwestern Japanese city said that if the quadruplets, now in incubators, maintain their present condition for another day, their chances of survival are excellent.

Six other sets of quadruplets have been born in Japan but none has survived.

Icebreaker Is Stuck Off Alaska Coast

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — The Coast Guard icebreaker Northwind was reported disabled and stuck in the swelling arctic ice pack about 500 miles northwest of Barrow, Alaska, and two other vessels were speeding to her rescue today.

The 269-foot Seattle-based icebreaker and her 200 men were said to be in no immediate danger, but that the Northwind needed assistance to get out of the dangerous ice before the fast approaching arctic winter sets in.

The cutter Staten Island was expected to head for the scene as quickly as she could replenish her supplies at Nome, Alaska today. She and the Canadian icebreaker John A. MacDonald are expected to reach the Northwind in about two days, the Coast Guard said.

"The Coast Guard estimated that it would take another two days to lead the Northwind out of the frozen trap."

The spokesman said the Northwind became stuck in the thickening ice after she lost a blade from her starboard propeller Saturday night. In addition, the icebreaker was reported to have suffered a four-foot quarter-inch crack in her bow.

The ship is expected to be able to steam under her own power to Seattle for repairs once she is freed from the ice.

The Northwind was on a resupply mission to a small group of U.S. scientists on an ice island. The supplies probably will be flown in later, the Coast Guard said.

AMC Joins Trend; Hikes Auto Prices

DETROIT (AP) — American Motors said today its 1968 cars will carry price tags averaging \$89 or 3.5 per cent higher than those on comparable 1967 models. AMC said it became the fourth U.S. car maker to increase prices on its 1968 models.

AMC's price hike was smaller in terms of dollars than the increases announced by the Big Three but on a percentage basis it was nearer their figures.

AMC's price picture was complicated by the fact that on its 1968 Ambassadors, or top of the line models, air conditioners are standard equipment. They were a \$350 option in 1967 models.

AMC said that the change in air conditioners and in dealer discounts "does not lend itself to a meaningful comparison of price changes. However, the prices of 1968 Ambassadors compared with comparably equipped 1967 models are significantly lower."

According to the auto companies own price figures, which include federal taxes and dealer preparation charges, these were the comparative increases:

General Motors \$110 3.6 per cent; Ford \$114 3.9 per cent; Chrysler \$133 4.6 per cent; AMC Motors \$89 3.5 per cent.

American Motors did as anticipated and priced its new entry into the sporty car field, the Javelin, under its major competitor.

William V. Luneburg, AMC president, said the basic six-cylinder Javelin will carry an advertised delivered price of \$2,649. He said this is \$184 lower than the Barracuda, \$120 lower than the Mustang and \$106 lower than the Camaro.

AMC's 2-door American sedan was priced at \$1,923 to remain the lowest priced car in AMC's line and the lowest priced comparable car in the U.S. industry.

5,000 in City Flee Homes; More Alerted

HARLINGEN, Tex. (AP) — Surging waters of the flooding Rio Grande, swollen by Hurricane Beulah's massive rains, swept roof-deep through fine homes in this South Texas city today after bursting through a flood control dam.

The Texas Department of Public Safety said 5,000 persons in Harlingen fled their homes as record torrents raged down Arroyo Colorado, a side channel of the Rio Grande.

Warnings also were issued for four other communities on the arroyo, including Mercedes, with a population of 11,145. Similarly imperiled were the small trading centers of La Feria, Rio Hondo and Lozano.

Water in the arroyo was a record 39.1 feet deep at 9:30 a.m. (CDT), a rise of almost a foot in three hours, and was still rising at this city of 41,100.

A call went out for more volunteers to help crews who worked through the night around up sandbag dikes around \$50,000 homes and trying to plug storm sewers that led to the arroyo.

The Department of Public Safety said Harlingen was in the greatest danger of the five communities threatened by the rambling arroyo.

The Coast Guard said its helicopters had evacuated 683 Mexicans surrounded by Rio Grande waters elsewhere by dark Sunday. Tremendous water pressure from the Rio Grande ripped out the flood control dam at Mercedes Sunday night, opening the arroyo to the boiling, debris-littered river.

A state official said that since the Rio Grande was expected to stay at high water for several days, so would the arroyo, as it had become in effect a parallel river channel.

The Arroyo carried a flood crest of 34.2 feet in 1958. After that flood the 300-foot wide steel and concrete dam was built near Mercedes to turn floodwaters into a man-made channel and away from the Arroyo and the cities bordering it.

Soviets Block Brown

Peace Bid Fails, Britain Tells Rusk

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk got a first hand fill-in today on the latest fruitless attempt by Britain to persuade the Soviet Union to agree to reconvene the Geneva Conference to seek peace in Vietnam.

British Foreign Secretary George Brown briefed Rusk at the secretary of state's Waldorf Astoria Hotel suite on his talk Saturday with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko.

As cochairmen of the Geneva Conference on Indochina, Brown and Gromyko have the authority to bring Vietnam before that body, but informants said both sides stood by their well-known positions, and the Soviet diplomat showed "no give."

Gromyko has repeatedly turned down proposals by Brown and his predecessors in the British Foreign Office to set up a new parity such as those held in Geneva in 1954 on independence for the two Vietnams, Cambodia and Laos, and in 1962 on neutrality for Laos.

Diplomatic sources said the new Soviet turn-down could have been no surprise to the United States. Gromyko, in his policy speech in the assembly last Friday, ignored a suggestion by U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg that the Soviet Union and Britain convene a Geneva conference on Vietnam.

Brown's meeting with Rusk was part of a continuing round of high-level talks on the fringes of the assembly. Earlier today the U.S. secretary conferred at his suite with Israeli Foreign

Minister Abba Eban on the Middle East dilemma.

Rusk will give a dinner tonight for Gromyko.

Rusk, Gromyko, Brown and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville will be guests of U.N. Secretary-General U Thant at a Big Four "discussion dinner" in Thant's office Tuesday night.

Meanwhile, Eban was to speak today in the U.N. General Assembly's general policy debate, opening public exchange with Arab foreign ministers over how to settle the Israeli-Arab war fought last June 5-10.

The Arab summit, meeting in Khartoum Aug. 29-Sept. 1 agreed on united diplomatic ef-

WASHINGTON—The White House wedding of Lynda Bird Johnson and Marine Capt. Charles S. Robb, with 14 bridal attendants, will be held in the historic East Room on Dec. 8, a Saturday.

The White House made the announcement today.

Lynda, 23, older daughter of the President and Mrs. Johnson, will have her younger sister, Mrs. Patrick J. Nugent, 20, of Austin, Tex., as her matron of honor.

Close friends, relatives, and friends of the bridegroom, including one on duty now in Vietnam, will be in the bridal party.

There is expected to be a military flavor to the wedding, but details are yet to be announced.

Lynda is the eighth daughter of a president to be married in Washington while her father held office—the seventh to be married in the White House itself.

And, it is the first time since the days President Woodrow Wilson that two daughters of a president have married while their father was in the White House.

Lynda and her fiancé, 28-year-old Capt. Robb, were away vacationing at Acapulco, Mexico, while Mrs. Elizabeth

California GOPs Back Reagan as President

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — California's Republican party organization is ready to go to the GOP national convention backing Gov. Ronald Reagan as a favorite son presidential candidate.

A few hours before a poll was released showing Reagan's popularity has slipped a bit this summer, the Republican State Central Committee unanimously supported the first-term governor as California's favorite son.

State GOP Chairman James W. Halley told the Republicans Sunday: "The eyes of the nation are indeed on this state and on Ronald Reagan."

Merwin D. Field's California poll indicated California voters are finding more fault with Re-

gan. Field's figures show 37 per cent thought Reagan was doing a job as of this month, compared with 41 per cent in June. In both polls 33 per cent felt he was doing a fair job.

Those finding him doing a poor job jumped from 17 to 25 per cent.

Field said voters in the earlier poll were judging Reagan more on style and personality. It now appears, he said, that Reagan's handling of state problems has begun to affect his popularity.

Field said Reagan is being criticized chiefly for proposing cuts in the state health program, raising taxes, cutting mental health funds and propos-

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Cities' Racial Troubles On Many Minds in State

HARTFORD (AP) —Violence in the cities was still on many persons' minds in Connecticut over the weekend. It was the topic of speeches by both the state's U.S. Senators and many a clergyman touched on the subject in Sunday sermons.

Meanwhile, a battalion of Connecticut Army National Guardsmen put down a mock riot in Derby in a training exercise.

Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., said in a speech in Hartford that the nation is in a condition of "incipient civil war, with black extremists preparing for action against the white community and with affronted whites preparing for violence against the Negroes."

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., said in a speech in Milford that "civil disorders border on insurrection" and "violence threatens to tear apart the fabric of our society."

In Hartford's predominantly white South End, the Rt. Rev. Magr. Robert W. Doyle warned his congregation at St. Augustin Church against resorting to violence against Negro demonstrators.

He mentioned the gathering of a crowd of white persons in the South End last Monday night when word got out that a group of Negroes was marching down from the North End.

"Ninety-nine per cent of them were out there for curiosity," said the Roman Catholic prelate. "A few—and I repeat that they were few—had intentions that were far from peaceful."

"I have been told that they were out there with bricks and bottles and baseball bats and worse," said Monsignor Doyle.

He urged his congregation "to influence whomever you can in favor of law and order" and "act like good disciples of Christ."

Mt. Washington Snowcapped as Weather Chills

BOSTON (AP)—Three inches of snow decked the 6,288-foot summit of Mt. Washington in New Hampshire today as New England temperatures dipped into the 40s in a foretaste of fall.

Weather forecasts indicated a continued chill today and tonight with a return of warmer weather Tuesday afternoon.

High temperatures today were expected to be mostly in the 50s and low 60s, dropping into the 30s inland and to the low and middle 40s along the coast tonight. Mostly fair weather was forecast for southern and central New England, and mostly cloudy weather in the extreme north.

The Weather Bureau said frost was likely tonight in the lowlands.

Brisk northwest winds accompanied the chill and atop Mt. Washington gusts reached 54 miles an hour.

Rio Grande Valley Pounded by Flood

HARLINGER, Tex. (AP) — Ramping Rio Grande floodwaters pounded relentlessly through this lower valley city today, with at least 200 homes inundated by the wild waters unleashed by deluges from Hurricane Beulah.

Damage estimates mounted past the \$1 billion estimated by state and federal officials after Beulah struck the Texas-Mexico Gulf coast a few miles southeast of Harlingen.

Harlingen residents, among them owners of some of the city's most expensive homes, fled before the flood's fury. They joined thousands left homeless by Beulah's 160-mile-an-hour winds, giant tides and massive rain.

The death toll from Beulah and tornadoes spawned by the hurricane-created storm surge stood at 44, including 11 in Texas and 33 elsewhere in the big storm's wake from the Windward Islands through Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula.

In 17 cities, not counting 4,500 Mexicans who sought emergency shelter in private U.S. homes, the Mexican government counted 100,000 homeless on its side of the Rio Grande from Camaguey 100 miles down the stream to Matamoros, near the river's mouth.

The flooding began serious Sunday night after a diversion dam on the Arroyo Colorado broke, sending tons of debris down the river and flooding the city.

An international boundary and Water Commission spokesman said Monday night the situation would get no better during the next two days.

Volunteers labored through the night sandbagging levees along the Arroyo Colorado, used as a diversionary channel in the multimillion-dollar Rio Grande floodway.

Sharp Quake SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — A sharp earthquake shook Santiago today, knocking scores of people out of buildings, cutting off electricity in some areas and sending people running into the streets in panic.

A half hour after the tremor at 5:11 a.m., the national police office said it had received no reports of casualties.

The force of the quake was estimated at 5 to 6 on a scale whose maximum reading is 12.

Communications with the area north of Santiago were cut off, the state telephone office said. It reported the tremor with its greatest intensity in the region around Valparaiso.

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Ten Children Killed; Poisoning Seen Likely



TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) — Ten children are dead in an apparent outbreak of poisoning in this Mexican border town, 15 miles from San Diego, Calif.

Mexican state police rounded up about 20 dairy operators, cheese salesmen, store owners and other persons here as parents from the city's poorest districts continued to stream to hospitals with their blanket-wrapped, crying children.

Authorities were checking milk supplies as a possible source. Police said no charges had been filed against the 20 persons, but that they were being held for investigation.

Dep. Dist. Judge Hector Valdivia said milk was found in the children's stomachs when pumped. He added that milk is pasteurized in Tijuana and couldn't definitely be blamed until samples were chemically analyzed.

Valdivia said 10 children have been confirmed as dead, but Tijuana police said as many as 20 could die eventually. The dead ranged in age from three months to 10 years.

Scores of children crammed the wards of the city's hospital, some two to a bed. One hospital reported three dead and more than 80 ill. Doctors worked feverishly to save the ailing children, but said several of them would not survive.

Physicians used universal antidotes and antihistamines to treat the poisoning, after pumping out the stomachs of each child. They said milk was found in some of the children's stomachs.

Husband Held Two Killed, Judge Hurt In Divorce

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — A routine divorce proceeding ended in a blaze of gunfire Monday leaving the wife in the case and her attorney dead and the judge wounded. The husband was held without charge today.

Attorneys at the Pennington County courthouse said the shooting broke out after Ray Bivins, a court attraction owner in his late 60s, was told by the judge that he would have to pay his wife more than \$5,000 in alimony.

Dead are Mrs. Bivins, a plump, red-head blonde of 43, and her lawyer, William Brady, 39, a father of four.

Circuit Judge Thomas Parker, 48, a nephew of the late Los Angeles Police Chief William Parker, was hospitalized in satisfactory condition with a wound in the thigh.

Attendees said Parker had led the divorce hearing since the attorney was held without charge today.

Brady told Bivins to put the gun away, witnesses said. "I got up and stood beside Brady," recalled state Atty. Gen. J. Brennan, 39, who was representing Bivins.

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Near Paralysis Covers Huge N.Y. School System

NEW YORK (AP) — Near paralysis gripped the nation's largest public school system today with a teachers' strike into its third week. Negotiators remained deadlocked on key contract issues.

Both sides in the dispute were called to City Hall Monday by Mayor John V. Lindsay but an eight-hour bargaining session failed to produce the critical agreement.

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U.S. Vessel Hit Off North Viet; 1 Killed, 2 Hurt

SAIGON (AP) — One round from North Vietnamese shore batteries hit the 2,200-ton U.S. Navy destroyer Mansfield in the Gulf of Tonkin, killing one crewman and wounding two others, the Navy said today.

The Navy said the round Monday punched a hole four feet in diameter in the base of the destroyer's fire stack and cut a few lightning cables. Forty-seven more rounds fell into the water around the ship.

The Mansfield, which has six five-inch guns, was firing on waterborne targets near Dong Hoi, about 35 miles north of the demilitarized zone.

Shrapnel penetrated the forward fire room and a passage-way but inflicted only light damage, the Navy said.

"The destroyer responded by returning numerous rounds of fire from her five-inch guns until the coastal defense site became silent," a Navy communiqué said.

DETROIT (AP) — United Auto Workers President Walter P. Reuther urged today that Henry Ford II should take a personal hand in contract negotiations at Ford Motor Co., which is in the 20th day of a strike.

Reuther's comments to newsmen came a day after Henry Ford II said, "The UAW should come to the negotiating table ready to settle."

Reuther, who rejoined the UAW's bargaining team at Ford Monday, said he was "pleased" that Ford was making an effort.

Reuther said the UAW "is doing everything it can to bring progress at state and national levels." The Soviet Union has launched Communist satellite in the city of North Vietnam.
