Rio Grande Valley Pounded by Flood

HARLINGER, Tex. (AP) — Ramping Rio Grande floodwaters pounded relentlessly through this lower valley city today, with at least 200 homes inundated by the wild waters unleashed by deluges from Hurricane Beulah.

Damage estimates mounted past the \$1 billion estimated by state and federal officials after Beulah struck the Texas-Mexico Gulf coast a few miles southeast of Harlingen.

In 17 cities, not counting 4,500 Mexicans who sought emergency shelter in private U.S. homes, the Mexican government counted 100,000 homeless on the side of the Rio Grande from Camargo 100 miles down the stream to Matamoros, near the river's mouth.

The flooding began serious Sunday night after a diversion dam on the Arroyo Colorado broke, sending tons of debris down that wide diversion channel.

An International Boundary and Water Commission spokesman said Monday night the situation would get no better during the next two days.

Volunteers labored through the night sandbagging levees along the Arroyo Colorado, used as a diversionary channel in the multimillion-dollar Rio Grande floodway.

National Guard troops stood by Sunday night after a diversion dam on the Arroyo Colorado broke, sending tons of debris down that wide diversion channel.

Sharp Quake

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — A sharp earthquake shook Santiago today, knocking down a few buildings, cutting off electricity in some areas and sending people running into the streets in panic.

A half hour after the tremor at 5:11 a.m., the national police office said it had received no reports of casualties.

The force of the quake was estimated at 5 to 6 on the Richter scale, maximum reaching 12.

Communications with the area north of Santiago were cut off, the state telephone office said. It reported the tremor with greatest intensity in the region around Valparaiso.

Husband Held Two Killed, Judge Hurt In Divorce

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — A routine divorce proceeding ended in a blaze of gunfire Monday leaving the wife in the case and her attorney dead and the judge wounded.

The husband was held without charge today.

Attorneys at the Pennington County courthouse said the shooting broke out after Ray Bivins, a court attraction owner in his late 60s, was told by the judge that he would have to pay his wife more than \$100,000 in alimony.

Ten Children Killed; Poisoning Seen Likely

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) — Ten children are dead in an apparent outbreak of poisoning in this Mexican border town, 15 miles from San Diego, Calif.

Mexican state police rounded up about 20 dairy operators, cheese salesmen, store owners and other persons whose parents from the city's poorest districts continued to stream to hospitals with their blanket-wrapped, crying children.

Authorities were checking milk supplies as a possible source.

Police said no charges had been filed against the 20 persons, but that they were being held for investigation.

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Police Fan Italy For Killer-Robbers

MILAN, Italy (AP) — Police fans stretched 300 miles from Milan to Rome today looking for three bank robbers who sprayed machine-gun bullets at police and passersby as they escaped.

Three civilians were fatally shot and 18 persons injured in a six-mile car chase and gun battle through Milan's streets Monday after four robbers took \$15,000 from a Bank of Naples branch.

The wounded included one robber who was captured along with the loot and six policemen.

It was the most serious episode of banditry in this northern part of Italy since the 1950s.

Public worry over the underworld has been increasing in Italy's second largest city. In the last three months, shootings between rival gangs and executions in Milan have left two dead and six injured.

Romney's Candidacy Will Be Formal Soon

DETROIT (AP) — Michigan Gov. George Romney will announce formally next month that he is a candidate for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination.

The Associated Press has learned that Romney will throw his hat in the national political ring shortly after returning to Michigan at the end of his current tour through Negro slum areas of urban centers.

Since Romney will be back Sept. 28, the announcement that he is a candidate for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination.

But he also added that his announcement would not necessarily be confined solely to the urban trip.

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Near Paralysis Covers Huge N.Y. School System

NEW YORK (AP) — Near paralysis gripped the nation's largest public school system today with a teachers' strike into its third week.

When the mayor re-entered the talks in the afternoon he scolded both the union and the Board of Education for "haggling" over the terms of the tentative oral settlement reached last Wednesday at Grace Mansion.

Both sides have accused each other of reneging on various points in the \$135 million proposed package.

More talks were scheduled today.

Attendance at the city's 600 schools fell to about 20,000 of the 1.1 million registered pupils-by far the smallest number since the strike by the AFT-CIO United Federation of Teachers began Sept. 11.

U.S. Vessel Hit Off North Viet; 1 Killed, 2 Hurt

SAIGON (AP) — One round from North Vietnamese shore batteries hit the 2,200-ton U.S. Navy destroyer Mansfield in the Gulf of Tonkin, killing one crewman and wounding two others, the Navy announced today.

The Navy said the round Monday punched a hole four feet in diameter at the base of the destroyer's fire stack and cut a few lighting cables.

Reds Hit Marines With 1,000 Shells

SAIGON (AP) — Embattled U.S. Marines at the strategic northern outpost of Con Thien today took the brunt of the heaviest sustained Communist firepower in Vietnam since the French defeat at Dien Bien Phu.

The Marines hurled back 10 shells for each one fired at them.

More than 1,000 shells fell Monday on Con Thien, a scarred fortress 34 miles south of the demilitarized zone and the key to the Marine defenses astride Communist invasion routes to the south.

Further north, the destroyer Mansfield was hit by enemy shells that splashed into the sea and called upon the nearby destroyer Morton to open up on the Red shore batteries.

New Peace Talk Bid By Britain's Brown

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — British Foreign Secretary George Brown called today for immediate peace talks on Vietnam, but charged that Communist Hanoi has "declined to body."

Albert Shanker, president of the 49,000-member UFT, said the earliest the teachers could return would be Thursday.

But the board announced schools would be open again today.

Supervisory personnel have been keeping the schools open.

Reuther Urges Henry Ford to Get into Talks

DETROIT (AP) — United Auto Workers President Walter P. Reuther urged today that Henry Ford II should take a personal hand in contract negotiations at Ford Motor Co., which is in the 20th day of a strike.

Reuther's comments to newsmen came a day after Henry Ford II said, "The UAW should come to the negotiating table ready to settle."

Reuther, who rejoined the UAW's bargaining team at Ford making an effort today, said, "Maybe Mr. Ford does not know what is happening at the bargaining table and it might be a good idea if he came down here for a couple of days and not making an effort."

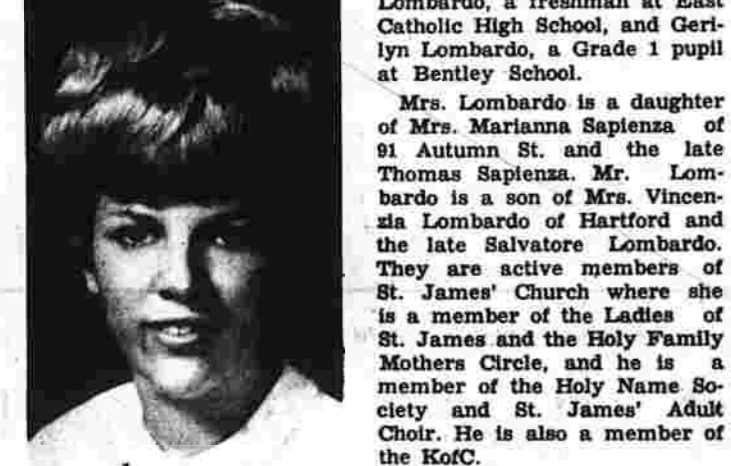

### Italian Winemakers Move To Meet Threat of Fraud

ROME (AP)—Italy's winemakers, their international prestige at stake, are moving to meet the threat of unscrupulous producers who turn water into wine by adding sugar and artificial coloring.

The world's second wine manufacturer, Italy had a bumper grape crop this year. But Italian winemakers are worried that fraud will darken the reputation of their famous asti, chianti and marsals.

An elaborate law banning the addition of sugar and other substances to fermenting grape juice was passed two years ago. Several delegates urged that the law be made more strict. "Fraud is now almost impossible."

But production of artificial wine persisted and early this year police arrested Giuseppe Ferrari, along with 15 others in a \$1.1-million fraud case. Police said Ferrari's wines were filled with water, sugar, artificial coloring and acid.

### GOP's Plan Showdown On Spending Levels

WASHINGTON (AP)—House Republicans, determined that President Johnson's tax-cutting program will be paid for by a spending bill through Congress, plan a showdown on the issue Wednesday.

Rep. Frank T. Bow, of Ohio, senior GOP member of the appropriations committee, said he will try at a Wednesday committee meeting to reduce emergency appropriations bill by his provision requiring Johnson to reduce the spending level to the President announced in January.

But Democrats control the committee, 20 to 10, and Chairman George H. Mahon, D-Tex., said he will fight Bow's plan.

The committee will meet in the morning. That afternoon, the House will take up the temporary funding bill.

Federal agencies which haven't received their annual money allocations will be in a bind after midnight Saturday when Congress enacts the bill. Appropriations committees are working on the bill.

The current budget year began July 1, but many spending bills have not been enacted.

Treasury Secretary Henry H. Fowler said other administration spokesmen have said the President can't decide on spending cuts until he has had a hearing in appropriations Congress will give him.

But Rep. John W. Byrne of Wisconsin, senior Republican on the Ways and Means Committee, said the President must specify what the cuts will amount to.

Byrne told the American Bankers Association meeting in New York: "The tax increase and reduction in spending should be a package which would assume that the deficit for fiscal 1968 would be cut in half."

The President needs a 10 per cent surcharge on income taxes, which would raise about \$7.4 billion while the deficit has been forecast at up to \$29 billion.

Byrne's proposal for spending cuts thus could involve about \$7.4 billion.

Other ways and means committee members have mentioned a \$5 billion cut.

Taking direct issue with Fowler's view, Byrne said: "We will not get a tax increase from Congress until a reduction in spending is assured."

The tax hike bill is being held up in the Ways and Means Committee by Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., who also wants assurance of spending reductions.

### N&W Ordered To Take Over 3 Rail Lines

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission ordered National and Western Railway to take over three smaller railroads.

In a 99-page brief filed Monday by mail with U.S. District Court in New York City, the ICC, joined by the Justice Department, asked the court to approve its June 9 order requiring N&W to take over the Erie-Lackawanna, Delaware & Hudson and Boston & Maine railroads.

The commission said it considered a number of alternatives before making its order, including several proposed by N&W. The ICC said it has discharged its obligations under the law, conforming to a Supreme Court order and has offered N&W the opportunity to include in its system the three smaller lines. But the ICC added it "cannot obligate the carriers to avail themselves of that opportunity."

The three judge court will hear the case on Thursday.

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### Police Tests Start, Many Pass Them Up

The controversial police promotion exams began last night as written tests for the lieutenant slot were taken. Tonight, at the same location, the Highland Park School on Porter St., 25 patrolmen will take the much-disputed percent of tomorrow's test.

The written test for detective was taken last night. This is the first part of the complete testing program. The policemen who pass this part of the test will then go on to take the oral part of the exam. If an applicant fails the written part, he cannot go on.

According to Donald Audi, superintendent of municipal services for the state, "about 25 patrolmen" will take the test tomorrow. There are 35 patrolmen with four or more years of service who are eligible, but some chose not to file an application. For several months, the Manchester Police Association has claimed that the testing was "rigged." In spite of assurances by Town Manager Robert Weiss and Audi, the MPA persisted in the rigorous claim. They said that particularly the oral part of the test, which counts 40 percent of the overall points, could be rigged.

Five sergeants were eligible to take tests for lieutenant yesterday, but only four took it. Sgt. George Dent did not take the test; he was unavailable for comment.

The vacancy on the police force was created when Lt. Henry Gaudreault retired last summer to enter private business. His position will be filled by one of the sergeants, and the vacancy will then be created among the sergeants. The patrolmen tonight are taking the test to fill this vacancy.

Tomorrow night, the written test will be given for a permanent appointment of a patrolman.

### Vernon Voters Okay School But Reject Offices

Seven per cent of the town's voters chose yesterday to build the \$1.75 million Vernon elementary school in 39-room center.

The vote on the school was 418-246.

The vote on the center was 244-401.

District 1 of the old City of Rockville supplied most of the "no" votes. The school lost in Rockville by 142-156. The center there is \$2,000,000.

District 2 of the old City of Rockville approved the school by 278-82 but disapproved the center 168-201.

Of 659 voters came to the polls although they were open 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The Board of Education met last night in Building A and expressed satisfaction with the school vote but disappointment on the center.

With resignation, Board Chairman Edith Casati said: "We'll continue to meet here. Dr. Raymond E. Ramanoff, superintendent, said, 'Frankly, I'm disappointed.'"

He noted the state of his own office and pointed also to the converted gym used for office and storage space by his staff. He said the school is expected to be completed by September 1968.

Dr. Ramanoff said the center state aid is not available without building it with the school.

### College Lease Issue Far from Resolved

The long-standing problem of arriving at a lease for Manchester Community College's new building, appeared only to grow more tangled as the result of discussion at last night's meeting of the Board of Education.

T.H. Laski, finance officer of the State Board for Regional Community Colleges, appeared at the request of the board, which has been trying since last year to get a lease for the building. This reflects the actual cost of using the facilities.

All that was discussed was that the college was to be established, however, was a pledge from Laski that "we stand ready and willing to work with you...we're anxious to see that Manchester is reimbursed for costs."

Applying the state-proposed formula to this lease, Laski added, results in a cost of \$45 per pupil—the same as it proposes for other leases.

Noting that the session had been directed that negotiations be continued, Laski said the talks could be held directly with him and Neumann, but that any agreement reached would still have to be ratified by four state agencies.

The Board of Regional Community Colleges is now in session in every town except Manchester where the colleges are leasing local facilities, such as the Department of Public Health and Finance Control.

"That could take until June," Laski said, "but obviously pertinent."

Replied Laski: "I think the college will go along with our recommendation if it is fair and equitable."

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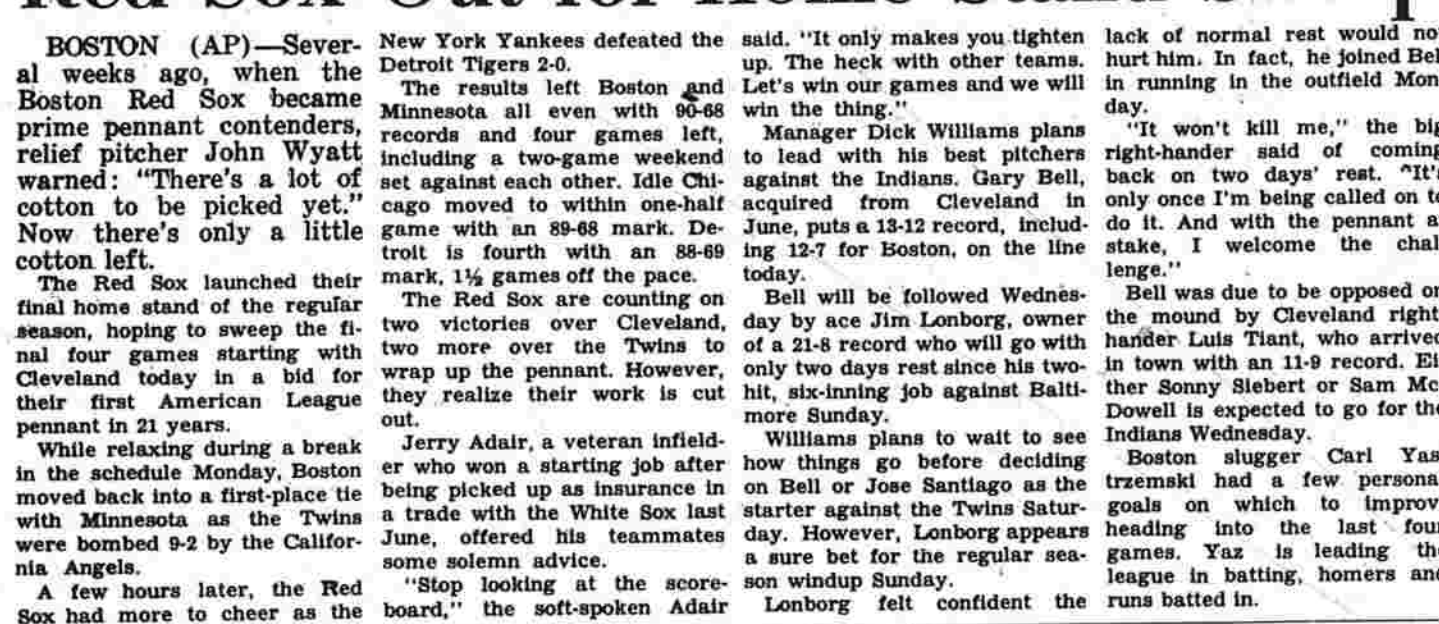
