Labor Set To War on Strike Law

NEW YORK (AP)—Angered over penalties levied for the 17-day strike of New York City's school teachers, organized labor today pledged twin assaults—in the courts and at the polls—to wipe out a new state law forbidding strikes by public employes. The penalties imposed on the city's public school teachers and some were reportedly ready to renew the walkout that crippled the 1.1-million-pupil system for 14 classroom days.

Police Repel 1,500 Students As Teachers Picket at OSU

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Car. Moments later a special squad of about 40 policemen in black riot jackets and helmets, carrying 30-inch riot clubs, marched in formation along the street and refusing to take any precipitate action. Shanker and his AFL-CIO United Federation of Teachers were found guilty of criminal contempt for disobeying a court order to halt the strike. The union itself was fined \$100,000, which broke down to \$5 for each of the union's 20,000 members. The blonde, 26-year-old, says a union official told her yeoman's work was menial.

Woman in Battle For Yeoman's Post

She says that last December, while serving as a stewardess on a cruise aboard Moore-McCormack's S.S. Argentinia, she was promoted to yeoman by the company. But she says she is an experienced typist and her rating was found satisfactory. Unable to get a yeoman's ticket to go back to school, she was offered a yeoman's position. "They replaced me with an 18-year-old boy without experience who got two weeks later to go back to school."

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—State Rep. A. W. Willis, seeking to become the first Negro mayor of this old South city, pegged his hopes on a quick victory today that would preclude a runoff. Willis, first Negro elected to the Tennessee legislature since the Populist period early in the century, faced six white candidates in today's voting as a major Southern city.

Parents Seek Dope Supply

PALOM VERDE, Calif. (AP)—Alarmed parents in the exclusive Palom Verde area near Los Angeles plan to pay for a sheriff's deputy to find out who is supplying marijuana to their children. The number of narcotics arrests among teenagers especially has grown sharply. The parents have worked out a plan by which the Los Angeles County and the coastal cities that make up the Palom Verde area will share the cost of hiring a plainclothes narcotics officer from the county.

U.S. Dead, Wounded Pass 100,000 in Viet

SAIGON (AP)—The U.S. Command announced today that the number of American dead and wounded in the Vietnam conflict in six months and becomes the fourth largest in the nation's history. The intensification of the war, despite the absence of many large-scale ground actions, was reflected in the headquarters report of 33 ground sweeps in progress and new targets hit for the first time in North Vietnam. U.S. warplanes smashed at bridges in Haiphong and returned to within 10 miles of Red China for the second straight day Wednesday, pressing their campaign to disrupt North Vietnam's supply lines as much as possible before the monsoon rains expected to start this month.

Ford Hunts For Ways to Offset Losses

DETROIT (AP)—The nation's Ford dealers, feeling an increasing bite from a United Auto Workers strike against their supplier, are searching for ways to offset actual or expected losses. In a spot check of dealers in half a dozen cities, major outlets appeared to be holding their own, but at least one, Queens Ford in New York, said "if things don't get better, I'll have to close up the end of the month."

Rocket Parts Poor, Says Braun Letter

WASHINGTON (AP)—A congressional disclosure today that rocket scientist Werner von Braun's office complained in February that the huge Saturn rocket project he heads was plagued by poor-quality engines and other hardware which could cause a serious accident. The Saturn rocket is to be used to propel American astronauts to the moon. Rep. William F. Ryan, D-N.Y., told the House the Rockwell Division of North American Aviation was told in the letter: "These are your engines which are going to cause us a serious accident if this situation is allowed to continue."

Switcher Blamed For Rail Crash
LIEGE, Belgium (AP)—A series of human errors was blamed today as the cause of a three-train crash that killed 12 and injured 75 in nearby Fexhe-le-Haut-Chever Wednesday. Railways officials gave this explanation of the accident: A car crashed through a level crossing gate in Momalle, two miles from Fexhe, in the morning. This not only damaged the crossing's automatic signal and closing system, but jammed the whole automatic signal system at the Fexhe station to which it was linked.

Tolland African Advises Missionaries

By BETTE QUATRAHE The new Africa is keen to learn anything which can improve or bring progress to the continent, stated southern Rhodesian student Gaylord Kambarami, the other day.

Kambarami is a business and administration student attending the University of Connecticut where he is enrolled in his final year. He spoke of the contrasts between the attitudes and beliefs of old Africa and new Africa, and how the people would be reached by missionaries.

A successful missionary today must have courage and keep up with the times in Africa. He must try to discover the African beliefs and unknown superstitions and work from there. He may then match these with those of the Western world, enlighten the African populace, building a strong foundation Kambarami explained.

Kambarami, who received his education in mission schools, was critical of the style missionaries who preached that everything that was African was wrong — this was the way to do things. They often failed to live up to their own preachings, leading to confusion in the minds of the Africans, he said.

Goals of Missionary He attributed the acceptance of the Islam religion to its basic philosophy of equality. The African basketry practices a "cause and effect solution" to all his problems according to Kambarami.

He cited three goals to be met by those trying to help the Africans. The first was to bring about a moral unity, guidelines must be established along the lines of what is moral in Africa. An example is the African belief that women belong in the home. They do not have the equality of men and women that exists in the United States today.

The new missionaries must establish common programs for the education and welfare of the African people. The uneducated African is afraid to meet the unknown and becomes wrapped up in the African beliefs and superstitions. The educated African, however, is curious to explore the unknown beyond himself.

The most critical need is to educate the Africans to teach and help their own people. The African teacher or missionary will be more readily accepted by the uneducated African than the "outsider," Kambarami explained.

Political Detainees American missionaries are partially responsible for the present political upheaval in many of the African countries today, according to Kambarami. There are over 500 political detainees in prison in Southern Rhodesia. They are held for indefinite terms without charges filed. Their families are left on their own to do as best they can without the husbands or fathers, without help from the government.

These people are absorbed into the African community where they try to help each other, he explained. Education of the African is not being devoted solely to the men. Women missionaries are now working with the women in their homes, teaching them how to care for their babies, to assure clean water, and other basic home learning techniques. Reception of the program has been "wonderful," according to Kambarami whose brother heads one of the missions where the women are receiving this training.

The problems related to a lack of education were illustrated by Kambarami as he described his parents' reaction to his leaving

From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Winning 12 awards for her 12 entries of jams and jellies in the recent Hartford Fair is not a new experience for Mrs. Jerome B. Smith of 15 Summit Dr., who has won top awards each year at the fair since she first entered in 1964. Known in Tolland as the local jammer, Mrs. Smith says she just "has to do things that are different," which explains why she is the only woman on the Tolland Volunteer Ambulance Corps, and also has her own wine license to make rhubarb and beet wines. Two of her winning recipes are Crab Apple Jelly and Elderberry Jelly.

Crab Apple Jelly
Take five pounds of crab apples and remove blossoms and stem ends from fully ripe, tart, juicy apples. Cut apples in half and do not peel or core. Add five cups water and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Crush with masher and simmer five minutes longer. Let fruit stand at least 12 hours then place in jelly bag and squeeze out juice or let juice drip out slowly by itself.

Take seven cups of juice and pour in a pan. Add one box of dry pectin and bring to boil immediately. Add nine cups of sugar and stir constantly. Bring to a full, rolling boil and boil one minute while stirring constantly. Remove jelly from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Pour at once into sterilized jars or glasses, cover with melted paraffin wax or another lid. Cook, keeping jars a few inches apart from each other.

Elderberry Jelly
Take three pounds of berries and remove larger stems from fully ripe berries and crush. Heat gently until juice starts to flow and simmer covered for 15 minutes. Place in jelly bag and squeeze out juice. Measure three cups and add three tablespoons lemon juice. Place juice in pan and add one box of powdered pectin. Bring to boil, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Cool and store.

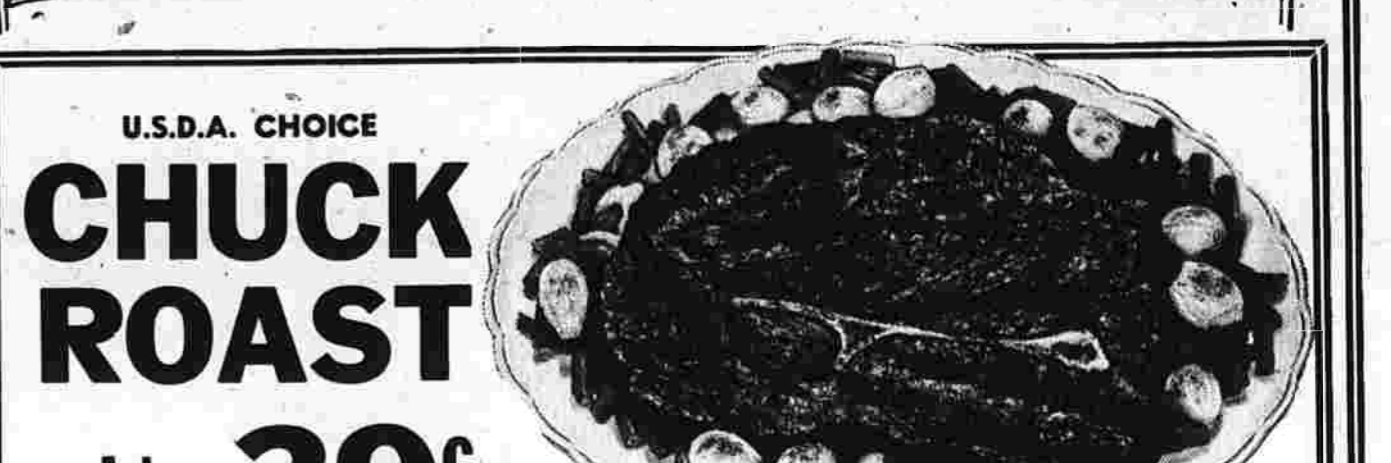

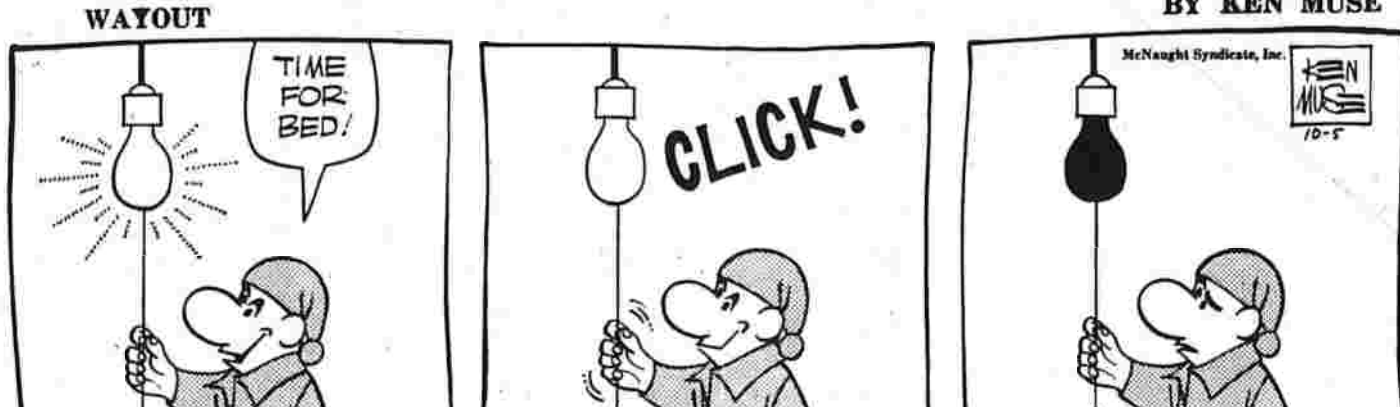

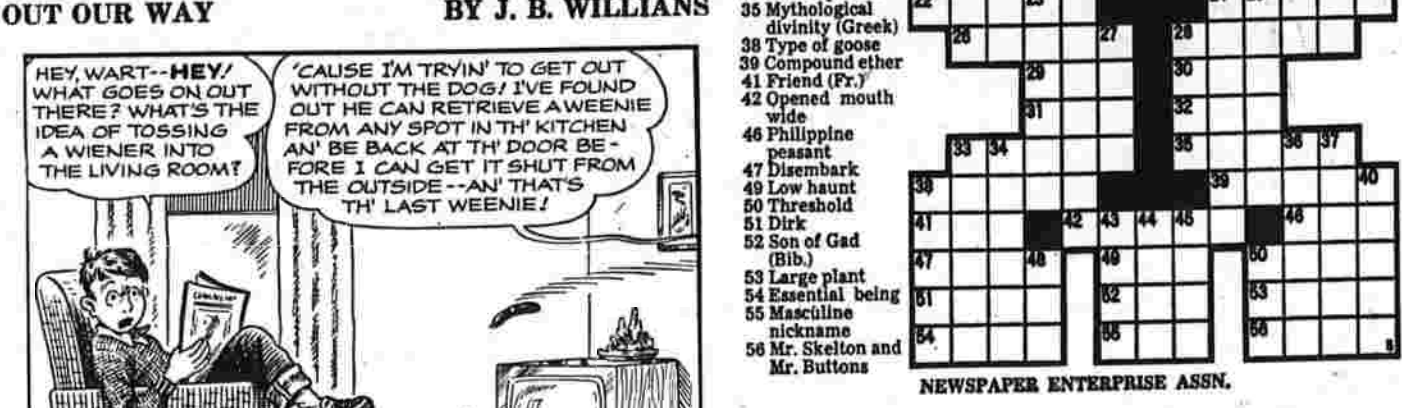
