NEW YORK (AP) — The AFL-CIO American Federation was considering disciplinary action against several other members for crossing NABET picket lines. The four local television men, it was announced, were fined \$250 each for crossing picket lines.

APTRA said the four were fined for crossing picket lines of the AFL-CIO National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians (NABET), which has been on strike against the ABC television and radio networks since Sept. 22 in a contract dispute.

The four men fined are among numerous performers, announcers, newscasters and disc jockeys who have individual contracts with ABC. The company contends these contracts take precedence over the employees' obligations to their union. The fines were made public Tuesday, a few hours before NABET announced that its members employed by the National Broadcasting Co. had voted by a 10-1 margin to approve a new three-year contract with NBC.

The contract was worked out by negotiators recently without a strike. It increases the average weekly basic pay from \$218 to \$240 by next October and reduces the work week from 40 to 37½ hours starting next year.

The 1,600-member NABET struck after rejecting an ABC offer of an increase in average weekly pay from \$218 to \$223. The 18,000-member AFL-CIO said that in addition to fining mandated \$275.

Sadly But Reassuringly Human
 No one could be sure, for a good long post-war period, that the character and brains and energy of the German people had not created an economic miracle.
 Indeed, we Americans were frequently being urged, by some of our observers, to look upon what had happened in West Germany after World War II as a sort of model example of what a really industrious, serious, hard-working, non-nonsense people could do for itself.
 For the better part of 15 years, it seemed that a miracle was taking place—a miracle which seemed likely to extend itself into something even more amazing—a permanent prosperity perhaps.
 Now the strain and tension are over. The West Germans are human as we are. They didn't invent permanent prosperity. They haven't possessed supernatural economic wisdom.
 The sad story in West Germany today is not one of unlimited boom, but of burgeoning bankruptcy. During the first half of the current year, a record total of 2,246 companies went into bankruptcy and disappeared from the scene.
 "After years of stormy growth," says the West German news magazine *Der Spiegel*, "thousands of businessmen now are forced to their knees... the profit boom is followed by the bankruptcy boom."
 So there, at last, comes the sad realization. There are, apparently, no human beings anywhere who are not human beings. There are no supermen. In the economies, it is that nobody anywhere has yet developed that voluntary self-discipline which would take boom prosperity and deliberately hold it down, and ration it out, with the objective of making it last longer—perhaps even, forever.
 If we have a good boom going, he it in the United States of West Germany, our human instinct is to assume it is going to last forever, particularly if we keep reaching out for bigger and bigger individual shares of it.

General Giap's Reduced Goal

American interpreters can afford to concede almost every point of the famous General Giap, victor of Dienbienphu and minister of defense in the government of North Vietnam, claims in his latest public assessment of the war in Vietnam.
 And, after they have conceded General Giap all he claims, they can find equal or even greater importance in what he does not say, time, claim for his side of the war.
 General Giap claims that American forces in Vietnam now find themselves in a stalemate from which they can escape only by bringing in enough extra force to undertake the invasion of North Vietnam. He does not think the United States is yet ready to face up to the likelihood of new world war such as an invasion would entail. General Giap also claims that those moves and feints of his which have required us to move additional units to the north have interfered with our pacification program by disrupting the constancy of our military presence in the areas we are trying to pacify.
 General Giap also contributed a not unshared analysis of the diminishing returns we Americans get from the escalation of our presence in Vietnam. "The more the war is Americanized," he wrote, "the more disgruntled the puppet Saigon army and administration become."
 In all these respects, General Giap, appraising the situation from his side of the battle, is after all, merely noting difficulties already prominent in almost every American analysis of the state of the war. He is not claiming anything we ourselves do not know to be substantially true.
 But now we come to the tacit admissions of General Giap's statement, in which he seems to have begun to understand the one thing it has been the whole American purpose in Vietnam to teach him. No longer is there, in General Giap's analysis, any vision of a strategic and psychological trap at some new Dienbienphu.
 Rather it seems, between the lines rather than in any open, direct admission, as if the best military authority in North Vietnam has now come to the realization that he is going to obtain no victory as such, but can hope only, at best, for a continuation and holding of the stalemate.
 This is the kind of military thinking which, sooner or later, germinates the political willingness to discuss at a conference table what has been demonstrated and established in the field.
 No official American military leader, so far, has made any public admission that we have attained a position of stalemate. Officially, at least, we still cling to the theory that we are winning, slowly but surely, and that all we have to do, to break the stalemate our way, is to keep gradually intensifying our own pressure. It was apparently on the theory that we had the enemy, not on the run, but in a slow squeeze, that we turned last winter from the possibility of negotiation to the process of more build-up and more pressure.
 The military itself has not changed since then, but there has recently been, from all kinds of sources, including a number of erstwhile political hawk, widespread civilian assertions that the war is stalemated, and that the effort it would take to break the stalemate open would require something so stupendous it would be self-defeating again.
 What comes into view, at the moment, is an area of agreement in analysis of the state of the war between the military of North Vietnam and the political of the United States, both of which admit stalemate. If the political arm in North Vietnam should ever decide to act on its military intelligence, and the military arm in this country at least tacitly concede what is being proclaimed by so much of our political world, the situation might be set up for stalemate to meet stalemate and agree on stalemate. That might be a condition for ending the killing.

Down To Earth

Let's face it. The soil on the moon contains from 53 to 63 per cent oxygen, 15.4 to 21.6 per cent silicon, 10 to 16 per cent sulphur, iron, cobalt and nickel, 4.5 to 8.5 per cent aluminum and traces of magnesium, carbon, and sodium—all reported by Surveyor 5 and its small soil interfered with our pacification program by disrupting the constancy of our military presence in the areas we are trying to pacify.
 General Giap also contributed a not unshared analysis of the diminishing returns we Americans get from the escalation of our presence in Vietnam. "The more the war is Americanized," he wrote, "the more disgruntled the puppet Saigon army and administration become."
 In all these respects, General Giap, appraising the situation from his side of the battle, is after all, merely noting difficulties already prominent in almost every American analysis of the state of the war. He is not claiming anything we ourselves do not know to be substantially true.
 But now we come to the tacit admissions of General Giap's statement, in which he seems to have begun to understand the one thing it has been the whole American purpose in Vietnam to teach him. No longer is there, in General Giap's analysis, any vision of a strategic and psychological trap at some new Dienbienphu.
 Rather it seems, between the lines rather than in any open, direct admission, as if the best military authority in North Vietnam has now come to the realization that he is going to obtain no victory as such, but can hope only, at best, for a continuation and holding of the stalemate.
 This is the kind of military thinking which, sooner or later, germinates the political willingness to discuss at a conference table what has been demonstrated and established in the field.
 No official American military leader, so far, has made any public admission that we have attained a position of stalemate. Officially, at least, we still cling to the theory that we are winning, slowly but surely, and that all we have to do, to break the stalemate our way, is to keep gradually intensifying our own pressure. It was apparently on the theory that we had the enemy, not on the run, but in a slow squeeze, that we turned last winter from the possibility of negotiation to the process of more build-up and more pressure.
 The military itself has not changed since then, but there has recently been, from all kinds of sources, including a number of erstwhile political hawk, widespread civilian assertions that the war is stalemated, and that the effort it would take to break the stalemate open would require something so stupendous it would be self-defeating again.
 What comes into view, at the moment, is an area of agreement in analysis of the state of the war between the military of North Vietnam and the political of the United States, both of which admit stalemate. If the political arm in North Vietnam should ever decide to act on its military intelligence, and the military arm in this country at least tacitly concede what is being proclaimed by so much of our political world, the situation might be set up for stalemate to meet stalemate and agree on stalemate. That might be a condition for ending the killing.

Britons Who Flee from Tea Become Loyal with Coffee

LONDON (AP) — Britons who flee from tea to coffee are becoming more loyal with coffee, a current campaign suggests.

The Coffee Promotion Council may not be an unbiased authority but it insists that coffee drinkers are among the up and coming in the world. Under the slogan "Coffee is the Up Cup" it is launching a year-long drive to win over this nation of tea lovers.

Britons drink five cups of tea for every cup of coffee. Consumption of coffee has doubled in the last 10 years, but the council isn't satisfied.

The council, aided financially by countries making up the International Coffee Organization, aims its campaign at young married women in whose hands—and purses—lies the potential for Great Britain to become a nation of coffee drinkers.

A primary target is the industrial Midlands, including Sheffield with its steel products, Coventry with its automobile industry and Birmingham with its automobile and arms industries.

The campaign's chief weapon is a series of advertisements showing coffee as an exciting, glamorous drink. One commercial shows a coffee drinker against the background of a jet airliner taking to flight while a commentator intones: "Let off coffee gives you that wonderful lift."

A coffee wagon will go around housing developments serving free cups at community centers and encouraging young wives to get to know each other.

The campaign is aimed at increasing the consumption of coffee and not to promote any particular variety but about 80 per cent of Britain's consumption.

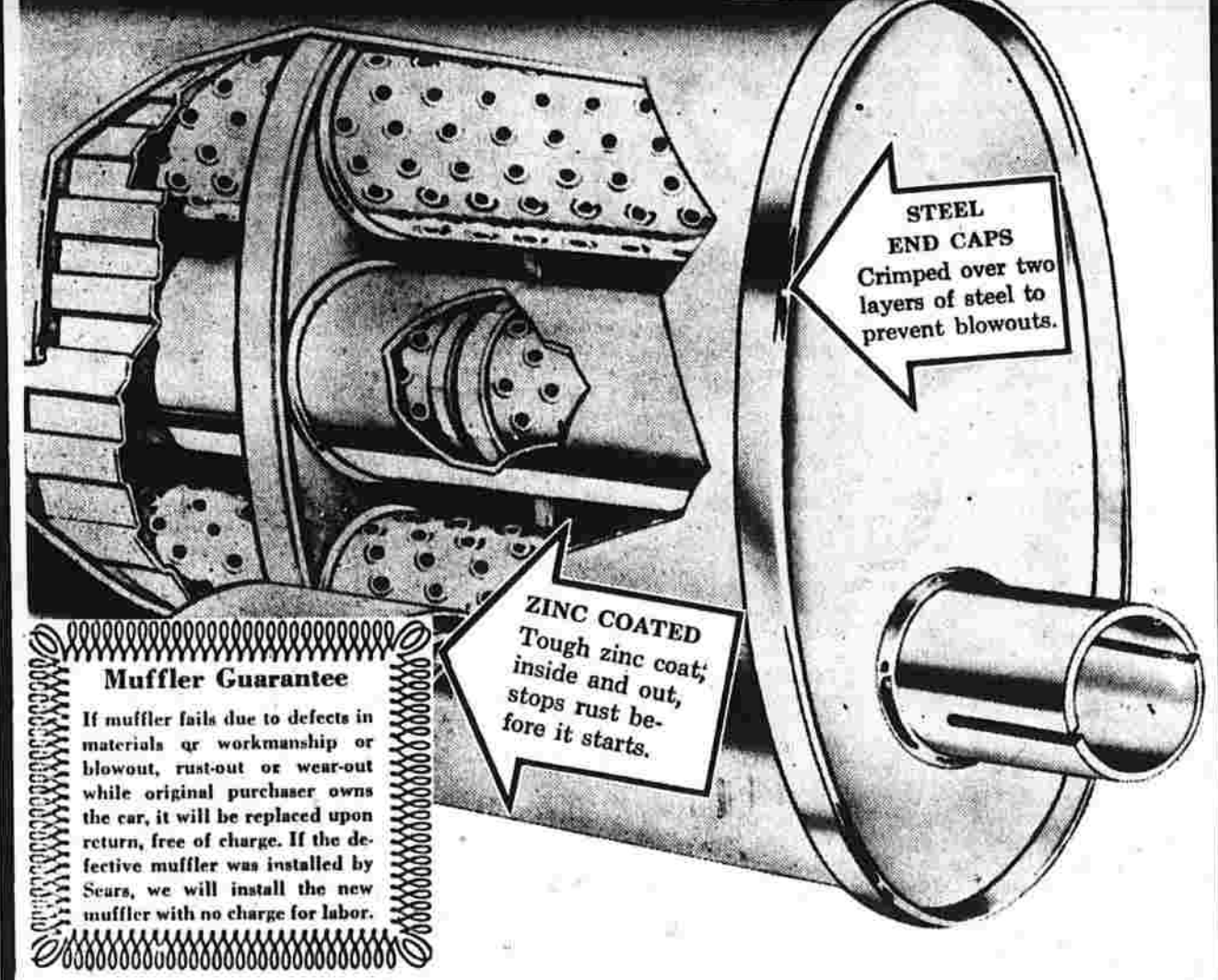

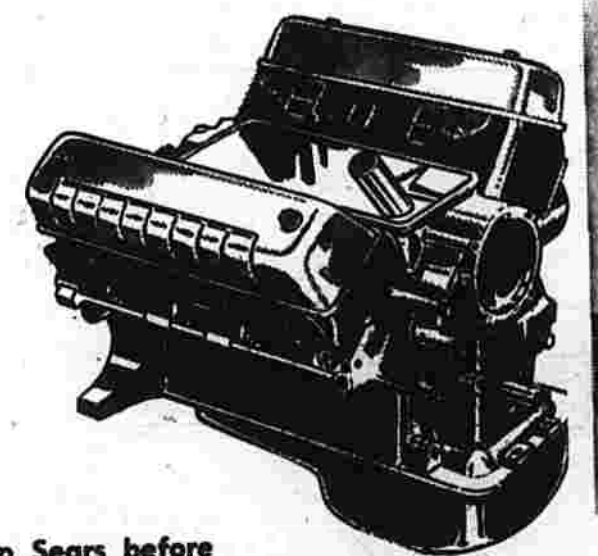

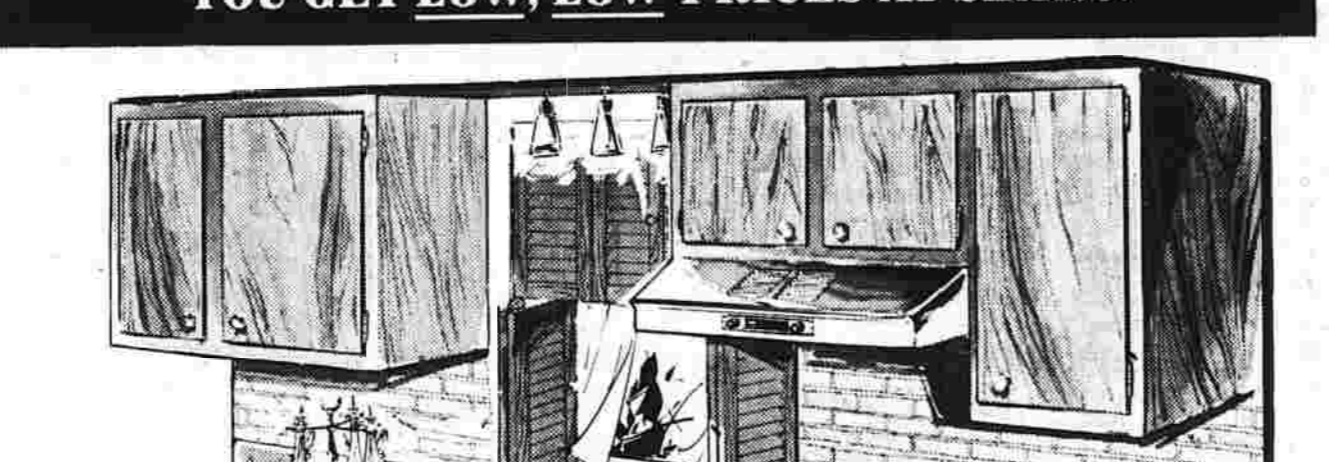

Also Lloyd Berry, vice president of the PTA Council, spoke in behalf of the council. Council President Eugene Montany did not speak. Berry said, "The PTA Council is very concerned about the rapid pace of development in the town of Manchester and feels strongly that there should be greater control of single and multiple residence construction and at the same time more stimulus to school construction so that the educational system can accommodate the large influx of children into the Manchester school system."

Dean Patterson of 107 Treason Dr., group leader in the turbo-power and marine department at Pratt & Whitney, division of United Aircraft, East Hartford, was opposed to the erection of condominium apartment on the basis of increased air pollution with the installation of separate heating units. Also he commented on the increase in noise which would be created by the installation of individual air conditioning units. Patterson has dealt with sound control, air pollution and aerodynamics in his work P & W.

CATECHISM CONTROVERSY — CHICAGO (AP) — A new catechism book for use in the Chicago Roman Catholic Archdiocese has drawn criticism because it praises civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. Critics said the catechism promotes a form of socialism. This will permit the selectmen to study the situation prior to the meeting so that appropriate action may be taken.

The board agreed to install an intersection sign on Grant Hill Rd. near the junction of a blind corner at Partridge Lane.

A maintenance and servicing policy for town vehicles will be established under the responsibility of Selectman Charles Luce. Reports of the maintenance will be gathered by Luce and turned over to the board, in the hope of obtaining better and more economical service out of the town equipment.

Sweden's Driving Change Cuts Death Number in Half

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Sweden's switch to right-hand driving is counted a success with traffic deaths cut in half during the first month, but business has been reduced in several sectors.

Reduced speed limits, designed to ease the transition from driving on the left, were one of the factors in saving lives in September, official says.

Since Sept. 3 the limits have been 40 kilometers an hour in cities, 70 on ordinary roads and 90 on expressways. The Right-Hand Traffic Commission is asking the government to approve 60-80-100, a kilometer equals .62 mile, so the speed within cities is 25 miles an hour.

The switch to the right was made to bring Sweden into conformity with other European countries; Britain and Ireland remain on the left.

Swedish oil companies reported a 20-30 per cent loss in gasoline sales in September. Many filling stations which found themselves "on the wrong side of the road" have lost customers. Planes and trains are being used more for long journeys.

ADICT WINNERS REPRIVE HARTFORD (AP) — Carl Ribera, a 27-year-old narcotics addict charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, has won a two-year reprieve under Connecticut's new narcotics law.

He is the first person to be sentenced to probation officers as a result of the new law.

According to a decision handed down Tuesday by Superior Court Judge Alva P. Lonselle, Ribera will be placed on probation for two years, provided he undergoes treatment for his narcotics addiction under the supervision of the State Mental Health Department.

Ribera, a Thompaville resident, is to be under the supervision of probation officers as the charge against Ribera may be eventually convicted, he must be credited with the time he spent in treatment.

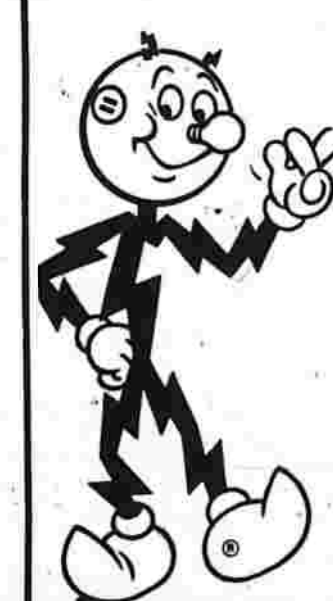

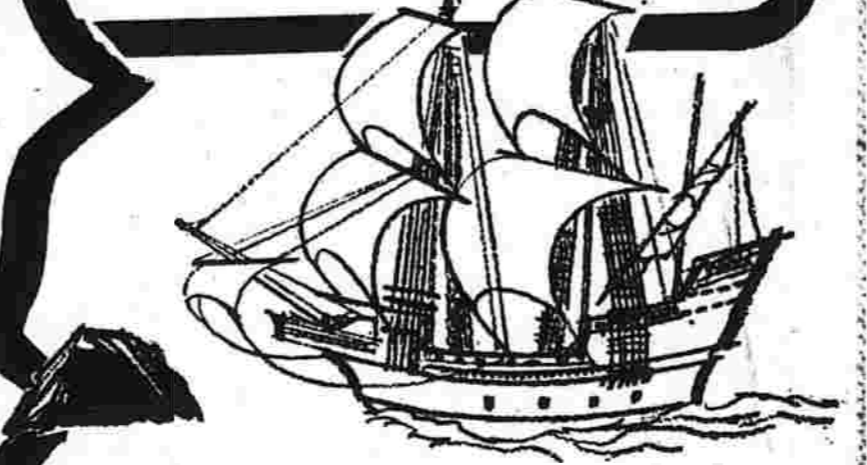

NATO Starts Moving from Paris Site

PARIS (AP) — North Atlantic Treaty Organization officials are closing down NATO's political headquarters here, widening the distance between France and her allies.

Movers have started crating and carrying 140 tons of documents and the office furniture to NATO's new home in Brussels. Scheduled for completion Oct. 32, the move will result in the political directorate with NATO's military headquarters, installed in Belgium since April because of the 1965-66 crisis. Charles de Gaulle expelled Allied troops and commands.

Allied foreign ministers decided last December to transfer the civilian headquarters although De Gaulle had let it be known it could stultify alliance, and has only withdrawn from the military command.

The cost of the transfer, to be shared by all 16 NATO members, is estimated at \$14 million—\$3.5 million for new quarters in Brussels, and \$5.5 million for direct moving expenses and severance pay for 350 staff members, mostly French, who will not follow NATO to Belgium. A French company, which won the job by bid, is moving the documents and furniture.

The French government is negotiating to buy the headquarters building, completed in 1959 at a cost of \$11 million. NATO's secretary in Paris is said to be asking \$20 million with the French offering "considerably less."

The matter may go to arbitration.

France retains a tie with the Atlantic Alliance as a signatory of the April 4, 1949 North Atlantic Treaty, pledging mutual aid as each party "deems necessary" if a member is attacked. In 1969 any member can renounce the treaty and withdraw on a year's notice.

Though Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville has said France has not decided to renounce the treaty, many political observers feel De Gaulle will complete the process he has begun, and withdraw.

Home Mishaps Injure Many

When Columbus discovered the New World in 1492, the dangers he and his men faced were of an unknown environment.

Today, 475 years later, Americans face the greatest risk of injury in their own homes. More than 21 million persons were injured in home accidents during 1966—29,000 of them fatally.

Carelessness is one of the primary factors in such accidents, says the Council on Family Health, a non-profit organization established as a public service by members of the drug industry to promote family health and home safety.

It is careless to offer a child medication and tell him it is candy. Chances are he will try to find the "candy" when he escapes your supervision.

It is careless to leave such potentially toxic substances as cleaning fluids, insecticides, gasoline, household chemicals and paints where children can find them. These should be kept out of reach of children and used by adults only.

It is careless to depend on a verbal "don't touch" as a complete safeguard with children under the age of 6. Always return any medicines you use to the medicine cabinet. Remember, even a sick child may reach for medicine left on the bedside table.

If you and your family are alert to the danger of fires in the home, you will observe safety rules that will prevent injuries.

Mother will not work in the kitchen while wearing long, loose sleeves. She will keep her face well away from the stove when cooking. And she will tie long, loose hair back with a ribbon while doing chores in the kitchen.

She will keep matches out of sight and reach of small children. And she will not leave young children alone in a room with lighted candles, a lighted open fireplace, or a lighted heater.

Frayed electrical cords will be replaced. Gas and electric equipment will be repaired when not working properly.

Alertness in the use of ladders will prevent a serious fall. Check and double check that the ladder is steady and sturdy; that each rung is strong; that it is set up properly, and that it is high enough for you to reach what you need without climbing to the very top. Over-reaching is the cause of many a tumble from ladders.

Red-Bloc Citizen Directs Major Film

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — For the first time in Hollywood, a citizen of a Communist-bloc country is directing a major motion picture.

He is Roman Polanski, 34, trained in a five-year course at the National Film School at Lodz, Poland. He is now directing "Rosemary's Baby," a bizarre tale of modern witchcraft produced by William Castle and starring Mia Farrow, John Casavetes, Ruth Gordon, Sidney Blackmer, Maurice Evans and Ralph Bellamy. Polanski also wrote the script, which is based on the current best-seller by Ira Levin.

"I feel very much at ease here at Paramount," said the director. "The studio is so much like the studios in Poland, where I first worked. The reason is that the Polish studios were patterned after the ones in Russia, and they in turn were copied from the studios here. The Russians came to Hollywood in the 1920s and 1930s and went back to pattern their studios along the same lines."

Polanski is no narrow-visioned provincial. He was born in Paris to Polish parents who returned to their native land when he was 3. His father survived a concentration camp, but his mother did not. After the war, Polanski tried acting and art studies, then enrolled at the film school.

"That is something you lack in America and in England, too," said the director. "The schooling is amazingly thorough, beginning with the basic steps of using a still camera and developing your own film. By the time you finish the course, you are making your own short films."

The Polish school produces from six to 12 directors a year, he said, and they are automatically hired by the nationalized film industry. Romanaki's films, in school and afterward, attracted attention and awards for their daring imagery. He did some film-making in France, then returned to Poland for his feature, "Knife in the Water."

The film won the critics prize at the Venice Film Festival and an Academy nomination as best foreign-language feature of 1964. It also propelled Romanaki to international fame, and he has since been making films in Italy, France and England. Among them: "Repulsion," "Cu de Sac," "The Fearless Vampire Killers." His fine sense of the macabre attracted him to Castle, himself a veteran of the scare film.

Polanski, who speaks Polish, English, French, Italian and Russian with equal facility, has had a chance to observe filming methods in the major movie-making countries.

"In Italy, the set workers are tremendously enthusiastic; they will work all night for you without complaining. The only trouble is that they are not so good professionally. The French also lack proficiency, but they are not so enthusiastic," he says.

"The technicians here in Hollywood are amazingly fast and efficient. You ask for a screwdriver and immediately you get it. The English technicians are quite good, but there the unions have fouled it up."

"You used to be able to shoot until 6 p.m. now it is 5:30; it's really 5:30, but they demand 10 minutes to wash their hands, which they never do. When the time comes to quit, you might have to stop in the middle of a scene. They could even turn out the lights."
