Beaud Tops In Vietnam And France

It was high noon in Manhattan, but already there was champagne lying in the bucket atop the piano and Gilbert Beaud was starting with Gallic inquisitiveness into his hotel mirror asking himself the questions he always asks upon arising:

"You, a singer? It is some kind of joke."

France's most popular composer, most dynamic performer and most ebullient boulevardier

since the grand days of the music halls finds it hard to believe that he is in demand all over the world, singing "What Now, My Love," "The Day That The Rain Came," "It Must Be Her," "Sand and Sea" and dozens of other songs that have brought him international renown as a truly inventive song writer.

"I write to understand myself. I sing so others will try to understand what I am trying to understand," says the debonair vocalist whose records have become best sellers in 100 countries. "Singing enables me to go deeper into the emotions I am trying to portray in my writing."

Winding up a smash supper club engagement in New York's Empire Room, where he sang mostly in English, Beaud is off on another world tour that will find him hypnotizing audiences who for the most part won't understand a word he sings.

"It is not important," he shrugs. "Music has no frontier. People may not know the words but they comprehend the meaning."

Liberty Records recently released Beaud's latest album, "Mon Amour," and American TV audiences will soon see him on the Ed Sullivan Show, the Kraft Music Hall, the Merv Griffin Show and Princess Grace's tour of Monaco, for which he also composed the background score.

Although he has long been popular here as a performer and once had a one-man show on Broadway, Beaud's "What Now, My Love" took a much longer time catching on in America than it did around the rest of the world, where it has been an all-time best seller under its French title "Si Maitenant."

Beaud was surprised to learn that the song is the chart leader in both French and English in Vietnam. The English version has caught on with American troops, thanks to Jack Jones' appearance with the Bob Hope show, and the French version has become a night club standard.

Events In Capital

Children Beaten

WASHINGTON (AP)—State Department officials said 14 white children from three Communist embassies have been beaten and intimidated by other students at the predominantly Negro public school they attend.

Harold A. Pace of the department's protocol division said Tuesday the children of Polish, Czechoslovakian and Bulgarian embassy officials have been subjected to brutal treatment at Lincoln Junior High School. One boy was hospitalized as a result he said.

"This is very bad for our image overseas," said Pace, adding the State Department would like to see the embassy children transferred to another school. But a recent court ruling may make this impossible, officials said. "By international agreements we must protect the diplomats and their families," said Pace. "I don't see how we can justify subjecting them to continuous harassment."

U.S. Drinking More

WASHINGTON (AP)—Tax collections indicate Americans are accelerating their intake of alcoholic beverages.

The Internal Revenue Service reported that alcohol tax collections for the year which ended June 30 reached a record \$4.8 billion, up 6.8 per cent from the previous fiscal year.

Tobacco tax collections increased just three-tenths of one per cent to \$2.08 billion, shy of the 1965 record of \$2.15 billion in fiscal 1964-65.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government officials say 37 school districts in 17 Southern and border states have voluntarily set their own deadlines for meeting federal desegregation requirements.

All have agreed to eliminate

dual Negro-white school systems within the next three years, federal officials said Tuesday.

They said another 44 of the total 4,000 Southern school districts have submitted plans aimed at meeting federal standards over a slightly longer period.

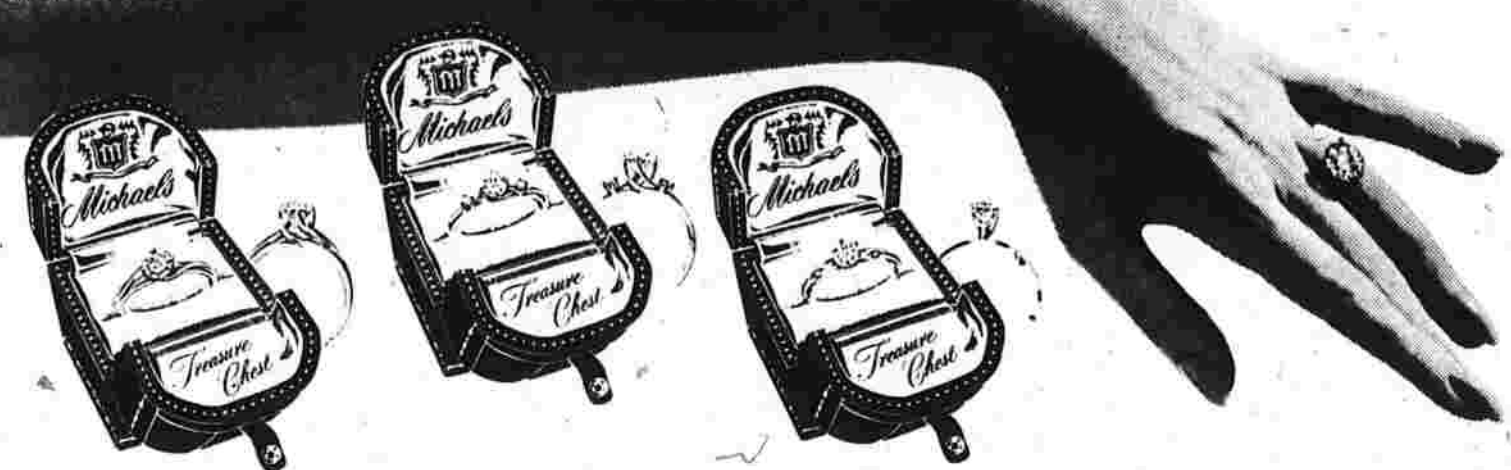

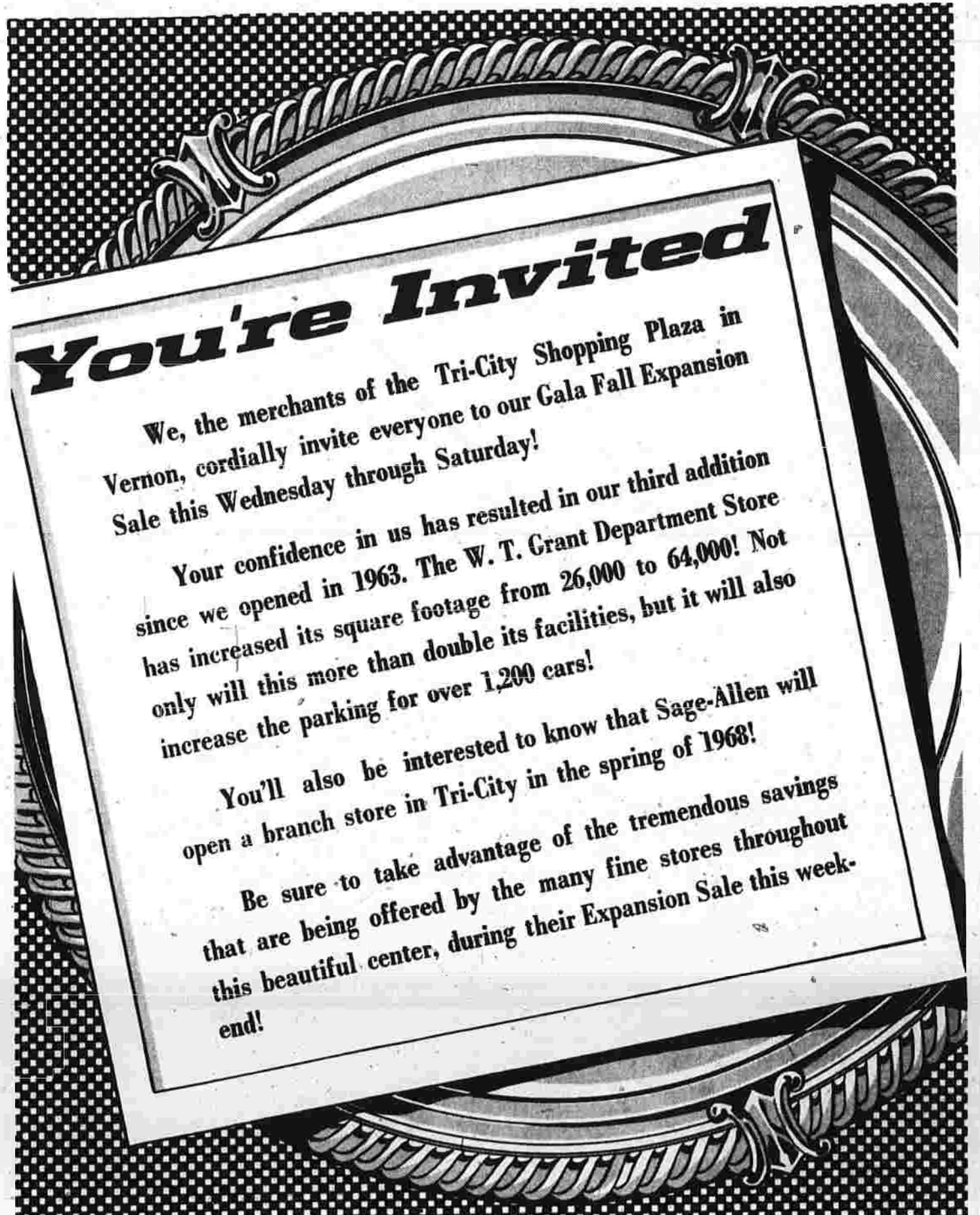

Sen. Hartke Says Rusk Committed U.S. in Asia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Vance Hartke said yesterday Secretary of State Dean Rusk has committed the United States to a crusade in Asia. "We had better not embark upon... unless a consensus has developed which is much larger than now exists in the country."

"We are the world's greatest power, no doubt of it," the Indiana Democrat and Vietnam war policy critic said.

"This administration plans to use that power to save Asia from communism, even if we must do so virtually single-handedly—as seems likely—and without regard to the cost to our domestic society," he said.

"We stand ready to save a billion 'free Asians' from a threat of more than 100 million communists."

He said it was to answer Rusk's comments at an Oct. 22 news conference.

He said Rusk contended "Asian Communist imperialism, represented by one billion Chinese, will be able within the next few years, and with nuclear weapons, to threaten to impose communism on one billion free Asians."

"The United States will be likely to succeed in this venture unless the United States assists the free nations of Asia by supplying American manpower and material and equating stability and progress in these nations with the national security of the United States."

Hartke asked: "First, if free Asia is threatened by Asian communism as suggested, then why is it that the most populous nations which are so threatened are not helping the United States in Vietnam with men and material? Specifically, why don't Japan, Indonesia, and India see the threat in Secretary Rusk's terms? Don't these three nations combined have more

is probably due to the increase in U.S. troops.

Marijuana parties have become such a problem that whenever you see a lot of guys sitting around and smoking at night, it is cause for suspicion," Moore said.

He said most of the smoking is done by the younger enlisted men, although two lieutenants have been arrested. He reported one warrant officer who had set himself up in business as a seller of court-martialed and sent back to the 'United States' to serve a two-year term.

First offenders normally are given four months "in the old LBJ" as the Long Binh military jail is called.

Officials there found that troops were smuggling in marijuana in their shorts and have cut off that source of supply. Some are attempting to get rid of packets of cigarettes dropped there near the desk of the jail commander who opened the pack and lighted one. When someone raced into the room and said "I smell pot," the red-faced commander realized the jail was far from potproof.

The cigarettes are fairly well camouflaged. Vietnamese with vast stocks of black market American cigarettes carefully remove the cellophane, open the pack, roll their own mixture and the product on the filter tip. The pack is then refilled, the cellophane wrapped around it and sealed with a hot iron.

The only real giveaway, aside from the heavy, sweet smell of the smoke, is that the ends of the cigarettes are crimped.

"If they ever get a roll-your-own machine, we're in trouble," Moore said wryly.

The full extent of marijuana use among GI's in Vietnam probably will never be known. For one thing, commanders are slow to charge combat veterans for fear of losing them and getting a green replacement. Another is the wide open, booming market for marijuana around big bases.

Bien Hoa, near Gen. Moore's office at the army command headquarters at Long Binh is considered the biggest marijuana market in the country. It is available in brothels, bars and at curbside cigarette stands.

Moore said as far as is known, heroin has not been coming into the country although some LSD has been reported. He said he expects LSD to become an increasing problem. An easy way to get it into the country is through the military postal system.

There have been seven military cases involving opium, but because the equipment is so elaborate, Moore doesn't think it has much chance of catching on.

for six weeks of being out on strike without wage.

And there is a somewhat larger question which these 1700 dollars, will, by the time they are being run through family budgets, be quite as big and round as they were when they were negotiated for. The thing that is going to happen because of them is that the price of the automobiles these workers manufacture is going to go up; that will add to the living expenses of other Americans, who will need increased wages in order to be able to perform that patriotic purchase of new cars which will keep the economy revving up. That will, in turn, increase the cost of the materials that go into the automobiles, until the price of them has to go up again, and it seems time for the whole cycle to start right over again.

The sad historical fact is that nobody, but nobody, and no union contract, not even the handsomest in history, has ever succeeded in getting ahead and staying ahead of inflation for very long. In the incessant game of leap-frog between wages and living costs, the illusion of progress and gain is greater than the actual bread and butter reality.

At the moment, in the Ford contract, it is the illusion of pay envelope bonanza which holds the center of the stage, and which bids all the rest of us, who make other brands of automobiles, or who make parts for automobiles, or who just need money to buy automobiles with, to start scheming how to catch up. But if we all succeed in catching up we then have, of course, put everything relatively back where it was before the new Ford contract was signed. The numbers can be higher without making real difference in the sharing.

We Feel No Pity

We can get used to anything, and this must be a grave disillusionment to those souls which, having departed our midst by the self-immolation route, turn to look back to see what news emanates, what soul-searching, what change of public opinion their sacrifice has caused.

Last Sunday, a 22 year old Buddhist nun became the third South Vietnamese this year to douse herself with gasoline in an effort to dramatize her quarrel with the Saigon government.

She was, for her sacrifice, such rewards as a one paragraph story on an inside page of the New York Times.

There was a time, several deaths ago, when the idea of a human being burning himself or herself to death for a mere principle was considered newsworthy. It was news, for a time, even when it was happening in far-off Vietnam.

But we have now become so used to it in Vietnam—almost regarding it as a rather regrettable but quaint custom, that we no longer even pay attention to the self-immolation when it happens in our own country, and the suicide that is the result of some American who swears aggression under ironclad guarantees, and enter a new era of partnership with the public attention, and certainly no more visible effect on public conscience or soul anywhere, than did the Buddhist nun in Vietnam.

If you want to create a sensation these days, burning yourself up isn't quite enough.

It doesn't bother the rest of us in the slightest.

Racial Balance Signpost

The city of White Plains, N. Y., has made a significant contribution to education in carefully charting the effects of racial balance on pupil performance in its public schools. The school system in an Israeli effort to recover some of the lost ground, the hope is that Israel will demonstrate a touch of moderation, just because Israel is so admittedly superior in its military capacities. It might now prove a fruitful endeavor for Israel, or diplomacies friendly to Israel, to explore whether the Arab world, trembling in its moment of fearful triumph, might not take this precious restoration of face as an opportunity for seriousness about peace.

Ford Contract's Wonderful World

We live in a wonderful world. After a month and a half of living on a reduced income, but enjoying various types of vacation activities, the Ford workers have won a new contract which is going to raise their yearly income, by three years from now, some \$1700 a year higher than it was when they went out on strike. This has been accomplished without violence. The strike itself has been a kind of ceremonial dance in which both union and management played out their assigned, expected roles as if it were a theatrical ritual custom. Nobody was really hurt. The settlement was reached with such cordiality it seemed that no one was going to have to pay for anything. It stands as the biggest wage increase settlement in American industrial history, and yet not a head was cracked, a vehicle wrecked. There was, in fact, hardly a harsh word spoken. And, to tell the truth, not even the realization that somebody may have to pay eventually, find that that somebody may happen to be yourself, quite shades the good feeling one gets from knowing that labor relations have got to be such a pleasant charade, and Detroit wages so respectable.

We do indeed, live in a wonderful world.

Are there any flaws left in it? Well, that \$1700 a year is a figure that has to be shaded slightly, even in advance, because there was, after all,

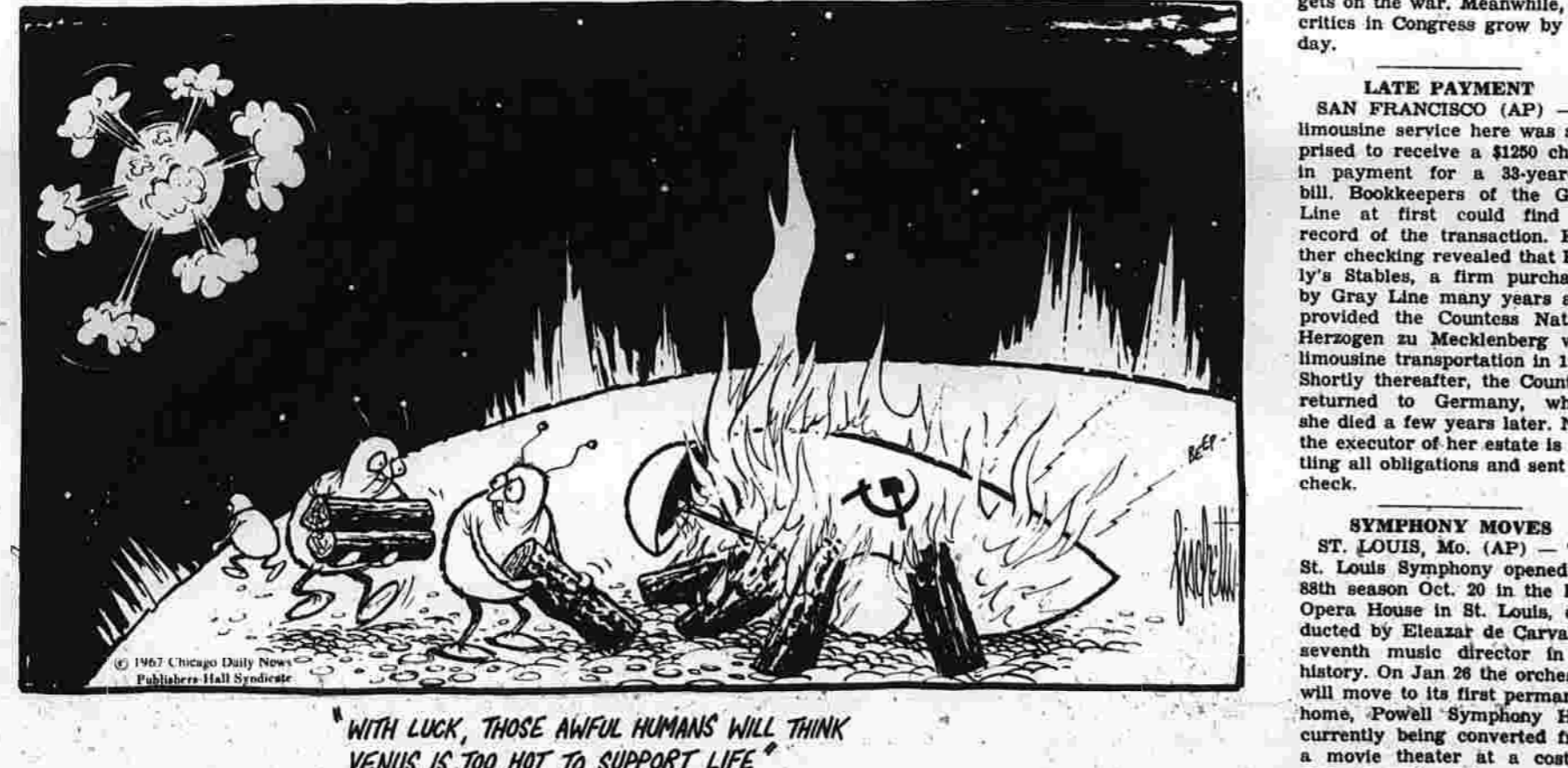

Painter Fuses Abstract, East

 LONDON (AP) — Rama Rao of Gudivara in southeast India studied to be an economist but wound up an art-and-computer painter with an important exhibition in London.

His paintings are currently on display at the Commonwealth Institute where they are drawing admiration for their combination of European techniques and Indian color and expression.

Born in 1908, Rao was interested in painting from childhood. But he graduated in economics before deciding to follow his true vocation.

The first person to encourage him was Dr. Grace Morley, a former director general of the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art.

In 1961, when Dr. Morley went to India to advise the government on setting up art galleries all over the country, she bought one of his paintings.

Rao was already scoring successes before this. He was judged the best of India's young artists for three years in succession, 1959 to 1961.

In 1962, he was the only Indian chosen to study painting at London's Slade School of Art on a Commonwealth scholarship.

He finished his four-year course in two years and won a post-graduate diploma in his third year.

He was judged the best lithographer at the Slade, and the Museum of Modern Art in New York bought one of his works.

Unlike most artists, Rao makes only one print from a lithograph and then destroys the plate.

South Portugal Province Europe's Newest Resort

FARO, Portugal (AP) — The Algarve, Portugal's sun-drenched southern province has become Europe's newest year-round resort.

Bathed in almond blossoms in winter and basking in the brilliant sun during the rest of the year, the balmy coast now bristles with new hotels and villas. It is the focus of Portugal's effort to attract more than two million tourists a year.

Despite the modernistic construction, the old still remains. Vast stretches of almond groves around the schools of fish and the Algarvians jump into the sea for a hand-to-hand fight in the wind. Most of the cash-like figures recall 500 years of Arab occupation. Dozens of multi-colored fishing boats with Viking-style bows lie on the beach.

Algarve is now accessible by road and by air. A new flight links Lisbon to Faro in 40 minutes for \$22 round-trip a day. Europe's longest suspension bridge, over the Tagus River, has cut road travel time to less than half a day from Portugal's capital.

At the same time, 12 new Moorish style or skyscraper hotels are opening this year with a total capacity of about 2,000 beds. This supplements present capacity for 4,000 guests in 82 hotel units. Private homes supply about the same amount of beds.

Nevertheless, the province still moves at the pace of a donkey cart. In Albufeira, many a letter is still delivered by mailman on a donkey. In some of the villages along the coastal road, a motorist cannot buy gasoline, since many Algarvians ride bicycles. Farmers still plow behind a yoke of oxen. Blindfolded donkeys still walk around the circular trail of a nora, pumping water into irrigation ditches.

The Algarve's orchards produce apples, apricots, figs, peaches, oranges, grapefruits and lemons. Its hills are silhouetted with vineyards. Blindfolded donkeys still walk around the circular trail of a nora, pumping water into irrigation ditches.

The foodstuffs are not only good, but cheap. Government officials are busy reorganizing the supply lines from Lisbon so shortages like those which occurred last year will not happen again.

On the heels of the new hotels, restaurants and places of entertainment are cropping up, although not fast enough to meet demands. Three golf courses are nearly completed, while riding stables, tennis courts and its main hotel, the spanking-new Solemar, is carved out of the rolling, wooded hills of Portugal.

At Praia da Rocha, the dramatic red rocks in the shape of castles and pinacles occupy the most attractive beach on the coast. In Lagos, a retired Portuguese colonel has opened his 18th Century home to visitors. The casa, Sao Goncalo, with its fine furniture are too crowded.

Romney Asserts LBJ Destroyed His Credibility

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — Michigan Gov. George Romney says President Johnson's administration "has cried wolf so often that it has lost credibility."

Romney told a gathering of some 700 Republicans at a GOP fund-raising dinner Tuesday night. "There's no doubt the biggest bludge in the whole credibility gap comes over Vietnam."

Starting an eight-day, ten-state speaking tour, the Republican governor, an undeclared candidate for the GOP presidential nomination, talked again about "brainwashing."

"Apparently there were a lot of brainwashed people in Vietnam in 1964," said Romney who stated recently he was brainwashed into going along with President Johnson's Vietnam policy.

Romney said he believed what he was told about Vietnam in 1964 and he continued to believe what he was told on his visit to Vietnam a year later.

"I am like the rest of the American public," Romney said. "I want to believe what our government leaders tell us. But today if any major public figure quotes Johnson's 1964 comments on Vietnam he should be regarded as the doviest of the doves."

Romney returns to Michigan Nov. 1—two weeks before a scheduled nationwide caucus for Nov. 15. Speculation is that Romney will use that occasion to announce that he will be a candidate for the GOP nomination for President in 1968.

Lilli Palmer Stars In Greek Tragedy

DODONI, Greece (AP) — Lilli Palmer, a slight lovely actress, the epitome of what is usually described as "continental," has long been a bright ornament of the international stage and screen.

Just how long is a bit starting. Fashions go out, styles are forgotten, but Miss Palmer has continued to present her special blend of sophistication and poignancy as if it had been mixed for the first time this morning.

These days, Lilli Palmer is up to something new. It isn't that she is playing a mother—she has long since dropped any hesitation about accepting such roles. It's that she's playing a mother who, with no conscious knowledge, is also her son's lover.

If this idea sounds modern and daring, one can only add that it is at the center of a drama written over two thousand years ago, Sophocles' "Oedipus the King." Lilli Palmer is starring with Christopher Plummer, Orson Welles and Richard Johnson in the film version now before the cameras in the wild mountainous region of northwestern Greece.

Jocasta, the queen wife-mother and a figure conceived on the grand tragic scale is without doubt the most difficult role of her career.

Recently, at the ancient Dodoni amphitheatre, Miss Palmer, regal in a purple gown, her long black hair awry, was going mad with grief.

"Twice-wicked bed, breeding husband from my husband, children from my son, she cried out in anguish as countless actresses have cried out on this same spot before her.

By the time the heat of the scene had been captured on film, the heat of the Greek day had also subsided. Miss Palmer, resting in the shade of an enormous plane tree, chatted electrically about her current role.

"I've never played in Greek tragedy before," she said. "And this one has shattered me. I keep marveling at the idea these plays have behind them; that man's fate is decided before he is born and that no matter how hard he struggles against it, there is really nothing he can do. Oedipus, his father, his mother-wife Jocasta, they all try to escape the prophecy that the son shall kill his father and marry his mother—and, in the end, they have escaped nothing."

"This absoluteness gives a work like 'Oedipus the King' a kind of inevitability and power which makes the modern theater seem very puny and anemic. There are no ways out."

"This is an extraordinary picture for me, she continued. 'Usually what I do on the screen is abnormal. It used to be different. At least there used to be a large quota of decent things that people hoped to make and that were made by professionals. Now it is all quite cold-blooded and people can make films about nothing and get away with it. As an actor you learn to shrug your shoulders and just say 'How much is it?'"

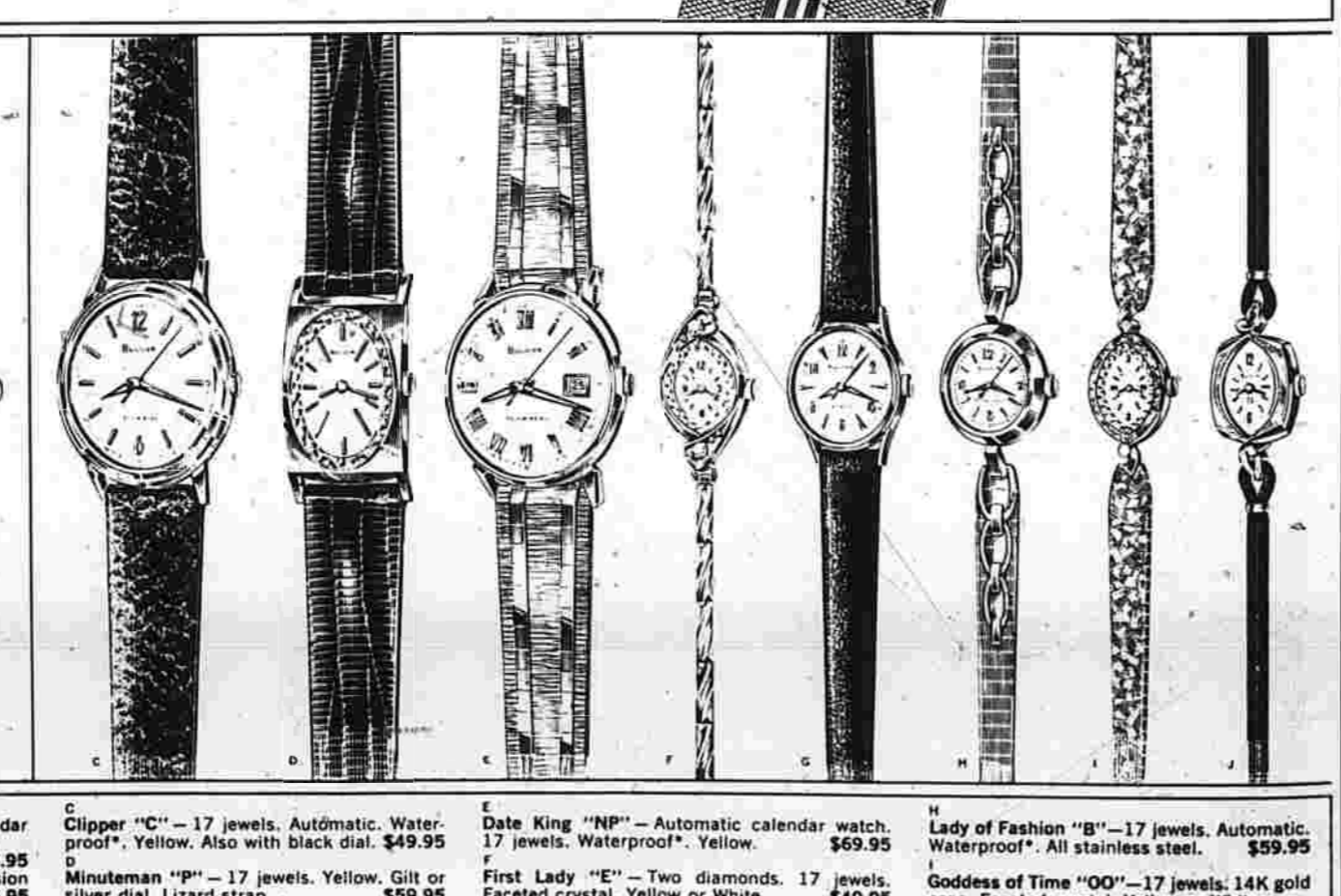
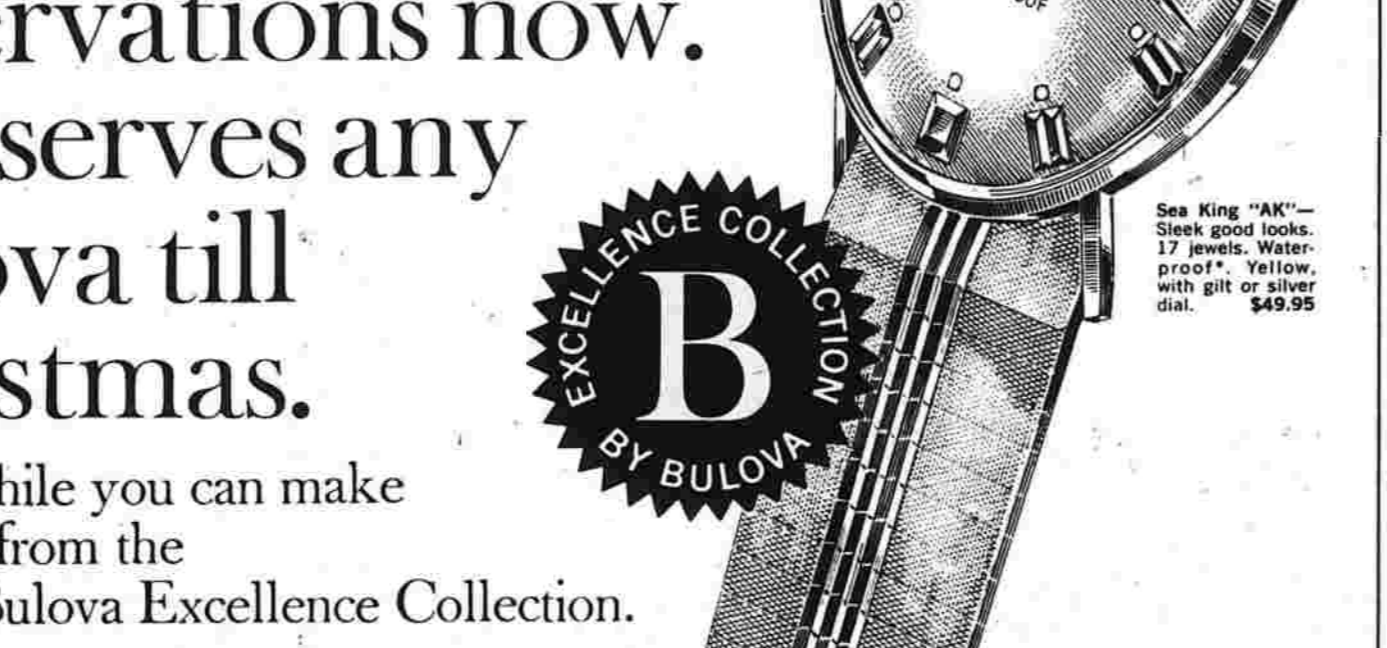

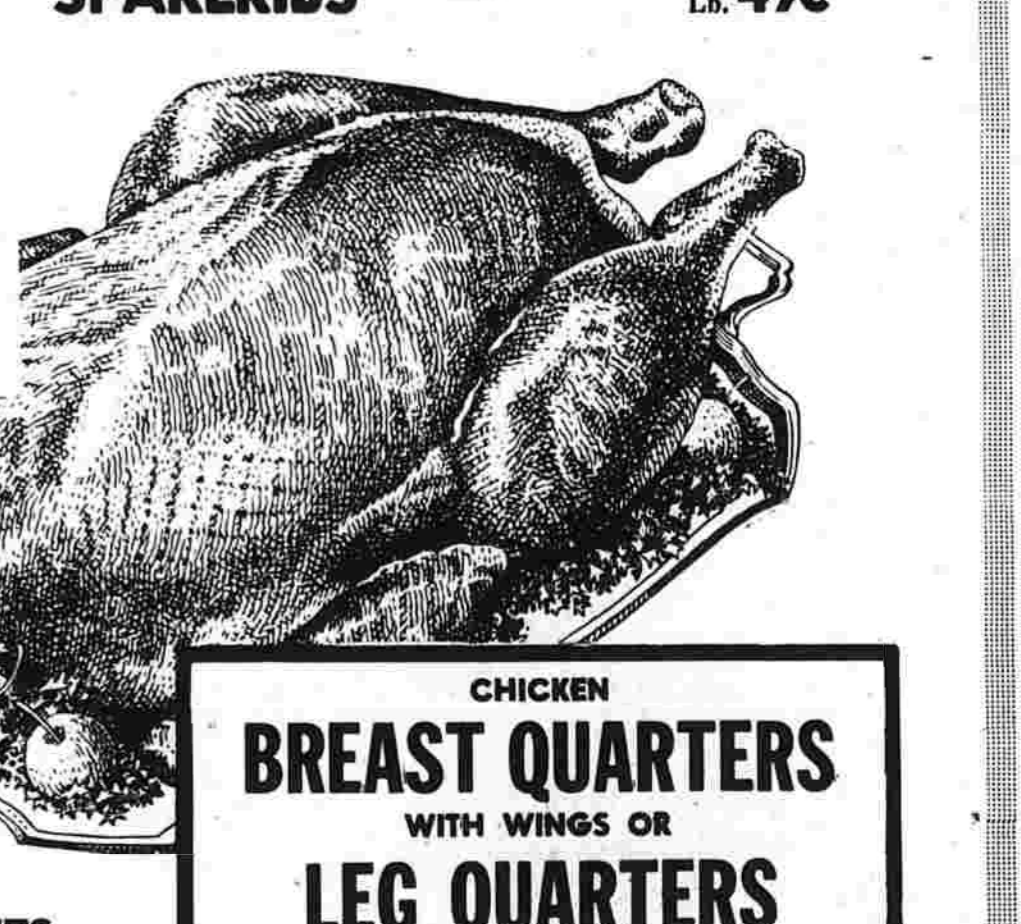

'When That Tree Goes, I Go'

RUIING GUNUNG, Indonesia (AP) — A spacious brick and concrete villa is nestled on a long ridge running through the sprawling tea plantation that carpets the hills here.
A row of stately trees stands near the villa. The most beautiful tree is dead. It was Sukarno's favorite.
The enigmatic Sukarno, now deposed after 22 years of flamboyant rule in Indonesia, used to sit on the veranda and admire the tree. He often said, "When that tree goes, I go."

The apartment was kept ready at all times. The beds were turned down at night. Abbo rarely had any advance notice. He was kept prepared at all times should Sukarno drop in and want a cool drink.
When Sukarno talked about his tree, it was in full glory. Abbo recalled. It stands more than 80 feet high, straight and clean. Elegant branches stretched in a protective umbrella, laden with lush green leaves.
Then, as Sukarno's power began to wane after the abortive coup in October 1965, the tree began to droop. It died slowly. It was entirely denied by the

time Sukarno was stripped of power by Congress in March this year.
Now it stands awkward and alone beside the 10 similar trees in a row behind it. It is ungainly, out of step in the lush surroundings.
Sukarno never comes to the roadside now. His apartment is locked and unused. Guests savor Abbo's exquisite French cuisine without realizing the multi-thousand dollar building is really for Sukarno.
They are curious about the dead tree facing the villa. It is now gray as a tombstone except for a small patch of bright green lying along one branch.
But that is only a parasite, still living on the once proud tree.

Burma Repatriates Operating Bazaar

MADRAS, India (AP) — Peniless repatriates from Burma have turned their misfortune into opportunity and are now operating the Burma Bazaar, one of the most popular business centers in this southern Indian port city.
During 1965, ships brought about 100,000 Indians home from Burma and 67,000 of them chose to stay in Madras. Except for personal baggage, they had

nothing but resourcefulness and an ideal. The repatriates simply chose the street closest to their arrival point.
Efforts by city officials to dislodge them proved futile. Soon, with friendly lobbying for them, the repatriates obtained recognition as petty shopkeepers and even received government loans to build their stalls.

Wealthy residents of Madras are seen often browsing and paying large prices for high-demand items.

Hal Boyle What Name For Today's Generation?

NEW YORK (AP) — It has become something of a game to give name tags to the different generations.

For example, the period following the U.S. Civil War has been called "The Gilded Age." And Gertrude Stein lumped all the sad young men in Paris after the close of World War I in the depressive term, "The Lost Generation."

How, then, could the present older generation be classified? That would cover anyone 50 or over.

Why not "The Boomed Generation"? They certainly have been boomed by change, circumstance, challenge and children.

Members of "The Boomed Generation" have never quite been able to keep their feet on the ground because the ground has kept sliding out from under them.

He has lived on into a time of uneasy prosperity, but he can't feel quite safe in it. For it has come a bit late to him. The accent is now on youth, not experience, and a new generation is already shouldering his name with the cry, "out of the way, grandpa."

When he was a lad he was taught to be polite to his elders. Now he must learn to be subservient to his discursive posterity.

Yep, nothing has stood still for a moment in his lifetime. There has never been a chance for him to get used to anything except incessant change.

He has been a pilgrim since birth; or every other day he is confronted with fresh frontiers. He has never been able to settle down because he has known no settled time.

He has seen the invention of stretch coats that will fit any feet. What he feels the need of now and then is a stretch mind that will enable him to fit any emergency.

From cod liver oil to wonder drugs, from the pogo stick to the jet airplane, from the silent movies to television, from James Whitcomb Riley to Allen Ginsberg, from ballets to bulletins—his life has marched without much chance to pause, select, or appreciate. There has been nothing for him to hold fast to, because nothing seems buttoned down long enough for him to get a grip on.

Yep, that has been the fate of the members of "the Boomed Generation." They sure have been busy corpuses in the bloodstream of time.

They are too dazed by it all, however, to feel much self-pity. If you ask one of these hoary survivors what he thinks of life, he is likely to reply:

"What? I catch my breath, young fellow. Now which life do you mean—the life I had planned to lead, or the one I'm still trying to catch up with?"

Grid Injuries on Rise

Of growing concern to players, coaches, club and league officials is the rising tide of injuries in professional football this season. A three-year survey of National Football League teams shows a high rate of knee injuries and a growing casualty list of quarterbacks.

A recent survey, compiled by NFL physicians, and reported in TV Guide, disclosed that the average league team last season started each game lacking the services of 4.6 players who were knee casualties for varying periods. Some 32 players, the survey showed, missed 10 more games each, all but because of knee injuries.

Tough Positions

"If these trends continue," Joe King writes, "combos will have to devise a remedy. The networks are not likely to abandon the pro-am dance for a safety-replacement, but the time may have to be changed to human officials."

League officials have concluded that players' knees are the most vulnerable to injury—but medical science still has not been able to develop a protective device to prevent the increasing number of knee injuries.

Quarterback and Linebacker

Quarterback and linebacker casualties were on the rise in the past two years the medical board found. And accidents were split about evenly between defensive and offensive players, with variations within each unit.

Safest Spots

The offensive tackles were deemed the safest man on offense and defensive linemen as a group were relatively secure. The center was rated three times more liable to injury than the tackle two spaces removed from him.
