

## Nobel Prizes Given To Four Scientists

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—The Swedish Academy of Science today awarded the Nobel Prize in physics to Prof. Hans A. Bethe of Cornell University and the chemistry prize jointly to Britons George Porter and Ronald George Wreyford Norrish and German Manfred Eigen.

Bethe was awarded the prize in physics for his contributions to the theory of nuclear reactions and especially his discoveries concerning the energy production in stars.

The British-German trio was awarded the prize for "their studies of extremely fast chemical reactions, effected by disturbing the equilibrium by means of very short pulses of energy," the academy's citation said.

Porter is attached to the Royal Institution in London and his British colleague lives in Cambridge. Eigen works at the Max Planck Institute of Goettingen. Eigen receives one half of the \$62,000 prize while the two Britons share the other half.

Bethe, 61, was born in Alsace while it was German territory and started his academic career in Germany. Forced to leave when Hitler came to power, he spent two years in England and went to Cornell, in Ithaca, N.Y., in 1935.

Since 1937 he has held the chair of theoretical physics at Cornell.

"I'm extremely happy and very much surprised," Bethe said upon learning of the award.

His work led to the discovery of which nuclear reactions take place in the sun to yield its great energy, "which, of course, supports all life," Bethe said.

The professor, who instructs a class in physics three times a week, said he had no plans for the \$62,000 prize.

He has a wife and two children.

The physics prize is the third of the 1967 Nobel awards to be announced.

The prize for literature went to Guatemalan novelist-diplomat Miguel Angel Asturias.

Oct. 19 for his epic novels about the troubles of the poor in his Central American country.

The previous day three medical researchers shared the prize for physiology or medicine. They were Haldan Keffer Hartline of New York, George Wald of Cambridge, Mass., and Ragnar Granit of Sweden.

Sill to be awarded is the 1967 Nobel Peace Prize, scheduled to be announced in Oslo, Norway, before Nov. 15, but there has been speculation that this will not be awarded this year.

Each prize this year is \$20,000 crowns, or \$62,000.

Bethe contributed to the development of the first atomic bombs as director of the section

for theoretical physics at Los Alamos from 1943 to 1946.

For his contributions to nuclear physics as well as other areas of theoretical physics, he was awarded the Enrico Fermi Prize by the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission in 1961.

Bethe published his first major and fundamental paper concerning the energy production

MOSEKOW (AP)—Two Soviet unmanned satellites joined together in space today in a rehearsal for making space platforms above the earth. They spent 5 1/2 hours in orbit together and then separated.

The first for Soviet scientists with what they called "automatic docking" of two Sputniks came almost two years after the United States joined two manned spacecraft in orbit. The unmanned Soviet venture appeared to be a test for putting cosmonauts into craft that would link up in space.

The two Sputniks, Cosmos 188 launched Friday and Cosmos 188 launched today on an orbital course close to 186's, maneuvered and joined.

They "fulfilled their program of scientific research," an announcement said, then separated on order from earth.

It termed the operation an "automatic docking" and said it had occurred at 12:20 p.m. Moscow time.

The announcement said the two satellites were coupled rigidly and were continuing the orbital flight with all systems and equipment functioning normally.

The United States has carried out successfully a docking by a manned satellite.

The operation was an obvious preparation for what the Soviet space program has long been expected to do next in manned ventures: join together craft in orbit to form space platforms.

When Soyuz 1 went up last April, reports in Moscow said it was supposed to be joined by another craft. But something apparently went wrong before the final crash that killed cosmonaut Vladimir M. Komarov.

The docking operation was proved successful, the announcement indicated. It said computers helped to bring the two devices together.

They sent television pictures back to earth, the announcement said.

It added that the docking meant large orbital stations can be constructed as the base for reaching other planets.

A space station would have the advantage for starting a major space trip of being outside the earth's gravity. A rocket could be assembled on it and then get more value from its thrust than a rocket which has first to blast loose from the earth's powerful hold.

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet scientists described the planet Venus today as a hot, stony desert with heavy clouds but no rain. They said a person standing on it would think he "is on the bottom of a gigantic bowl."

## Split UN Council Seeks Agreement

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The 10 nonpermanent members of the U.N. Security Council, split between two proposals, tried today to agree on a plan the council could adopt to send a peacemaker to the Arabs and Israelis.

One major difference was over wording of instructions to the proposed U.N. special representative concerning withdrawal of Israeli troops from captured Arab lands.

A Canadian-Danish draft said no state in the area should "persist in refusing to withdraw" troops that are on another's territory against its will.

A resolution submitted by Argentina, Brazil, Ethiopia, India, Mali and Nigeria said the Israelis should withdraw either "to positions they held on June 4"—the day before the war began—or "from all the territories occupied as a result of the recent conflict." The phrase to be used depended on final instructions some of the delegates receive from their governments.

The Arabs want the date left in. The Israelis contend any withdrawal should be "to agreed and secure frontiers"—meaning borders negotiated before the withdrawal.

Some diplomats said they expected a compromise by Tuesday or Wednesday and a meeting of the 15-nation council a day later to adopt the resolution.

## Winds Smash Mississippi, Two Killed

GULFPORT, Miss. (AP)—High winds from either a tornado or waterspout smashed viciously into this Gulf Coast city today, killing at least two persons and injuring scores of others.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol unit at Gulfport reported the two fatalities and said some other people were missing.

"Gulfport highway patrol unit reports two fatalities," said the U.S. Weather Bureau wire. "Some people missing. . . workers still digging out. . . rain continuing."

Witnesses said that one restaurant and a group of motels in a beach area were flattened. Many mobile homes, common to this tourist area, were toppled, some with occupants still inside.

Early estimates from the highway patrol placed the number of injuries at several hundred. Newsmen at the hospital counted between 15 and 20 injured, although emergency rooms were jammed. Damage was widespread. However, witnesses said most serious damage seemed to be confined to the Mississippi City-Handshere areas, neighboring communities.

The winds wrecked 17 trucks at the Gulfport city dock where they were waiting to load bananas. No injuries were reported at the docks.

All off-duty policemen and firemen, along with personnel from a Navy Seabee Base and units from the Mississippi National Guard, were called into the stricken area.

Homes could be seen in various stages of destruction. Some were completely gone.

The destructive weather hit shortly before 8 a.m. as many people headed to work.

## Bride Captor Kills Himself After Cleveland Abduction

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—A disappointed suitor shot himself to death today after wounding a young bride he held captive at gunpoint over the weekend in his third-floor suburban apartment, police said.

Robert Batch, 23, was dead on arrival at Doctors Hospital, a bullet wound in his heart.

Lida Caldwell, 19, was wounded in the chest and taken to surgery where doctors reported her in reasonably good condition.

University Heights Police Sgt. Chris Schoupt said Batch's mother, Martina Smith of Johnstown, Pa., talked to the boy from his kitchen and told him she loved him and would protect him.

"We heard two shots and we rushed in," Schoupt said.

Cleveland detective Capt. Patrick L. Garrity said when he entered the bedroom, the girl was still standing, although wounded.

Garrity said Batch was lying on the floor, the gun in his hand.

Both Batch and Mrs. Caldwell were carried from the home on stretchers.

Police said Batch had refused to talk to his mother.

"Go away and leave us alone," Mrs. Caldwell said from the bedroom before the shooting.

Batch had held the woman captive at gunpoint since Saturday night.

Mrs. Smith had flown to Cleveland from her home in Johnstown, Pa., to try to reason with her son. She arrived less than an hour before the shooting.

Batch had warned he would shoot Mrs. Caldwell and himself if anyone intervened. Earlier, he used the women as a shield and drove police into a stairway with a volley of shots.

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## Company Wiped Out Infantry Surprise Viet Cong

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. infantrymen surprised a Viet Cong company near the Cambodian border today and it was all but wiped out by artillery, napalm and aerial bombs, a military spokesman reported.

A spokesman for the 1st Infantry Division said it was believed 80 enemy troops were killed in the battle about 72 miles northwest of Saigon near where a furious 14-hour battle raged Sunday. U.S. losses were put at three dead and three wounded.

In the air war, U.S. fighter-bombers carried their furious campaign against the heartland of North Vietnam through its sixth straight day Sunday, battering targets near the chief port of Haiphong.

Facing against the approaching monsoons, Navy pilots hammered the Cat Bi MIG air base, the Chi Lai transshipment point, and a barge repair yard that was hit for the first time. All were within seven miles of the center of Haiphong.

In the ground fighting, two companies from the 1st Infantry Division, rushed into the battle

## Expo 67 Finishes, USSR Exhibit Star

MONTREAL (AP)—Expo 67 closed its 185-day run Sunday in a blaze of flags, fireworks and tributes, and its computers showed the Soviet exhibit was the star of the Canadian centennial fair.

Russia's swept-roofed pavilion, the costliest of all at \$12 million, attracted about 13 million guests. Canada's exhibit drew 11 million. The geodesic sky bubble of the United States was third with 9 million visitors.

While the Soviets concentrated on their achievements in science and industry, especially in aerospace, the United States showed a potpourri of Americana from space capsules to pop art to a Andy Warhol and Elvis Presley's guitar.

Some viewers complained that the U.S. pavilion was mostly trivia; others liked the informal, low-pressure approach.

Fifty-three per cent of all visitors to Expo were Canadians, but Americans flocking up to Montreal constituted 45 per cent of the sightseers.

The skyrocketing attendance reached a climax Saturday when Martha Racine of Montreal walked through a turnstile to become the 50 millionth visitor. Mrs. Racine, 39, won a trip to Osaka, Japan, to see Expo 70.

Expo's attendance clipped the old record for world fairs of 42 million visitors set by the Brussels Fair of 1958.

Among other statistics spun out by the Expo computers:

—The free transit system, the Expo Express, rolled over 374,600 train miles.

—25,463 youngsters turned up at the misplaced children department.

—25,463 youngsters were happily turned back to parents or guardians.

## After Relapse Pope's Fever Abates, Rests for Operation

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI's doctors announced today that after a relapse over the weekend, his fever is going down and he has begun a period of rest to build him up for the operation to correct his prostate ailment.

The announcement by the Vatican press office said the date of the operation has not been set. The relapse touched off speculation that the surgery might be delayed.

The announcement said: "The condition of fever, due to which the Holy Father was unable to preside at the solemn functions (Sunday) in St. Peter's Basilica, is on the way toward solution. After days of intense work, His Holiness this morning has begun a period of rest in preparation for the foreseen surgical operation, the date of which has not yet been fixed."
