Humphrey and Thieu Escape Bomb Attack

SAIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong lobbed four shells on grounds of the gaily lighted Independence Palace tonight as President Nguyen Van Thieu entertained Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and 2,000 inaugural guests, but none of them. A fifth shell, straying from the target, wounded three persons outside. The tube of a stum mortar, believed to have been the weapon, was found in a building five blocks from the palace. The shells landed in quick succession. The explosions shook the windows, but it was all over in a few seconds and the party went on. A dinner party for a smaller group later was carried out as scheduled. There was a flurry of other incidents in the Saigon area: A civilian survey launch, August 19, was hit by a Viet Cong mine in the Saigon River about two miles north of the city's center. The vessel was grounded on a beach. A U.S. Navy spokesman said there were reports the U.S. Army's Military Sea Transport Service tugboats to aid it and the tug came under automatic weapons fire. These reports could not be confirmed. A short distance to the east, U.S. troops clashed with a Viet Cong force seeking to infiltrate the city. Police arrested a man trying to plant a package of explosives at a South Korean military base near the center of Saigon. Within minutes after the blast went off, the sound of counterbattery fire could be heard in the edges of the city as South Vietnamese and U.S. gun batteries fired at the Viet Cong positions. Flares from helicopters lit the sky over the city and gunship helicopters darted in on the lookout for further enemy action. Earlier in the day Thieu and Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky had taken over their jobs as heads of the civilian government and it had been feared the Viet Cong would attempt some bold incident to mark the ceremony. The inaugural ceremony itself went off without a hitch. Four miles away in St. Vincent Charity Hospital, her husband, a short order cook, also in satisfactory condition, is recovering from a face wound. "I hope I can see her soon," Lida Caldwell said from his hospital room. "I'm in heaven again."

Thieu Energetically Begins Term

SAIGON (AP) — Lt. Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu energetically began a four-year term as South Vietnam's elected president today by proposing peace talks with Hanoi, appointing a civilian associate of Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky to succeed Ky as premier, and opening the elected House of Representatives with a call for action now over and around the city were the greatest ever known. Some 80,000 troops and selected guests were massed for half a mile down broad Le Loi Avenue in front of the inaugural stands. Security was so tight, however, that ordinary citizens had to see the ceremonies on television or listen over the radio. A young Buddhist monk was reported to have burned himself to death early today in an anti-government protest in Quang Ngai City, one of South Vietnam's northern provincial capitals. The body of the 17-year-old youth was said to have been found near a banner listing "general objection" to the Thieu government. No other details were available. Thieu's speech, which Humphrey hailed as "a masterpiece—great speech—was largely what was expected. He promised a strengthened army, social reforms, a campaign against corruption and called for help for the peasants and a narrowing of the income gap between city and countryside. The appointment of lawyer Nguyen Van Lee as premier was also expected, and was criticized in advance. Those who hoped to see Thieu broaden his government's political base by the appointment of some respected political figure were disappointed. Use Increases Marijuana: The Pot of Controversy

NEW YORK (AP) — It is known as pot, booz, grass, tee, weed, ganja, hash, hashish, as well as other names. At a conference in South Lake Tahoe, Calif., Judge Arthur L. Alarcon of the Los Angeles Superior Court said: "A few years ago the marijuana user who came to the court's attention was usually a member of a minority group from a slum area with a poverty-level family background. Today, the judge sees an increasing number of middle-class users from good families, students with above average grades and without a prior record of delinquency." Bob Schmidt, a student leader at Sacramento State College, offered this theory: "It is indicative of the entire disillusionment, the entire frustration of our generation against what we feel have been lost to us—on marijuana as well as other issues. 'We have been told it is an addictive narcotic, told it leads to the use of heroin, told it is physically destructive. We found these were lies.' A girl marijuana user in Birmingham, N.D., asked 'Why do people drink?' Why does a drinker really taste good now and then? Marijuana has the same effect, only it's not as habit-forming as alcohol." Dr. James L. Goddard, director of the Food and Drug Administration, shocked a lot of people when the subject of marijuana came up during a conference at the University of

Propaganda Try Seen Communist Drive Halted

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. and South Vietnamese troops took back another Communist attempt today to seize the town of Loc Ninh and a U.S. Special Forces camp 72 miles north of Saigon in what U.S. officers said was an obvious try for a propaganda victory to counter South Vietnam's presidential inauguration. U.S. spokesmen said the Communists left 110 bodies on the battlefield after their renewed attempt to overrun the headquarters compound of the district town and the Special Forces camp. This raised the Communist toll to 385 dead in the three-day battle with South Vietnamese troops and two battalions of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division. Striking in four waves, the Communists managed on the third try to penetrate the perimeter of the military installations but were driven out by the defenders and American artillery within 30 minutes, U.S. headquarters said. Meanwhile, U.S. fighter-bombers returned to North Vietnam's Hanoi-Halophong heartland for the seventh straight day Monday, attacking four air fields, a key power plant and a big railroad yard. A U.S. Navy F4 Phantom shot down a MIG17 in an aerial duel between Navy jets and with four of the Communist interceptors northeast of Hanoi, the U.S. Command said. There were no Communist attacks in heavily guarded Saigon today at Loc Ninh about 60 miles north of Saigon. A 46-year-old Saigon lawyer, Loc has been a close associate of Ky since a native of South Vietnam, he gives the top government command a geographic balance, since Thieu is from central Vietnam and Ky is a native of Hanoi. Europeans Agree On Terms of A-Ban

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The United States and all of the Common Market countries except France agreed today on terms of a treaty to check the spread of nuclear weapons to countries that do not already have them. Atlantic Alliance sources said. The development cleared the way for a new East-West effort to sign a treaty. The five countries are West Germany, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg. They had been objecting to the inspection article in the treaty. The U.S. permanent representatives to the North Atlantic Council announced the United States would resume negotiations with the Soviet Union in Geneva on the inspection system, taking into account principles proposed by the five members of Euratom—the European Atomic Energy Community. The inspection aims at preventing peaceful nuclear plants from making or helping make nuclear weapons. France is also a member of Euratom. But President Charles de Gaulle wants no part of the nuclear treaty and intends to have France produce nuclear weapons without international inspection. The five Euratom countries

Town Plans to Study Non-Graded Classes

The concept of "non-gradedness" will be thoroughly studied by school administrators this week, according to Superintendent of Schools Robert Briarton.

"It's something that we should take a good long look at," he said, indicating plans to visit schools where the program has been in operation.

The non-graded concept of education attempts to meet the individual learning capabilities of the student. It does away with the standard grade groupings now commonly used throughout the public schools, according to a report on non-gradedness presented last week at a meeting of the Board of Education.

Dr. John Keresztes, coordinator of instruction for the Farmington public schools, said that a child usually learns at different levels in each of the subjects he takes, and that a child may test on the fourth grade level in one subject, the fifth in another, and the sixth in a third.

The non-graded concept is an attempt to meet the children at their individual differences, Briarton explained yesterday. It requires more teacher planning and preparation as well as a constant contact between the teachers involved.

The testing and categorizing of the students into standard grades, after comparing them with other students, "is not consistent with individualized learning," according to Dr. Keresztes.

Individual Growth Cited

She traced the start of the standard grade system to 1848, when the grades were first established "to meet the needs of immigrants," she said. "The idea was to put the students in blocks where they were to do no more or less than the grade allowed."

"Non-grading is not a 'radical departure,'" she said, but a method for enabling teachers to substitute flexible organization for the rigidity of grades. "It allows for individual rates of development," according to the Dr. Keresztes.

She also cited the growing number of tools becoming available for use in the classroom such as computerized instruction, and Educational television. These can often be used to make the program work better.

They were described by Briarton as "the frosting on the cake."

A town should move into the non-graded approach slowly, she warned. Farmington has been in the program for seven years and has accumulated a good history and evaluation of the program.

The entire elementary program is non-graded, and a study is being undertaken presently on non-grading the junior and senior high schools.

A school system usually starts non-grading in the first three intermediate Grades 4 through 6. Briarton stated he would like to get teacher evaluations of the non-graded program in school systems in which it is in operation. This would include both the teacher's opinions about the progress of the students and how the teachers like the program.

Meadowbrook school principal Donald Parker will attend a conference on non-graded schools and is expected to report back to the Board of Education.

"We will keep the idea in front of our minds during the year to see if it would be the best thing for our kids," Briarton explained yesterday.

Five of the six members of the Board of Education attended the non-graded program sponsored by the Hikes Memorial School PTA.

What do you say?
Answer: Bid one no trump, a negative response. The hand is not quite strong enough for a response of two clubs. Save His Trumps

When Arthur Robinson played the South hand he ruffed the second round of clubs and led the king of spades at once. West won with the ace of spades and led another club to make South ruff again.

Robinson led the queen of spades, and East ruffed. Now East and South each held two trumps. East returned a diamond to the ace and Robinson ruffed a spade in dummy, returned to his hand with the queen of hearts, ruffed another spade in dummy, and got back with the king of hearts.

The People's Action Committee is an organization of members who pursue specific projects. According to one of its spokesmen this is one of the most important things they have done. The theses charged the church with materialistic ideas, and with avoiding problems of minority groups and the poor.

Vernon Town Head Start Program Withdrawn from WACAP

The Board of Education last night agreed to withdraw its support of the Head Start program from the jurisdiction of the Windham Area Community Action Program (WACAP) but to continue the program under Federal Title I funds given to the Science program or try to continue the program in other ways.

"You try to satisfy a real need and get bogged down in bureaucratic red tape," board member Frank DeTolla stated. "It bothers me that a good idea can be wrecked by bureaucracy."

Andrew Manegga met with WACAP officials at the request of Superintendent of Schools Dr. Raymond Ramadell. He discussed the situation with the school board last night.

One Administrator of six or seven Head Start programs under the jurisdiction of one administrator, he said. The idea would do away with the local Vernon program.

High School Sets Computer To Schedule Classes in '68

Rockville High School students will be scheduled by computer next year to take action on the school's most important decisions taken at last night's meeting of the Board of Education.

The board also agreed to hire the services of the Hartford National Bank's school computer operation, for a three-year period at a cost of \$1 per pupil. Total cost of the program will be about \$1,700.

The computers will schedule the expected 1,700 students more efficiently than is presently possible under the current procedures, according to high school Principal Martin Fagan. The computers will permit classrooms to be used to a greater capacity and efficiency. It will also hold the line on the need for additional clerical help at the high school, the board was told.

South Windsor High School has used the computerized service for two years now and reported favorable experiences. Fagan predicted that the computers would reduce the administrative time used on scheduling by 25 per cent in the first year and more in subsequent years. Fagan and his assistants will still have to make preparations for the computer programming the first year.

The computers will provide the school with three copies of the individual schedules for students as well as class lists for each session.

These lists are extremely time-consuming, tying up the high school clerical help for most of the summer, according to Fagan.

Smoking Policy Study
The school board agreed to study the present policy on permitting smoking at the high school and particularly Sykes Freshman High. The item was brought up by board member Mrs. Marie Herbst and will be put on the next agenda.

Sentiment to ban smoking at Sykes was apparent among many members of the board. The permitted smoking area was thought to be a carry-over from the smoking regulations instituted when Grades 9 through 12 were housed at the high school.

Since Grade 9 is now separated from the others it was felt smoking regulations could be enforced. "I'm worried about the kids," Mrs. Herbst stated, describing her feeling over 13 to 15-year-olds smoking.

New Classroom
The school board, with some mathematical computations, created three classrooms out of two at the new elementary school presently in the planning stages.

The three rooms will be slightly under the state-required size for a standard classroom. Dr. Ramadell obtained State Board of Education approval, however, because the rooms will only house from one to ten students each in special education classes. Local school board authorization was necessary, however.

The school superintendent will forward the board's approval to the Public Building Commission which will put the recommendation in the school plan.

The decision in effect changes the 28-room school, to a 40-room school.

State aid will be altered slightly to agree with the reduced square footage per room, Ramadell noted.

The rooms were put in to meet state regulations for special education classes for "physically handicapped, neurologically impaired, or those suffering

town-owned property on which the new school will be built, in co-operation with the State Board of Education.

The cost of the land acquisition is 50 per cent reimbursable under new state regulations.

A problem has arisen over estimating the cost of the land because the town bought the property with several buildings on it, including the former co-

representative to the Capitol Region Educational Council.

Agostinelli Opposes Joining Refuse Unit

Mayor Nathan Agostinelli went on record last night against Manchester membership in the North Central Refuse Disposal District (NCRDD).

"As far as I am concerned," he told a group of 30 Manchester, South Windsor and Vernon officials, "it is best for us at this point not to join the district."

The officials were meeting in the Vernon Town Hall to consider an offer from the Arizona Biochemical Co. to build a regional incinerator-composting plant in Manchester, and to get Manchester's answer to an invitation to join the NCRDD, now composed of South-Windsor and Vernon.

The Arizona Biochemical proposal was blasted by Vernon and South Windsor officials on the basis that it was financially unsound. It was the consensus of all present that the offer was unacceptable, unless a new written offer acceptable to state officials and carrying complete financial coverage, is presented.

With that decision out of the way, the NCRDD officials asked for Manchester's decision by joining the district. The Manchester Board of Directors, last August, had promised its formal decision by Oct. 15. None had been given.

Agostinelli's abrupt stand against Manchester membership brought a gasp of surprise from the stunned group.

"Oh, brother," said Manchester Republican Director Wayne Mantz, with apparent consternation.

"If I had to vote tonight, I'd vote for joining the district," Mantz said.

Agostinelli, explaining his position, said Manchester still has about five years of life left in its disposal area and the jury is still out on the most effective process for refuse disposal.

"So many new methods are being talked about and experimented with, that I am not sold on going into an incinerator project with the NCRDD at this time," he said.

The NCRDD officials, particularly Robert Deming of Vernon, its chairman, refused to accept Agostinelli's personal decision as the final Manchester decision.

He asked for and received a promise from Agostinelli for a formal decision of the Manchester Board of Directors by Dec. 1.

"In view of the split on your board, it is only fair for you to

take a formal vote," Deming said.

Agostinelli said that he will call a special meeting of the board in two or three weeks, so that it may take that formal vote.

Agostinelli made four votes besides his own to defer Manchester's membership in the district and, all signs point to those four votes.

The Democratic minority of three is expected to side with him, since it has never been sold on the NCRDD, and Agostinelli is almost certain of the votes of one or two other Republicans.

Seymour Lavitt, chairman of the Capitol Region Planning Agency, was an active participant in last night's discussion. Following Agostinelli's stand against Manchester membership, Agostinelli said that he would like to see the NCRDD go ahead with its plans for a regional incinerator.

"We've waited for them too long and, if we continue to wait for them to join, we'll jeopardize the entire program," he said.

Lavitt suggested that the NCRDD proceed with plans for an incinerator which would take care of South Windsor and Vernon needs for the next 35 years.

"Manchester, in the interim, could buy time until its own plans are settled, by sending its refuse under contract to the regional incinerator, thus benefiting all involved," he explained.
