

Brown Raps British Press

LONDON (AP) — Foreign Secretary George Brown was at the center of a new political storm today after telling the nation's biggest publisher "it is about time you shut up" and calling British newspapers "the most prostituted press in the world."

There was a demand from the Conservative opposition that Prime Minister Harold Wilson fire Brown.

"Enough is enough," said Duncan Sandys, a member of the Conservative party government that Wilson's Labor party unseated three years ago. "For the sake of Britain's good name, Mr. Wilson has a duty to make a change."

Brown turned on Lord Thomson of Fleet at a banquet the publisher gave for American executives Wednesday night, then later waded into a 10-minute row with newsmen covering the banquet.

Brown's outburst apparently was set off by a joke Thomson made in introducing him.

According to the London Daily Express, the joke concerned a George Brown who was advised by his doctor that if he wished to live to be 100 years old he should give up smoking, drinking and women.

The point of the story was that even if the patient did not live that long, in these circumstances it would seem like 100 years.

Brown hit right back, putting aside his prepared text to attack the Canadian-born publisher, apparently for a series of articles in his London Sunday Times running about Harold Philby, the former Foreign Office man who spied for the Soviet Union for 30 years until he defected to Moscow in 1951.

Thomson tried to interrupt him but Brown silenced him with: "I didn't interrupt you."

"You are doing—your papers are doing under your control—a very great disservice to this country and a very great disservice to the affairs which we ought to be controlling," Brown said.

VC Mortarmen Press Attack On Vietnam Headquarters



SAIGON (AP) — Viet Cong mortarmen carried the attack on the Vietnamese district headquarters at Loc Ninh into the fourth day today but left the National Day parade in Saigon alone.

The 200-round barrage fired at one of the American battalions defending Loc Ninh wounded only one man. A total of 365 Communists have been reported killed in attempts this week to overrun the town 72 miles north of Saigon, apparently for a propaganda victory to take some bloom off the inauguration of President Nguyen Van Thieu.

Allied casualties at Loc Ninh so far were reported to be seven Americans and 18 South Vietnamese killed, and 21 Americans and 64 South Vietnamese wounded. B22 bombers dropped 300,000 pounds of explosives today on suspected Communist camps and supply areas.

Ground fighting was generally light across the country, but troops of the U.S. 25th Infantry Division reported killing 22 Viet Cong in a fierce eight-hour fight Tuesday only 19 miles north of Saigon. Six Americans were reported killed and 11 wounded.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey meanwhile inspected the demilitarized zone from a C-118 transport that lumbered over the U.S. Marines' war-scarred battlefield at an altitude of 1,500 feet. Hours before Humphrey's plane dived over the DMZ, Marine fighter-bombers attacked a suspected surface-to-air missile site just north of the zone, but Humphrey's plane was 1,500 feet below effective SAM range.

Humphrey also visited U.S. units at Da Nang and Chu Lai. The U.S. Command disclosed that 30 to 40 Viet Cong attacked an Army helicopter compound at Chu Lai Tuesday night to plant explosive charges, but the command said the attack apparently had no connection with the vice president's visit. Ten Americans were reported wounded and damage to aircraft and equipment was reported light. There was no report of enemy casualties.

U.S. Marine jets also attacked North Vietnamese artillery positions in and above the DMZ and ranged up to Hanoi to plaster the Canal des Rapides highway, bridge five miles northeast of the Communist capital's center. It was the eighth straight day of U.S. air raids on Hanoi.

Hanoi Radio claimed U.S. air attacks on the capital in the "past few days" have killed or wounded more than 200 civilians and burned or destroyed more than 150 houses.

Although the Viet Cong fired four mortar shells into the grounds of the government palace in Saigon Tuesday night during an inaugural reception given by President Thieu, the regime's mammoth National Day parade through the heart of Saigon today went off without a hitch. Last year the Viet Cong shelled the parade from outside the city, killed eight persons and wounded 45.

The parade today, which concluded the inauguration program, showed off airborne, artillery and mobilis units, new weapons and two companies of uniformed armed forces who marched jauntily past the reviewing stand on high heels.

Humphrey missed the parade to take his air tour over the DMZ and to visit U.S. Marines at Da Nang. Escorted by Marine F4 Phantoms and A6 Intruder jets, the vice president could see Marine guns below bigging away at enemy entrenchments to the north.

Shortly before Humphrey left for Malaysia, retired Lt. Gen. James M. Gavin, an outspoken critic of the Johnson administration's policy, arrived in Saigon for a five-day fact-finding visit.

Monsoon weather confined most of the U.S. air attacks against North Vietnam Tuesday to the southern part of the country.

The suspected SAM site north of the DMZ which Marine jets hit may be part of a renewed effort by the North Vietnamese to counter the big high-flying B52 saturation bombers which strike against Communist artillery batteries and troop concentrations threatening the Marines just below the zone.

B22 flights along the frontier were suspended for two months last spring when intelligence reports indicated the North Vietnamese had moved SAMs just above the DMZ. At least one Marine fighter-bomber was shot down by a missile before U.S. jets knocked out the sites.

A group of some 20 students blocked the path to a college placement office where the interviews were scheduled.

The CIA representative made no effort to wade through the demonstrators.

U.S. Confused To Europeans

LONDON (AP) — The image of the efficient American is as bright as ever in European eyes—but the image of the United States is clouded and confused.

The war in Vietnam, a summer of race riots and reports of an alarming crime rate have raised mixed reactions and emotions.

"You people have taken over the world leadership we once had and you're welcome to it, mate," a Cockney cabbie in London tells his American passenger.

A Gaullist Cabinet minister in Paris warns against "the Americanisation of French life."

An Italian clerk in Rome says: "I feel sorry for the Americans and we owe them so much."

British officials feel the United States is preoccupied with promoting its own interests, notably in Asia where the chief challenge has arisen.

On the economic front, there is concern that huge U.S. companies will gain control of science-based industries that hold the key to West Europe's future.

Sir Paul Chambers, head of Britain's giant Imperial Chemical Industries and an advocate of British entry into the European Common Market, warned against U.S. domination becoming "a menace to the whole economy of Western Europe."

Britons still look at the United States as the land of opportunity. But there's still plenty of criticism.

One British reporter, after a 6,000-mile trip through the United States, reported that he

found "confusion, irritation, bewilderment."

"Attitudes are hardening," he said. "There is less tolerance." Nevertheless, more than 8,000 scientists, technologists and engineers—along with scores of doctors—left Britain last year for the United States for more money and better chances of promotion.

A government report, while expressing concern about the "brain drain," quoted one aeronautical engineer who emigrated as saying about Englishmen working with him: "Almost without doubt, all would prefer life in England. This is a cultural wilderness."

Ken Mills, 45-year-old aviation expert, emigrated to the United States last year, began making more money than ever before in his life, but still came home again. He told friends: "My younger son could not join us in America without the risk of being called up for Vietnam."

Dr. Joshua Bierer, one of Britain's outstanding psychiatrists, said: "Americans as leaders of the free world have developed symptoms of a guilt complex over their inability to cope with Vietnam and with the color problem and the breakdown of moral discipline at home."

A recent public opinion poll showed 63 per cent of Britons questioned were against taking sides in any major world crisis that brought the threat of war

Humphrey Visits Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey arrived in the Malaysian capital from Saigon today as hundreds of steel-helmeted riot police guarded against a repetition of the violence that broke out during President Johnson's visit last October.

Humphrey's effigy was hanged in Penang, a hotbed of leftist activity 180 miles to the north, a few hours before he arrived in a big U.S. Air Force jet.

Some 200 youths massed in downtown Kuala Lumpur Tuesday night but scattered when riot police arrived.

Half an hour before Hum-

phrey's arrival 100 young members of the left-wing opposition Labor party paraded along a main street with "Humphrey Get Out" banners but dropped their signs and walked away when a light drizzle started.

The Labor party has charged that Humphrey will try to involve Malaysia in the Vietnam war. However, Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman gave assurance Tuesday that the government would not send troops to Vietnam although it would continue to train South Vietnamese police officers.

Humphrey's arrival was accompanied by little fanfare. An elaborate ceremony including the traditional reviewing of a

guard of honor was canceled after it was learned he would arrive after dark.

The deputy prime minister, Tun Abdul Razak, greeted Humphrey because Prime Minister Rahman has a badly sprained ankle.

On his final day in South Vietnam, the U.S. vice president flew a quarter of a mile high between the range of Communist machine guns and missiles—to survey the U.S. Marines' battleground along the demilitarized zone. From his lumbering transport plane, he saw U.S. artillery hammering Red positions.

The vice president said that "militarily, there is no doubt tremendous progress has been made."

"The enemy cannot defeat the allies, he cannot possibly win victory over the allied forces," he said. "They know they can't win."

"Politically, progress has been significant. The Vietnamese have done quite well. President Thieu and Vice Pres-

Police Quell Trouble at High School

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Trouble broke out today at a racially mixed high school, but the pupils were quickly dismissed and police said they were in control.

"There was a group—we don't know whether they were students or non-students—causing a commotion," said Police Superintendent James W. Slusser.

"In the confusion there was a rush and police temporarily repelled the group," he said.

Slusser said he couldn't give further details on the trouble immediately.

Police said the students were throwing bricks. Two broken windows were visible on the school. Police units ringed the building on the city's North Side.

The trouble broke out about an hour before the pupils were to be dismissed at 11:15 a.m. for a special teachers program. One youth was reported injured. A hospital reported another was treated for tear gas.

Candidate Negro

Mayoral Election Has Single Issue

GARY, Ind. (AP) — Gary's mayoral election, scheduled to be held next Tuesday, now centers largely on a single issue—the Democratic candidate, Richard Gordon Hatcher, is a Negro.

"The vote is polarized on that point," said the incumbent, Democratic Mayor A. Martin Katz.

"The issues being talked about are not the real issue," said Mrs. Phyllis Spencer, a Negro assistant city attorney. "It's a question of color."

Hatcher's Republican opponent is Joseph B. Radigan, a partner in his family's furniture business.

Tuesday Hatcher asked a federal court in Hammond, Ind., to postpone the election on the ground that registration frauds have been perpetrated. In his petition, he said more than 6,000 Negroes were purged from voter rolls, while 4,000 fictitious whites have been registered. He named as defendants John Krupa, the Lake County Democratic chairman, and other party organizations.

Ugly overtones pervade the atmosphere in Gary, a steel-producing community of 180,000 on the eve of the election.

In addition to the charges of registration-fraud, predictions of election day violence have been voiced. A highly placed city official who asked not to be identified said, "Some of the merchants downtown are scared of what may happen if Hatcher loses."

Hatcher, 34, is a soft-spoken lawyer.

He has been a deputy prosecutor in Lake County Criminal Court, a member of the Gary City Council, and then its president.

He sponsored an open housing law and a political observer in Gary said, "He was death on crime as a prosecutor and a councilman."

In the Democratic primary last spring, Mayor Katz sought the nomination for a second term. There was a third candidate, Bernard Konrady. Hatcher

Reuther Seen Planning for Union Split

WASHINGTON (AP) — Walter Reuther appears to be liquidating major financial interests in the AFL-CIO in preparation for pulling his 1.5 million-member United Auto Workers out of the labor federation, informed sources say.

The AFL-CIO's Industrial Union Department, Reuther's last remaining power base within the federation, is rapidly and deliberately spending itself out of money, it was reported.

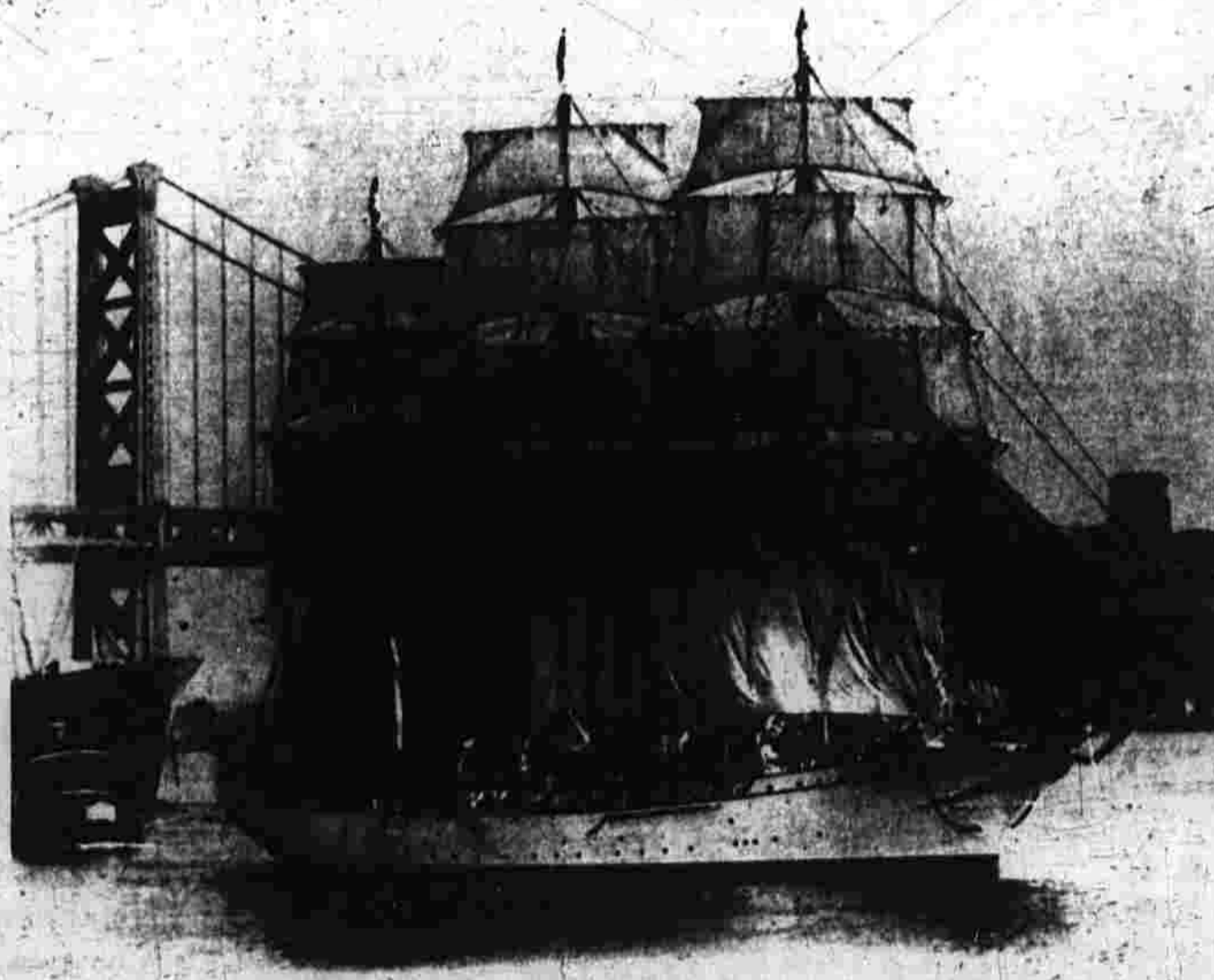
Jack Conway, executive director of the Industrial Union Department, denied any such significance could be attached to the money problem, but confirmed that more than \$1 million has been spent out of cash reserves in the past 10 months. This was more than half the department's total cash.

"It's nothing serious," said Conway, adding that much of the money had been spent supporting organizing drives among teachers, farm workers and Southern textile workers and in helping other unions.

But another labor source said: "It could mean that if Reuther pulls out of the AFL-CIO, he would leave the Industrial Union Department empty-handed."

Reuther has been attacking the leadership of AFL-CIO President George Meany for more than a year and making three

Senate Investigators Begin Hearings on Negro Rioting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate probes open public hearings today on Negro rioting and other civil disturbances with testimony about a Houston uprising last May in which one policeman was killed.

The probe by the Senate permanent investigations subcommittee, headed by Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., was ordered by the Senate Aug. 11.

Since then the subcommittee has had teams of investigators gathering information in riot-torn cities throughout the nation.

The riot in Houston on May 16 and 17 broke out on the campus of Texas Southern University, the state's largest all-Negro college. Nearly 500 Negroes were arrested, some of them students at the university.

Testimony about the riot and its causes is expected to take two days or more. Next week the subcommittee plans to examine a riot last April in Nashville, Tenn. Hearings on riots in Plainfield and Englewood, N.J., are expected to follow.

The Senate directed the subcommittee to investigate fully immediate and long-standing causes of riots and to recommend measures for their prevention.

McClellan recently said the panel's task "will require one of the most intensive and comprehensive inquiries ever undertaken by a congressional committee."

Motel Robbed Of Cash Box Wounded Bride Says No Escape Chance

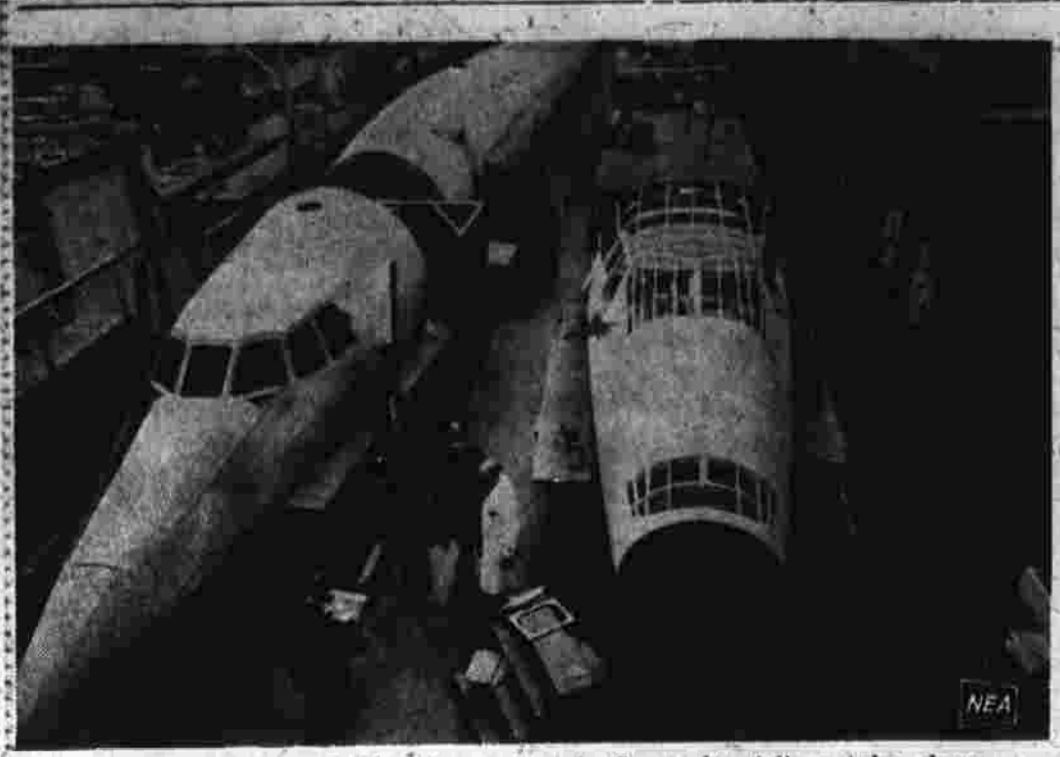

Medic Alert Tags Are Worn By About 200,000 Members

TURLOCK, Calif. (AP)—A man digging for gem stones accidentally stepped on a nest of yellow jackets. About 15 stung him. His throat swelled and he couldn't find a companion he was deathly allergic to stings. That he pointed to a little metal tag he was wearing.

His companion, who had been soothing at "a few little stings," rushed him to the emergency room of the nearest hospital.

"The doctor said more delay might have meant his life," his wife wrote Medic Alert Foundation International, Turlock, Calif., 95230.

The nonprofit, tax-exempt charitable foundation gets many grateful letters from those who wear Medic Alert tags on bracelets or necklaces.

New enrollments average 2,500 a month, says Chester L. Watts, executive director.

The American Medical Association estimates that 40 million Americans—on it five and a half million—should be wearing medical identification because of a hidden health problem. It can prevent painful mistakes in treatment—or save a life.

There are some 200 reasons, ranging from drug allergies to contact lens use, for wearing a Medic Alert tag.

The tag contains, besides medical information about the member, the name, address and telephone number of the doctor and of the wearer's nearest relative. It may also carry such information as blood type, religion and if he has a heart condition.

A one-time only membership fee of \$5 provides a wallet card and a stainless steel link bracelet or 24-inch necklace with the member's name and address on it.

Members prefer sterling silver. Watts says, and they pay \$7.50. Indigent persons can obtain them free.

A percentage of each fee goes into a trust fund to perpetuate the central file.

Dr. Marion C. Collins of Turlock founded Medic Alert in 1959 "after his daughter, Linda, was administered an antituberculin injection by another physician. Linda, then 14, was allergic to the serum and almost died. Dr. Collins is president of the foundation, the largest of its kind in the world.

The Manchester 4-H State Club has received or official endorsement of the American Academy of General Practice, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the National Sheriff's Association, many state and county medical societies and other organizations.

It has affiliate organizations in almost a dozen other nations. The foundation's strongest supporters are, of course, members whose lives have been saved because someone noticed the attractive Medic Alert tag.

"I am never without it—I even wear it when I sleep," wrote a shipyard welder who passed out during a heart attack. He was saved when his bracelet-tag and wallet card led rescuers to his "nitro" bottle and a doctor to his blood type.

A widow wrote that her husband had felt so secure with his bracelet she had him buried with it.

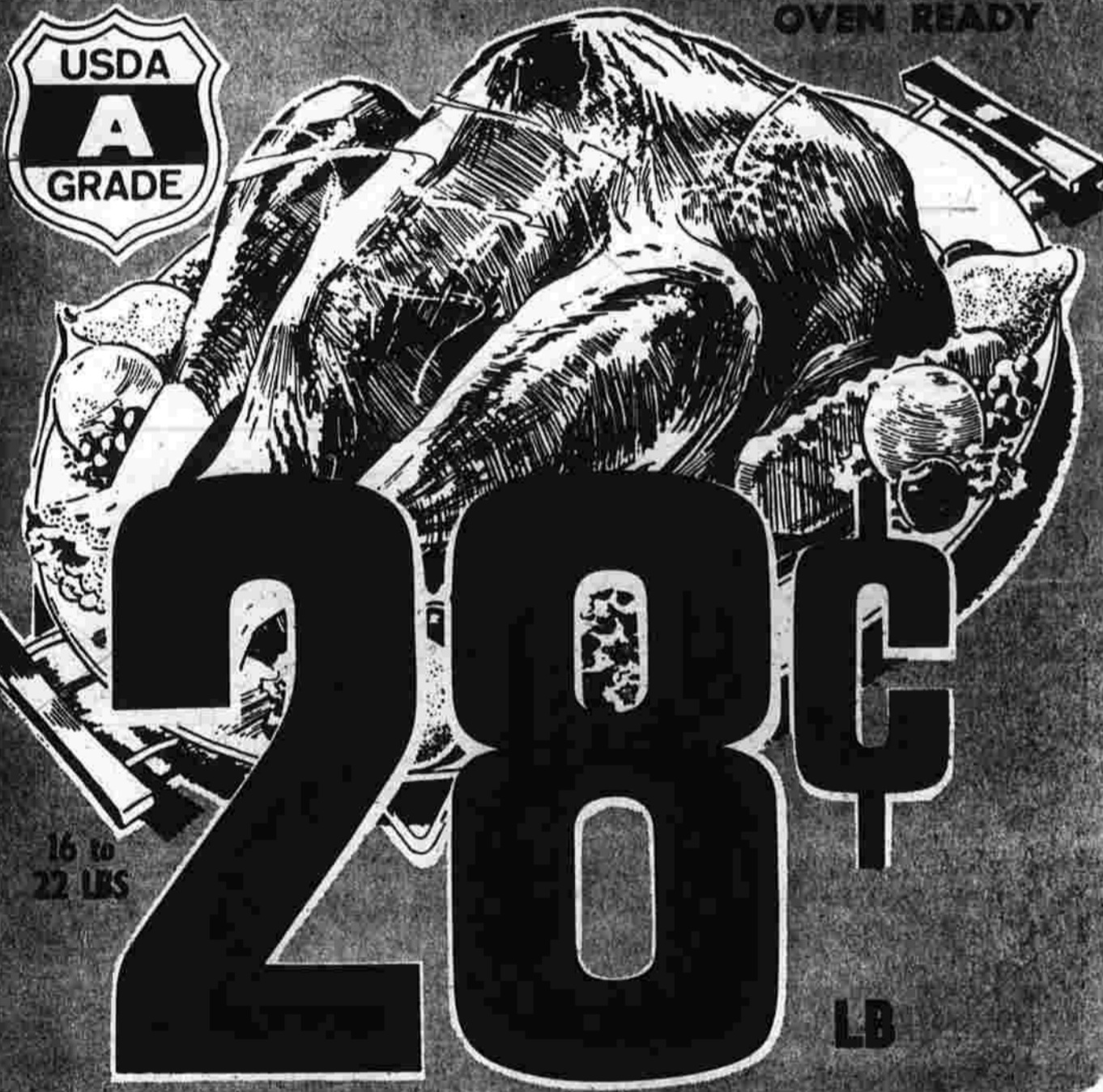

With Thanksgiving and Christmas ahead this versatile appliance gives you the extra two burners you need when preparing the traditional holiday dinner for a large group.
Just set the outdoor stove on your kitchen counter or table (it's perfectly safe and odorless) and you're ready to cook the vegetables, heat the gravy or keep the soup warm, leaving the burners of your regular kitchen range free.
According to Mrs. Riviere, sleeping bags are also getting a big play at home these days when Sis has her teen-age friends over for pajama parties. One sleeping bag, the points out, can substitute for lots of blankets or serve as a comfortable mattress when unexpected guests arrive.
If your kids like to sprawl on the sofa floor while watching TV, another camping item—the air mattress—can serve as a comfortable floor cushion to help them avoid chilled tummies.
The family camp stove and propane lantern also give you a handy emergency kit. If a sudden alarm interrupts your party or supply, you can use the lantern for light while you heat baby's bottle or fix supper for the kids.
Even those bottle-size disposable propane cylinders that fuel the family camping gear can find useful applications around the house, Mrs. Riviere advises.
Equipped with a variety of burner heads that can be bought at any nearby hardware store, your fuel cylinder becomes a versatile propane torch that literally has 101 home uses. U.S., Canada Join To Battle Lamprey

By KLAUS FOLZ
SOUTH HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — The sea lamprey's voracious appetite is feared by fishermen in the Great Lakes region. It is a parasitic fish that attaches itself to the side of its victim like a tick and sucks out blood and body fluids.
Until the 19th Century, the sea lamprey—petromyzon agara Falls—prevented the lamprey from advancing into Lake Erie from its natural habitat, the North Atlantic.
But with the building of the Welland Canal the door was opened to the upper Great Lakes where large trout and whitefish roamed in abundance.
It did take the lamprey more than a century to develop from its normal pattern. But by 1921 lamprey had successfully navigated Lake Ontario, the Welland Canal and into Lake Erie.
Continued West
Shallow, warm Lake St. Clair presented another natural barrier to the lamprey, which is accustomed to cold water. But by 1927 lake trout catches in Lake Erie, the lamprey, which grows to a length of three feet in the sea, but only about two feet in fresh water, had moved on to Lake Huron. A decade later it was at work in Lake Michigan.
With each female lamprey laying about 40,000 eggs, of which 60 per cent are said to hatch, it was easy work for the invader to kill the whitefish and trout, both of which prefer the rocky shoals favored by the lamprey.
Results of early experiments with mechanical river barriers to block lamprey spawning grounds were encouraging. Electrical barriers were more successful, but floating objects did often short-circuit the two poles, putting generators out of action.
Developed in the United States and Canada, the first full-scale chemical battle is still far from won.
