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Vernon Nursing Association Raises Its Rates to \$4.50 a Visit

The Rockville Public Health Nursing Association has raised its rates for bedside care. The new fee will be \$4.50 a visit, an increase of \$1.25. The new rate went into effect yesterday.

Mrs. E. Fenlon Burke, president of the association, said the increase reflects salary increases for the staff, higher rent and other rising costs. She said the fee is still lower than for most other agencies of comparable size.

Mrs. Burke said it is the policy of the association to adjust the fee schedule to the financial situation of patients. Those who can afford to be asked to pay the full fee. Others pay a sum agreed on with the nurse in accordance with their incomes.

In some instances the State Welfare Department, the Connecticut Cancer Society, Medicare and other groups pay the full cost of the visit.

The association also offers health counseling and education services to families, conducts immunization clinics and mothers' classes and works with the Norwich State Hospital in follow-up care for discharged patients.

Tolland Jury Starts Hoffa Probe

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How Much Can Senators Restrain Military Use?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators grapple today with the constitutional question of how far they can go in trying to restrain a president in the use of the U.S. military in international crises.

With reportedly little agreement among them, members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today are expected to vote on legislation to express the desire of Congress to exert some influence over some military actions such as those made in Vietnam.

Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., originally proposed putting the Senate on record as opposing a "national emergency declaration" on a treaty or a legislative declaration approved by Congress.

But that seemed to some members to impinge on the constitutional powers of the commander in chief and a watering down process was begun.

Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., a committee member who said he was not satisfied with Fulbright's proposal, predicted Johnson to cite the act eventually with a statement urging the U.S. military to hold more than \$1,000.

20th Century Builds Largest Set Ever

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — In some locales are seldom what they seem, in television's "Peyton Place" series, the town square is actually an open area between 20th Century-Fox studio's cafe, two sound stages, a fire house and a building of dressing rooms.

But now the studio is outdoing itself. Jackhammers clatter and carpenters saw whine as 20th announces it is constructing "the largest set ever built."

It will cost more than 12 million and stretch across the lot nearly half a mile between two Los Angeles thoroughfares—Pico and Olympic boulevards.

The set, representing New York City of 1890, is for "Hello, Dolly!," which will star Barbara Streisand and Walter Matthau and, says John De Cuir, it also represents "nothing but problems."

"By ordinance you can't hang anything from existing buildings," said De Cuir, pronounced De Cuir, a veteran production designer who's in charge of the project.

"That means we have to install 110-foot poles, which have to go 16 feet into the ground where we run into conduits and water pipes."

De Cuir, an Oscar winner for his "Cleopatra" sets in Rome, where he also reproduced the Sistine Chapel for "The Agony and the Ecstasy," pointed to a wall of his sketches: "Next to the studio property building will be Fifth Avenue and the Hoffman House, a hotel-restaurant, which had the longest bar in the world and was where Boss Tweed hung out.

Stage 14 will become the exterior of a tenement, and next to the administration building we'll build a clubhouse of steel, glass and Victorian flavor.

"We're bringing 150-foot elm trees from Nevada—they don't

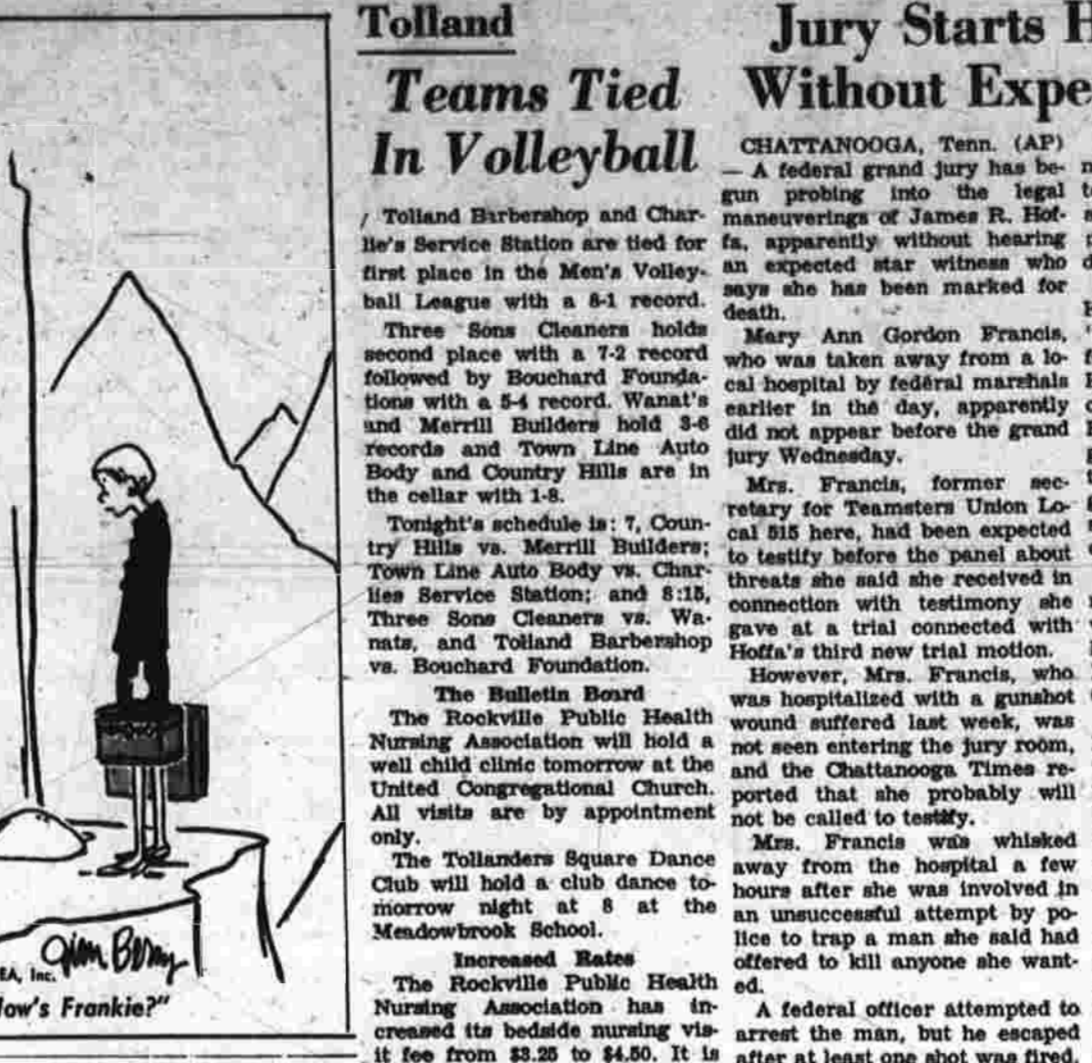

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Protesters Demonstrate On Campuses

Students called for an end to the Vietnam project and creation of a faculty-student committee to review university research policy.

At City College in New York, demonstrators held a rally as they set in muddy slush dug for the foundations of a building they say encroaches on a favorite student lounge area.

The demonstration by some 100 students was the second in three weeks over the same area. In the first, demonstrators forced a sign which read "prohibited" to be removed from the site.

At the University of California at Berkeley, students of Columbia College and the university's School of Engineering were demonstrating in favor of open recruiting by any organization.

With more than two-thirds of the 2,115-member undergraduate student body voting, the tally showed that 65 percent said they did not object to any governmental or private employee interviewing sessions.

"Although many students feel that the war in Vietnam is wrong, people do not feel that suppression of certain types of speech is a suitable means of protest," Edson Weisman, president of the sophomore class.

A majority of University of Texas students voting in a campus election expressed themselves as opposed to an immediate ceasefire and withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam.

Approximately 20 per cent of the university's 28,000 students cast ballots with 1,774 for halting the war and 2,618 against.

Another 87 said they were uncertain.

A protest of a different nature took place at the predominantly Negro Central State University in Wilberforce, Ohio, where 200 students trapped President Harry Groves in his office for several hours.

They had gathered to show support for the school's non-teaching employees who are involved in a labor dispute with the university. The crowd dispersed before any police action was taken.

At Granville College in Loudonville, another school with a predominantly Negro student body, a so-called "scholarship rebellion" continued over student charges the school employs students at the expense of academics.

There were several other student demonstrations across the nation against the presence on campus of CIA or Navy recruiters or recruiters in the program of the Chemical Co., producer of napalm.

But Approved of Tonkin Many Senators Unhappy About War Authorization

WASHINGTON (AP) — That loud noise in the Senate is from the barn door that slammed when the horse trotted away.

In this case the barn door was the overwhelming approval given to the President — in the Tonkin Gulf resolution of 1964 — to use whatever force he thought necessary to stop Communist aggression in Southeast Asia.

The vote was 85 to 2.

The horse that got loose in the war in Vietnam. Now a horse in the Senate is interpreted as meaning a self-conscious bunch of senators, ill at ease now for not paying attention to what they were doing, are blaming Johnson for it.

But, as noted, Johnson asked precisely for such approval before the Vietnam war began. Yet, what is a "national commitment"? Those words are made of rubber. They could be used to apply to almost anything a president might undertake with a foreign power.

Members of Congress are bugged down, Fulbright and others who had approved the Tonkin resolution, are uneasy about this war. One of them, Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., the man who captured the measure through approval.

He told them it could happen before they voted. But Fulbright, who has been all over the lot on how much power a president should have in foreign affairs, is now for curbing the president.

The Constitution has never given a president a completely free hand in the foreign field. But about the only real restriction it puts on him is this: Any treaty he makes with a foreign power must be approved by two-thirds of the Senate.

Let's Not Be Children
 The alienation of the Johnson Administration from the American people, who have undergone a tidal change of opinion against the Vietnam war, was never more sharply expressed than in Secretary Rusk's vehement press conference last week. With the desperation of a man clinging to a sinking dogma, Mr. Rusk set forth his familiar and increasingly unconvincing rationale for the war, and contemptuously flung out at all who disagree with him by crying, "Let's not be children."

The American majority which has now beyond doubt swung against the Rusk doctrine will, we suspect, take kindly to being dismissed with a schoolmaster's charge of infantilism. It is childish to question Mr. Rusk's obsession with a Chinese menace which only he perceives, and to doubt that America's vital security interests demand our fighting an Asian war which the South Vietnamese themselves will not fight, and a great and growing number of Americans are convinced to this day.

"Disasters from this policy," Mr. Rusk said, put the nation in a "mortal danger and risk a catastrophe for mankind" by placing in question the credibility of American "commitments" under the Southeast Asia treaty. The people are entitled to ask what has become of the commitment made to them by President Johnson when he sought election in 1964 on a peace platform directly contrary to the Vietnam policy which he followed. The "pledged word" cited by Mr. Rusk as justification for endless involvement in an Asian land war conflicts with the pledged word of Mr. Johnson not to send Americans to fight Asian battles, which promise is the more important?

The Suspended License Driver

A Tremendous Might-Have-Been
 The dam which has now begun operating its first turbines for the generation of power is called the Aswan Dam, and the body of water it impounds is called Lake Nasser, and of the two immense calendars outside the water section containing the schedule of operations for the dam one is in Egyptian and the other in Russian.

But the whole project also might be called the world's biggest "Might Have Been" for the good thing for the future living in the vicinity of the Nile Valley could have had the stamp of American engineering, financing, and equipment on it, because in a Near East more peaceful and stable than the Near East of this 1967.

What the story of the Near East might have been, if, back in 1966, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles hadn't punished it a good, effective idea to fund a Near East dam, and that the American arms, exclusively, and punish him by turning down his application for assistance with this Aswan Dam project, is something no one can say with certainty.

But, in the surface reading of the history of our times, it was the Dulles attempted use of the dollar whip on Nasser which led Nasser to retaliate by nationalizing the Suez Canal, which was the Dulles and France to conspire with Israel to use military means to blast Nasser out of power in the fall of 1966.

That, even though some elements in the west, like the 1966 United Nations diplomacy of Canada and the United States itself, came to Nasser's rescue, determined rather forcefully which world camp Nasser was going to gravitate toward, and the net result of the Dulles decision with regard to Egypt and Nasser and Aswan has been to disassociate the United States from what might well have been its natural associate and cooperation with whom still will be a revolution in Egypt, while throwing Egyptian foreign policy over to a recklessness which has been ruinous for Egypt and pleasing only—and not very pleasing even there, considering its ineptness and failure—to Russia.

Surely, then, this is one of our time's greatest might-have-beens, the might have been of what might have happened if Mr. Dulles had nationalized the Aswan Dam as something the United States had a chance to help create for the people of Egypt, not an implement of completion upon their particular leech of the moment.

WASHINGTON — Shocking collaboration between the State Department and the six-month-old military dictatorship in Greece is exposed by the story, concealed until now, of how, together, they very nearly barred a prominent Greek political refugee from the U.S.

Obviously, U.S. policy is to keep arms' length from the military junta which seized power in Athens last April. Behind the scenes, however, working level State Department officials do cooperate with the junta in ways that can only encourage the Greek colonels to think Washington has little interest in restoring a democratic regime.

Nowhere is this more obvious than in the case of Elias P. Demetropoulos, an influential Greek journalist and political editor of three newspapers and a militant foe of tyranny, both right and left. A prisoner of the Nazis during World War II after courageously helping toward U.S. aims (for which he was decorated), Demetropoulos was captured and then credited any longer Mr. Rusk's claims during the Red revolt of December, 1944.

When the colonels staged their coup last April on the pretext of fighting Communism, Demetropoulos went into hiding. Briefly, then emerged as an outspoken critic of the junta—only by word-of-mouth. Rather than submit to military censorship, he refused to write for his newspapers.

His problems with the junta deepened in August when the United Nations invited Demetropoulos to be Greek representative at the UN's annual editor's roundtable in Warsaw, Sept. 12-18. The junta made private overtures to Demetropoulos to "be" favor the colonels in the Warsaw discussions, even dangling before him the ambassadorship or ambassador or at least neutral toward key Western country.

Demetropoulos refused. The American people do not demand precipitate and reckless withdrawal from Vietnam, though more and more Americans are coming to insist upon it. We have a feeling that if this Administration cannot do the will or will to work its way out of the Vietnam morass, the American people—or "children"—Mr. Rusk pretends that word—will elect an administration who can step down the war instead of steadily stepping it up.

Mr. Rusk insists he is ready to negotiate, that only Hanoi is unwilling. What he is ready to negotiate, however, is Hanoi's surrender—the abandonment of the Viet Cong by North Vietnam, thus leaving the field clear for the Saigon regime backed by our then unchallenged military power.

It is no mystery that Hanoi refuses to negotiate on these terms under the intimidation of our bombardment. But there is every reason to believe that Hanoi would negotiate a compromise agreement which gave the Viet Cong a place in the country's political future commensurate with the strength, which contemplated the ultimate withdrawal of all foreign troops and settlement of its political differences by the South Vietnamese people themselves—if these over the long American objective—87.
