WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's appeal to the voters to bear on Congress in support of a tax increase, "Let him go to the people with that issue," said Chairman Melvin Laird of Wisconsin, of the House Republican conference. "We'll go to the people with the issue of the tax increase and let them decide if it's worth it."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Thurston B. Morton of Kentucky, often a foreign policy spokesman for Republican moderates, says the Johnson administration's "complete shift" in its justification for Americans fighting in Vietnam could destroy "what little morale is left among South Vietnamese. Previously, said Morton in an interview on his own changed views on war policy, the United States was seeking to help the South Vietnamese choose their government "without a gun at their head."

Rate Hike Asked In Car Insurance

The State Insurance Department is again considering whether to grant higher car insurance rates which have been proposed by two insurance rating organizations. The National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters (NBCU) and the National Automobile Underwriters Association (NAUA). The latest request is for an 8 per cent increase in the rate for liability coverage in the state. The NBCU said that for private passenger cars it is proposing higher rates in liability insurance averaging 12.5 per cent, or \$13 a car annually, for \$20,000/\$20,000 bodily injury and \$5,000 property damage liability coverage.

Seen Set for Tomorrow News Blackout on Operation Is Ordered by Pope Paul

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI today ordered a news blackout on his operation, but Vatican medical sources said the surgery would be performed Saturday morning as planned unless there are unexpected complications.

Word of the information blackout was announced by Rinaldo Ossola, director of L'Osservatore Romano, the Vatican newspaper, as the Pope began a spiritual retreat of prayer and contemplation in preparation for the operation to correct an enlarged prostate condition.

Columbia School Board Denies Church Rooms for Catechism Classes

The board of education Wednesday night again denied the application by the Rev. Hugh Murphy of St. Columba's Church to use the Porter School for catechism classes on Tuesday afternoons.

The board, after reconsidering Father Murphy's request, stated that it is illegal to use the school for any purpose other than education until all school activities are completed for the day. Members added that the activity room is in use until 4 p.m. most days and sometimes until 5 p.m. or later during inclement weather.

Father Murphy had asked to use the activity room Tuesday days from 3:15 to 4 p.m.

The gym group meets Tuesday and Thursday for intramural activities and in inclement weather uses the activity room.

The board pointed out that the school schedule could not be changed but Father Murphy stated that parents would expect to pick up children attending religious education classes.

Board members added that the school is responsible for all children until they are home and said intramural activities were part of the school function and could not be curtailed in any way.

Hope is Changed

Father Murphy told the board that "other towns see the problem, why can't Columbia?"

He added that he could see that at the moment the plan would be "impractical" but said he hopes for a change in a few months. At this point, one board member said, "I don't know, Father Murphy any false hopes."

When asked why he could not schedule religious education classes for Saturday or evenings, Father Murphy said it would be inconvenient and he would not be able to get the mass at any time.

Assistant superintendent-Principal George Patros said that, hopefully, Windham High School may close earlier in the future thus making Porter School facilities available to townpeople at an earlier hour. He pointed out that bus schedules were such that some children put in an eight-hour day, "far too long for young children."

The board added that if policies change at any time in the future, Father Murphy could re-state his request.

The board also denied the application of the Girl Scouts for the use of the cafeteria from 11:30 to 2 p.m. but added that the Scouts could apply for other hours the board would reconsider.

Mrs. Joanne Armstrong, who presented the Scout's petition, said there was a feeling in town that the school "is not being utilized to its fullest potential."

Wallace Leitz, a board member, said, "The school was built for educational purposes first. It would be very feasible that teachers planning next year's programs would be disturbed. The school board has its problems and the general public should be made aware of them."

Guy Beck stated that facilities should not be interrupted during a school day which could cause a disturbance. He said he was celebratory last until 5 p.m. and reiterated the fact that it is illegal to do so anyway.

Principal Patros told the board the Church Camp was donated to the school to be used "as seen fit." He added the money would probably be used to buy a record player or a film strip.

Policeman's Slaying Opens Parole Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The arrest of two federal parolees in the slaying of a policeman has reopened a long-standing argument between legislators and parole officials as to how to control the parole system.

Director J. Edgar Hoover, who has reached the highest levels of law enforcement in the nation, is in the midst of a major effort to reform the Federal Bureau of Investigation, says the case indicates that parolees are a major problem.

But Walter Dunbar, new chairman of the U.S. Board of Parole and Pardon Commissioners, says a preliminary look at the records of the accused slayers convinces him he also would have voted to parole them.

The indirect debate was prompted by the case of two parolees from the federal penitentiary at Marion, Ill.—Clifton O. Burton, 29, and Henry M. Gargano, 35.

They have been indicted on federal charges of aggravated bank robbery in the \$68,783 hold-up of a Northlake III, bank Oct. 27 in which two policemen were killed in a gun battle. Conviction could mean the death penalty.

Gargano was paroled last March after serving 10½ years of a 21-year sentence for bank robbery and escape from a prison farm. Daniels was paroled last January after serving 9 years of a 15-year bank robbery sentence.

Both men had long criminal records and were on parole from federal prisons.

"It's easy to see if a prisoner has had his teeth fixed in prison, or has learned to tune an auto when we get into areas of how to measure his ability, what he'll do when he gets out, how he'll react to his associates, these are less predictable," he said.

Daniels and Gargano passed every test the parole board laid down. Both had completed high school in prison, both had taken college extension courses.

Gargano had been promised a job as a plumber when he got out. Daniels, Dunbar said, had "a dental technician's skill as a dental technician."

Ben Meeker, who supervised their parole in northern Illinois, where he is chief of parole, described Daniels as "the type of prisoner that if you looked through a thousand prison cases you'd say he's the type who would do good on parole. Every one of his prison addresses thought he was well adjusted."

But Meeker said parole officers had been able to check up on the pair only periodically on a monthly basis.

The Chicago office handles about 100 cases a month with 15 field offices, or nearly 90 cases apiece, he said.

Students Enjoy Steno Lab

Wouldn't it be nice to walk into a class and just with the flick of a dial to hear and be able to work on make-up, scheduled, or advanced assignments? Stenography students have this opportunity in the Steno-lab.

Each desk is equipped with earphones, a channel indicator selecting tapes to be heard, and a volume control. The tapes, played on a short-handled console, cover word practice and letter dictation.

Mr. Kenneth Skinner, head of the Steno Instructional Materials Center, is preparing more tapes which will soon supply the lab with more material to have four lessons running simultaneously.

Stenography teachers, whose classes use the year-old lab, are Mrs. Charis St. Jean, Mrs. Pamela Pruitt and Miss Avis Kellogg.

Mrs. St. Jean said that the steno-lab stimulated concentration, and the dictation tapes for speed at an early point. The shorthand console frees the teacher, allowing her to devote more time to observing and helping the students.

It is a substitute teacher is needed, a student could operate the console's controls, and the class would continue without interruption.

In reference to what the students think of the lab, Mrs. St. Jean said the girls seem to like it. They can do more in a shorter time.

Pathology Is Explained To Pre-Med

The Pre-Med Club was introduced to the laboratory science of pathology last Monday night by Dr. Becker, a pathologist at Manchester Memorial Hospital.

Through the use of slides, Dr. Becker presented the history and applications of the science. He mentioned some of the activities such as Leucemia, Virus, and Pasteur who contributed greatly to modern medicine and especially to pathology.

Dr. Becker noted that 75 to 100 years ago there were no blood transfusions, antibiotics, or anesthetics. Laboratory medicine may become automated in the next fifteen to twenty years.

Slides were shown of the types of testing done each day in the lab. Then Mrs. Roy McKinnery, a technician at the hospital, invited the group to tour the bacteriology room, blood bank and chemistry laboratory. Equipment such as an isotopic analyzer, a PPI tester, an automatic white blood cell counting machine, and a machine recording twelve separate experiments on blood almost simultaneously were viewed with much interest by the students.

Dr. Becker invited any individual to feel free in the future to return to discuss with him any aspects of his field. There is a demand for people in this field because hospitals are expanding and laboratory medicine is a vital part of the medical profession today.

Many other students from the art department were represented in the show, as were students from Bolton and Blain and other areas.
