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Building Fees Reach \$3,652

Building permits were issued last month for taxable construction estimated at \$669,390, according to a report issued by Thomas McMahon, chief building inspector. The figure compares favorably with an estimated \$600,000 in taxable construction in October 1966, when a \$200,000 permit for an addition to Colonial Board and another for \$100,000 for an addition to the Highland Market, both issued last year, are considered.

Total fees collected last month added up to \$3,652, compared to a total of \$3,701 received in October of last year. The construction of single-family dwellings last month was far ahead of that for the corresponding period last year. Permits valued at \$488,500 were issued in October for 22 single-family dwellings, at an average estimated cost of \$19,000. Permits were issued for only four single-family dwellings in October 1966.

Permits were issued last month also for one 2-family dwelling, two garages, one residential garage, three swimming pools, two fences, two signs, 11 demolitions, 25 alterations and additions, one dog house and one cabana.

Mayor Races Won By Stokes, Hatcher

Cleveland, Ohio Gary, Ind.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Carl B. Stokes, a product of the alumna, became the first Negro Tuesday to be elected mayor of one of America's 10 largest cities. Stokes, in all his battles up to the social, economic and political ladder, never had to fight harder than he did to beat Republican Seth C. Taft for Cleveland's mayoral office. His razor-thin edge of 2,501 votes—128,529 to 127,528—was in doubt almost to the end.

Stokes lost his independence race against Democratic Mayor Ralph S. Locher by 2,143 but got a recount before he was elected. Stokes received heavy support from the Negro East Side. He came out of the white sections trailing but within striking range. He substantially increased his percentage of the white vote from the 17 per cent he received in the primary. Stokes, 40 and a nasty dresser with an easy humor, bucked his own Democratic party organization to defeat Locher in the Oct. 3 primary by 18,000 votes. This time he had the backing of his party, organized labor, and Cleveland's two daily newspapers, the Plain Dealer and the Cleveland Press.

He and Taft sought to avoid the racial issue but it could not be ignored and one of the heaviest votes in Cleveland's history—287,158—burned out despite a day that began with sub-freezing temperatures and driving snow. Stokes had been considered a slight favorite at best after a month-long campaign in which observers felt he had pulled a political hinder by agreeing to debate Taft. Taft responded. He asked his supporters, who had tried to make him the first Republican mayor of Cleveland in 26 years, to "forget words spoken in heat and to think now of things that can be done to make our city a great city."

Stokes lost no time after the victory to call for a united Cleveland. He asked for his opponent to join him in building a better city. Taft responded. 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Ann Uccello Elected, Steals State Spotlight

Hartford, Conn.

HARTFORD (AP)—Hartford's new Republican mayor, Ann Uccello, stole the spotlight in Tuesday's 33 municipal elections in Connecticut while Democrats forged ahead in the larger cities. The fact that Miss Uccello garnered the most votes in Hartford's nonpartisan council election and thereby took the title of mayor away from Democrat George B. (Flea) Kinnala somewhat obscured the fact that the GOP had actually lost one of its four seats on the nine-member council. The council is now 6-3 Democratic, and the charter changes approved by the voters which will give Hartford a strong mayor and partisan elections won't go into effect until 1970.

Uccello, therefore, takes on a title of considerable political value but little political weight. The council and the city manager run the government of Hartford. Meanwhile, elsewhere in Connecticut, voters repeatedly ousted two-term Republican Mayor Thomas C. Mayors in Stamford's election and Democratic incumbent Donald T. Dorsey scored an impressive victory over Democrat Robert L. Motturo in a contest to decide who would succeed Democratic Mayor William T. Shea.

In all, the Democrats took four cities from the Republicans. Stamford, West Hartford, Hamden and Wallingford (although Wallingford's Republican mayor who has a four-year term, remains in office for two more years, at least while the GOP took four from the Democrats—Middletown, Shelton, Rocky Hill and Waterbury.)

The Democratic "turnover" victories were in bigger cities, but subtracting the population of the Republican "turnovers" shows the Democrats with a net gain of the equivalent of a city of 100,000.

Mrs. Hicks Is Beaten In Boston

BOSTON (AP)—Strong support from Negro voters helped Louise Day Hicks lose her bid for mayor of Boston.

While the race issue often went unspoken by either candidate during the campaign, Mrs. Hicks was known to be a vigorous opponent of busing to achieve racial balance in the city's schools.

"You know where I stand," she told voters repeatedly. "I am for the busing of children from the white vote to be split about even and the Negro vote to be solidly behind White, the Massachusetts secretary of state.

In the city's three predominantly Negro wards—8, 13 and 14—White outpolled Mrs. Hicks by 15,000 to 8,316. He also ran well in other Negro areas. Unofficial estimates place the total of Negroes among the city's 288,000 registered voters at 90,000.

DETROIT (AP)—More than 24,000 Chrysler Corp. workers jumped the gun on a midnight strike deadline today, closing down nearly a quarter of the No. 8 auto maker's operations. The walkouts at eight plants came as bargainers for the company and the United Auto Workers Union passed the 24-hour mark in a marathon attempt to write a new three-year contract before the week's stoppage raised the possibility more Chrysler's 108,000 UAW members would get out during the 46-day strike.

U.S. Infantry, Communists Engage in Night Fighting

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. Infantrymen battled Communist troops again tonight in the Dak to sector of the central highlands, where Americans have lately chased the Viet Cong and strong and aggressive North Vietnamese forces.

Steady reports said two companies of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division came under a heavy ground assault as they were moving into night defensive positions southwest of Dak To, which is 270 miles north of Saigon. Enemy mortars shelled a battalion artillery base.

Officers said they had no word about casualties, but the fighting was still going on several hours after dark.

A fierce Marine battle with North Vietnamese troops and Communist attacks on provincial capitals and refugee hamlets marked the ground war elsewhere while spokesmen reported on heavy air strikes against North Vietnam that cost three American planes.

U.S. Marines charged through a screen of American tear gas to take a heavily fortified village which the North Vietnamese abandoned Tuesday after nearly 24 hours of hard fighting and bombardment in the coastal lowlands 27 miles south of Da Nang.

The Marines reported 23 of their men killed and 88 wounded. They also reported the seizure of 20 enemy machine-guns and other weapons. The Marines said the retreating Communists carried off at least two dozen of their dead.

Communist units also showed increased ferocity by invading U.S. probes in which 50 American soldiers and 78 of the enemy were reportedly killed at Loc Ninh, 78 miles northwest of Saigon, and near Dak To in the central highlands.

The step-up Communist activity and in Red opposition to U.S. operations appeared to indicate that the Communists are not being as elusive as they have been and may be moving east into positions for new thrusts on the Viet Cong border Tuesday and Wednesday.

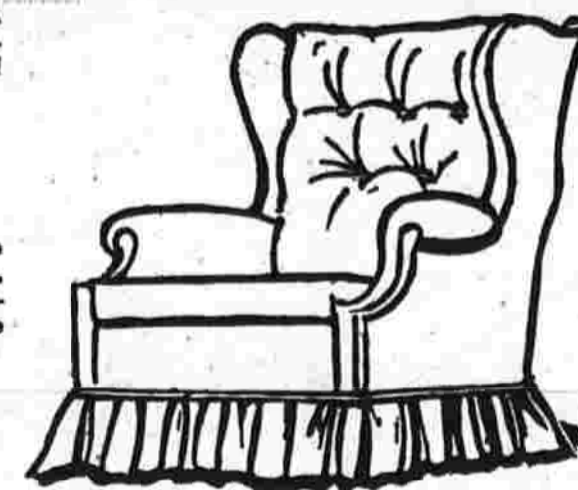

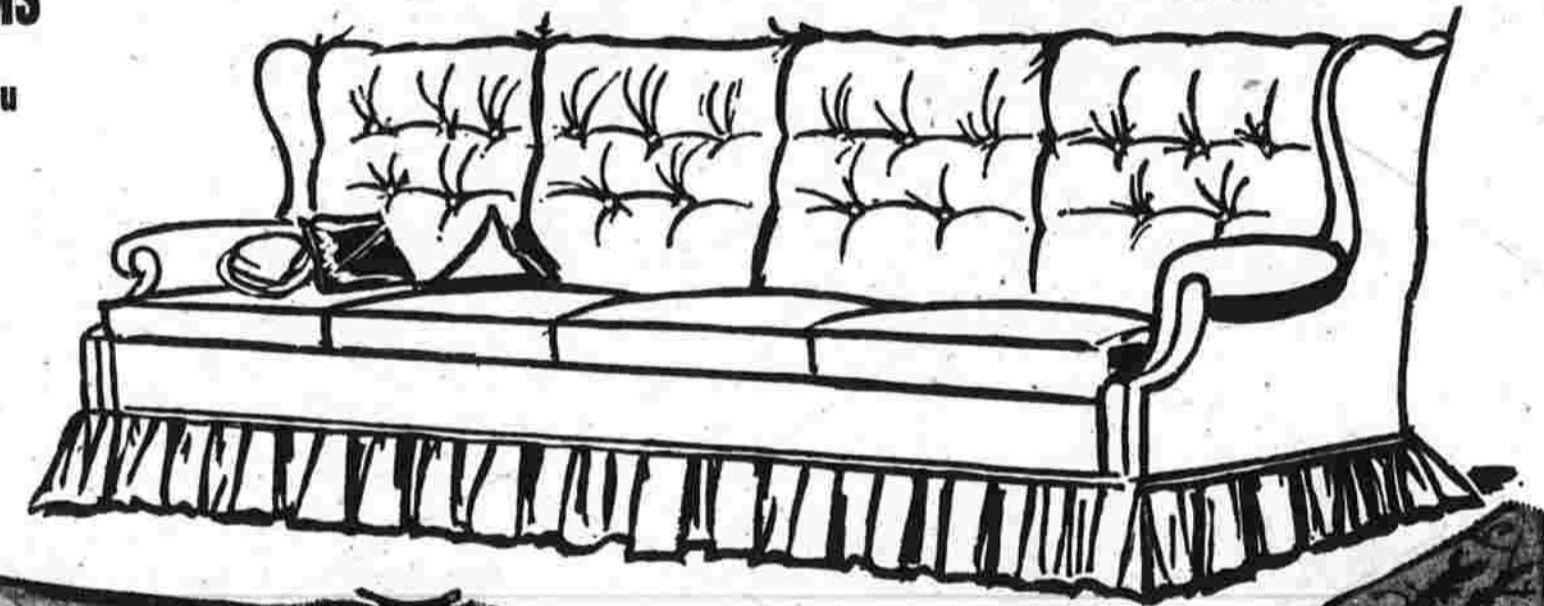

What Hath Pascal Wrought?

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — (NEA) — Hitting glass with a hammer and chisel sounds like a fairly destructive occupation, but a pretty, blonde, 63-year-old grandmother is creating lovely works of sculpture with those tools.

Pascal — she has abandoned her first name and her married name and just uses her maiden name — is the world's only glass sculptor. Some others may work with molten glass, but nobody else, as far as she knows, goes at it with her tools.

There's a good reason for her uniqueness. It isn't easy. In fact, it took Pascal 10 years to figure out a way to do it.

Then she went to Pittsburgh, a glass center. Someone told her about an abandoned glass factory in Dumbur, Pa., where the cullet — the waste glass — was still in the furnaces.

She got hold of some chunks of this cullet, set up a table in a nearby motel and set to work. Eureka — success. The glass let itself be sculpted.

At her Beverly Hills studio, Grandmas called Pascal digs into a hunk of glass. She sculpts.

An Aide Explains DeGaulle's Design

PARIS (AP) — Mind reading and explaining are twin political obligations for the followers of President Charles de Gaulle. Only a restricted few of his closest confidants can claim to know what De Gaulle really wants, what he is trying to do, where he would lead France and the world. Even those few can never be sure they are right.

De Gaulle drops copious hints of his intentions, or often uses fuzzy language that leaves room for different interpretations. Former Premier Michel Debre was still promising that France intended to stay in Algeria long after De Gaulle had decided on the basis of evidence available today to get out of there.

That doesn't stop Gaullists from making educated guesses about the general's aims. One of them, René Capitant, has now come out with a succinct outline of De Gaulle's global strategy. De Gaulle has supplied the individual building blocks, but Capitant has fitted them together to make a clearer overall design than De Gaulle has ever sketched.

Writing in the Gaullist weekly *Notre République*—Our Republic—Capitant says the world of tomorrow will have three poles: in the West, the Anglo-Saxon world; in the East, China; in the center, Europe from the Atlantic to the Ural.

"There, destined with a singular force, are the essential elements of the European problem. On one side are the partisans of a little Europe, historically linked to the twin poles (Russia and the United States) of 1945. Their aim is to tie as tightly as possible Western Europe to America. This was only half of Europe, of a Europe divided and torn apart as Poland was for a long time.

"The Gaullist vision of a big Europe is much different: it is of a Europe that is reunited, reunified, finding again with its historical frontiers its essential

CRC Hearing Set Nov. 15

The Charter Revision Commission (CRC) has scheduled a public hearing for next Wednesday on its recommended charter changes, preparatory to submitting a final report in December to the Board of Directors.

The public hearing will be at 7 p.m. in the Municipal Building Hearing Room.

CRC vice chairman Atty. John Fitzgerald appeared at last night's meeting of the Board of Directors to present a progress report and, doubling as head of the four-member Democratic minority, presented also a minority report.

The CRC's Democratic minority disagreed with the five-member majority on two proposed charter changes and one rejected proposal.

It opposes two-year non-staggered terms for the nine members of the Board of Education, no-less-than-one-mill annual tax for capital improvements.

In addition, it objects to the rejection of a proposal by Town Manager Robert Weston for incorporating a merit system for town employees into the charter.

All of the CRC's other recommendations but one were approved by all of its members. The exception is pay raises for the directors. Atty. Fitzgerald was the only one to vote against the proposal.

Nurse-Parachutists Trained for Combat

LEONOR, Portugal (AP) — There is a small but growing number of Portuguese women who don't believe their place is in the home.

They parachute into guerrilla-infested areas in three African countries to administer medical aid to Portuguese soldiers wounded in combat.

These female soldiers, technically called nurse-parachutists, are trained to handle any dirty job they may encounter in the line of duty, including killing the enemy.

Three of them received their parachute wings and officers' emblems this week and will soon be off to join more than 30 of their comrades-in-arms in Portuguese Guinea, Angola and Mozambique, where Portugal has been fighting an anti-guerrilla war for more than six years.

They received four weeks of intensive training, including instruction in the use of automatic weapons. Each of them made six jumps in full battle gear right alongside male paratroopers, the elite corps of Portugal's armed forces.

From here they will go to the Azores Islands for an additional month of training before embarking for one of the combat areas in what Portugal calls its overseas provinces.

Few are ever involved in actual combat, but they are ready to do battle if need be.

Asks Frats To Correct Hazing Rites

NEW HAVEN (AP)—A Yale University dean says he expects to give Yale's social fraternities a chance to correct any abusive hazing practices—such as branding the backs of new pledges.

Richard C. Carroll, dean of undergraduate affairs, said in a story in Tuesday's Yale Daily News that he expected to give the Inter-Fraternity Council complete jurisdiction in "solving its own problems."

The student newspaper published Friday a story on hazing practices used by fraternities to initiate new members.

The paper's most serious charge was that Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity branded a small delta on the back of each student pledge.

But Albert Evans, head of the Inter-Fraternity Council, said in Tuesday's News that Friday's story was misleading, and that the brand was more like a cigarette burn, which lasts only two or three weeks.

According to Evans, the practice has never caused any medical complications.

A past president of Delta Kappa Epsilon, George W. Bush '66, said Yale fraternities have the physically mildest initiations of all schools in the country.

Dean Carroll said all physical hazing should be abolished, but that he would allow the council to take the necessary steps.

He said he had "every expectation that the IFC will look into its own affairs in a responsible way, and we want to give them that chance."

Switch to Germ-Free Mice Gets Demand from Research

WILMINGTON, Mass. (AP)—Build a better mousetrap and the world beats a path to your door. Build a better mouse, and you've got to go out and sell it.

That's what Dr. Henry L. Foster, a veterinarian, learned when he converted his Charles River breeding laboratories in 1968 from the production of ordinary mice to germ-free mice.

"We had to go out and convince people there was a need for it," Dr. Foster said in an interview. "At first it was difficult, but it worked out well."

Today the laboratories produce about 8 million germ-free rats and mice a year for research. Most of the demand comes from the drug industry, medical schools and the federal government, including the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston, Tex., where they'll be used in tests to prepare man for landing on the moon.

The advantage to the researcher of germ-free mice is that there are no unknown variables.

A normal mouse may react to a test in a certain way because earlier in its life it was exposed to a bacteria or virus the researcher knows nothing about.

"The germ-free mouse offers the researcher a clean slate," Dr. Foster said.

Foster starts a family of germ-free mice by taking a baby directly from the mother's womb by a caesarian operation.

"The fetal membranes and the placenta," Dr. Foster said, "are nature's own sterile isolator system. We deliver the baby mouse in a sterile chamber and then place him in a sterile container."

Actually, one male germ-free mouse is placed in a container with one female germ-free mouse.

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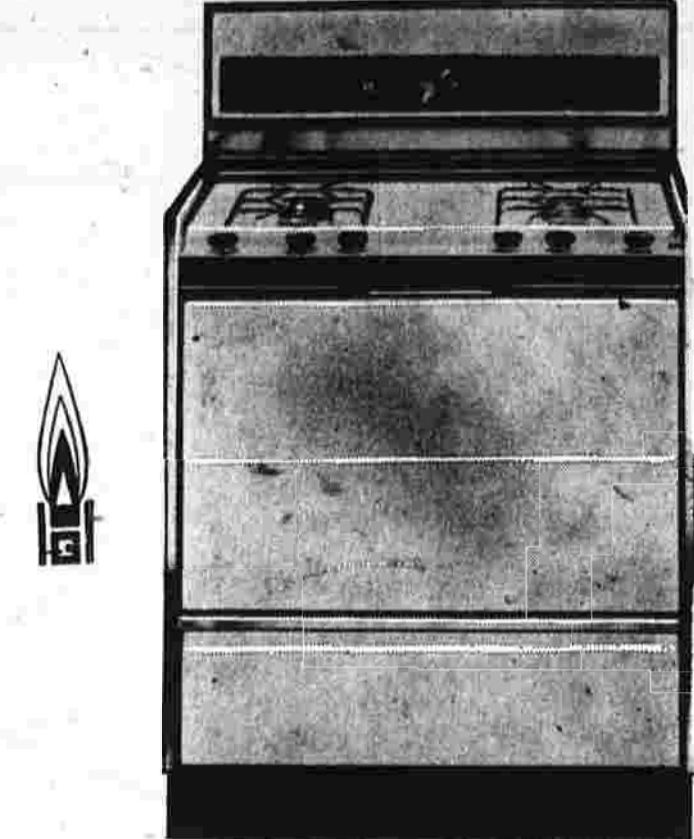

With Saturn Launch Durante-Nosed Aircraft Make Operational Debut

By JIM STROTDMAN AP Aerospace Writer

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Five big-nosed aircraft that look as if Jimmy Durante's schmoose slipped into their engineering plans will make an operational debut with the launch of America's first Saturn rocket on Nov. 21.

The modified jet cargo planes, built with 10-foot-long "drop wings" in front to hold the big steerable antennas ever flown, will play a major role acting as airborne radio relay tracking stations during all missions in the Apollo man to the moon program.

For the first Saturn launch, the aircraft will be positioned over the Atlantic, one over the Gulf of Mexico and three above the Pacific Ocean.

Called ARIA for Apollo Range

Corporation. The "drop snouts" are modified versions of eight C-130 jet transport cargo planes.

The movable, dish-shaped antennas in the aircraft's elongated nose—coupled with the maneuverability of the plane itself—gives each ARIA the capability to act as a long-range communications relay link.

Flying at altitudes between 35,000 and 40,000 feet at specific locations around the globe, the aircraft during manned Apollo missions will be equipped to relay astronauts' voices from orbiting spacecraft to ground flight controllers and vice versa. They will also receive and record telemetry data concerning spacecraft stationing.

Four of the ARIAs will be equipped with a Tomlin telescope camera to photograph launch events, including separation of rocket stages and space-vehicle re-entry.

When not being used for Project Apollo, the airplanes and their 11-man crews will help gather telemetry data during other NASA and Defense Department launches, officials Donnell Douglas and Bendix said.

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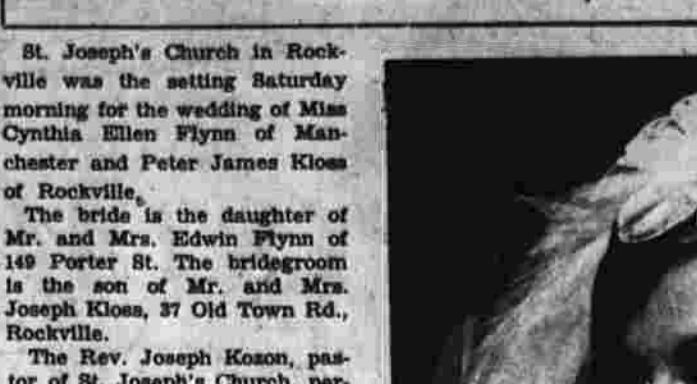

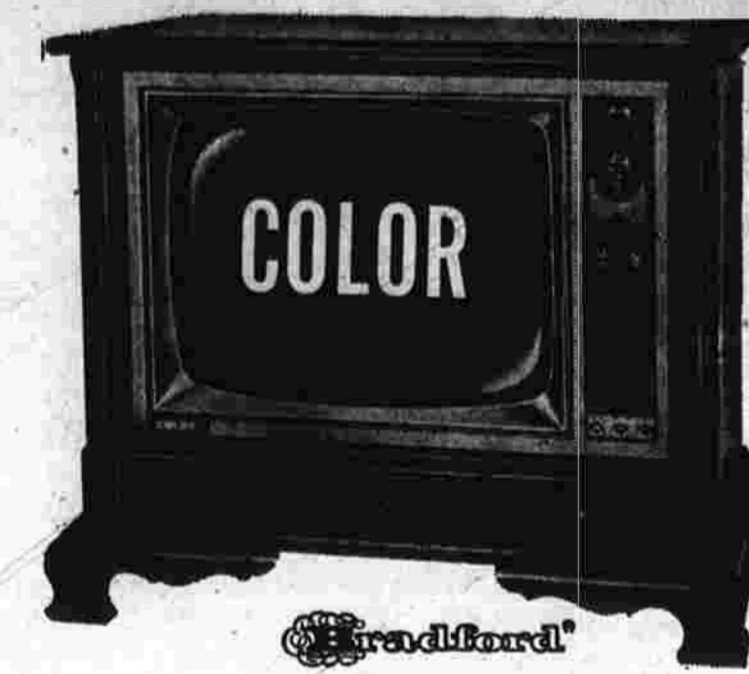

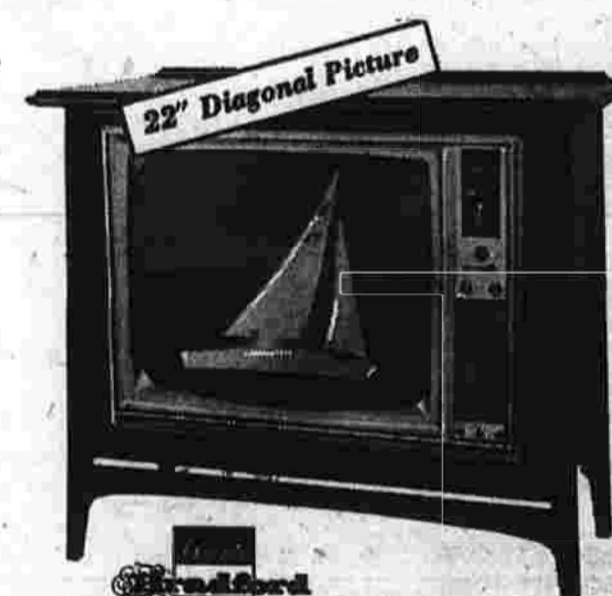

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Sonic Boom Gives Headache To Jet Builders, Operators

NEW YORK (AP)—A boom of another kind, not an economic boom but one whose impact on mechanics may be even more readily understood, will burst upon our heads in the 1970s.

This is the sonic boom, a blast of sound waves created when aircraft fly faster than the speed of sound. It can shatter plate glass, plaster and other property, but above all it can shatter nerves of man and animal.

It is also perhaps the greatest headache that lies ahead for jet builders and operators of the huge commercial jets that are expected to be soaring through the skies at speeds of more than 1,800 miles an hour.

British, French, Soviet and U.S. interests are now working on their models, all of which will be sleek, comfortable and quiet within, but incredibly loud without.

As a result, mankind is preoccupied with the noise problem. The contest is clearly defined: Man demands speed in going from one place to another; he has an innate urge, often unarticulated, to peace and quiet also. Will the noise be banished? Or will man be forced to listen?

The expert opinion now concludes that the loud plane will win. They feel there is an insurmountable barrier to technology, generally has won in the past, as witness the air, water and sound pollution that already exists.

For the present anyway, federal officials feel the public can adjust to the noise, citing as evidence man's adjustment to the introduction of other brand-new noises in the past.

"Individuals tend to accommodate themselves to an initially disturbing noise once it becomes a pattern of daily life," the Federal Aviation Agency says.

"There are noisies today in cities and in small towns that are taken for granted which, if they were introduced as new noises, would cause disturbances for an initial period of time," the agency adds.

This conclusion provokes outraged rebuttals from sociologists, doctors, men of property owners and residents who live near airports, all of whom contend that although man may tolerate air noises, his adjustment to them is less than perfect.

The problem of shock waves also is causing great concern among some of the insurance fraternity, who feel they will be deluged with claims for damage, much of which they will be unable to prove or disprove as caused by the boom.

Proof of damage from sonic blasts has been fairly easy to establish so far because tests to boom but one whose impact on mechanics may be even more readily understood, will burst upon our heads in the 1970s.

During tests in St. Louis six years ago more than 1,500 claims were filed and more than 800 of them were declared valid. Claims also were allowed for damage in tests at Oklahoma City and Chicago.

What happens, however, when several huge supersonic commercial craft fly coast to coast, over city and farm, leaving behind a 50-mile swath boom? Let's see.

As a result, there is a very active and knowledgeable group that wants to ban overland flights at speeds faster than sound. This would leave the transonic routes to the big new jets.

The alternative, now being considered and studied by engineers, is a modification of the craft that would reduce, but not eliminate, the boom. So far, nobody has been able to muffle the noise completely.

The result of these differences of opinion very likely will cause you to hear a lot of talk about the boom before you hear the boom itself.

The biggest echo, however, may well be the reverberation from official statements that you, modern man, can learn to live with it.

No Doormat Action

REHOBOTH, Mass. (AP)—When a town employee suggested that the town had needed a doormat on which people could wipe their feet, officials asked various businessmen how much such a mat could be rented for.

Monday night, to their consternation and amusement, the selectman received a letter from an unidentified laundry and dry cleaning firm. It offered a \$1.50 monthly rental fee—accompanied by a form inquiring about the customer's credit rating.

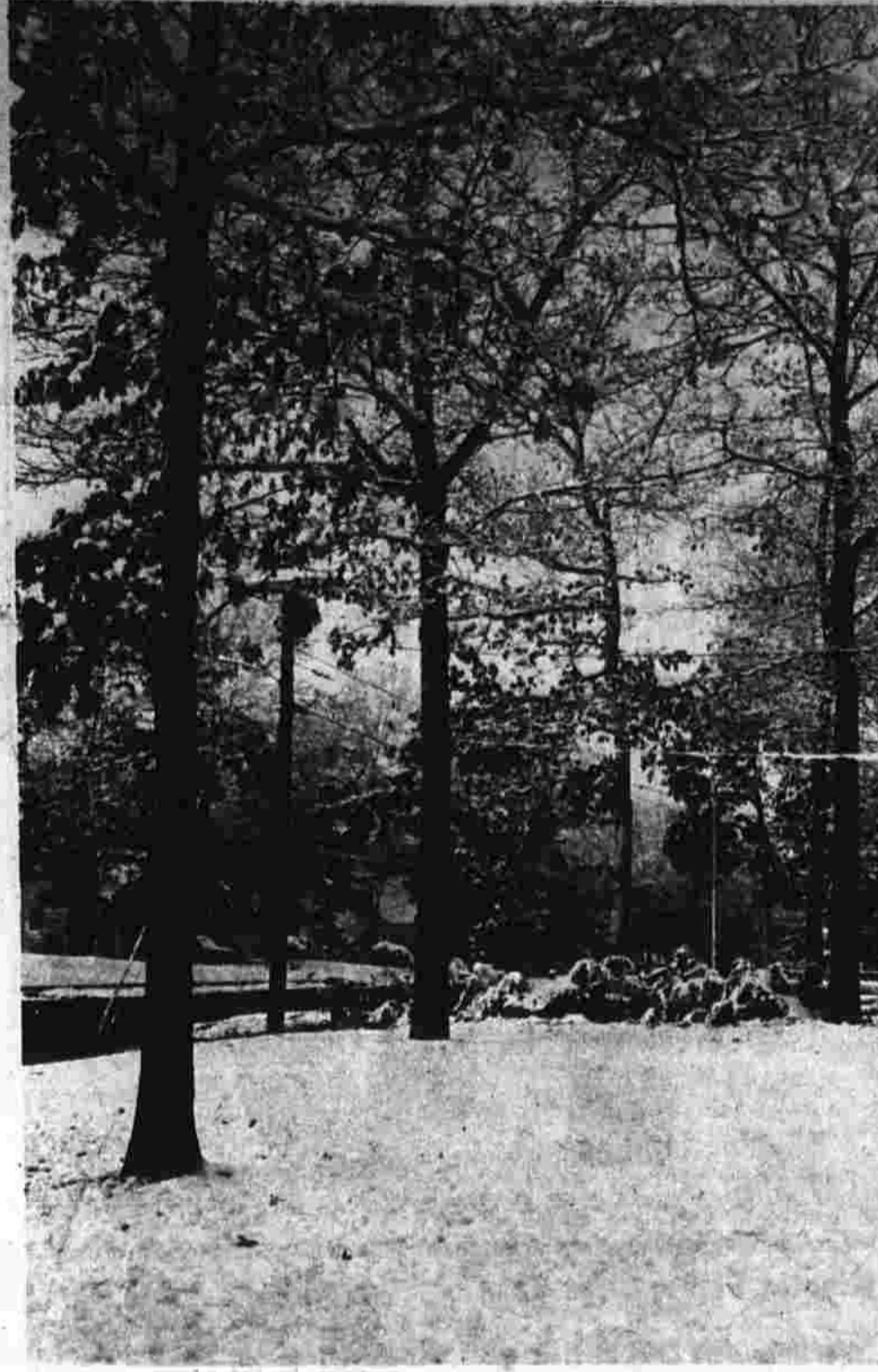

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Bolton Preliminary Plans Studied For Planned Grade School

The preliminary plans of the proposed elementary school were reviewed in a three-hour meeting with Richard Howland, director of the Bureau of School Buildings, State Board of Education Monday morning.

Among those attending the meeting, arranged for by the Building Commission and the architect, were PBC chairman Douglas Cheney, Architect Robert Lashard, Superintendent of Schools Dr. Joseph Castagna and school board chairman Harold Smith and vice-chairman Ricky Graham.

Cheney reported to his commission at a meeting Monday night that the drainage design is okay, but that the school plans will need some revision in the light of new information.

He said that the school board discovered at a meeting to review educational specifications last Thursday that the first stage of the school, as designed, will not be big enough for the grades tentatively scheduled to occupy them.

Dr. Castagna confirmed this fact today. He said that the school, as designed, would "just barely accommodate" children in kindergarten through Grade 5, putting 30 in a room.

According to school board thinking, the new school would be built to house kindergarten through Grade 4, and the remodeled North Rd. school, making it a middle school.

Speech drawn in 1965, Cheney pointed out that the original specifications for the elementary school were drawn in 1966, with only one revision, but no over-all revision since then.

One of the amendments was a request for a room for perceptually handicapped children under P.A. 206 (which is now incorporated in the special education act, 207). During the discussion in Howland's office, it was discovered that it would serve the purpose of the program better to have a conference room, rather than a classroom.

A conference room will probably also be needed for a remedial reading teacher, a service still in the dream stage in 1967, because such a person has not become available.

Howland also explained that the ratio of kindergarten rooms to rooms for other grades is usually one kindergarten room for every five or six other classrooms.

The preliminary plan has one too many kindergartens, according to this ratio.

Cheney reported that Howland said that using the all purpose room for other use and physical education often left no time in the schedule for music and drama.

This brings up the question of whether band lessons should start in the fourth grade, as they do now, and whether there should be a special room for music.

School Would be Full

Cheney explained that if the school had been built, as requested, for occupancy in the fall of 1968, there would have been a question for increased enrollment. Now, if the school were to be ready in January or February 1969, based on present population, it would be full.

The birth rate is apparently going down, he said, but the "permanence survival" rate is going up. Dr. Castagna explained today that this second rate has a lot to do with families moving into town with small children.

Dr. Castagna said that this year's enumeration figures have not yet been tallied, but that he hopes to have them ready for the regular school board meeting Monday.

He said he expects the board to discuss the new elementary school Monday, although it is not an agenda item. It may be discussed under communications, because the PBC has written the board asking for revised specifications.

The PBC will also meet Monday to review figures with the architect.

As for the septic system and surface drainage, which the PBC had been worried about, Cheney said that the plans are all right, that the state says to proceed, take a seepage test in the spring to determine if a surface drain is necessary. Cheney said he'd prefer to install the surface drain, anyway, to take excess water off the teaching field, that it would be "well worth the money" (estimated at about \$5,000 extra).

Vernon Planner To Study State Act

Defining the Community Development Act (C-DAP) and how it applies to Vernon will be one of the first projects undertaken by the town's new professional planner.

John McAlmont Jr. of Rhode Island, who has been hired by the town, will start his work here on Nov. 13. He has, however, already been working with the state's Community Affairs Department along with Mayor John Grant and Jay Edinger, director of administration.

Entering the C-DAP program will require considerable activity on the part of all of the town's boards, agencies and commissions related to community development, planning and zoning.

It is the administration's feeling that there is a very definite relationship between planning and the development objectives. In this connection it is felt the planner should definitely be a part of the project from its inception.

In order to have the town considered in any of the activity available under C-DAP an application has to be filed. This involves many red tape and once the initial application is made the town can file for specific implementation of projects under other legislative acts.

Implementing the program will probably necessitate hiring a coordinator and possibly other staff, Edinger said.

Perhaps after investigating, he said, the planner and the administration will not want to enter into the program, and, too, there may not be any funds available for participation in the program immediately.

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Hal Boyle
Leon Uris
Admonishes
New Writers

NEW YORK (AP) — So many you'd like to write novels and become rich and famous? Well, listen to this warning from Leon Uris, whose most recent best-seller is "Tops," and who turned himself from a high school dropout into one of the world's most successful novelists: "I don't know of any other profession that has the casualty rate that novel writing has. That life in the lonely room gets them."

"Novel writing is a real death trap. It kills off major writers. It burns them out."
"The novelist, in a way, is like a garbage can. He has to expose himself to the filth, the leprosy, the ugly, as part of life. He can't take his eyes away from truth."
"He has to feel these things. And in time they break him down."

Among major novelists Uris feels were burned out by the insatiable requirements of their craft he listed Jack London, Sinclair Lewis, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Ernest Hemingway and William Faulkner. The key to a novelist's personal survival is balance, he said, adding with a smile: "I never let work interfere with my pleasure."

In actuality, however, the athletically built writer—his 43, blue-eyed, has iron-gray hair, a sensitive face that breaks into a ready grin when he thinks he has said something too serious—is a man of intense self-discipline.
Beginning at the age of six, when he composed an opera about the death of his dog, a work that never managed to reach Broadway, the Baltimore-born writer turned out hundreds of thousands of unpublished words.
He quit school at 17 to join the U.S. Marines and serve in the Pacific combat theater. After the war he spent eight frustrating years before his first novel, "Battle Cry," based on his Marine experiences, found its way into print.

Turned down previously by seven publishers, it has since sold seven million copies and been made into a film. Altogether the six novels by Uris—these include "Tops" and "Armageddon"—have sold between 17 and 20 million copies.
"I took me all my life to become an overnight success," Uris said wryly. "I had a lot of trouble breaking the doors down."
A fluent writer who can slip 100 words a minute out of his typewriter, he rewrites each page several times. He likes to ski most of the day in the mountains surrounding his hillside home at Aspen, Colo., then concentrate on his writing between 4 and 7 p.m. in a workshop over his garage.

"Most writers are morning writers," he said. "I'm a twilight writer."
"One reason I became a writer is so that I could sleep late in the morning. And being a twilight writer has its advantages: I don't have to play parlor games with the kids or help them with their homework." A man of methodical planning, Uris likes to spend two full years in researching the background of his novels, then writes them in from seven months to a year.

"Doing the research keeps me out of pool halls," he said.
Critics, admitting the raw power of his narrative skill, have sometimes complained his novels lack literary grace. To which Uris, who has a low opinion of most critics, has replied: "Fortunately, English and writing have little to do with each other."
He believes that American literature in this century has been "the most virtile of any in the world, and will probably continue to be."
"The biggest problems of our time are the survival of the human race, hunger and tyranny. These are great themes. He isn't afraid his own inspirational font will run dry."
"I'm Jewish—I've got a lot to say."

"I've always felt that the only success a man has in life," Uris replied slowly, "is the love and respect of his family. That's your only harvest. The rest is nonsense."

Israel Embarks on Plan For Weapon Against Arabs

TEL AVIV (AP)—Israel has embarked on a crash program to develop a new weapon against the Arabs—television. It's a race against time. The Israelis fear the Jordanians will have the same propaganda weapon operations as Israel. Considered to be at stake in the budding Middle East television war are the loyalities of hundreds of thousands of Arabs in the holy land of Jordan's west bank, now under Israeli occupation.

The Israeli television monopoly has been established during the war last June. "Everybody else in the world was watching what was happening except Israel," says the television task force chairman, Prof. Elisha Katz, who works at Jerusalem's Hebrew University and at Chicago University. Katz, 41, is a mass media research expert who was born in New York and resided for most of the year in Jerusalem. He says the project should aim for more than just propaganda.

"It's a matter of establishing a support with these people," he says. "I hope this operates much less in politics and ideology and more in the area of that change of ideas and culture."

What the Israelis and Jordanians decide to put before the camera is assured of an eager audience. "We understand Jordan is planning to have their own television working in a couple of months. We have to be smart about it."

The provisional target date for Israeli emergency television is called—April 1. Preparatory work is moving at a sharp pace.

A task force of Arab affairs and communications experts, headed by an American professor, will be cloistered in a seaside hotel all this week to hammer out guidelines for Arabic-language programming.
