### Channing: All About Walter

NEW YORK — (NEA) — The conversation was supposed to be about Carol Channing, but somehow it was about Walter Matthau.

Carol, who has helloed her last Dolly, was spooning out stewed fruits from a jar onto a soup plate in Sardi's East ("I'm allergic to the chemicals used in food preservatives," she said, after ordering an empty plate for lunch). She was wearing an Yves St. Laurent pin-striped black pants suit with white button-down shirt and black tie ("I sent him my measurements and he sent it back and it fitted perfectly. I will have to wear it the rest of my life, it was so expensive"). And she was talking about her forthcoming television special, "Carol Channing and 101 Men," set for ABC on Thursday.

"Walter Matthau," she was saying, "doesn't need this show. But he said he wanted to work

with me. He plays all the leading men to my Mary Pickford and Theda Bara and Pearl White. He's marvelous and he and his wife and my husband and I have become good friends.

"He's sort of Francis X. Bushman to my Pickford in a scene where, as Daddy Long Legs, he is teaching me to spell at a blackboard. I couldn't figure out why everyone was laughing when we did the scene: Then I found that Walter had written a four-letter word on the back of the blackboard.

"He's also Antony by Theda Bara's Cleopatra. He's the most ridiculous Antony I ever saw with those sandals on those hairy legs and as innocent as a friendly puppy about Cleopatra's connivings. Then he plays a Lon Chaney type opposite Pearl White. He's got fangs and a claw for a hand. He loves the fangs; he ordered them from his own dentist and he wears them at any excuse.

A man from Monsanto, the sponsor, called to make an appointment, and when he saw Walter, he was wearing the fangs.

"He's also in a skit with me when he tries to teach me to be a straight man. It's one George Burns wrote for Gracie Allen and Jack Benny, and George makes an appearance although he is unbilled.

"Walter sings 'Dolly' to me, and he does it well. This is his first singing and dancing assignment. He's going to be in the movie version of 'Hello Dolly' with Barbara Streisand. Was I disappointed that I didn't get the role? Yes, but after I got rid of the feeling that I wanted to jump out a window, I realized that Barbara is a total original and she'll do the role her own way. It won't be an imitation.

"After Marilyn Monroe was signed to do my part in the movie version of 'Gentlemen Prefer Blondes' she was sent to see 18 performances of the play. When I went to the movie, her performance was a carbon copy of mine. That hurt. Barbara won't be a copy.

"You know, Walter Matthau has a quality of being able to be a cute mean man. That's why he can be such a lovable villain. He'll be wonderful in the movie.

"While we're here in New York, we're going to be talking to Thornton Wilder, who wrote the original play. 'The Matchmaker' on which 'Hello Dolly' was based. He wasn't

### Story by Shaw, Music by Rodgers

NEW YORK (AP) — A rare treat will come along on NBC Television Wednesday—a musical adaptation of George Bernard Shaw's "Androcles and the Lion." The music was written by Richard Rodgers.

The 90-minute program sounds so delightful, in fact, that it arouses suspicions. After what happened to "My Fair Lady," the musical adaptation

of Shaw's "Pygmalion," on the stage and motion pictures, how come television is getting first crack at a similar project?

Mark Merson, an independent packager and producer, said that it just happened to work out that way. He was looking, he said, for a classic to adapt for TV, and remembered the Shaw play which he saw when he was nine and in which Eva Le Gallienne and Ernest Truex

starred.

He sought permission to use the play, written in 1913, from the late playwright's representatives, the Society of Authors, in England.

"They turned out to be a marvelous bunch of old ladies working in a headquarters on the outskirts of London, and they act like watchdogs on Shaw's work," Merson said. "They liked the idea and sent me on to negotiate a deal with Shaw's executors. And they work with a literary critic—identity unknown—and part of the deal is script approval."

Merson then approached Richard Rodgers. The composer "read the play one night and the next day said he wanted to do it." At this point Merson took his idea to NBC and the network snapped it up.

The show was taped last August, 18 months almost to a day from the time Merson started to work on it. The production cost
