





is one thing which can never grow old-Senator Ribicoff addressed a Connecticut high school assembly yesterday, taking patriotism for his theme.

In one passage, he quoted from the fa-

mous Inaugural Address of John F.

"Ask not what your country can do for you. Ask what you can do for your

"Let every nation know, whether it wishes us well or ill, that we shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe to assure the survival and the success of liberty.' Then Senator Ribicoff continued with some thoughts of his own:

"Our country was founded by men who believed in civic values. They beleved in their country and their flag. They were loyal, and not afraid of hard 'Nowadays, there are those who say

these qualities are outmoded. They are square. In some circles, it's unfashionable to be a square. But this has not always been the case. "In the early days, the word 'square'

was one of the finest in the English language. We had a square deal for the onest, and a square meal for the hungry. A man stood foursquare for the right, and when he could look his felow square in the eye, he was in pretty good shape. "Then, convicts took this good word

and twisted it out of shape. To them a 'square' was an inmate who would not onform to the convict code. "Now he's still different. Everybody-

especially the younger set - knows a square when he sees one. A square volunteers—when he doesn't have to. He works overtime-when the others have gone home. He doesn't sneer when others salute the flag. "In the American colonies two cen-

turies ago, there were lots of patriotsall squares: George Washington and Paul Revere-Thomas Jefferson, Patrick Henry and Benjamin Franklinwere just as square as could be. They were devoted to individual dignity, freedom and responsibility. They believed in government of the people, by the people, and for the people-in freedom of wo.rship and the press. They are still quoted around the world where people yearn and strive for freedom. "Let'ri learn a lesson from them

"Let's face up to the times in which we live - though dangerous and overwhelming they sometimes seem. "Let's come to terms with the challenges that' confront us."

Such thoughts about patriotism-true patriotism-eset the mood for the feelngs all of us have today about those who, in the course of a nation's history. wear their own patriotism not on their sleeve, but in the dedication of life itself to whatever service is required of ____

This was an unbelievable complication of forces, instruments, electronics, chemistries, plus occasional touches of mere human judgment. This complex ity has to be perfect, or it fails. It worked from Cape Kennedy Thursday: Here, then, was man succeeding in the most complicated kind of effort that can be imagined-succeeding with infinite perfection. Most of us spend much of our lives won-dering why humanity can't learn to do some of the simplest things right. Well, the answer is clear enough The simplest things are the hardest, because they require value judgments. But what an escape, what a holiday what a therapy we have for ourselves when we can lose ourselves in a maze of erector techniques, and come out with something that works!

The sheer magnificence of Saturn 5, with its unbelievable application of power, was a companied, on the same day, by the tender softness of Surveyor 6 landing on the surface of the moon. Should we ever stop questing for the unknown, we might find ourselves with nothing but bread.

White or black, the Ugly American is bent on fragmenting American society, aborting its evolution in justice and fraternity, and replacing it with a monstrosity in its own hideous image. Under another aspect, he is an extremist as regards our variously explained but ultimately inexplicable mamilitary involvement in Vietnam. He may be roaring a demand for an end to all restrictions on bombing, for resort to the most frightful of weapons, for the invitation of war with China Or he may be a gentleman faultless in attire and accent, with a reputation for compassion and concern, who tells a crowd that the real enemy is the President of the United States. Again, he may be a celebrated and prosperous

man of letters who lurches around a stage slobbering liquor and scattering obscenities—all, of course, in the cause of peace. Or he may be unkempt, sweaty, and raw-throated as he screams insults at men in uniform, attempts physical indignity upon them, and baits them past endurance. He is, in each of these appearances, the Ugly American. In still another guise, he is a pied young to drop out of the conventional picture, so staid and stultifying, and to plunge into drug-induced hallucination






