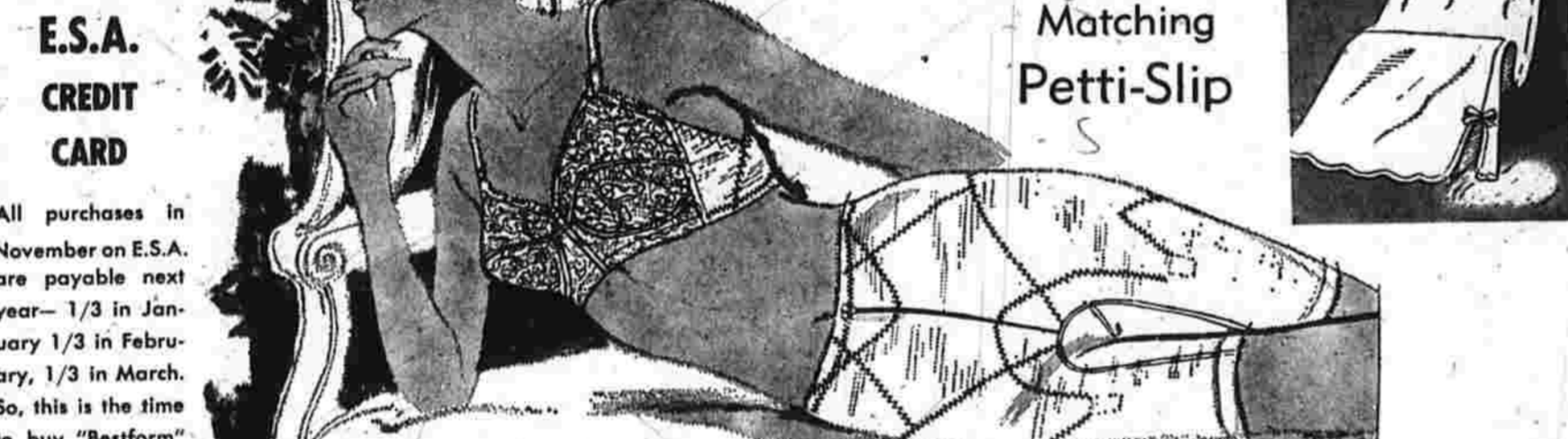

Steel Union Head Pressed In Strike, Layoff Dilemma

WASHINGTON (AP) — I. W. Abel, disgraced president of the United Steelworkers Union, is under considerable fire in trying to steer his big union past the twin shoals of a major strike or mass layoffs next year. The center of the controversy is a no-strike plan being devised with the steel industry at a time when labor militancy and strikes across the nation are at a 15-year low. "There is a big element of steel union leadership that believes it is nonessential to give up the right to strike," said one labor source outside Abel's union. Steel Workers Union aides say Abel is angry at being accused of causing the steel industry's no-strike plan. Probably Abel's biggest problem, aside from any psychological effect of discussing a no-strike plan, is to find himself lined up on the same side with some labor sources see an internal union leadership battle brewing, although Abel has denied it, saying: "We are in a time of debate, that's all, a debate we hope will change existing views."

QUEEN MARY CREWMAN DIES. RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)—The last voyage for the Queen Mary also turned out to be the last for a long-time crewman.

New Critic of Warren Report Claims 3 Gunmen Involved

NEW YORK (AP)—A new critic of the Warren report claims that three gunmen in three different locations fired a total of four shots in the assassination of President Kennedy.

Joseph Thompson, a philosophy professor turned investigator, disputes the Warren Commission finding that Lee Harvey Oswald was the lone killer of the President.

Writing in the Dec. 2 issue of the Saturday Evening Post, Thompson says he based his conclusion on detailed analyses of the pictures of the assassination and testimony of certain witnesses.

In a statement, William A. Emerson Jr., the magazine's editor, said "With painstaking care and formidable logic Thompson demolishes the Warren report by building a case for three assassins."

In an editorial accompanying the Thompson article, the Post said: "We declare once again that we believe the Kennedy mystery has not been solved, that the case is not closed."

Thompson, 39, who teaches at Haverford College, is a graduate of Yale University and Navy veteran. The article was excerpted from his book "Six Seconds in Dallas" to be published Nov. 27 by Bantam Geis Associates.

Thompson said his "new evidence does not prove that the assassination was a conspiracy. Nor does it prove Oswald's innocence. It shows that the question of Oswald's guilt must remain open."

Car Crusher Studied As Regional Solution

The use of car crushing equipment to rid the Capital region towns of their junk car problems was investigated last night by members of the Capital Region Council of Elected Officials.

Also presented at the meeting, held in Enfield, was Vernon's immediate solution to the problem—burial of the cars in an abandoned gravel pit.

The greatest concentration of junk cars in the country is in Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts. A total of 20,000 to 30,000 cars are junked in Connecticut every year.

Charles Vaughn, representing Connecticut Mobile Auto Crushers, Inc., proposed the stockpiling of cars in town dumps, which could then be crushed by his equipment.

He can handle 60 to 100 cars a day and would like a week's work before he enters a town. The cars are crushed into blocks and loaded on flat bed trucks and transported to a metal shredder in Everett, Mass.

Vaughn suggested towns jointly buy up areas where the cars could be brought. Facilities could be instituted forcing cars to be brought in rather than abandoned, he said.

State statutes now call for a fine not more than \$100 a day for the keeping of more than two unregistered cars. A problem of enforcement has arisen, however, because most towns have nowhere for the residents to take the cars to junk them.

Stop in Vernon. RCCEO Chairman Lewis Rome instructed the town officials to investigate junk car regulations in their towns, to see if they could be enforced, and whether temporary stockpiling of cars in a designated area such as a town dump could be accomplished.

Vaughn's proposal would require about 500 or more cars a week in a given area.

Vernon Public Works director Andrew Tricario is considering inviting Vaughn to a junk yard in Vernon, possibly under the auspices of the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce, which would permit Tolland and Ellington to participate. The off the cuff idea has yet to be presented to Mayor John Grant and originated after talking to Vaughn last night.

Vaughn's equipment crushes the entire car after the seats and tires are removed. He asks for no subsidy at all and is operating a private enterprise.

Hartford is arranging to set aside five acres "at the town dump, for Vaughn's operation. He is expected to bring in a new incinerator which will smokelessly burn the tires and seats. The incinerator will cost about \$20,000 and be purchased by Vaughn, he said.

Three centralized locations would be needed in the Capital Region, according to Dana Hansen of Bolton, to handle the problem economically. "There is a limited radius in which you can economically move the junked cars," he said.

A major need is a regional survey of the economics of moving the junk cars from one given area to another, it was noted.

Native Dancer Dies After Tumor Surgery

KENNETT SQUARE, Pa. (AP) — Thoroughbred race horse Native Dancer, whose only loss in 22 races was in the Kentucky Derby last October, died today after an operation for a blocked intestine.

Native Dancer, one of racing's best known horses, was owned by Alfred O. Vanderbilt. Among his 21 victories was the 1953 Kentucky Derby.

He died at the University of Pennsylvania Veterinary Hospital about 2:15 a.m. at a hospital spokesman said.

The spokesman said veterinarians discovered a tumor in the small intestine. The tumor had choked off the flow of blood to the small intestine. The tumor was removed during a two and a half hour operation that ended about midnight. The tumor, however, was unable to recover hours later and died several days later.

Dancer became ill on Tuesday and was brought to Penn's New Bolton station, where he was operated on Wednesday night.

Native Dancer, who won \$700,000 during his career, suffered his only loss when he finished second in the 1953 Kentucky Derby to Dark Star. He was retired to stud at Sagamore Farms, near Baltimore in 1964.

His \$20,000 stud fee was the highest in the world for a privately owned stallion. His many sires include King, a Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner, have won over \$4 million up to this year.

Old Animal Skull May Help To Sketch Man's Ancestors

NEW HAVEN (AP) — The 26-million-year-old skull of a small animal, unveiled today by Yale University, may help paleontologists to sketch early ancestors of man.

"Not only is the skull some 8 to 10 million years older than any previously discovered," said geology Prof. Elwyn L. Simons, "but it is better preserved than any fossils related to man that are older than 300,000 years."

Study of the skull lessens the chance that primitive ancestors of the ape and man were like a farrier of iron, as some experts believe, said Simons.

Simons, a curator at Yale's Peabody Museum, explained the discovery before the annual meeting of the Society of Vertebrate Paleontologists.

Working from the age of the skull was estimated at 27-28 million years. Only the jaw bone of animals from that period had previously been uncovered.

Homoids, man-like creatures, emerged relatively recently — perhaps about one million years ago.

"Homo sapiens," or modern man, apparently appears as a species about 100,000 years ago, some paleontologists say.

SPACELAGE DICTIONARY SEE CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Students in Oregon State University's science education program have almost completed a 600-page dictionary of space-terms for elementary school pupils. They're doing the project for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Some of the terms—which probably were nonexistent in the grade school dictionaries of 50 years ago—are: air breather, looting, orbital decay and plasma engine.

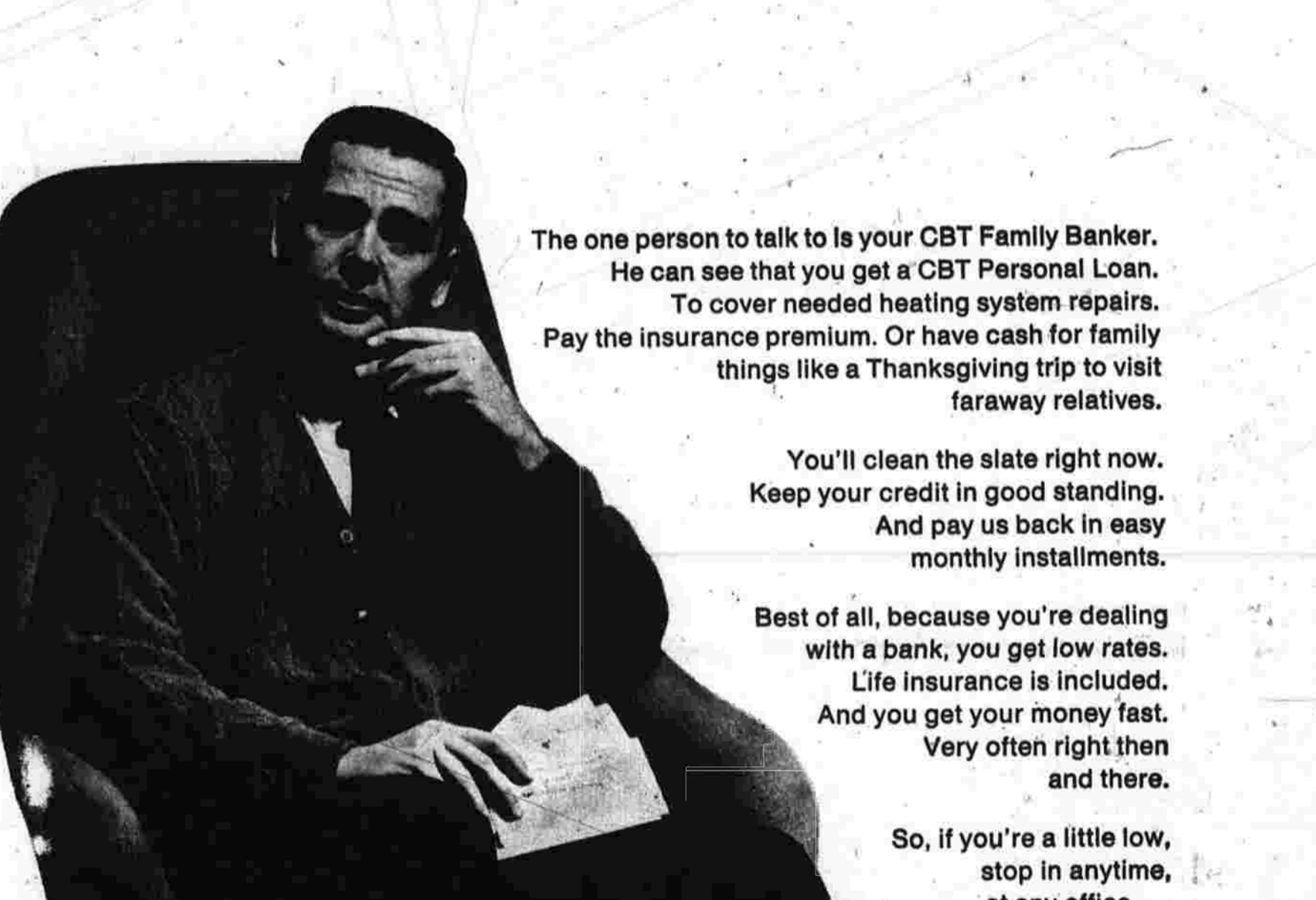

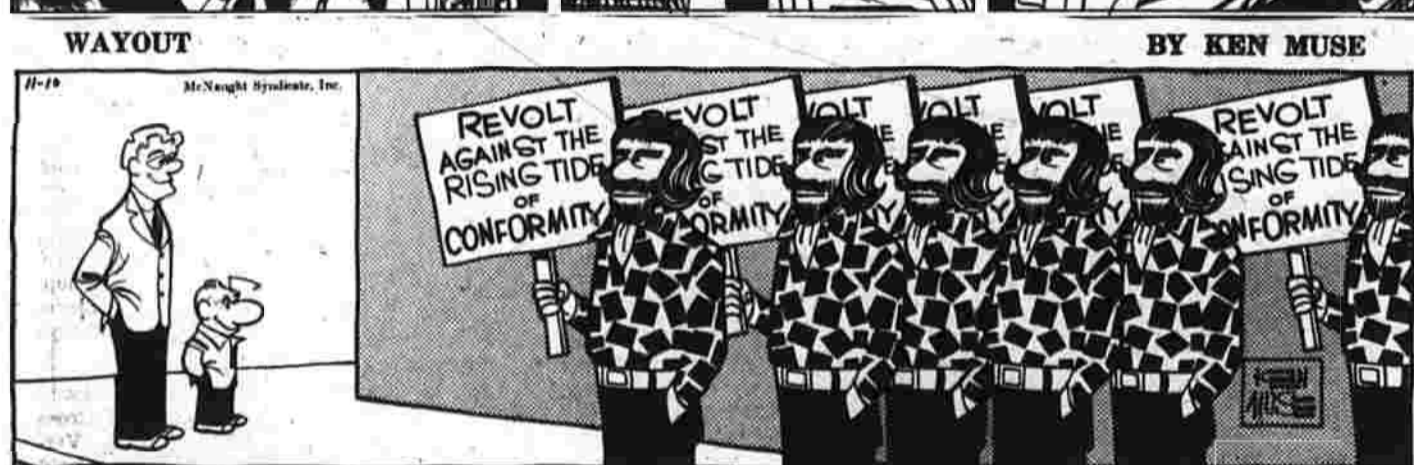

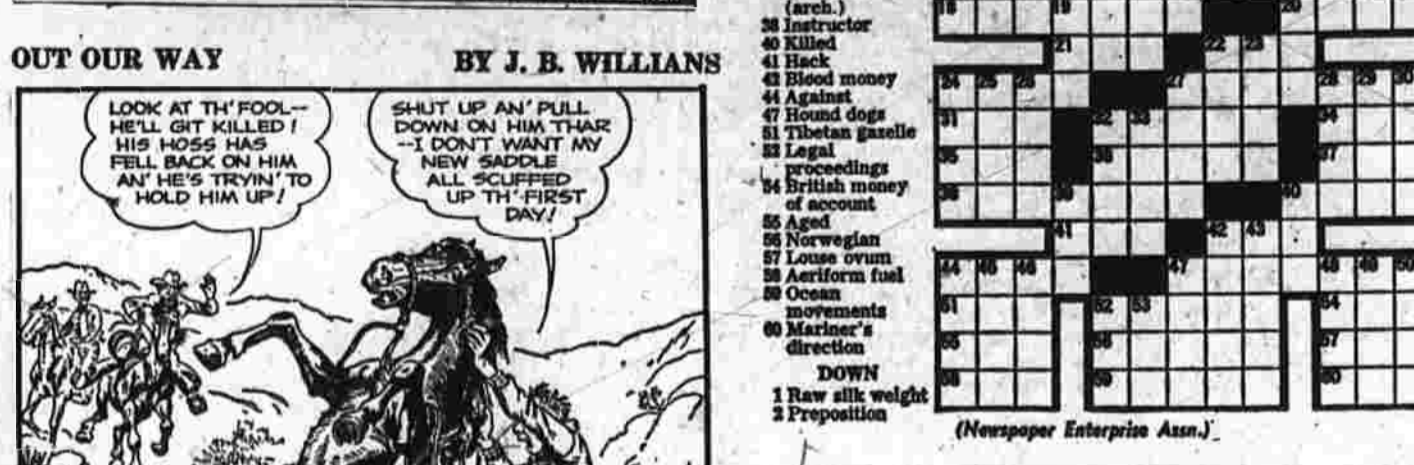
