

Final Rites Slated For Richard Martin

Manchester citizens will pay final tribute tomorrow to Richard Martin, who served the town for 18 years as town manager and who was a principal framer of the town charter.

Mr. Martin died Saturday afternoon on his 62nd birthday at Manchester Memorial Hospital. Among his survivors are his wife and three children.

At the time of his death he was a consultant with the State Water Resources Commission. In his honor all municipal offices will be closed tomorrow morning and all town flags will be at half staff until after the funeral services which are scheduled for 11 a.m. Tomorrow's meeting of the Board of Directors has been canceled.

The funeral services will be held at the John F. Tierney Funeral Home, 219 W. Center St. Burial will be in St. Bridget Cemetery. The Rev. John J. Delaney of St. Bridget Church will officiate.

Friends may call at the funeral home tonight from 7 to 9.

Mr. Martin died after having been in a coma for hours, suffering from heart failure. Both his lungs had filled with fluid, but his system fought off death, doctors said.

His personal physician called tribute to Mr. Martin, calling him a man of unusual stamina and courage.

"He didn't lose that courage even in the face of critical illness and pain," he said.

Mr. Martin's survivors are his wife, Ruth Smith Martin, a son, Alan Martin of Boston, an attorney with the Boston law firm Finley, Hoag and Elliot; two daughters, Mrs. Kathy Martin Widmer of Cambridge, Mass., and Joan Martin of New York City, employed by the General Learning Corp., an affiliate of Time Inc. and General Electric Corp.; a grandson, Richard Jean Widmer; and four sisters, Mrs. George Noyes of Morgan, Vt., Mrs. Merrill Williams of West Chesterfield, N.H., Mrs. Philip McCausland of Tallahassee, Fla. and Mrs. William Hunter of Tionderoga, N.Y.

Bearers at the funeral tomorrow will be Philip Tangarone, State's Atty John D. LaBelle, Supreme Court Judge Charles House, Superior Court Judge Jay Rubenow, Jacob Miller, Alan Olmstead, Frank Atwood and Emmitt DeGallo.

Mr. Martin was stricken at 4:30 p.m. Thursday at his home at 33 Harvard Rd. and was rushed to the hospital at 5:45. A team of physicians kept him under constant attention and treatment. They said his

War Feared If Red China Voted in UN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Nationalist China's Foreign Minister Wei Tuo-ming asserted today that the seating of Red China in the United Nations would lead to war by encouraging Peking in aggression.

Wei addressed the U.N. General Assembly immediately after Cambodian Ambassador Huot Sambath launched the annual debate on the China issue with an appeal to seat the Peking government as an "indispensable" step to safeguard the U.N. charter.

Sambath called for the immediate expulsion of all Chinese Nationalist representatives from "the positions they hold unlawfully." He said all neighbors of Communist China, with the exception of Thailand—which he characterized as a colony of the United States—

PLANE SAID HIJACKED ATLANTA, Ga. Derailment Evacuees Seen Set to Return

NEWTON, Ala. (AP) — Residents of Newton, evacuated because of the danger of an explosion after a railroad tank car of deadly chlorine was derailed Saturday, were expected to be permitted to return home today. An emergency call brought additional water pumps after one pump broke down as firefighters tried to cool the tank car.

Officials said the danger of an explosion apparently is passed. However, it was not announced immediately when the residents would be permitted to return home.

Newton, with a population of about 3,900, was deserted except for state patrol officers who cruised the town to guard against looting. There have been no such incidents. Only a few firemen and rescue workers remained at the scene of the train wreck where small fires continued to threaten to set off the tank car containing 100,000 gallons of chlorine. The fires have burned since the derailment Saturday night.

There have been no serious injuries. Some residents, who were hustled out of an area of several square miles, were permitted to return briefly to their homes from surrounding towns Sunday night to grab clothing, keepsakes and pets which they left behind in the hurried mass evacuation Saturday night.

Fire Chief J. C. Belcher of Ozark said another pump would be brought to Newton, where the immediate task is to keep the tanker cool so that it will not explode, releasing its deadly fumes.

Plated Boot For Soldiers To Be Tested

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army soon will field test in Vietnam a new armored boot designed to save infantrymen from crippling wounds inflicted by Communist land mines.

Mines and booby traps have caused a higher proportion of American deaths and wounds in this war than in World War II and Korea.

Some 800 pairs of a new blast-protective tropical combat boot will be sent for field evaluation to Army and Marine troops in South Vietnam.

Another 100 pairs will go to soldiers patrolling the truce line in Korea, where armed clashes

Angers Ruling Prince Sihanouk

VC Camp Discovered in Cambodia

EDITOR'S NOTE: The U.S. Command in Saigon for years has charged that Viet Cong and North Vietnamese forces find sanctuary in neighboring Cambodia, charges which Cambodia's ruler, Prince Norodom Sihanouk, has repeatedly denied. Western newsmen were admitted to Cambodia to cover the visit of Mrs. John F. Kennedy. Two Associated Press men went to the border across from War Zone C, which they have covered from the Vietnamese side.

By GEORGE MCARTHUR and HORST FAAS PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — The discovery of a Viet Cong camp site four miles inside Cambodia has angered Prince Norodom Sihanouk and raised doubts about his past denial that Vietnamese Communist forces were given sanctuary in his country.

Cambodia's ruling prince reportedly regards the discovery by American newsmen as a fabrication and part of a campaign against him by the U.S. press.

We found the Viet Cong camp, very recently used, on the border opposite War Zone C, about 70 miles northwest of Saigon. It had been used for several months and was most probably a staging area for the Loc Ninh battle, only nine miles away, earlier this month.

The outspoken prince, who contends the United States is the aggressor in Vietnam, reportedly told intimates our reports were part of a campaign inspired by the U.S. Command in Saigon to justify military operations against Cambodia.

We informed Prime Minister Son Sann of the camp site before the stories were published. His initial reaction was cautious and he said he would make an official investigation. However, Prince Sihanouk reportedly accused us of hypocrisy, said our evidence was doubtful and questioned whether the camp site existed.

Evidence of Viet Cong occupancy found in the camp included military records written in Vietnamese, North Vietnamese medical supplies and similar items. Dated scraps of paper indicated the camp had been used for several months dating back to last February.

There were unmistakable signs that several hundred men, probably from a major headquarters command group, had left only a few days before. From the camp a heavily traveled road went through the dense jungle to the frontier, crossing it nine miles from Loc Ninh. Logs had been put down to counteract the monsoon mud. Tracks indicated many heavy trucks had used it.

One embarrassed young lieutenant escorting us said perhaps the road was used by timber thieves. Another suggested it was built by the forestry department.

American officers have charged for years that the Viet Cong use Cambodia as a sanctuary when the going gets too rough for them.

American authorities in Vietnam have pinpointed at least 20 permanent camp sites, many of them in a five-mile area adjoining the border where the Cambodian army does not patrol.

Discount Rate Up 1/2%; Pound's Value Dropped

Britons Told Devaluation Aids Country

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Reserve Board's discount rate moved up a notch today in what officials described as an effort to protect the dollar in the wake of the British pound devaluation.

The rise from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent is identical to one put into effect on Dec. 8, 1965, but that was for a different reason—to stem inflation. It triggered a year of tight money.

This time, however, the move is designed to prevent a heavy flow of dollars overseas in search of higher interest rates. It's expected to have little immediate effect on consumer interest rates in this country.

When it devalued the pound on Saturday from \$2.80 to \$2.40, Britain also raised its discount rate from 6 1/2 to 8 per cent.

The U.S. discount rate is the interest commercial banks must pay the Federal Reserve for money they borrow from the system. Other rates are pegged upward from it.

In this case, however, the board is bringing its rate more in line with interest rates elsewhere in the world economy rather than tracking new ground.

Interest rates generally are at their highest level in almost half a century.

But some officials said the higher discount could tend in the long run toward an increase in rates consumers pay for loans. In this connection it could have an anti-inflationary effect but officials emphasized that would be only a side effect.

The Federal Reserve acted at an emergency Saturday night meeting and its decision was announced Sunday.

There was no immediate reaction from the White House.

A statement by Treasury Secretary Henry H. Fowler said nothing about the discount rate and mentioned world-wide cooperation to help the British. He expressed confidence the United Kingdom would achieve its objective of improved competition in world markets.

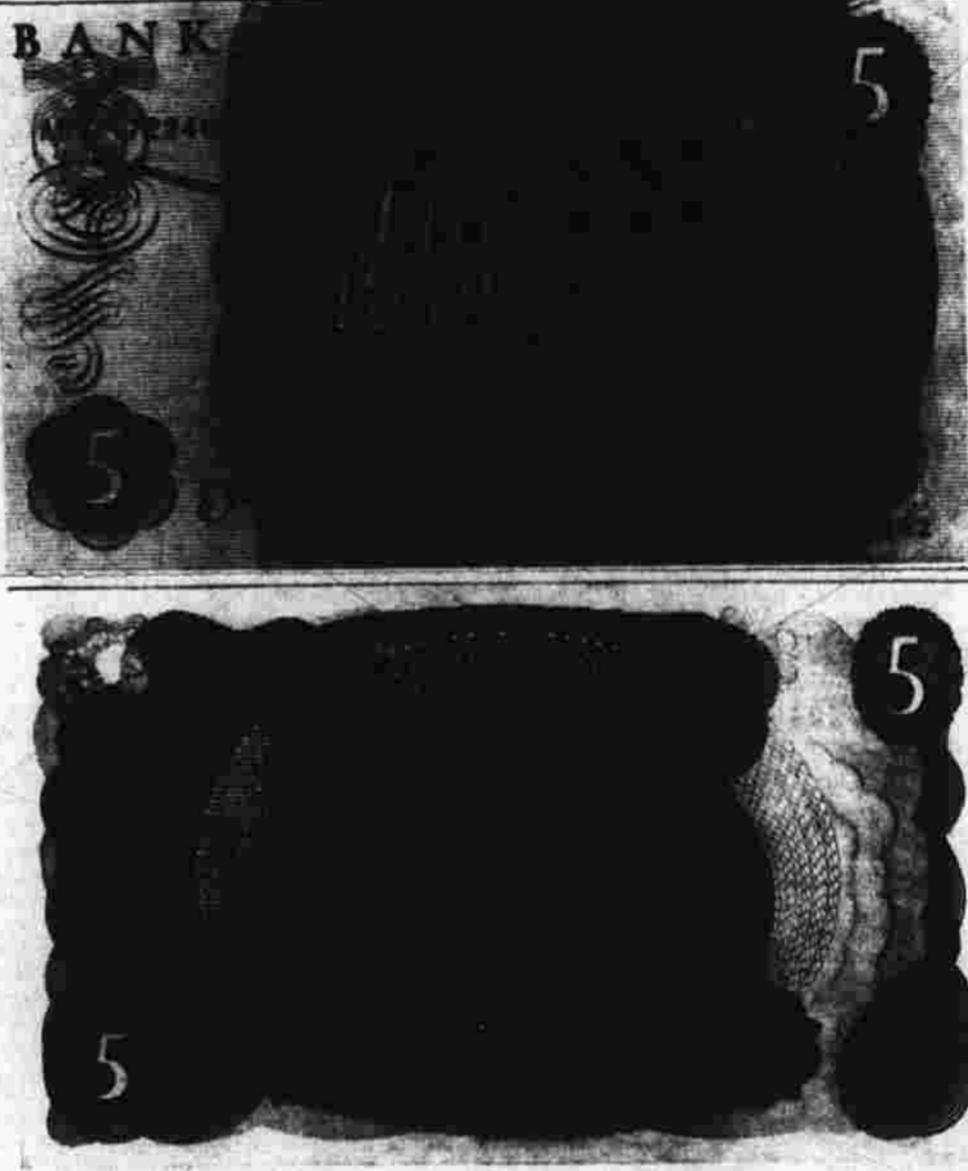
But Chairman Wright Patman, D-Texas, of the House Banking Committee, a frequent critic of Federal Reserve Board policy, said of the discount rate rise: "I don't like it... the people are fed up with crushing interest rates."

Patman said the board used the devaluation of the pound as an excuse to raise the rate. The Federal Reserve and the big banks had decided it was time for another interest rate crush."

"Always public relations conscious," Patman continued, "the Federal Reserve chairman (William McChesney Martin) was apparently waiting for the first likely excuse. This came Saturday when the British made their announcement on the pound."

Patman said that if the Federal Reserve is really concerned

U.S. Action Seen Aimed At Protection

LONDON (AP) — Chancellor of the Exchequer James Callaghan told a tumultuous Parliament today devaluation of the pound will give Britain "substantial competitive advantages" in world markets.

After being greeted by opposition Conservative chants of "Resign, resign," Callaghan predicted unemployment should go down, next spring. He forecast that Britons will be able to consume more in 1969.

Prime Minister Harold Wilson also faced a hostile barrage when he entered the packed chamber. Legislators roared, "Out, out."

Callaghan was reporting to the House of Commons on the Labor government's weekend devaluation of the pound and its accompanying package of measures designed to curb home consumption.

He was interrupted at one point by the Conservative spokesman on finance, Iain MacLeod, with a reminder that the chancellor consistently had rejected devaluation as a solution for Britain.

"He is an honorable man," MacLeod then added. "Will he resign?"

To this Callaghan replied grimly as the chamber grew silent: "I recommended the Cabinet to devalue. They accepted my advice. It is my immediate responsibility to see the operation is successful."

It was at once noticeable that Callaghan had not directly answered MacLeod's question.

Callaghan was peppered with questions from lawmakers of all parties after he had outlined his case for cutting back the value of the pound from \$2.80 to \$2.40.

Among points he made: —Several nations during the crisis period offered credits to

Devaluation Rates

LONDON (AP) — These are the rates of various devaluations announced over the weekend:

Britain and Ireland — The pound cut from \$2.80 to \$2.40.

Israel — From 8 to the dollar to 3.5.

Denmark — From 6.97 to the dollar to 7.5.

Spain — From 60 to the dollar to 70.

Malaysia — Old sterling-backed currency cut by 14.3 per cent, same as British pound; new currency intact.

Malta announced an intention to devalue. Finland cut its money's ratio Oct. 11, and Uruguay devalued two weeks ago. Bermuda, Hong Kong and Guyana cut their rates 14.3 per cent, the same as Britain.

Congressmen May Remain To Act on Tax Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield said today Congress may have to drop its mid-December adjournment goal and remain in session to act on a tax increase because of Britain's devaluation of the pound.

"Much as I hate to say so, much as I abhor the possibility, I think the welfare of the country and the stability of the dollar comes before any adjournment plans," the Montana Democrat said.

Mansfield told newsmen that he would lead a nonstop 90th Congress with no extended recess

between the first and second sessions.

President Johnson's 10 per cent income tax surcharge proposal is stalled in the House Ways and Means Committee, and Mansfield had conceded earlier it appeared likely to remain there.

But he said the British devaluation of the pound from \$2.80 to \$2.40 may force a reassessment. He said a tax hike is necessary to head off increased prospects of inflation.

"The need for a tax increase is more apparent and greater than ever," Mansfield said.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois disagreed. Dirksen said weekend economic developments, including Sunday's increase in Federal Reserve interest rates,

"should ease the pressure for a tax increase but only for a while."

Dirksen said he still believes Congress may be able to adjourn its current session about Dec. 15.

Mansfield took the opposite view and said Johnson should even consider asking for a tax hike in excess of the 10 per cent surcharge he already has proposed.

The Montana senator said Britain's 14 per cent devaluation means that the British will be able to undercut U.S. exports by that amount.

"The important thing is to maintain the stability of the dollar," Mansfield said.

He said he fears inflation will mount at an increasing rate unless there is action on a tax boost.

President Johnson met Saturday at the White House with House and Senate Democratic

UN Likely to Adopt British Mideast Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — A British resolution seeking a Middle East settlement was given the best chance of adoption among three headed for a vote in the U.N. Security Council today.

Delegates expected that the vote would come late tonight.

The three resolutions all would send a U.N. representative to the Middle East to seek settlement of issues left by the Arab-Israeli war in June, in-

cluding withdrawal of Israeli troops from territory they seized.

But they differ over how the settlement should take as to the Israeli withdrawal from territory seized in the war, an end to Arab belligerency against Israel, the fixing of borders, freedom for Israeli shipping through disputed waterways and solution of the Arab refugee question.

The Arabs consider a U.S. resolution pro-Israeli.

The Israelis consider an Indian-Mallan-Nigerian resolution pro-Arab.

The British resolution, introduced Thursday 12 days after the others, has been widely hailed as "balanced."

Diplomatic sources said that at a meeting at the U.S. mission Sunday, U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg joined Lord Caradon of Britain in rejecting suggestions for changes put forward by Ambassadors Jose Maria Ruda of Argentina and Gerardo de Carvalho Silos of Brazil.

They had been trying to merge the British resolution with an unpublished Argentine-Brazilian draft.

The informants said they believed Brazil would vote for the British resolution. They said that if Argentina did also, it would have the nine votes necessary for adoption, because it already had those of Britain, the United States, Nationalist China, Canada, Denmark, Ethiopia and Japan.

One diplomat said the Soviet Union was prepared to abstain.

Heavy Casualties Hit U.S. Battalion

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese regulars surrounded a U.S. paratrooper battalion on a plane bombed the Hanoi-Haiphong area for the fifth straight day on Sunday. The attacks included blows against the fifth and sixth targets to come off the Pentagon's restricted list in four days. They are a concrete plant and a barge yard near Hanoi.

The battalion of the U.S. 173rd Airborne Brigade was cut off for 24 hours before the reinforcements arrived to break the Communist attack and bring out dead and wounded. Heavy enemy ground fire kept rescue helicopters away.

Associated Press correspondent John Lengel reported from Dak To, about 15 miles from the fighting, the heavy Communist fire set off a huge explosion inside the U.S. perimeter, possibly causing heavy casualties. It could not be determined immediately what caused the blast.

The fighting, perhaps the most vicious yet in the U.S. highlands campaign, came as the U.S. paratrooper battalion on a plane bombed the Hanoi-Haiphong area for the fifth straight day on Sunday. The attacks included blows against the fifth and sixth targets to come off the Pentagon's restricted list in four days. They are a concrete plant and a barge yard near Hanoi.

The U.S. Command announced the loss of four planes, bringing the total number of losses over the North to 749 aircraft. The four planes carried six crewmen, all of whom are missing.

Radio Hanoi reported American planes returned to the Hanoi area Monday. It claimed two were shot down. There was no immediate comment from the U.S. Command.

The belief grew among U.S. commanders that the Communist attack around Dak To are trying to do what they achieved earlier

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### "THE WAY I HEARD IT"

by John Gruber



We've been discussing the instruments and how to judge a performer's abilities on them. Continuing in the same vein, we come to the percussion instruments. At the beginning of this series I said that the voice was the oldest instrument, although it usually is not considered an instrument at all. If you separate the voice, then the drum is really good head is extremely difficult to play any more. These drums are tuned to a pitch indicated by the composer and are capable of a wide variety of tonal effects depending on where they are struck and on the stick employed for the purpose. They are sometimes muted with a handkerchief. The stick used is not homogeneous and has spots which stretch more easily than others. The plastic head is easier to tune. Originally, tuning was accomplished by tightening screws around the rim of the instrument. This still produces the best results. About a generation or so ago, mechanism was added that uses a pedal to pull on the rim and thus vary the pitch. The mechanism pulls equally, which leaves a natural head out of tune in spots, due to wear in the skin, minute variations in thickness, and so on. This is another reason for plastic heads. But the fact remains, plastic heads have a much poorer tone than the original, natural material. The tympanist must frequently change the pitch of his instrument during the course of a composition, in accordance with the composer's directions. This is usually playing in one key, while the percussionist is constantly changing the number of measures of percussion instruments which produce actual notes. Among these are the glockenspiel (a set of polished steel bars) the xylophone, and the celesta, which is sort of glockenspiel played with a keyboard. Then there are bells of various sorts, and antique (or Chinese) cymbals. Little instruments played like the more familiar large ones. Cymbals are capable of a wide variety of tonal response depending on the way they are struck. They are Turkish in origin, and the best cymbals have been made by a single Armenian family for centuries. Others try but have never found the secret of the complicated alloy used. Columbus is reputed to have had a pair of his family's cymbals on board the Santa Maria. They were provided to frighten away sea serpents he might encounter in unknown waters. A percussion instrument that is easily played and usually dismissed as of no consequence in the triangle. Unfortunately, it is given to children in the first grade to bang on and thus develop a sense of rhythm. Consequently, people feel that if a little child can play that, there is nothing to it. This is not the case. In my entire musical experience I have encountered only three or four first-grade players. One of them is Tete Lashin, currently on leave of absence from the Hartford Symphony. The secret is in the way the beater is held. The grasp must be of the utmost flexibility and resilience, otherwise the tone is "damped." This occurs with every other percussionist in the Hartford orchestra, and in most of the other orchestras as well. Larry White, who once played a beautiful triangle for the Boston Symphony and is now retired, told me he spent 400 hours of practice before he learned how to hold the beater correctly. Then comes the problem of blending this sound actively to the needs of the composition both in volume and character of overtones produced. There are a host of other percussion instruments, even the piano is one. Most of them are under-rated by the audience. Usually the snare drum is used for military effects where its technique is not too difficult, but I know of at least two compositions which require 64-measure rolls. If you think it is easy to maintain an absolutely evenly rhythmic roll for this length of time, you might try it and see. In short, there isn't a single instrument that is as easy to play as well as it can be played. And if you want to increase your appreciation of symphony concerts, I heartily recommend the percussion section to your attention. Listen to them attentively; don't just hear them as the notes go by your ears.

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## Chicago Unit Proves Tops In Symphony

The Chicago Symphony demonstrated that it is one of the world's greatest orchestras yesterday at Jorgensen Auditorium, as part of the major concert series at UConn. Jean Martinon, who conducted, showed that he is one of the world's greatest conductors. This was apparent from his reading of Mendelssohn's "Reformation" Symphony, a work not normally considered any sort of contender for honors in the symphonic field. This performance made it sound like the finest composition, even though the orchestra was not at its best. It is not. Up until now, I had never realized just what can be done with it. Nobody had demonstrated in the past that it could be done with it. I doubt if I shall hear it. And that will again in my lifetime. The orchestra's performance is a masterpiece of sound that permits the volume and shimmering timbre of the instruments that are clearly seen. Every section is exemplary in its performance. The strings are not the absolute top on their instruments, but they are the orchestra that presents a higher average of artistic abilities among its members.

Although Mr. Martinon is unquestionably a great conductor, his status as a composer is on a lower plane. He was represented yesterday by his Fourth Symphony which he subtitled "Allegretto." My slight acquaintance with his composition in the past led me to believe that he is essentially a top composer, but he has gone off on some strange adventures in this composition. Despite this more modern technique of composition, the work sounded oddly old fashioned. It was completed in 1905, but it is not known if it was from the program notes I should not have placed it later than 1920 by its general sound. The program opened with the Overture to "Genevieve," Schumann's only opera. It has been many years since I have encountered this overture and it certainly was a welcome relief after the many dozens of "Academic Festivals" and other works of that ilk which is the lot of a critic to hear ad nauseam. Incidentally, I had never heard of this work until "Bavaria's 'La Valse' brought things to a close, and although I was first heard in 1920, it sounded fresher and, oddly enough, more modern than Mr. Martinon's work which had just preceded it.

GOOD REASONING WINS RUBBER BRIDGE MATCH

Roger Lord, 28-year-old St. Louis bridge enthusiast, bid seven notrump on today's hand because only a grand slam could pull the match out of the fire. The hand was dealt during the recent International Rubber Bridge Tournament at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas. Opening lead—jack of hearts. West led the jack of hearts. East signaled with the ace. Lord won with the queen and saw that he needed four clubs to make his grand slam. Declarer took dummy's spades, got to his hand with the king of diamonds and cashed two more spades, discarding the king of hearts with the eight of hearts at the first trick. Since East had actually played the eight, he probably did not hold the nine. Therefore his last card was the jack of clubs. Lord played dummy's queen and made his slam.

It's worth noting that South would have had no problem at all at West had discarded any of his useless clubs early in the play.

## Congressmen May Remain To Act on Tax Increase

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield had set early opening schedules for the next two days and obtained a strict limitation on debate on all remaining amendments. This is expected to bring final passage of the legislation on Wednesday. The final form of the measure is expected to be determined in a conference between the Senate and House, which passed the bill last August.

In three days of debate last week, the bill's managers succeeded in maintaining it in nearly the form in which it won Senate Finance Committee approval. Many more amendments remain to be acted on. The biggest test is expected on the Republican move to substitute the House bill for the version worked out by the finance panel.

In passing on this, the Senate will eliminate whether it wants to go along with a much larger benefit increase and also much higher taxes that the committee wrote into the legislation. The minimum payment would be raised from the present \$44 a month to \$70.

The House voted for a boost of sweeping Social Security bills on October 11, but a \$400 minimum.

penable" step to safeguard the Chinese Nationalist representative government in the United Nations.

As usual, all representatives of the Soviet bloc walked out when Wei began speaking. The assembly president, Foreign Minister Corneliu Manescu of Romania, had left the room a few minutes before the Cambodian ambassador concluded. One of the vice presidents, Ambassador Jose Rafael Molina-Urena of the Dominican Republic, was in the chair during Wei's speech.

Philippine Ambassador Salvador P. Lopez came out strongly against seating Communist China. He declared Peking "does not appear to want to have anything to do with the United Nations at all."

Lopez said the time will come when the Chinese people have a government "truly expressive of their ancient traditions of moderation."

achievements and accepted. The Arabs are anxious to have a resolution adopted that calls for Israel to withdraw from "all the territories" she occupied in the war, does not mention the establishment of boundaries and says nothing else that would imply that they should negotiate with Israel. The Israelis have demanded direct negotiations and would like the resolution to allow the special representative to set them up. They want a vague clause on withdrawal and a specific clause on boundaries.

The British resolution calls for withdrawal of Israeli armed forces from territories occupied in the recent conflict" and acknowledgment of the right of every Middle Eastern state "to live in peace within secure and recognized boundaries." It would have the special representative contact the states concerned to "promote agreement and assist efforts to settlement."

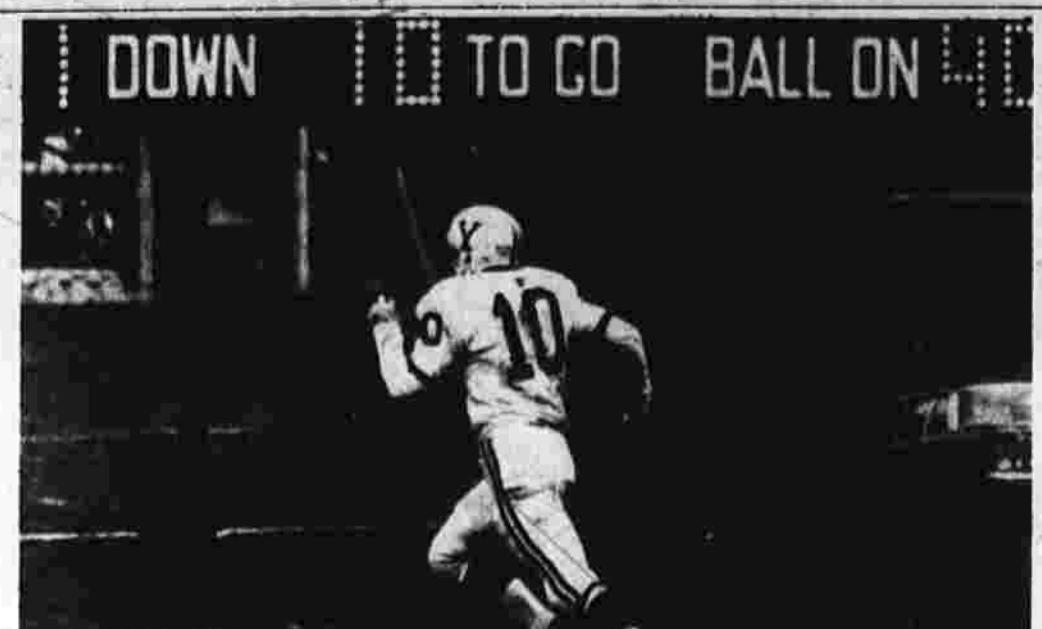
