Wise, general manager of American Mutual Insurance Alliance, a voluntary association of 123 mutual insurance companies that write about 10 per cent of nation's automobile -liability coverage. It was presented at the mutual insurance technical con

mination of five years of the associa tion's work aimed at altering the insur ance industry's approach to auto lia-

writing auto-liability policies about 50 years ago, the purpose of this insurance has been to protect against lawsuits hose persons who cause accidents. Now, said Mr. Wise, "the shift in public expectations and social evolution in that the system is more and more expected to compensate and protect the

Under the present system a person injured in an automobile accident must prove that an insured person caused the injury before the injured person receives any benefit from the insurance. Under the guaranteed benefits program says Mr. Wise, an injured person would simply file a claim. The insurance company would give him a choice of receiving the guaranteed benefits or of filling a court suit in an effort to obtain greater benefits but at the risk of get-

If he chose to receive the guaranteed benefits the insurance company would pay his medical bills up to \$5,000. He could also draw other benefits, such as compensation for loss of income, up to 7.500. Mr. Wise calls this the basic disability payment. For housewives, students, or others not on payrolls, there
