Of all the feast days celebrated throughout the year, Thanksgiving is the one that is most truly American in origin and observance. The first Thanksgiving celebration was held in 1621 following the harvest and lasted almost a week. The Pilgrims and their Indian guests, 90 brightly painted Indians, feasted on wild turkey, duck, geese, venison, lobster, clams and other shellfish, baked ears of corn and wild rice, with wild plum and dried berries for dessert. Although the holiday continued to be celebrated in various states, it wasn't until 1863 that President Lincoln proclaimed that Thanksgiving Day would be a national holiday to be observed on the last Thursday of every November. In 1941, Congress changed the date to the fourth Thursday of November.

Helicopters Recovering More Pilots Than Before

SAIGON (AP) — Rescue helicopters are recovering more U.S. pilots downed over North Vietnam than ever before, but the ratio of recovered men to the number in trouble has not changed much since the bombing campaign began in February 1965.

The helicopters save about one of every three pilots able to bail out successfully over the land. The other two are rescued by the Army's ground forces.

Ch. Paul E. Leake, commander of the 2nd Helicopter Rescue and Recovery Group, declined to discuss the recovery of a pilot whom a reporter asked about it. But other sources gave this accounting: In 1966 54 per cent of the pilots who bailed out with good parachutes were rescued. Since then the rate has risen to 58 per cent.

Only about 10 per cent of the pilots who bailed out are considered unrecoverable. The rest are rescued within 72 hours.

Leake said that the recovery rate in comparison to the number of pilots who bailed out has remained steady since 1965.

Leake added: "Of course, we'd like to get 100 per cent recovery rate. That would be our goal. We would like to see more helicopters in the air. The more helicopters the more important single factor in recovery."

Requirements for additional forces have been stated to the Air Force and favorably received. However, it will take lead time for funding, procurement and production, our force structure is being re-evaluated behind that required to keep pace with the buildup in tactical aircraft, and increased sortie rates.

Air Force sortie rates—4,000 sorties a week and one hour of flying by aircraft—are averaging between 4,000 and 6,000 per month this year, equalling the 1965 figure.

The 3rd Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Group has been authorized for 25 H53 "Jolly Green Giant" rescue helicopters. It has 14 on hand. It also is entitled to six H53As, an advanced and faster version of the H53. It has four of these "Super Jolly Green Giants."

The group is responsible for 2.1 million square miles in Southeast Asia, including 700,000 square miles of jungle.

"Due to combat losses and production delays, the required number of Jolly Greens has never been available," Leake said.

Country Post Office Gives Special Service

CONDON, Ore. (AP) — The roads were out in the great floods of Christmas week, 1964. Mail was piling up in the Condon Post Office and none was coming in.

Postmaster Al Ribney borrowed a Jeep and took it through.

"I went out on cow trails and stubble fields," he recalls with a smile, remembering the 280 miles he drove that day to Pendleton and back.

It was night when he got home. And it was Christmas Eve.

He sorted the mail and packages he had just brought in, then delivered them.

"I played Santa. That was more fun than the rest of it."

Why did he do it?

For much the same reason he has turned the Condon Post Office into a place of unusual service and a center of information.

He thinks that's the way a post office ought to be run.

Is McNamara's Departure Dramatic Event of War?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Is the departure of Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara from his post the first in a series of dramatic events involving the war in Vietnam?

While the White House would neither confirm nor deny Monday night that McNamara was on his way out—although other sources did confirm it—it would always be remembered that McNamara not only has a strong political sense but also a vivid dramatic one, too.

It should be no surprise if 1968 turns out to be a very dramatic year.

Johnson and the "North Vietnamese, out of the same set of circumstances, have exactly the same reason for wanting for exactly opposite results in the war next year.

The reason is the criticism piling up around Johnson for his conduct of the war from all directions, including many within his own Democratic party. Because the criticism can have a tremendous effect, it is not far-fetched to expect startling events in the months ahead.

Johnson sees his popularity and public confidence in him at a low level. Already some forces are at work within the Democratic party to keep him from being renominated in 1968. No one knows better than Johnson that his chances for renomination and re-election to the presidency are in jeopardy if the war drags on through all of next year and the criticism continues to grow.

Only Monday it was learned that Charles F. Frankel, assistant secretary of state for educational and cultural affairs, resigned, according to the Columbia Broadcasting System, in protest against Johnson's Vietnam policies.

The fact that he is President is reason enough for Johnson to get the war over with as fast as possible. His political future gives him an added reason for wanting to.

U.S., Britain Charge Reds Drugged Military Attaches

MOSCOW (AP) — Five or six men attacked and searched the American and British military attaches in Moscow after they were served apparently drugged wine on a trip this month near the Romanian border, the two embassies charged in protest notes to the Soviet government.

An American spokesman said today the Soviet reply "was not considered satisfactory" and that further protests are being considered in Washington and London.

The U.S. Embassy and the British Foreign Office said the incident occurred Nov. 17 when the British attaché, Brig. C. A. Des N. Harper and U.S. Col. William J. Spahr of Philadelphia, Pa., were visiting Kishinev, capital of Soviet Moldavia.

The attaches toured an experimental winemaking farm in the area at the suggestion of their Soviet guide, sampled its wines and sherry and ate food. On returning to their hotel room they became ill, vomited and went to bed, a statement from the British Foreign Office said.

"A subsequent medical examination gave material evidence for suspicion that the wine had been laced with," the British statement continued.

About four hours later, according to the British, five or six men broke into the room, "forcibly held the attaches down, tore open their clothes and removed their money belts which contained personal papers."

The papers were returned after about an hour and the attaches did not suffer serious injuries, the U.S. spokesman said.

The intruders broke glasses and an ashtray and tore down a curtain, then charged the attaches with the property damage and said there had been complaints of noise in the room, the British said.

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Why Can't Johnny Read? He May Have Dyslexia

LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (AP) — The Los Alamos school system is taking steps to cope with the learning disability which causes some children to have difficulty in reading.

The disability is called dyslexia, which means "difficult reading." Little is known about its cause, but its effects are seen daily in many classrooms.

It affects between 10 and 20 per cent of all school children. And it usually strikes children before they are five years old.

One Los Alamos scientist said that he had a son who had an IQ of 140. But year after year the boy had problems in school.

"I tried for five years to get somebody to help me with this," his mother said. "I didn't know what it was, but I knew we had a problem."

Her husband, who has a doctorate degree, said he believes he also must have had the dyslexic. Some doctors say there is strong evidence dyslexia is inherited.

"I have never read anything except texts," the scientist said. "I have never read a book for pleasure."

Dr. J.C. Dolson, a surgeon and Los Alamos school board member said about 16 elementary school teachers from Los Alamos attended a summer workshop this year sponsored by the College of Santa Fe. The workshop probably will be repeated next summer.

This coming spring, Dolson said, the school board plans to run a complete screening of first graders for dyslexia. By the following fall, the school should be ready to set up at least one special class for dyslexics.

"That would be their home room," he said. "They would learn everything together."

The class would not differ from others except for reading. They would be learning slower in the beginning. We have found they are really quick to catch up. After two or three years they should be up with the others.

"But it is important that the dyslexic be detected at an early stage. If a child receives the extra attention without special attention, the chance of rehabilitation, except with intensive private tutoring, is about eight per cent. In the first grade the odds in favor of recovery are 50 to 65 per cent."

Bodies Found May Be Missing McGill Students

BUFFALO, Mo. (AP) — Two bodies found in a soybean field south of Buffalo may be those of two Montreal college students who were hitchhiking home from a summer vacation in Mexico, authorities said.

Montreal officials said Bertram Kidd, 20, and Marjorie Sharp, 21, students at McGill University, were last seen Sept. 11 when they left a bus north of Mexico City.

The Missouri Highway Patrol said clothing near the woman's decomposed body bore a Canadian manufacturer's label.

The patrol said W. S. Cheek West Memphis, Ark., recalled that about three months ago he brought two young hitchhikers from near the Mexican border to the Texas-Oklahoma line.

Cheek's description of the pair generally fit the victims, the patrol said. He also recalled that the girl said her father was a banker in Montreal.

The bodies were found Sunday on a farm 60 feet off U.S. Route 66, Crowners Jerry T. Canton estimated that the bodies had been there about three months.

A metal detector disclosed two 28-caliber slugs among the remains.

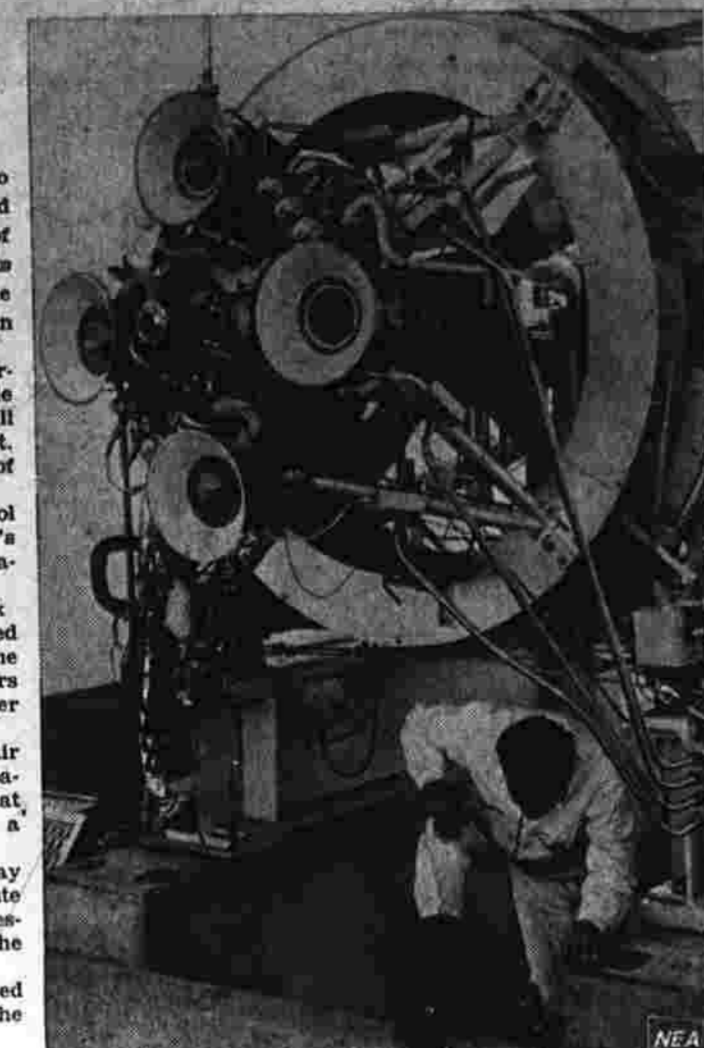

Newest in Service Rent-a-Car at Rich's, Inc., Drive Away with Purchases

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Customers at Rich's, this city's oldest and largest department store, can now walk in, do their Christmas shopping, rent a car and drive out with their purchases.

Passenger cars, station wagons and compact cars are available on no figures or no down payment. More will be added if needed.

Rates begin at \$5 per day and 5 cents per mile for the compact and range upwards, depending on the type car and equipment. A standard passenger car, fully equipped, for instance, rents for \$7 per day and 7 cents per mile.

The cars must be checked out and returned to the main Rich's store downtown at present, but plans are to extend the service to a branch store in the suburban Lenox shopping center.

"We are not aiming for the commercial trade," Mrs. Kelly said, pointing out that the maximum lease period is one month.

"Basically, our's is a family thing for local residents. For instance in the city the site of Atlanta, there are a number of traffic accidents each day. 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Tolland Variance Asked From ZBA To Construct Machine Shop

A zone change from commercial to light industrial was requested at last night's zoning board of appeals hearing to permit the location of a small machine shop on property belonging to David Webster on Kingsbury Ave.

The proposal, presented by Alex Herbert, 100 Kingsbury, Vernon, would permit the Landon Company of Norwich to lease space for light manufacturing purposes from Webster.

Webster would construct a 4,000 square foot building which would be valued at \$90,000 to \$100,000. It would be located in the vicinity of Webster's two warehouses on Kingsbury, one of which contains about 6,000 square feet, explained Herbert.

The Landon Company contemplates having ten to fifteen employees and would perform machine operations on small equipment parts.

The industry was described by Herbert as a growing and good looking industry of the type the town is trying to attract.

William Summers, chairman of the Industrial Development Commission, explained the purpose of the application, pointing out the site is across the street from a town owned industrial tract.

"This is the type of industry the commission would like to have the opportunity to attract, the small businessman on the small plot of land. We do not want any help we can get from private citizens to attract these industries," he stated.

He asked marshaling parties to get together to bring the matter to the zoning board. He said he would like to see the zoning board members around his hands, brushing deep and cupping his hands, as a sign of support.

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McNamara Described From Warm to Cold

WASHINGTON (AP) — His recall the family atmosphere and his habit of usually reserved debate often find him a friendly, brilliant leader, a warm family man and a rare expression of outright candor.

McNamara was born in San Francisco June 8, 1916, the son of Robert James and Nell Strang McNamara. His father managed a wholesale shoe factory.

He was graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1937, winning Phi Kappa Phi honors as a sophomore. Two years later he received a master's degree in business administration at Harvard.

After working briefly for a West Coast accounting firm, McNamara taught for three years at Harvard, resigning to enter the Air Force.

After leaving the service in 1946 he joined Ford and rose rapidly through the huge company's executive ranks to become president in 1960.

Then he came to Washington as a job to which he brought a decision-making capacity he once described as:

"I have no hesitancy in making a decision. Once made it doesn't worry me. It's the problem of finding the right approach to an objective that worries me, that keeps me awake and makes me irritable at home."

But from Capitol Hill often came grumblings that he showed inadequate deference to members of Congress. And his 1960 campaign for the White House, which he lost to Lyndon B. Johnson, was a major disappointment.

His critics scornfully dub him "Superman" and portray him as a cold and machine-like, a cost-conscious human computer without a heart.

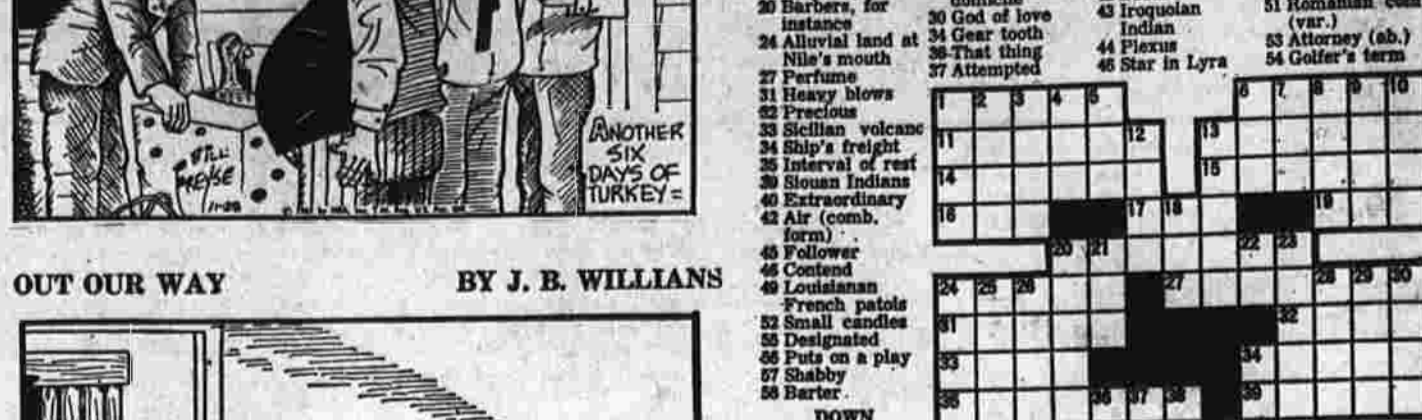

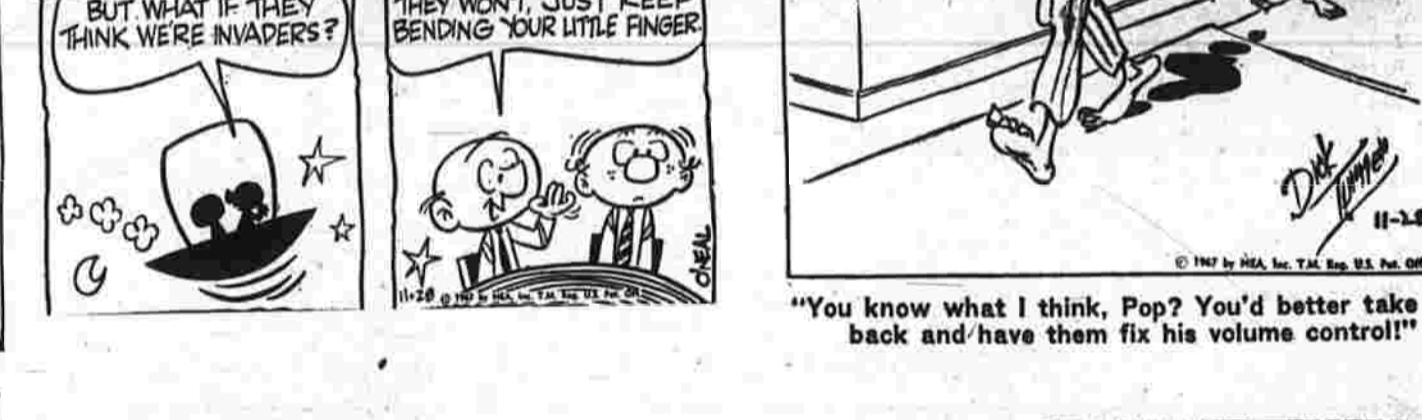

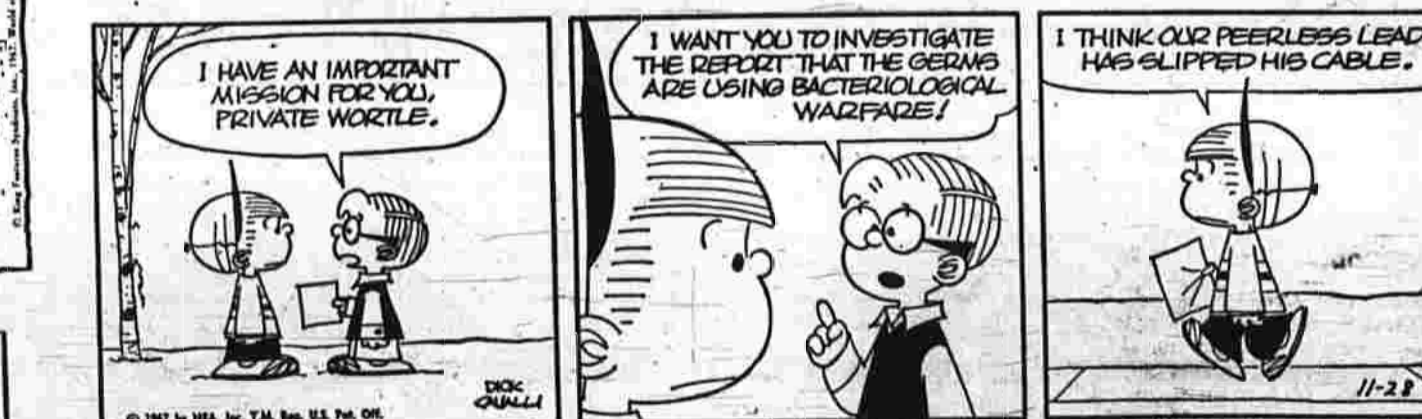

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Compound Target of VC Assault

HAIPHONG (AP)—Waves of Viet Cong troops assaulted a government district headquarters near the Cambodian border for 9 1/2 hours today and overran some of the 200 defenders before jet fighters strafed and bombed the area into retreat.

A South Vietnamese spokesman said 60 enemy bodies were found inside and nearby the perimeter of the district headquarters compound at Duoc Duc, 80 miles from Saigon.

He said 15 government soldiers were killed and 19 wounded. Simultaneous with the ground attack only three miles from the Cambodian border, the Viet Cong shelled a government outpost four miles to the south and a U.S. Special Forces camp 10 miles to the south.

Elsewhere only small scattered skirmishes were logged in the ground war.

Over North Vietnam, U.S. Navy bombers on Tuesday came closer to the center of Hanoi than they have in some days.

Attacking pilots reported leaving secondary explosions and broken tracks in the railroad yards 1 1/2 miles northwest of the city's center.

They said they did heavy damage to the northern spin of a rail and highway bridge a mile west of downtown Hanoi.

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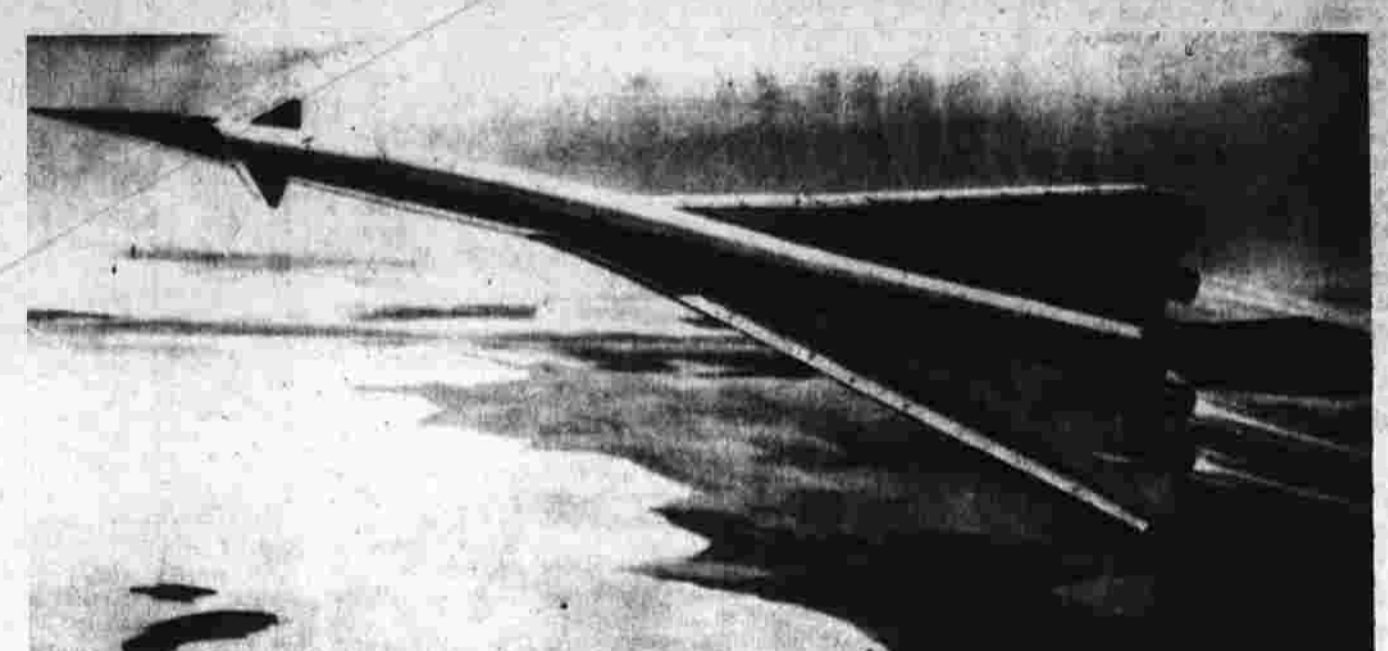
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Artist's Conception of New Airliner

Ike Urges Leeway in Viet War

NEW YORK (AP)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower says the United States can win the Vietnam war and urge greater leeway for U.S. troops in pursuing enemy forces across South Vietnam's national frontiers.

He advocated limited forays into the demilitarized zone to spike enemy artillery and "hot pursuit" of enemy ground forces, even when they seek sanctuary in neutral Cambodia or Laos.

Eisenhower said the pursuit principle should also apply to aircraft flying over the zone. He discounted the possibility of major intervention in Vietnam by either the Soviet Union or Red China.

The former Republican president said allied commanders during World War II spoke Tuesday night in a taped interview on the CBS television network along with Omar N. Bradley, the nation's only other living five-star general.

Eisenhower said Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, apparently "has about as many troops as he would like, or as he's asked for."

But he added, "Personally, I would like to see him have another 10,000 to just clean this thing up more quickly."

At another point he said "the first principle of war is to win quickly. I think that if you're going to appeal to Korea, and throughout all international means of getting this thing settled, then get all the force you can as quickly as you can."
