



Another theory is that the enemy purpose was purely diversionary—that the action at Dak To was precipitated primarily to draw American troops in from other areas in South Vietnam.

The same squeamishness about taking the life of another human being through the ritual of courts and convictions and sentencing and professional executioners has, obviously enough, begun to spread itself toward another human tradition which might also be called murder, legalized. In war, the kill ing of other human beings, in blood cold or warm, is made legal under the theory that it is, like an execution, an act o the state, not that of any individual. Bu the concept struggling upwards through what civilization we may claim for our selves is beginning to argue that murder s still murder, no matter what its legs auspices. If we exist long enough to carry this particular human experiment far enough, we may all wind up as softhearted humanitarians, pusillanimous pacifists, incapable of taking snybody's life, even in a strictly private enmity or

To all who would consider any such state of humanity deplorable and shameful and much worse than the end of the world, we can offer considerable consolation. This may be where we are neading, but we have a long way to go. And the end of the world is, so far, way out in front.

Longer Hours—Fewer Voters

The emphasis in the debate about the large number of citizens who fail to show up at the polls and cast their ballots on election day is always on the mechanics of election laws. A persistent claim is that more people will vote if the polling places are kept open for longer hours. The potency of this argument was such that the General Assembly has made it mandatory for all Connecticut municipalities to keep poils open until 8 p.m.

At this time, there is a move underfoot to further extend the hours for voting. Much of this discussion centers on the national election which some claim should be a holiday. Another argument is that polling places on national elections be kept open throughout the nation for 24 hours. Figures are always cited which show fewer than 64 per cent of the voting population bothers to take part in the election of a President.

In this light it might be worthwhile to note that a lower percentage of Waterbury voters took part in the recent election than the one two years ago, despite the fact that they had two more hours in which to vote. The percentage of Waterburians going to the polls in 1965, when they had 12 hours to vote, was 83.5. This month, though the polls were open 14 hours, only 77.1 per cent

We think that there is a parallel between the experience in Waterbury and statistics of low participation in national elections. The Waterbury campaign was between two persons who had faced each other two previous times. The isremained much the same as before. It was an election in which the conscientious voter went to the polls, but the spark needed to penetrtate the felt there was no real contest.

On the national level, the percentage of those voting suffers because much of the South has been a one-party domain. in other words, in a large part of the nation there has been no real contest during national elections and this has neld down the percentage.

Of course, this is changing. The South s progressively moving toward a twoparty system and figures from the last wo national elections show heavier voting in the states of the old Confederacy. This percentage is due to increase even more with the inclusion of Negro vot-

All this does not mean that there should be no continuing work on streamlining election law mechanics. It does mean that voter interest is the key to the number of persons who vote. Active political parties putting forth their best candidates and advancing the main issuem are the best answer to this prob em. If enough people are aroused, i really matters very little whether the polls are open 10 or 24 hours.-WATER-BURY REPUBLICAN
