Hike of \$7.4 Billion In Fowler Tax Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler gave Congress an administration proposal today for a \$7.4 billion spending cut, and said it would be unthinkably not to enact it promptly.

Fowler said the combination would cut the expenditure from more than \$22 billion to less than \$14 billion and would amount to a giant step in strengthening the U.S. dollar against fluctuations in the international market.

The switch brings to the front the question of the Cabinet's role in the Treasury's budget process. It falls, Jenkins' political career could go down with it.

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Compound Target of VC Assault

SAIGON (AP)— Waves of Viet Cong troops assaulted a government district headquarters near the Cambodian border for 9 1/2 hours today and overran some of the 200 defenders before jet fighters strafed and bombed the area into retreat.

Simultaneous with the ground attack only three miles from the Cambodian border, the Viet Cong shelled a government outpost four miles to the south and a U.S. Special Forces camp 10 miles to the south.

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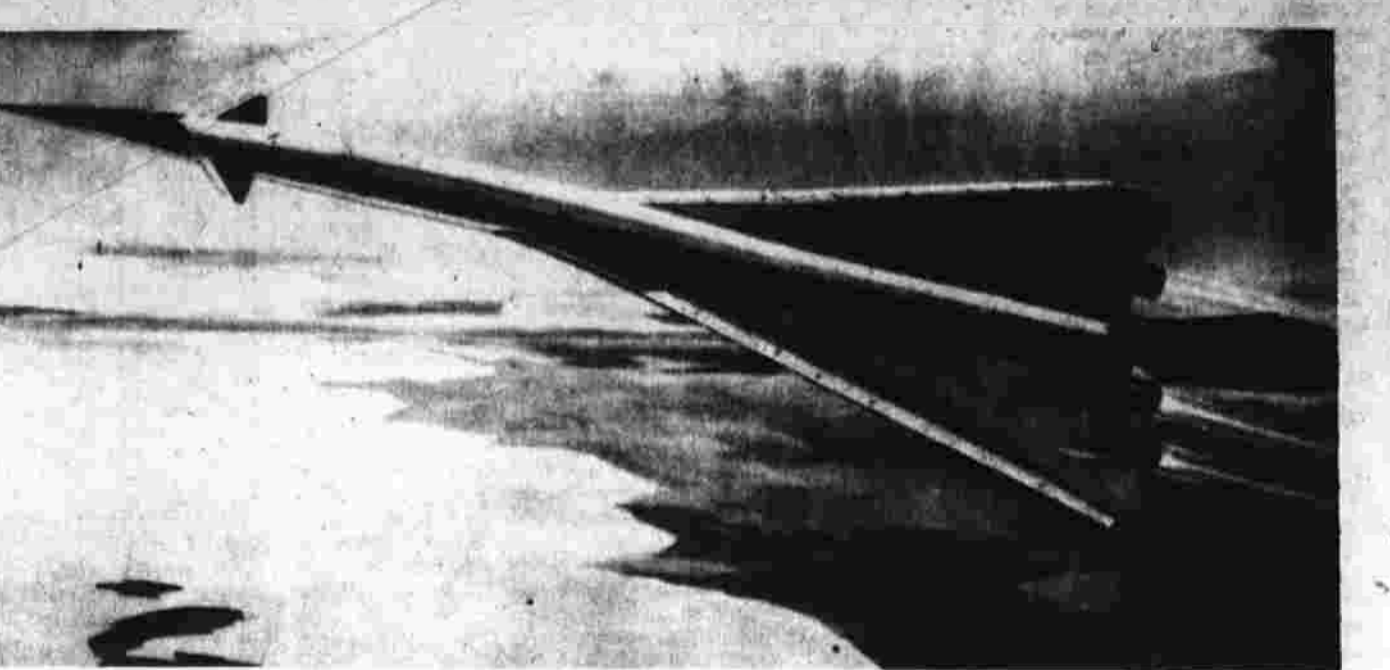
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Artist's Conception of New Airliner

Ike Urges Leeway in Viet War

NEW YORK (AP)— Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower says the United States can win the Vietnam war and urge greater leeway for U.S. troops in pursuing enemy forces across South Vietnam's national frontiers.

Eisenhower said Gen. William W. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, apparently "has about as many troops as he would like, or as he's asked for."

Eisenhower said the present principle should also apply to aircraft flying over North China. He discounted the possibility of major intervention in Vietnam by either the Soviet Union or Red China.

### Board Again Bars Joining Refuse Disposal District

Manchester will not join the North Central Refuse Disposal District and will seek its own solutions to its refuse disposal problem.

That decision was made by a 6 to 1 vote of the Board of Directors last night. Republican David J. Odegard was the only one to press for and to vote for Manchester membership in the district.

Voting not to join were Republicans Nathan Agostinelli, Wayne Maritz, William Scheller and Harold A. Turkington; and Democrats William Fitzgerald and Anthony Fitzarone.

Democrat Francis Mahoney and Republican John Garvide did not present last night. Mahoney had a previous commitment and Garvide is on a business trip.

The motion against joining was seconded by Fitzgerald and in a Bi-partisan vote.

The district, comprised of South Windsor and Vernon, is planning a regional incinerator and had invited Manchester to be a member. It had asked for a formal decision by Dec. 1.

The present district was formed in 1965, as a successor to the Northeast Refuse Disposal District, which folded when Manchester pulled out.

Scheller, in making his motion not to join, said, "Manchester is big enough, dollar-wise and population-wise, to solve its own problems and need not look to regional solutions."

Fitzgerald said that, while he believes membership in the district has some advantages, "the disadvantages of being a member outweigh those advantages."

"None of us are losing sight of Manchester's problem of refuse disposal, and the time might even come when we may consider district participation, but not now," he added.

Turkington agreed, saying, "I am against regionalism basically, but after we explore all other avenues of local action, we may decide to join after all."

Mantz, who had attended district meetings for the past several months, said, "I am not convinced that we should join now. We may want to join later. It will take them a good year to find a site and to complete engineering studies."

Odegard disagreed. "Now is the time to join and it is a mistake if we don't," he insisted. He added, "I am strongly op-

posed to regional government, but the problem of refuse disposal is regional cooperation own planning," he urged. "We must soon decide on two things—the type of facility we want and the amount we can contribute to its construction."

Agostinelli reiterated his opposition to joining, saying, "Based on the years we have left in our hands, I am still convinced that we should not join."

He said that he will call an informal meeting of the board shortly, to appoint a committee to study Manchester's problem and to report back with recommendations.

Town Manager Robert Woles promised to submit a report on refuse disposal costs, based on a comparison of a town facility versus participation in a regional facility on a lease, and not membership basis.

He recommended that support be given to the regional incinerator appears the best solution to the refuse disposal problem.

### 'Safety Sedan' Scale Model Displayed by Commissioner

NEW YORK (AP) — Motor Vehicle Commissioner Vincent L. Tolson has displayed a state-financed scale model of a "safety sedan" that he says would withstand a front or rear end impact at 50 miles an hour.

The model, developed at a cost of \$35,000, was shown at a news conference Tuesday.

Among the score of safety features are:

—A periscope that juts up from the roof, with an eye mirror to the left of the steering wheel, giving the driver a panoramic view to the rear and sides without having to take his eyes off the road for long. The device has a wide-angle viewing lens of 180 degrees.

—A hydraulic energy-absorbing bumper that extends 12 inches and operates automatically as soon as the car goes over 37 miles an hour.

—A silhouette with no jagged edges that would impale a pedestrian.

MISSOULA, Mont. — A new kind of forest-trail cargo carrier called a "gyro carrier" has been developed here. ### Copper Strike Drags On Despite Drain on Miners

"I've been through them all since 1953 and this could be the worst. But I don't care if it lasts from now 'til kingdom come, we'll hang on."

That's the attitude of a veteran miner, U.S. miner, talking about the strike that has threatened the U.S. copper industry since July 15.

The strike has cost many millions of dollars in copper company revenue and miners' wages.

But it drags on with the companies and a coalition of unions, headed by the United Steelworkers of America, apparently just about as far apart as at the beginning.

The strike's impact on individuals and communities has been harsh because most of the mines and smelters are located in small Western towns mainly dependent on a one-industry payroll.

But, while the strike has shut down 90 per cent of the nation's copper mine production, 80 per cent of its copper processing capacity and 20 per cent of its copper fabricating capacity, there has been no severe copper shortage.

The loss in production is estimated at 500,000 tons of refined copper.

The ability to maintain output of copper products to meet the needs of private industry and the Vietnam war is due to two factors:

By last June, mills and foundries, anticipating a strike, had built their inventories to a record 641,000 tons. And they have been buying foreign copper at premium prices and passing on the extra cost to consumers.

Although builders and automobile radiator manufacturers were reported starting to feel the pinch, an industry source said:

"There's no copper shortage if you want to pay the price."

The Defense Department has been able to meet its copper needs under the priorities system provided for by the Defense Production Act.

The unions accused the companies of trying to exhaust surplus copper supplies to trigger governmental intervention, set the stage for a substantial copper price increase and to "starve the strikers into submission."

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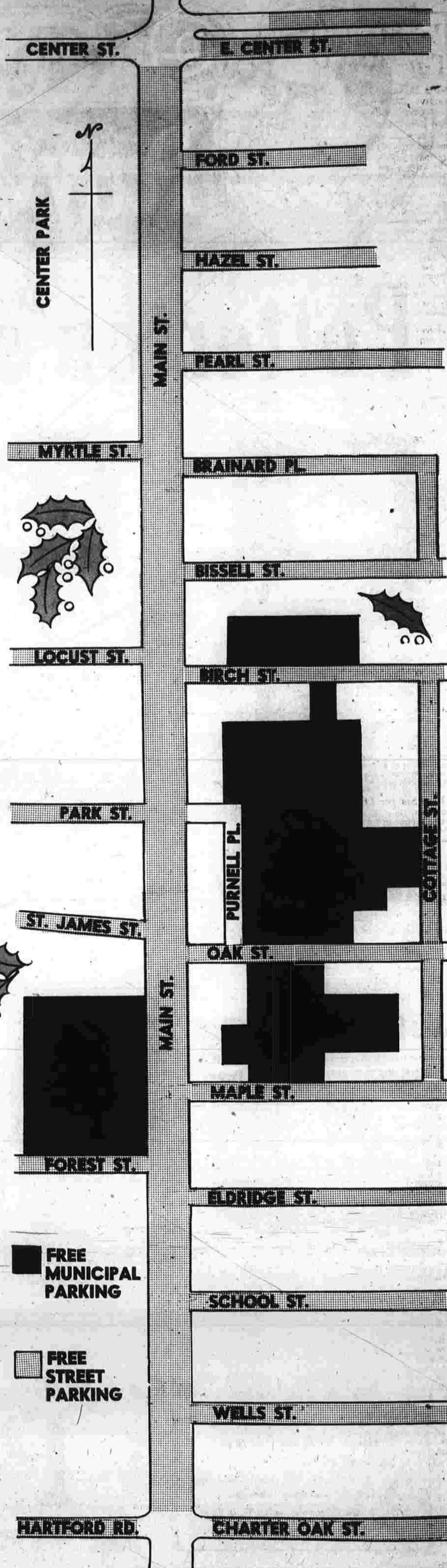

**Draft Dodging Charged**  
NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Black Power advocate Fred Harris Brooks, who lost his student deferment when he was suspended from Tennessee A&I State University following riots in the campus area last April, was indicted Tuesday on a charge of draft dodging.

Brooks, 21, directed Nashville's "Liberation School" during the summer. The school, which Brooks directed as an anti-poverty program, lost federal backing after it was accused of teaching young Negroes "pure, unadulterated hatred of the white race."

Brooks, testifying before a Senate subcommittee last week, said he thought Negroes should gain power by "any means available."

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Gov. Richard J. Hughes of New Jersey undergoes surgery today at University of Pennsylvania Hospital for removal of cataracts from his left eye.

Hughes, accompanied by his wife, Betty, arrived at the hospital late Tuesday smiling and in good spirits. He spoke briefly to newsmen before going to his room.

The governor will have cataracts removed from both eyes in successive operations over a 14-to-20-day period. Date of the second operation was not immediately known.

Originally, Hughes announced he would enter the hospital on New Year's day but changed his mind on the advice of a doctor, an aide said.

**Steinbeck Discharged**  
NEW YORK (AP) — Novelist John Steinbeck left University Hospital Tuesday after a seven-week stay that included surgery for a ruptured spinal disc, the New York University Medical Center reports.

The 1962 Nobel prize winner for literature and his third wife, Elaine, live at Sag Harbor, N.Y. Steinbeck, 65, had been in the hospital since Oct. 8.

The tree, destined for the Blue Room at the White House, will be cut and shipped Dec. 7 from the Postage County farm of Howard M. Cowan in Ravenna Township.

The Ohio Christmas Tree Growers, Inc., said Ohio won the right to furnish the tree in a competition last August among tree growers from 26 states.

Mon. In a speech at Boston Oct. 20 his own monetary idea man, Jacques Rueff, concluded that the "American economy is still the most powerful in the world."

The McNamara Departure

There was a time when Robert S. McNamara was the industrial executive serving as Secretary of Defense, was considered something of a personal symbol of that menace Dwight Eisenhower spoke about in his celebrated valedictory as President.

"In the councils of government," said President Eisenhower, "we must guard against the acquisition of unwarranted influence, whether sought or unthought, by the military-industrial complex.

For a long time, there were those who saw Defense Secretary McNamara with his computer-like mind and computer-like principles, as the menacing man in one of the "complex" Eisenhower spoke about.

He seemed the perfect high priest for the combination of interests and forces Eisenhower had warned about.

A year and a half ago, however, the Secretary of Defense went to a meeting of newspaper editors at Montreal and suddenly revealed a softer, human side.

More recently, McNamara has shown signs of trying to advise and act counter to the automatic instincts of the military-industrial complex.

As a result—perhaps with not much more accuracy of analysis and real justice to his real views than was involved in the original judgment in which they hawk—the doves of the Vietnam debate had recently begun to regard Defense Secretary McNamara as an asset rather than a menace.

This is what was happening on the surface. The judgment will now have to be that there has been even more under the surface, in order to produce a situation in which McNamara would retire from the most meaningful engagement of his career and go to the sidelines with the World Bank.

Yet obviously there is some action toward a new and clearer brand of leadership. Reality seems to exert its own discipline on excessive pursuit of image, which is comforting to know.

For however real any change finally turns out to be, the new Johnson already testifies that the President and the Administration are awake to at least some of the hard lessons of their own experience.

Memo to Big Brother

It is very considerate indeed of the Justice Department at Washington to file an antitrust suit against the National Funeral Directors Association on the charge that that association coerces its members to prevent them from advertising the price of funerals.

Big Brother at Washington is concerned with the possibility that the price of funerals is kept high by practices which violate federal anti-trust laws, and it is going to try to keep the national association from encouraging such practices.

If it is possibly illegal for a voluntary association to influence its members not to advertise prices, shouldn't there be some chance that it might legislate for an individual state to pass legislation which actually forbids normal competition in prices?

In these days of clear valid line between price-fixing by the state and price-fixing by conspiracy among private businessmen? What is the difference, so far as the consuming public is concerned, in the result? Does Big Brother really care?

The New Johnson: The audience at the latest Presidential press conference came away talking about the new Johnson's relaxed, informal, humane and friendly persuasive.

President Johnson, the audience concluded, finally learned the cost not merely of the great father image, and profited from declining simply to be himself.

U.S. experts in the "other war" have retold their program more times in the past eight years than anybody in the Johnson administration cares to recall.

This latest change may be different. It goes to the heart of what has been wrong with the effort to establish a system of political control and security for hamlets under long term Communist control.

Under the new plan, discussed at great length in the White House during Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker's visit here, pacification teams will be permanent.

For another example, take the so-called "pacification" or in plain language, trying to please everybody. Certainly it was a repudiation of that tactic for the President to threaten a veto of any trade quota bill reaching his desk.

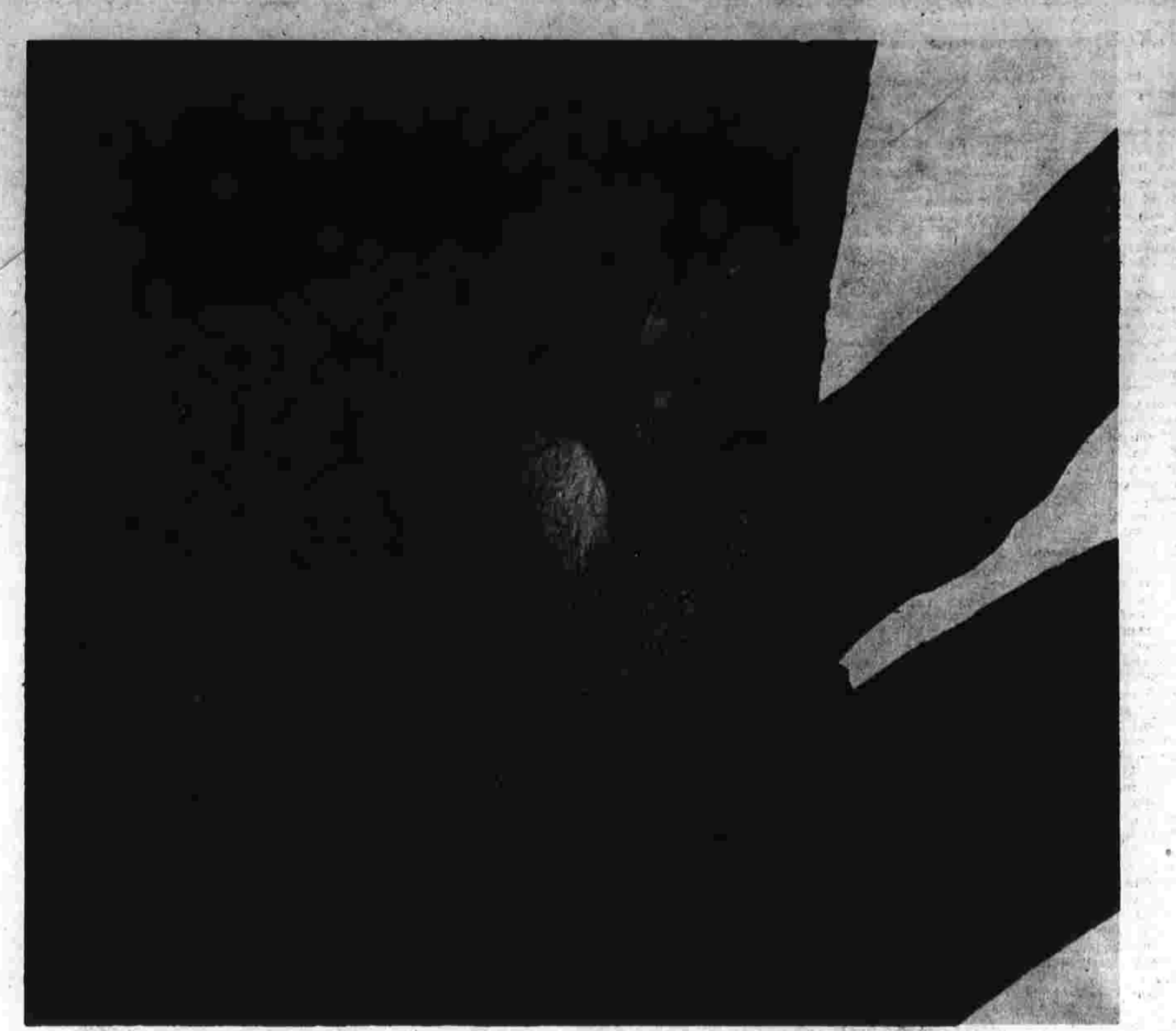
The Administration, for a final instance, seems on the brink of dropping the pretense that it can have guns and more butter too. That seems to us the really significant message in the renewed action on the tax increase bill.

Whether the lessons have been completely absorbed, of course, remains to be seen. One sign, as our Mr. Otten has observed, will be whether the spending cuts the Administration promises are merely postponing, or will bear witness to real thought on the need for priorities.

### Whites Hit Housing Law In Detroit

DETROIT (AP) — A new open housing law in Detroit has been met initially by heated criticism from scores of white citizens pledged to work for repeal of the ordinance.

The Detroit Common Council passed the measure in a 4-2 vote Tuesday. It becomes law in 30 days.

Speakers, many refusing to give their names to newsmen, milled around after the brief council session about "white flight," "intimidation," "violence for a person from selling to whomever he wants, except the sale must be based on race, creed, color or national origin," said Council President Edward Carey.

Carey, who supports the law, said a property owner could refuse sale or rental to persons who were in "poor financial condition" or were "slowly housekeepers."

The law, introduced by Nicholas Hood, the only Negro member of the council, deals with sales and rental to persons if the property is put on the open market.

Carey, who termed the law as "moderate approach to a major problem," said the burden of proof will be on the "person who is discriminated against."

Persons convicted of racial discrimination in housing face fines of \$500 and 90-day jail terms.

#### Gas-Electric Minicar

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal officials say the University of Pennsylvania and General Motors Corp. have learned to develop a gas-electric minicar that would produce only about one-tenth the air pollution of conventional cars.

Secretary Robert C. Weaver of the Housing and Urban Development Department told a Tuesday news conference the car would be about half the length of conventional U.S. models, seat three adults, have a top speed of 40 m.p.h. and accelerate like a Volkswagen sedan.

Weaver said the car could be mass-produced for use within five years. It probably would sell for about \$1,000, he added.

HUD sponsored a project with a \$300,000 grant.

The car features a gas-driven electric motor that works in combination with a small gasoline engine. It could run on either engine alone, officials said.

### Surplus Deterrent

WASHINGTON (AP)—Saying its major Vietnam buildup is over, the Defense Department pledges an effort to insure that war's end won't find the Vietnamese landscape littered with surplus U.S. supplies.

Department spokesmen told a Senate-House Committee on Economy in Government that after the Korean War, the United States found itself with \$12 billion worth of supplies left unused.

Thomas D. Morris, assistant defense secretary, told the committee Tuesday that a special unit of 500 men has been combing U.S. troop locations in South Vietnam since March, identifying unneeded material and pulling it back to warehouses for re-use elsewhere.

Morris said an overabundance during the U.S. troop buildup was unavoidable if U.S. troops were to be assured all necessary equipment. Time, he said, did not permit the strictest supply and inventory control that now is in effect.

### Car Bureaus Tell Policy Cancellation

HARTFORD (AP)—Two auto insurance rating bureaus say they'll cancel private passenger car policies only in cases of failure to pay premiums or license or registration suspension.

The announcement was made Tuesday by the two bureaus.

Insurance Commissioner William R. Cotter said he intended to approve the voluntary plan, which he called a forward step in the public interest.

Up to now, Cotter said, an insurance company could cancel a policy with ten days notice for virtually any reason.

Policies include individuals insured for medical payments, liability, collision and uninsured motorists protection. The changes take effect next year.

Companies will also give 30 days notice of cancellation, but the non-cancellation provision won't take effect until a policy is 60 days old.

Involved in the changes are companies writing nearly half of the liability insurance and 74 per cent of the physical damage insurance in the state.

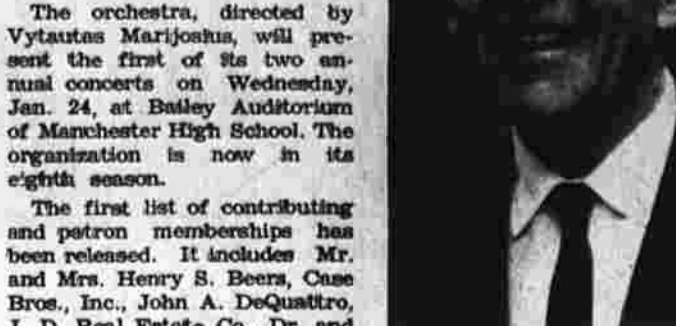

### Finest Stores Await Voting On Contract

BOSTON (AP)—Local union members in western Massachusetts and Connecticut vote today on ratification of tentative agreements to end a two-week stoppage at First National Stores.

Representatives of those locals approved the agreements Tuesday night, and the membership of three other New England locals involved in the stoppage voted approval of new contract agreements reached earlier Tuesday.

The 1,000-member Boston local will vote Thursday.

John J. Sullivan, federal mediator, said the Worcester local, representing workers eastward from that city between the New Hampshire border and the area surrounding Boston, approved, 100-0, its contract proposals.

The New Hampshire local voted 270-20 to ratify its proposed agreement, and the Maine local voted 200-30 to accept its offer from the company.

Settlements vary for the different locals, but mediators said improved wages, economic fringe benefits and working conditions comprised the major portions of the agreements.

Leo A. Margyda, First National vice president for Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont, said all northern New England stores would be reopened at 10 a.m. Thursday.

The contract dispute involved some 7,000 employees and closed 371 First National supermarkets in Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Connecticut.

The company called a strike. The Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workers Union, AFL-CIO, said it would lockout, except in Boston where workers did strike.

Eisenhower More of Hawk Than LBJ Administration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower is more of a hawk in this war than the Johnson administration has been—so far.

Eisenhower said he would approve invading the demilitarized zone in Vietnam, pursuing enemy ground forces into Laos and Cambodia, and even chasing enemy planes into Red China.

He spoke last night in a CBS television interview which was taped last Friday, three days before the news leaked out that Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, who has a much more restrained view of the war, is leaving President Johnson's cabinet.

There have been repeated reports in recent months of conflict between McNamara and U.S. military leaders who want a much tougher war.

Johnson and his top civilian advisers, who included McNamara, have been persistent in continuing the war against North Vietnam but they have been waging it, and speaking of it, in more cautious terms than Eisenhower's.

For instance, the American forces have been careful not to invade the demilitarized zone in Vietnam, and the subcommittee said the war could not be won alone by air or bombing attacks but that increased bombing could not win or shorten the war and that the final victory must be won by ground forces in South Vietnam.

And American fliers have been careful to avoid the air space over Red China. Eisenhower sounded more like the Senate prewar subcommittee which last August was sharply critical of McNamara's less than all-out ideas on fighting the war.

It recommended an immediate increase in bombing of all important military targets in North Vietnam, even if it risked war with Red China. It has long wanted to give Red China an excuse for coming into the war by an American invasion of North Vietnam or American pursuit of North Vietnamese planes over the border.

But Eisenhower discounted the possibility of major inter-

vention by Red China or the Soviet Union if his views were followed. The former president said the United States can win this war and should do so as quickly as possible.

The persistent subcommittee, which listened to testimony from McNamara in August, said: "What is needed now is the hard decision to do whatever is necessary, take the risks that have to be taken, and apply the force that is required to see the job through."

In his testimony McNamara warned against widening the war with the risk of involving the Soviet Union or Red China. McNamara was of the opinion that increased bombing could not win or shorten the war and that the final victory must be won by ground forces in South Vietnam.

The Eisenhower statements and the McNamara departure, coming so close together, may have been sheer coincidence. But the most interesting question left is this: With McNamara out of the way, will Johnson move over to the Eisenhower-Senate subcommittee view and start making this a hot fiercer war?

### New England Vignettes 2nd President Gets Tree From Granville, Vt., Man

**BOSTON (AP)**—New England's 2nd President, James Madison, is to be honored in a unique way when a Christmas tree is dedicated to him in the White House.

When Riley Boatright, a 78-year-old Granville, Vt., farmer, presented a Christmas tree to the President's family in 1822, he had his eye on a little home one day to find large halls for growing in the Vermont woods as a possible Christmas tree for a future chief executive.

Last week Boatright's little tree—now 70 feet tall—was cut down and sent to Washington, where it will be lighted by President Johnson in ceremonies Dec. 21.

The tree came from Green Mountain National Forest and was grown on land once owned by the Boatright family. The tree's trunk measures 17 inches in diameter at the base and the top spread is 27 feet.

Boatright, who lives in Granville, Vt., says he got the idea of sending the first Christmas tree to President Coolidge when he saw a Christmas display on Boston Common.

The first tree was only 40 feet tall and ruffled officials had to be talked into shipping the tree to Washington, the 78-year-old Boatright says.

It required a large crane and a crew of 30 men to fell this year's national tree, only the second to come from Vermont.

Boatright says he had been invited to Washington for the lighting ceremonies on the Ellipse.

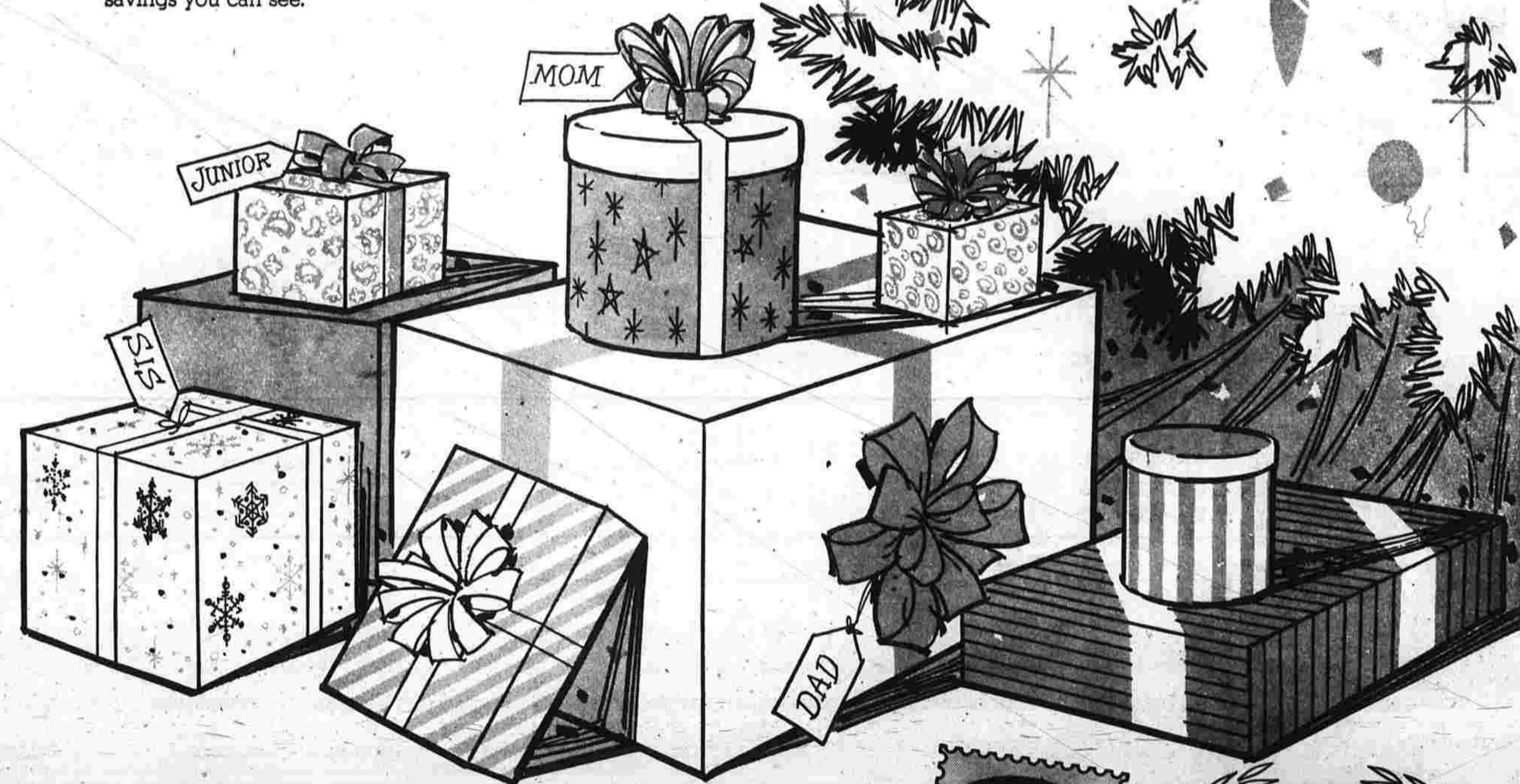

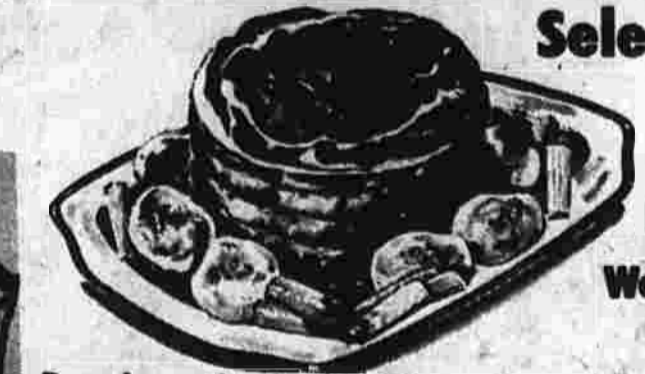
