By the Senate bill, the rate for first class letters—the means of communication the American people use for family, friendship and business - will go from five cents, or nickel, one-twentieth of a dollar, up to an inconvenient fractured-fraction of a dollar six cent rate. This one cent increase in the size of the stamp we will have to buy for first class letters amounts to a 20 per cent ingrease over the present rate.

Under the present rate, first class mail already pays more than 100 per cent of the cost for its own handling. First class mail, it may be added, is med we all choose to send and receive. When the private letter goes up to six cents, there will also be an increase in the rates for the so-called tunk masithe mail most of us would, if we had a choice in the matter, choose not ever to receive at all. As compared to the 100 per cent of its own cost first class mail now pays before the new increase is figured in, junk mail now pays only 61 cent of its own cost. The increases included in the Senate bill are not enough to raise this up to the 100 per cent level which already obtains in the

The harsh dollars and cents reality, then, has to be stated this way: Congress proposes to increase the rate for private first class mail, which is a precious and valued necessity of every body's life, in order to continue subsidy of junk mail, which is merely a nuisance to most people.

As for the people of this country, they are just going to lie down and take it. They are going to let themselves be voted into the world of the six cent stamp without one real whimper of pro-One would think that if there is any-

thing that goes through the mails that deserves some affectionate attention from our great paternalistic government, it would be the first class letter. One could argue that, if there is any one class of mail which really deserves subsidy from all the taxpayers, or from all the users of the mails, that would be it. But government, as it operates in the recommendations of the executive branch at Washington and in the voting of the legislative branch at Washington actually heads in the opposite direction, and makes the first class letter the one piece of mail which has to pay more

than its own cost. And the American people are se beaten down, so whipped into submission to the inevitable crunch of the buresucratic and political steamroller, so indifferent to the big question of small injustices, that they apparently fail to spend even one five cent stamp, while there is still power in one, to deliver a protest to Washington.

This amounts to some surrender, by us, of the role we have tried to sell ourselves as our own inevitable and special duty in the region. If somebody could devise the formula which would make that much surrender on our part graceful, and set up the future condi tions which would guarantee that we had surrendered nothing more than our cwn primacy in the region, that would be a brand of diplomacy which could be called world-saving. For unless somebody can lead us out we are in Vietnam like Samson, more likely to pull the world down than to save it.
