UAW Sets Date for GM Pact

DETROIT (AP) — The United Auto Workers Union served notice today on General Motors that it has set Dec. 1 as a "last-gut date" for reaching agreement on a new national labor contract covering the union's 200,000 UAW-represented workers.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther told newsmen following a two-hour meeting of the union's General Motors Committee that if no agreement is reached by the target date, the union will then set a "strike deadline."

Reuther indicated top officials of the union were not in favor of calling workers off their jobs during the Christmas and New Year holidays. A last-minute agreement would mean that this time would deprive workers of holiday pay.

The union chairman said the UAW strategy is aimed at obtaining an agreement on national issues by Dec. 14 and then concentrating on local issues at plants around the nation early next year.

If no agreement is reached on the national contract by the deadline, the 200-member GM Council would then be called back into session to set a strike deadline after the holidays.

"We hope to get national problems out of the way so that we can do a more efficient job on local issues," Reuther explained.

The pattern for an economic settlement covering wages and fringe benefits already has been set in an agreement negotiated with Ford Motor Co. and the Chrysler Corp.

Reuther said the chief problem is GM concerted working conditions and union representation.

Reuther also sent newsmen the UAW has sent a letter to George Meany, AFL-CIO president, expressing regret that because of the auto labor negotiations the UAW officers would be unable to attend the national labor organization's convention next week.

TPC Upheld By Court in Luce Appeal

The Town Planning Commission (TPC) has been upheld in its Dec. 30, 1966 action, when it denied an application by Charles Luce of Charles's Service Station for a change to E. Middle Tpk. and Arrott Rd.

The area is in Residence A and C zones and Luce had sought the zone change in order to expand his service station. Luce had appealed the TPC denial on the basis that the commission was arbitrary, that it had abused its discretion in restricting his use of his property, and that the restriction was in effect confiscatory.

Judge John Bracken, in Hartford County Court of Common Pleas yesterday rejected all of Luce's claims.

The TPC, when it denied the application, did so on the basis that the zone change requested was not in accord with the town's Comprehensive Plan, that it would permit certain uses not appropriate to the neighborhood, and that it would tend to depreciate neighborhood values.

The town was represented in the appeal action by Atty. Philip Bayer, a former town councilman. He substituted for Town Councilman John Shea, who had removed himself from the case because of a conflict of interest. Luce was represented by Atty. Paul Grobert.

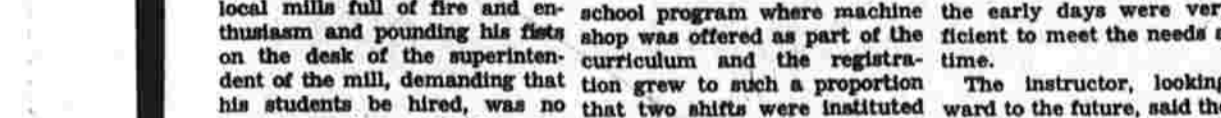

Malaysia Fights Over? KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Malaysia's week-long wave of fighting between Chinese and Malays appeared over today as police foiled a leftist attempt to stage a general strike in Kuala Lumpur. From the most turbulent areas in the northwestern part of the peninsula to the southern tip just across from Singapore, police reported his returning to normal and no serious incidents in the past 24 hours. Shoppers in Kuala Lumpur ignored demands by the Labor party to stage a hartal, or strike, to protest devaluation of part of the country's currency. The number of persons arrested on suspicion of instigating the violence or planning new disturbances rose to 1,250, about 10 per cent of them Chinese. Imperial Hotel Wrecked TOKYO (AP) — A screaming crowd started tearing down the Old Imperial Hotel today, and scores of onlookers clicked their cameras steadily. There were no demonstrations of protest from the groups that had tried to save the 44-year-old structure designed by Frank Lloyd Wright. The owners say the three-story building is uneconomical to run on its expensive downtown property and they plan to build a modern 17-story building. There were indications that a part of the old building will be rebuilt at the Metji Village, a cultural center Tokyo is building for next year's centennial celebrations of Japan's modern era. It will take about six months to demolish the building, which withstood the great earthquake of Sept. 1, 1923, the day after it opened.
