

Forces Join to Kill 200 in VC Battalion

SAIGON (AP) — American infantrymen and South Vietnamese Marines boxed in a Viet Cong battalion in the Mekong Delta today and reported killing 200 in a day-long battle that raged into the night.

Initial field reports put U.S. casualties at four dead and 38 wounded, South Vietnamese at 15 killed and 59 wounded.

The action was 66 miles southwest of Saigon along the banks of the Rach Ruong Canal which runs along the borders of Dinh Tuong and Kien Thung provinces.

The fighting coincided with another series of Communist ar-

tillery, rocket and grenade attacks on U.S. forces. Communist troops shelled a U.S. Navy destroyer, killing two Americans and wounding three; launched a grenade and small arms attack on the main U.S. Army headquarters just outside of Saigon; sank a cargo barge and set another afire, and ambushed an Army convoy.

A spokesman for the U.S. 9th Infantry Division described the fighting in the delta as a typical Riverine Task Force maneuver up the Rach Ruong Canal in heavily armored Navy troop carriers.

He said a battalion of Vietnamese marines—perhaps 800 men—were in the lead troop carrier when they came under heavy Communist rocket and machine-gun fire from the right bank.

The Vietnamese marines sped on north past the enemy troops, hit the beaches and started sweeping south toward the Viet Cong battalion. At the same time a battalion from the 9th Division—about 400 men—landed south of the Viet Cong forces and began pushing north to close two sides of the box.

A short time later, a third battalion from the 9th Division was lifted in by helicopter to the west of the enemy forces, closing three sides. The spokesman said the box was completed by heavily armed Navy Monitor boats along the canal blocking to the east.

In addition, U.S. Air Force tactical fighter bombers pounded the Viet Cong positions with 17 strikes throughout the day. U.S. Army helicopter gunships and artillery also hammered at the Communist forces.

The South Vietnamese marines made a concentrated assault on fortified Viet Cong positions in the afternoon and killed nearly 100 of the enemy, a 9th Division spokesman said.

He said that of the total 200 Viet Cong troops killed by the Riverine Task Force, 124 were slain by the Vietnamese marines, the rest by the American infantrymen.

The enemy battalion—perhaps 400 to 500 men—was identified as the 502nd Viet Cong Local Force Battalion.

The allied troops also reported taking five prisoners and capturing 42 weapons.

In Saigon, the U.S. Command said the allied troops pushed the Viet Cong battalion about 2½ miles into retreat to the north. A spokesman said that at last report at nightfall, moderate to heavy contact was reported.

The Riverine operation, named Coronado Nine, is another in a month long series aimed at rooting out the Viet Cong from the delta which they dominate. Coronado Nine was launched about Nov. 1 and had been continuing mainly in Dinh Tuong Province.

The 502nd Viet Cong Local Force Battalion has been operating in the area for years.

The operation may be a forerunner to a wider U.S. effort to help wrest control of the delta from the Viet Cong. In Saigon, informants said Maj. Gen. William R. Peers of Stuart, Iowa, will be named the senior U.S. military adviser in the delta sector early next year. Peers, now commander of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division in the central highlands, led the forces that drove North Vietnamese army regulars out of the hills of Dak To last month.

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Makarios Welcomes U.N. Plan

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — President Makarios of Cyprus welcomed Secretary-General U Thant's peace proposals for his strife-torn island Monday and called for the complete withdrawal of all non-Cypriot armed forces other than those of the United Nations.

Makarios also called for "effective guarantees against any military intervention in the affairs of Cyprus." This, he said, "is a demanding necessity for peace."

In his appeal, Thant had urged Greece and Turkey, as a first step, to withdraw expeditiously from the island in the eastern Mediterranean their armed forces in excess of the levels provided in the 1960 Cyprus independence agreements. He also spoke of enlarged responsibilities for the U.N. peacekeeping force on the island.

Political Plans May Be Revealed Soon LBJ Keeping Name Off N.H. Ballot

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is keeping his name off the popularity contest ballot in the New Hampshire primary March 12 but soon after could lose the option of concealing his future political plans.

Johnson has shrugged off questions about whether he is seeking a second elective term. But the bridge he has said he will cross when he comes to it may be just around the bend in the April 2 Wisconsin primary.

In New Hampshire, a candidate's name can't be posted on

the presidential primary ballot without his consent. In Wisconsin, his name can be entered by a state commission and he must disclaim any intention of running to get it off.

Sen. Thomas J. McIntyre D-N.H., said in an interview Sunday that in line with the President's wishes, Johnson will not be entered in the popular vote contest but will be represented with a slate of Democratic National Convention delegates.

"The President doesn't want to disclose his intentions officially in March in a state where we have only about 55,000 regis-

tered Democrats," McIntyre said.

The public impact of New Hampshire's primary has always been out of proportion to the relatively small numbers of voters involved.

When the late Sen. Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., trounced President Truman in the state's 1952 voting, Truman said presidential primaries were a lot of "eyewash." But he announced soon after that he wouldn't seek re-election.

Without mentioning names, he referred indirectly to McCarthy when he said: "I believe we already have several volunteers for next year's ticket. In general, I like to stay out of these internal party matters."

McCarthy won the unanimous endorsement Sunday of

Actor Bert Lahr, 72, Dies of Hemorrhage

NEW YORK (AP) — Bert Lahr, the beloved Cowardly Lion of "The Wizard of Oz" and veteran of countless stage and movie roles, died today at 72.

Lahr's death at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center was attributed to a massive internal hemorrhage. He had been under treatment since Nov. 21 for a back ailment and pneumonia.

One of the great comic actors, Lahr's career spanned some 50 years and ranged from the classic Cowardly Lion in "The Wizard of Oz" to Estragon in the difficult "Waiting for Godot." Which did he like best? "Strangely enough," he said once. "It was 'Waiting for Godot.' It was controversial. Those that hated it, spit at it. Yet it

had its cult, and it created a different type of audience for me. It was like—well, it was like playing Carnegie Hall. It changed my whole career. Before that I was a buffoon. This gave me a chance to play Shaw and Moliere."

But it is as a clown that Lahr will be remembered by millions who saw him—and who will see him—as the Cowardly Lion.

Lahr was born in New York City on Aug. 13, 1895, not far from the expensive Fifth Avenue apartment that came with success. As a teenager, he joined a children's vaudeville act called "Nine Crazy Kids." "It was horrible," he said, "but I got the bug, you know."

The job was advertised at a salary range of \$8,000 to \$10,000. Etlinger requested that the salary be increased to \$13,500. The board unanimously approved his appointment with the higher salary, but two members voted against the increase.

Cable Car Runs Wild, 27 Injured

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — With passengers screaming in terror, a cable car ran wild down one of San Francisco's steepest hills Sunday night, ramming a car which exploded into flames and crashed into nine others.

Ambulances took 27 persons, most of them from the cable car to hospitals with burns and bruises. Critically burned was James Van Baalen, 30, of San Francisco.

The six-ton Hyde Street cable car, nearing the end of its two-mile run from Powell and Market Streets in a heavy downpour, rolled onto the steep grade and went forward out of control on rain-slick tracks.

According to passengers, the cable car careened for a block and a half down Hyde. Some passengers jumped off. At Bay Street the car rammed an auto which bounced off others as its gas tank ruptured.

"A big sheet of flame hit the cable car," said Jim Kosok, 22,

Cardinal Spellman Lies in State

NEW YORK (AP) — Dressed in the white, red and gold splendor of a Prince of the Roman Catholic Church, the body of Francis Cardinal Spellman lay in state in St. Patrick's Cathedral today.

Thousands of mourners filed by the catafalque, placed in the center aisle, after a solemn high mass of requiem sung Sunday night by Archbishop John F. Maguire and nine concelebrants. Archbishop Maguire has been named administrator of the archdiocese by Pope Paul VI to serve until a successor is named.

Shortly after midnight, the great bronze doors of the cathedral were shut.

Four New York City firemen and policemen stood guard over the coffin of African mahogany lined with bronze which will remain in place until funeral services Thursday for the cardinal, who died Saturday of a stroke at the age of 78.

All seven surviving American cardinals have been invited to the Thursday services. The six cardinals currently in the United States have indicated they will attend, but whether Francis Cardinal Brennan, head of the Vatican's Sacred Rota, would return from Rome was not known.

As mourners filled the cathedral and messages of condolence poured into the chancery including those from the Pope and President Johnson—speculation began on who would succeed Spellman.

Although the selection of a successor is finally made by the Pope, this will be the first major American church appointment under a new nominating system set up to give American

Medical Breakthrough

Heart Transplant Patient Is 'Feeling Much Better'

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — A South African man with the transplanted heart of a 25-year-old girl pumping his blood announced today: "I am feeling much better."

Louis Washkansky, 55, a Lithuanian-born businessman, was able to speak 33 hours after a medical breakthrough operation. The tubes to a respirator were removed from his throat, permitting him to speak his first words since Sunday's surgery.

But he remained in a critical period at what Groote Schuur Hospital called the world's first human heart transplant.

Heart specialists around the world were waiting to see if Washkansky's body would accept or reject the heart of De-

nise Ann Darvall, an accounting machine operator killed in a car crash.

"The longer Washkansky goes on, the better," said Dr. Jacobus G. Burger, medical supervisor of the hospital, "although that does not mean the heart will not be rejected later. The body could decide in 5 or 10 years' time that it doesn't want this heart."

Washkansky had a tracheotomy—a breathing tube inserted in his throat—and could not speak although he was reported fully conscious Sunday afternoon after the five-hour operation. He was being fed anticoagulants to prevent blood clotting. Dr. Burger said that without the transplant Washkansky

would have been dead within a few days because his heart's muscle was worn down.

The landmark operation was supervised by Dr. Jan H. Louw, the hospital's chief surgeon, with Prof. Chris Bernard performing the main surgery.

Surgeons removed the heart from Miss Darvall's body first and kept it going by a mechanical pump while they took out Washkansky's damaged heart. They then transplanted the girl's heart into the man's chest and started it beating with jolts from electrodes.

"It was like turning the ignition switch of a car," said Dr. Louw.

Coventry Loan Fund Sets Drive

The Coventry Student Loan Fund is conducting a fund drive, with some 1,800 letters to be mailed this week to Coventry residents requesting contributions.

The Student Loan Fund was founded in 1968 to enable students to pursue a higher education. Trustees report requests for loans exceed the balance on hand, and so a more intensive fund drive is being undertaken this year than in the past.

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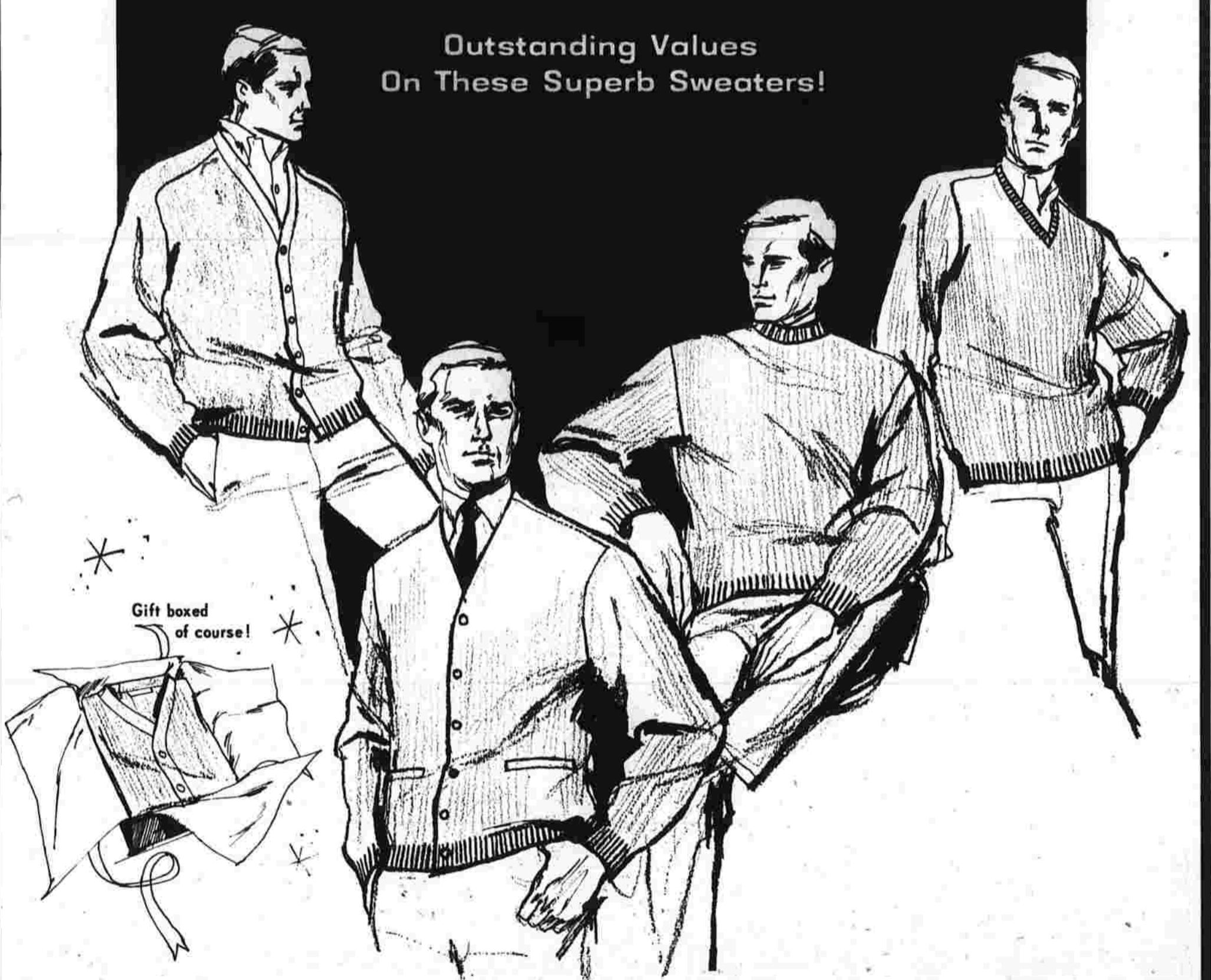

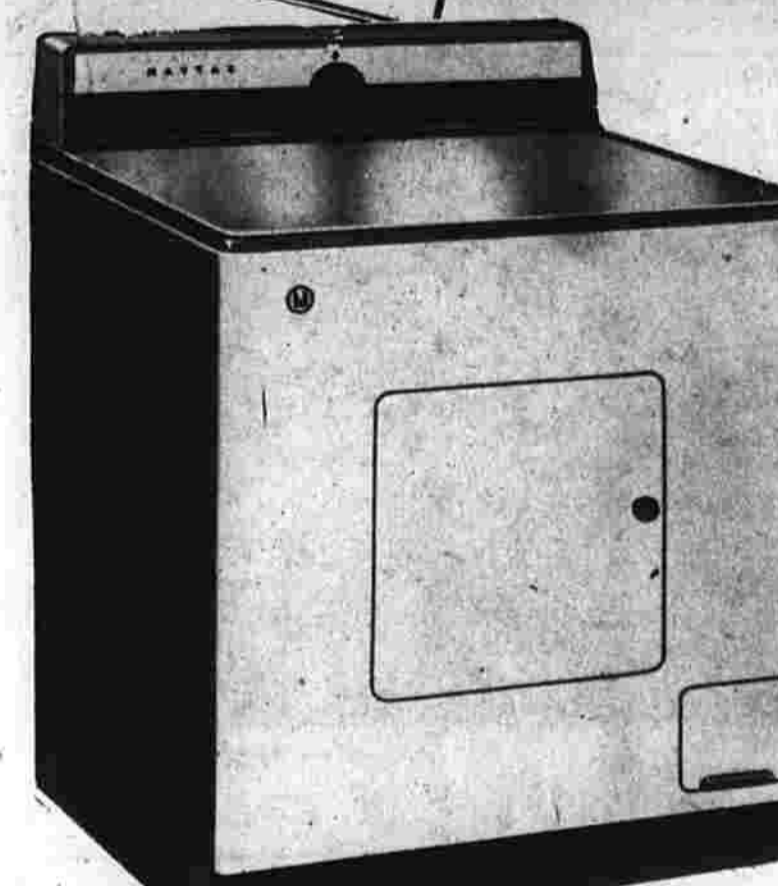

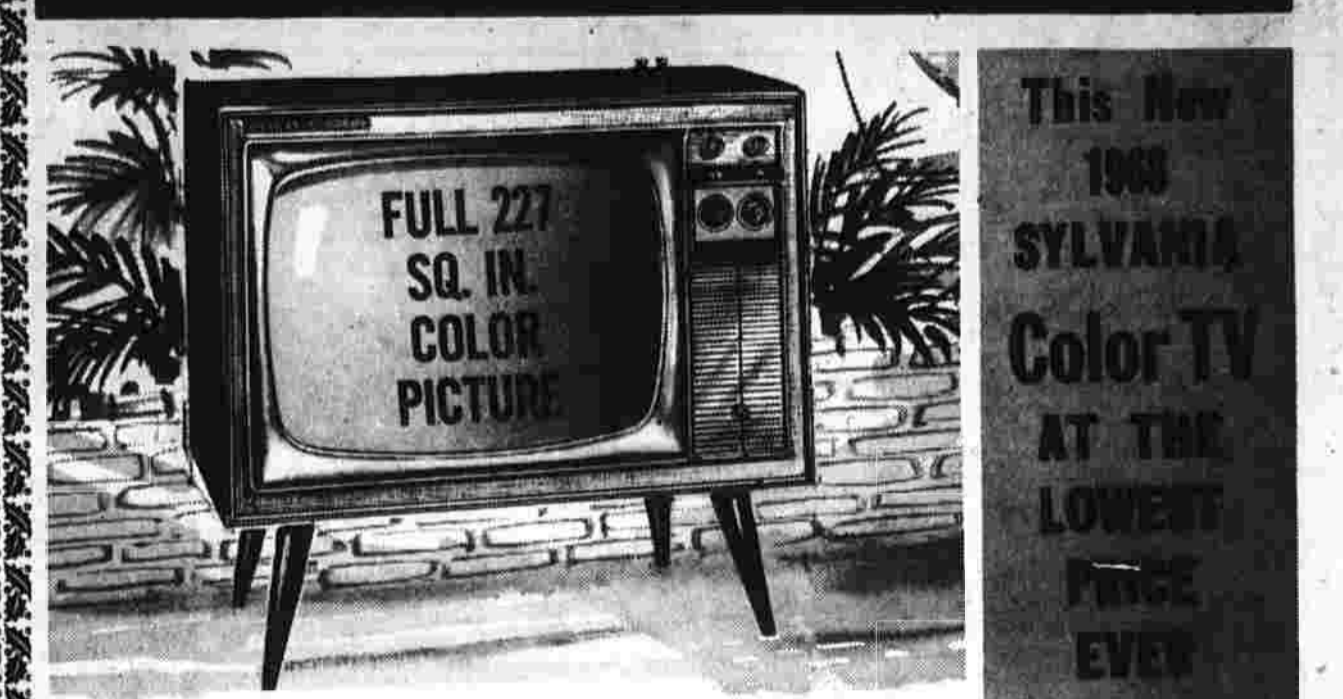

Heart Transplant Patient Is 'Feeling Much Better'

The case was followed with intense interest in the United States, where heart disease is the nation's leading disease. "It sounds to me like a damn good job—scientifically valid," said Dr. Norman E. Shumway, head of the cardiovascular surgery division at the Stanford Medical Center.

He said his staff is ready to perform the same operation when the right combination of dying patient and donor whose heart must be taken no later than half an hour after death occurs at Stanford.

Dr. Shumway predicted that within 10 years doctors will be transplanting hearts with the same frequency they now transplant kidneys. About 400 persons throughout the world were living with transplanted kidneys as of last February.

Dr. Michael DeBakey, who led the development of the heart pump, said in Houston the transplant certainly would be a great achievement if they're able to overcome the rejection.

Dr. Kenneth R. Burton, chief of the Medical Research Institute said there was "quite a definite improvement in the patient's life two years or more since several dogs which have received heart transplants are still alive two years after ward."

One abortive heart transplant attempt in 1964 at the University of Mississippi. Surgeons there kept a patient alive despite a failing heart in a long but futile wait for a suitable human donor. In desperation they finally transplanted the heart of a chimpanzee, which failed after one hour.

The greatest obstacle to success in heart transplants is the human body's own defense mechanism against foreign objects. To suppress this mechanism so it won't attack the transplanted heart, doctors were giving Washkansky a number of drugs. But such drugs so depress the defense mechanism that such harmful foreign objects as germs thrive more easily, creating another hazard.

"We are just hoping for the best," said Dr. Burger. "The body throws out foreign tissues and he might be able to keep it or not. The operation was an irreversible step. If the heart is rejected he dies. It's not like a kidney transplant where the patient can be put on dialysis until another suitable donor is found."

A team of 30 medical specialists led by Prof. Barnard performed the operation.

"We were all almost tongue-tied when this was medical history in the making," said a young doctor who witnessed the surgery. "There was terrific palming work of suturing main arteries and veins of the patient to those of the donor heart."

Houston said he brushed past Tarkenton and "Young jumped me at the 10-yard line. My legs felt as if they weighed 100 pounds each, so I just dove for the end zone."
