### Brundage Says He's Opposed to Discrimination

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) — Replying to charges that he is biased against Negroes and Jews, Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, declared, "I have opposed racial and religious discrimination all my life."

The accusations came from Dr. Harry Edwards, a San Jose College professor who heads a group encouraging Negro athletes to boycott the 1968 Olympic Games at Mexico City. The group asks Brundage's resignation as one of the conditions for withdrawal of the boycott.

Edwards said Brundage owns and operates a country club in Santa Barbara, Calif., where Negroes and Jews are excluded. "The club is entirely run by the members," said Brundage. "I have nothing to do with its operation. I only go there occasionally to play golf."

In answering the charge Brundage said that in the 1920's while he was president of the Amateur Athletic Union, he and American track and field champions removed from New Orleans because they were Negroes. 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FRANCE TRAVEL REQUEST

WASHINGTON (AP) — A resolution aimed at urging American tourists to avoid traveling in France will be introduced next month in Congress by Sen. Thomas Dodd, D-Conn.

Dodd said Friday he will ask the Johnson administration to study the possibility of requiring France to pay part of her \$7 billion World War I debt to the U.S.

The actions are necessary, Dodd said, because the government of French President Charles de Gaulle has for more than a year now been using American tourist dollars to wage war against the American dollar and the American gold reserve.

Dodd said his resolution emphasizes the warm Americans have toward the people of France if not toward the government.

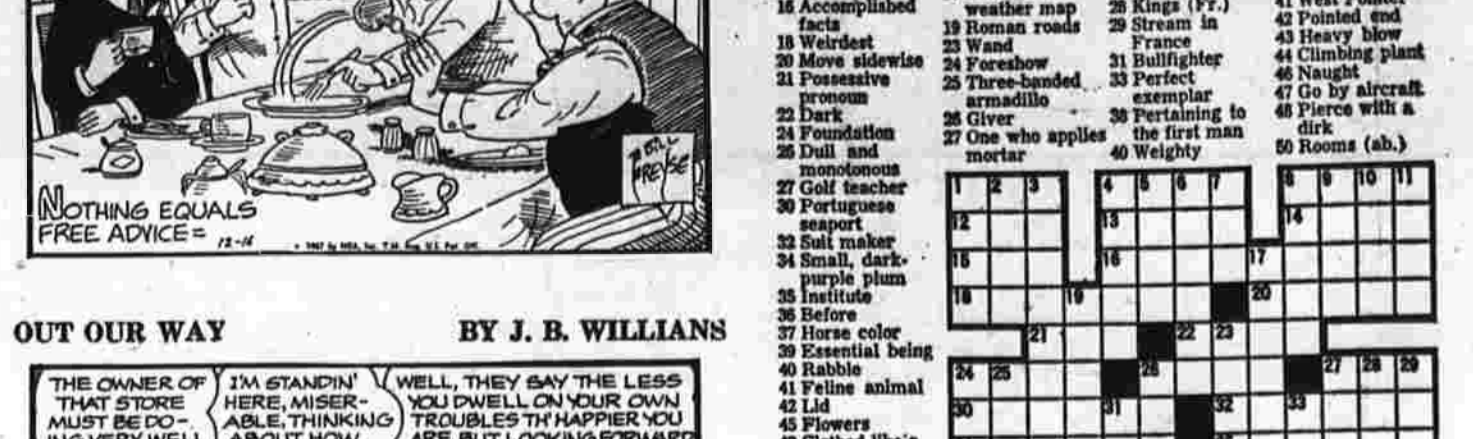
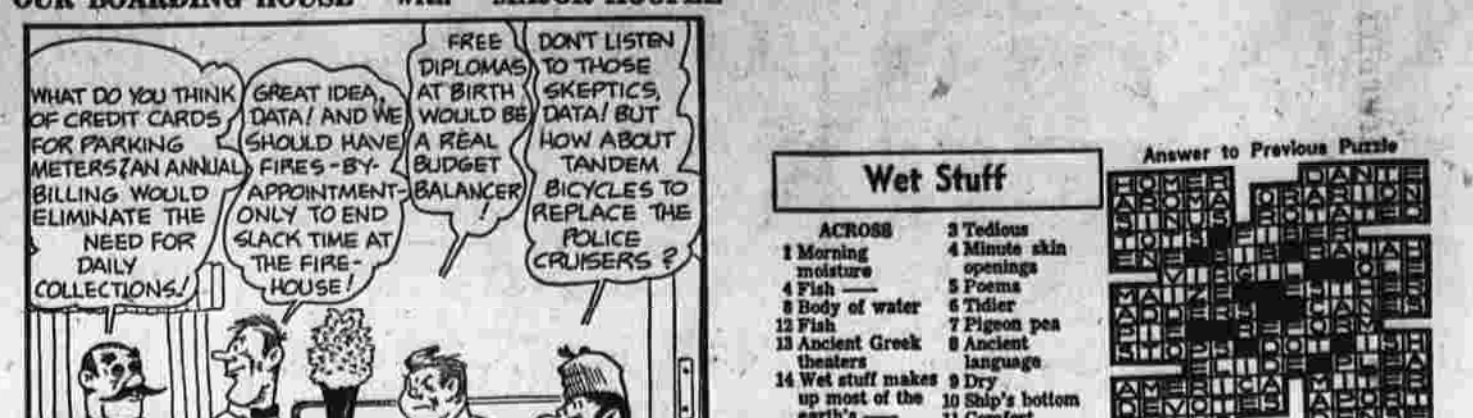
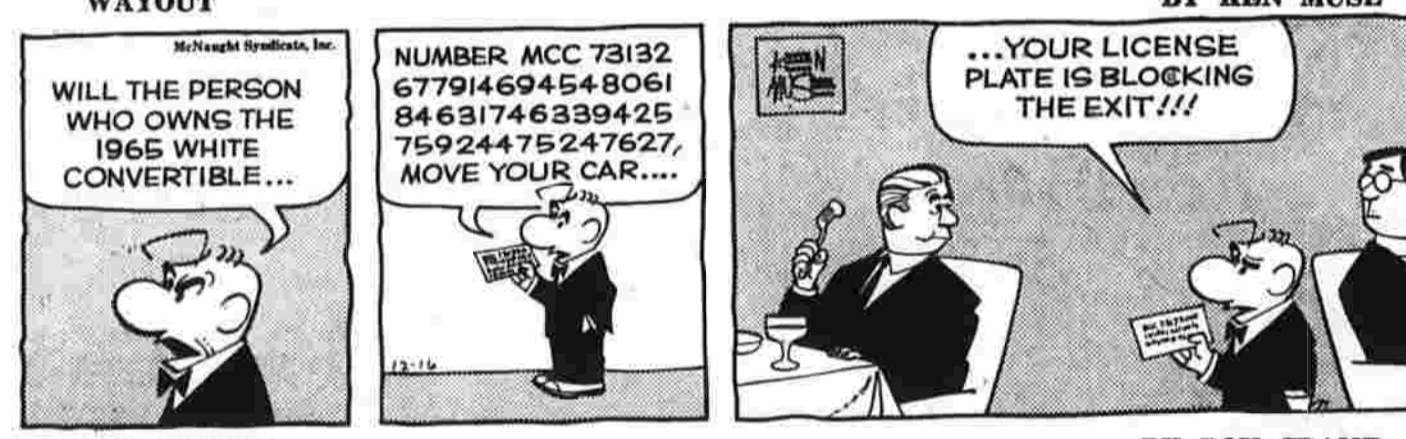

## Rough Week for Dollar on European Markets

LONDON (AP)—The dollar hit another rough week on European markets. Rumors swept European capitals that the devaluation of the dollar would lead to a sharp change in the price of gold, and the whole international market was in an even keel. Although West European nations were reportedly reluctant to cooperate, there were reports that Washington had proposed a plan to combine all the reserves of the United States and other Western countries into one pool. The pool would total about \$20 billion and would confront speculators with an overwhelming amount of gold by before the rate of \$35 an ounce would be forced up. In any case, among other possibilities was the chance that the U.S. Treasury would ship the last domestic link between gold and the dollar sometime next year. 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Junta Offers King Chance To Return

named an unknown officer, Lt. Gen. George Zolotas, as regent and gave him power to issue royal decrees.

In spite of the king's statement that junta leaders were forgers who used his name to legalize their own April 21 coup, orders went out Friday for pictures of the royal family to be hung in ministries and schools after a directive Thursday that they be taken down.

There was speculation in Rome that one factor in the junta's overtures to the king was a lack of confidence in some elements of the armed forces so soon after Constantine tried to use some military forces in his counter coup.

"The regime doesn't change," Patakos said. "It is still a crown democracy. And we don't plan any changes. The king left by himself and pictures of the royal couple remain on the wall."

In Rome, Constantine talked with a series of Greek visitors. Among them was Foreign Minister Panayiotis Pipinelis, who is known to be a staunch royalist. Pipinelis had come to Rome Friday from a meeting of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in Brussels.

Rumors that he had sided with the king were reinforced today when Patakos said, "the foreign minister was ordered to return to Athens by noon Friday. He is not in Rome with the government's permission."

Pipinelis was accompanied by ousted defense minister Lt. Gen. Grigorios Spantidakis, a junta leader. Patakos said Spantidakis was dropped Wednesday when he hesitated over expressing his allegiance to the regime.

Informal sources said the king had dinner Friday night with Stavros Niarchos, the multimillionaire Greek shipping magnate and a close friend of the royal family. He reportedly filled Constantine in on the attitudes of the Greek business community towards his flight.

The new constitution promised by the junta after its April take-over has been delayed by the counter coup attempt. The president of the 20-member committee that was scheduled to submit a draft constitution Friday asked the regime today for another seven days to complete its work.

Patakos had said he believed there would be a delay of three or four days. He said the committee president told him wording of certain articles had not been completed "due to the events of the last few days."

"I told him the excuse was unjustified and I expected him to reply today exactly when the draft would be ready," he added.

At his news conference, Patakos also said former Premier George Papandreou had again been placed under house arrest after being set free two months ago. He was originally interned after the April coup.

The general also acknowledged that several arrests involving military officers and politicians—some "for their own security"—followed the collapse of the counter coup.

Patakos said that as soon as King Constantine left for Italy with his family, the generals who had supported him were arrested in their offices by junior officers.

"They offered no resistance or else they would have been shot," he said.

Patakos said he did not know if Premier George Papadopoulos had sent a message to Constantine in Rome. Informal sources here said Papadopoulos had phoned the king Friday, but no details of their discussion were available.

Suspended Term Given to Woman In Shooting

NEW HAVEN (AP) — A woman charged with firing two shotgun blasts at her husband while he was teaching a college class has been given a suspended sentence in connection with the case.

Mrs. Ruth A. Dryfoos, 35, of Bathany, was sentenced to a suspended term of one-year-and-one-day to three years by Superior Court Judge Joseph Klau Friday. The judge also imposed two years probation.

Mrs. Dryfoos had pleaded guilty to a charge of aggravated assault. Her husband, anthropology Prof. Robert Dryfoos, was wounded along with one of the students in the Southern Connecticut State College night class when the shooting occurred July 27, 1966. The student wounded by one of the shots was Robert Evers, 20, of Hamden.

The woman's attorney, Thomas Clifford of New Haven, said Mrs. Dryfoos was "under great emotional stress" at the time of the shooting. He said she has undergone intensive psychiatric treatment and that family problems which might have contributed to her actions have been cleared up.

Her husband joined the attorney in a plea for leniency on the court's part.

\$100,000 FIRE IN BRISTOL BRISTOL (AP) — Fire caused an estimated \$100,000 damage to the 138-year-old Terryville Congregational Church Friday. About 60 firemen from Bristol and Thomaston quelled the blaze.

Patler Found Guilty Of Rockwell's Murder

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — John Patler, kicked out of the American Nazi Party last April, was convicted today of murdering party leader George Lincoln Rockwell.

Patler, 29, faces a 20-year prison sentence. The prosecution had demanded he be sent to the electric chair.

A jury of 10 men and 2 women brought in the verdict of first-degree murder as Patler watched ashenfaced. As deputies led him from the Arlington Circuit Court room he turned to his lawyers and said, "Thanks an awful lot."

There was no immediate word on whether the conviction would be appealed.

Rockwell, 49-year-old "fuehrer" of the anti-Negro, anti-Jewish Nazi group, was shot to death while getting into his car last Aug. 23. Police said his assassin shot from the roof of the shopping center, using a 7.63mm German Mauser pistol. Patler was arrested a half hour later, about a mile from the scene.

Rockwell was murdered moments after putting some clothes into a coin-operated washing machine. He had driven to the self-service laundry from the national headquarters of the party, a rundown mansion less than half a mile away.

When prosecutor William J. Hassan asked for the death penalty in his summation for the jury, Patler's 23-year-old wife, Alice, shrieked "No!"

Escorted from the room, she was briefly treated at a hospital and released. She was not present when the verdict was read.

Patler was a captain in the American Nazi Party but was expelled from the hate group after he defied with Rockwell on policy.

One party member, Christopher Weisigo of Chicago, testified that Patler had commented several times before the slaying: "Rockwell is an evil genius and must be stopped."

Patler's attorneys argued he could not have known Rockwell's movements on the day of the shooting. They said he was nowhere near the shopping center when the slaying occurred.

The Manchester High School football team, through its 1968 co-captains, Robert Bleiler and Lee Potterton, has sent a letter to the chairman of the Board of Education requesting that Davis Wiggins be retained as football coach.

Wiggins, at this week's school board meeting, asked to be relieved of his coaching duties at the end of the current year because of the pressure of his supervisory duties.

Hired in 1965, Wiggins holds the dual post of the MHS football coach and supervisor of physical education for the school system.

He told the board Monday that though he was overworked he would abide by whatever decision it reached. Several board members said Wiggins should be given additional help.

The matter was referred to the personnel-committee for study.

In its letter, the football team asked chairman John Rotner to convey to the board "our earnest desire to have Mr. Davis Wiggins continue on as our coach."

"We all agree," the team said, "that he is the best coach MHS has had in a long time."

Rotner, who spoke to Bleiler and Potterton, said the co-captains also wanted to convey their feeling that Wiggins should be given additional supervisory assistance in the physical education department.

Copies of the team letter have been sent to all board members, School Superintendent William Curtis, and MHS Principal A. Raymond Rogers.

Hillhouse School Brawl Results in Hour Changes

NEW HAVEN (AP) — School hours at New Haven's three public high schools will be curtailed next week in the aftermath of a brawl in the Hillhouse High School cafeteria Thursday in which four persons were injured.

One arrest was made, some windows were broken, trophies were taken from their display cases, and some rocks were hurled at police outside a school before the brief flurry of violence ended.

Some Negro students at Hillhouse, where a majority of the 1,700 students are Negro, claimed the trouble was an outgrowth of an incident Wednesday in which a white youth allegedly punched a Negro girl in the back when she refused to participate in a pledge of allegiance to the American flag.

"He went walking around the school with his nose in the air," said a Negro student, Ronald Barnes, who is a member of a group calling itself the "Black Student Union."

It was reported that hostility toward the white youth broke out into violent school during the lunch period Friday. Slogans were exchanged while the white youth was in the cafeteria, and a teacher was trying to escort the youth to the principal's office in an attempt to avoid trouble when the brawl began.

Fights occurred throughout the dining hall and broke out in other sections of the school. Ten police cars were summoned to the area. Rocks and bottles were tossed at some police vehicles. Friday's school session at Hillhouse was suspended at about 1 p.m.

The 1 p.m. closing, 90 minutes earlier than normal, will be in effect all of next week in the cities three high schools. Superintendent of Schools John A. Santini said that teachers will use the remaining time each day "to work on ways of improving learning and teaching conditions" at the schools.

For one class period Monday, Santini said, Hillhouse students will attend an assembly "to consider school matters." He indicated he would attend the assembly.

A meeting was held in the high school auditorium late Friday to discuss the disturbance. A 15-year-old girl, reported to be the one punched in the back by the white youth two days earlier, told the school superintendent: "He wasn't punished the way a big boy would have been punished who had done that."

Other Negro students also expressed criticism of alleged differing standards of treatment of Negro and white students by school officials. One student complained of "discrimination and unfairness" as he talked with the school superintendent during the Friday afternoon meeting.

Santini later issued a statement which appeared to refer to a demand by adult Negro leaders that they be allowed to meet with school officials to discuss the situation.

"The school staff and I are continuing to work intensively on the problems which give rise to this situation," Santini said.

In the difficult task of operating city schools today, the Board of Education and the school staff are ready and willing to listen, to consult with and be advised by persons interested in public education," the school superintendent added.

Planes Again Hit Bridges in Hanoi

Planes went along Friday to attack antiaircraft sites and dual MIG interceptors. No MIGs were reported downed Friday but one was claimed Thursday.

The Communists claimed they shot down a total of seven American planes Thursday and Friday. The U.S. Command has acknowledged only the loss Thursday of an F105 Thunderchief which went down in raids on Hanoi.

The Americans attacked the belt of missile defense below Hanoi and Hai Phong even while the Communists were sending up the SAMS, "the flying telephone poles." One missile exploded on the ground and eight sites were bombed.

One plane rolled off a strike near Hanoi spilling a MIG17 on the field at Hoa Lac 20 miles west of the city and badly damaged it in a strafing run.

Although American raiders concentrated on bridges, they also slashed up and down North Vietnam. Carrier-based Navy pilots working the coastal rail route reported catching large trains in the open. They said they destroyed nine boxcars and damaged 45 more.

On the ground in South Vietnam several sharp clashes were reported.

On the Bong Son coastal plains 325 miles northeast of Saigon, U.S. air cavalrymen, who move to battle in helicopter, and South Vietnamese infantrymen said Friday they killed 47 North Vietnamese regulars and that the fight was still going on.

Farther North, along the demilitarized zone, U.S. Marines reported killing 46 North Vietnamese soldiers in an artillery barrage followed by a three-hour ground battle within eyesight of the Leatherneck outpost at Con Thien.

The fight started when the Marines spotted an enemy column, a spokesman said. The North Vietnamese broke contact before dusk.

The Marines lost three dead and 32 wounded in the fight and from Communist shelling of their field positions around Con Thien. Enemy gunners fired 102 rounds of mortar and artillery at Marine units along the DMZ during the day.

GOP Will Fill Posts If Democrats Don't

"If the Democrats don't fill the three vacancies on the Community Council for Economic Opportunity, we Republicans will do it for them," said Manchester GOP Chairman Francis DellaFera today.

The seven-member council has been three short since September, when the three minority Democrats resigned on masse.

Their letter of resignation stated, "It is with deep regret that we have been compelled to conclude that the Community Council has become an agency without purpose or function—without policies or objectives."

Since then, the appointment of three replacement Democrats as required under minority representation rules, has appeared each month on the agenda of the Board of Directors. And, each month, at the request of the board's Democratic minority, the appointments were tabled.

Democratic Town Chairman Ted Cummings said in September that, as far as he and other Democratic town officials are concerned, the vacancies will stand and no replacements will be recommended.

The four remaining members of the council, all Republicans, met Wednesday and approved a letter to the board of Directors, requesting that the council be brought back to its full strength.

Council chairman Atty. James Higgins said that, although Manchester is fortunate in having little need for agencies to take care of the economy,

the council should continue. He said that programs may be developed in the future which may require the services of the agency.

At present, two Manchester programs are financed with federal Anti-Poverty funds — the Head Start Program, for pre-kindergarten children; and the Foster Grandparents Program, for persons over 65 who work with retarded children.

Head Start is funded through application by the Manchester Board of Education. The Foster Grandparents Program is funded through the Thames Valley (Norwich-New London) Economic Opportunity Council.

Manchester's Community Council on Economic Opportunity has received no official status or recognition by federal agencies.

The local council is authorized by an ordinance which created a Manchester Department of Economic Opportunity, an official arm of the town.

DellaFera said that the GOP Board of Directors' majority will appoint Democrats to the council.

"I am certain we can find three capable Democrats who will be willing to serve," he said.

The cost of the plan, according to Brown, Donald and Donald, would be about \$14,000 to \$16,000, with the federal government paying about two-thirds under the "701" program.

The commission came to the conclusion that it cannot give a decision on a pool because it does not have any information. It would like to know such things as costs and minimum state requirements.

The town will be asked to allocate \$5,500 from the Reserve Fund for park development for work on a pool, as requested by the selectmen, acting as the Park and Recreation Commission.

The Planning Commission at its meeting discussed the eventual need for a building code in town. The selectmen at their meeting upstairs were unofficially discussing the need for a paid assessor. Both possibilities come up from time to time.

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# 'Girard' Back to Theater

NEW YORK (AP) — Barry Morse, the actor who relentlessly pursued David Janssen in "The Fugitive" for five years, has gone back to his first love, the theater.

Morse, the long, lean Londoner with an impeccable public school accent, now is directing a play aiming for Broadway. He directed "Mr. Dickens of London" which was shown on ABC Tuesday night.

Since the dramatic windup of "The Fugitive" in late August, Morse has not visited California and has no plans to return for awhile.

"It must have seemed like more, but I appeared in only about one-third of the shows," he said. "It was an actor's dream — a steady job and I knew well in advance when I was needed. Meanwhile I could be busy with other things — a one-man Dickens show and a summer repertory theatre, to mention two."

The series, he said, was helpful in giving him an identity as an actor on a national basis — "although people still have a tendency to regard me with some initial apprehension."

"And I, on the other hand, have had to be extremely careful both playing the part and talking about it. It would never do to suggest that a law enforcement officer was acting like a neurotic nut all those years."

Few viewers were aware that he was an Englishman using an American accent.

"An accent, of course, is the way other people talk," he observed. "Accents are part of an actor's business. Nobody gets very excited when an American actor uses a British accent. The trouble is that sometimes it is not done very well."



Morse had worked with "The Fugitive's" producer, Quinn Martin in other series, usually playing heavies including a Roumanian drug peddler and a French smuggler, and using a variety of accents.

"Quinn called one day to say he was sending over a script," Morse said, "and when it came I looked at it but couldn't find a villainous part. I thought someone had switched scripts. Then Quinn called and asked me if I'd play Lieutenant Girard. I was surprised, but said yes."

Barry and his actress wife, Sydney Sturgess maintain apartments in London — which is home base — Los Angeles and Toronto where he worked for years. A son, Hayward, is an actor in England. Their

# He Likes Being a 'Madman'

NEW YORK—The first play Roger Coggio saw, at the age of 15, changed the course of his life and fired him with the desire to become an actor. Having fulfilled that ambition in his native France and in other European countries, Coggio makes his American television debut in "Diary of a Madman," the one-man drama based on the Nicolai Gogol classic, Wednesday from 10 to 11 p.m. on CBS.

Coggio's gift for recitation, even while he was attending elementary school in Lyons, his

home city, attracted considerable attention.

"Since I couldn't afford to study acting," says Coggio, "I began going to the movies and dreaming of becoming an actor. Then I saw my first play at the Theatre des Celestins in Lyons when I was 15. That performance, Mary Chase's 'Harvey,' played by Fernand Gravey, opened up a new world for me. Then and there I decided not to wait any longer. I joined a dramatic group in the suburbs and worked every night. We put

on Clifford Odets' 'Waiting for Lefty,' and soon thereafter I was given parts in radio plays."

Six months later, Coggio went to Paris where he took a job as a factory hand and at the same time attended dramatic school. Roles in Schiller's "Maria Stuart" and another in a film, "Avant le Deluge," followed.

"These two roles marked my beginnings as a professional because until that time I had had to make my living as best I could."

In 1955 Coggio won recognition in Morvan Lebeque's "Les Fiances de la Seine." He then appeared in a number of roles on French television. In 1956 he played in Colette Audry's "Soledad" and the following year in "Night Must Fall." He was invited to join the Theatre National Populaire and spent three years doing a wide variety of plays. It was during this time that he became interested in directing a job he undertook initially in 1959.

"I gave myself a small part in the play," says Coggio of his first directing venture, "but only to keep the payroll down. It was through directing that I learned what acting really meant. If I had a troupe of my

## A Familiar Face On Whatsisname

NEW YORK (AP) — Martin Balsam, ever since the golden days of live television drama, has been a frequent guest in the nation's living rooms. He has played everything from villains to heroes, and it is with a certain wistfulness that he confesses that, while the public constantly recognizes his face, usually they don't know his name.

"Or," said Balsam, sadly, "They call me Ernie—it seems I

bear a certain resemblance to Ernest Borgnine."

But Balsam, an Actors Studio graduate, has in fact been making a theatrical name for himself in the past couple of years. He won an Oscar for his performance in the film, "A Thousand Clowns." Currently he has star billing in the Broadway hit, "You Know I Can't Hear You When The Water's Running."

On Sunday evening he will share the limelight with Maureen Stapleton in one of the current television season's highlights—Truman Capote's play, "Along the Paths of Eden."

Balsam thinks the hour special on ABC will be as effective as Capote's "Christmas Memory" last season—which, incidentally, ABC will rerun next Tuesday night.

The actor, a professional for more than two decades, looks back fondly on the old days of live drama. Later he followed the industry west when it went into filmed series and appeared in guest star roles in everything from Alfred Hitchcock shows to "Dr. Kildare." He made a couple of pilots for series that did not sell, but always hankered to get back on the stage.

Balsam mentioned, almost in passing, that offers of television and screen roles had decreased in number since he won the Oscar.

"Probably they think my price went up," he said. "Actually it didn't move up a penny."

The Capote assignment, to be taped in New York during hours when he was not needed at the theater, came to him, he said, at just the right moment.

"The Broadway show was set, and I was just beginning to get a little restless. Working on the other project took up all the slack."

"Along the Paths of Eden" is a story about a woman in search of a husband who decided that the best place to find one is at funeral services in cemeteries. Balsam plays the widower she meets.

"Capote could have made it anything from comedy to tragedy," Balsam said. "What it does have is poignancy and a lot of truth."

two active careers in one family work out very well.

"We figured out that we have really been together a total of 10 or 12 years," said Morse. "It would be impossible for us to get bored."

His combined experience as a director and a Dickens buff led to Tuesday night's show, a tour of the city in Dicken's time with Sir Michael Redgrave as Dickens.

"The most difficult thing was to find old, unchanged sections of the city — or at least camera angles — without television antennae sticking up or cars rolling into view."

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
