





Saturday, December 1 The Mayor On Regionalism In his comments on the issue of regionalization Mayor Nathan Agostinelli has contributed, not for the first time since his entrance into the public life, and certainly not, we hope, for the last time, a note of that sanity which ought to be part of every community's life. Mayor Agostinelli is no less devoted than any of us, we believe, to the preservation of those values and atmosphere which belong to us because we

the interlocking complexities of modern living constitute a compulsion which neither depends upon politicians for its movement forward nor obeys nostalgic commands to halt and recede. There are problems we in our time have to face which are going to have to be handled in a spirit of cooperation between communities if they are going to be prevented from ruining all communities separately. And it is always the nature of the problem itself - not any attempted command from state or

But he is also, fortunately, aware that

federal government - which is the real compulsion toward cooperation. Mayor Agostinelli is not so foolish as to think that any all-purpose, all-situation law or formula can be set down for meeting the problem of today and tomorrow. He is not so foolish as to think that we can preserve some Manchester of yesterday just by refusing to associate ourselves with any proposition solution which involves the crossing of a town boundary. Nor is he so foolish as to think that everything is going to be inevitably regional. In that extreme direction the eventual emergency would be a drastic need to decentralize again. The best thing Manchester can do, as it faces this twentieth century future, is to try to keep a level stance, free of automatic cant, and an open mind, free of the habit of closing off options before circumstances have been examined. Mayor Agostinelli is proving a good contributor to this kind of community atmosphere.

Preachment And Practice There is one kind of sermonizing text which never seems to have to wait very long for actual demonstration in the field of practical affairs.

It is the kind of text at which former Secretary of State Dean Acheson has become the leading expert in our times And, although there was obviously no direct connection between something he said on educational television the other Sunday night and what happened in the United States Senate on Thursday-it being quite possible that Senator Rus sell Long neither heard nor read the Acheson statement in question - the suitability of the Long action to the Acheson word seems remarkable. In his television appearance, Mr. Acheson was discussing the business of how to get along with Congress. He was saying that things were somewhat different now than they were a few years

One of the differences was, he said, that "there seems to have been a great worry grown up about getting along with Congress. This, I always consider ed to be a waste of time. What you wanted to do is to get your way. And it didn't make much difference whether the Congress liked it or liked you or liked me or not. The point was to accomplish something. All you have to have is some success and they soon stop nipping around and behave."

On Thursday, in the United States Senate, the situation was that a group of Senators who wished to quarrel with some of the provisions of the new social security bill understood it was understood they were to be given their natural opportunity to talk on the bill. While they were enjoying this gentlemanly understanding, and while the one Senator who had been deputized to watch proceedings nonetheless was busy in some casual conversation at the back of a Senate chamber which was practically empty, down in the front of the Chamber, Senator Russell Long of the Louisiana Longs was quietly conducting what seemed to be some routine piece of trivial business. He called up a bill by number, rather than by name, and got it through on the routine voice assents of the handful of Senators in their seats. And then it was discovered that the bill

he had passed in this manner was the Social Security bill on which the opportunity for debate had previously been

guaranteed There was immediate and fuming protest, but, as Dean Acheson had said. once you had what you wanted, once you had got your way, it made little difference whether those with whom you were dealing liked it or not. You got "your way."

After he had got his way, Senator Long had to agree to let another vote be taken on the bill. But, in return for this, those who had wanted to talk at come length about it had to agree to vote on it at a certain time the next day, which meant the bill's opponents had been forced to surrender their power to delay it by their argument. The philosophy thus propounded in the text by Mr. Acheson and thus exemplified in the action by Senator Long is nothing particularly new, but something as old as all the evil in the world. It says the end justifies the means.

Back To The Kid Stuff The kindest way to dispose of the speech President Johnson delivered to the AFL-CIO convention in Florida the other night is to say that it was a speech groomed like the Presidential hair that night-on the slick side again. We don't think it makes very much difference in the Presidential image whether he uses a tight tonic control on his hair or lets it lie relatively loose. But we think he loses when he goes back to the kid stuff in his speech-

If there was any silly political virtue he neglected to claim for himself and his party, any transparent, cozening tribute he failed to make to George Meany and his organizational steamroller, any small political insult he neglected to deliver to the opposition either in the other party or within his own, it was obviously an unintentional over-




