Somebody, of course, will have to pay for that "fine Christmas present" from President Johnson for which Governor Dempsey is so grateful. The "fine Christmas present" is a

package of some \$30,000,000 for the New Haven Railroad, to enable it to keep running until it is ready to enter new ownership and management, and to do a few things about improving the looks and service of the railroad in the in-

But this "fine Christmas present" to the railroad, to its future new owners, and to the people and communities the railroad serves, is going to be paid for by a not very glamorous collection of characters who, being mere taxpayers, do not even get to wear a red suit and white whiskers when they practice their involuntary generosity. It may now be that the last emer-

gency of The New Haven has been met If so, that is cause for public pleasure and satisfaction, so far as the practicali-

There also ought to be a notation that the capacity to grow any given kind of public taxpayer dollars, many of them life — coelanthus, platypus, snail, bird, coming from people who have never even seen The New Haven, let alone ride on it, have been used to make up for the past knavery of some pretty glamorous private management railroad characters and for the visionless stewardship of the bankruptcy trustees.

And out of it all the only guarantee that things will be better in the future is merely that, since the new ownership will be bigger and presumably more responsible, the taxpayers won't have to bail the railroad out again for a long time to come.

We hope that is so. We hope that the new management does something to turn The New Haven back into a railroad people can use with comfort and pleasure. But, to tell the truth, a ride on the lines the future managers of The New Haven now maintain for their own railroads is no particular encouragement to such a wistful hope.

To Right Place, Whatever It is The official policy statement which the National Liberation Front of South Vietnam has now distributed at the United Nations, through the offices of Rumania, a member of the world organization, is a propaganda document through and through. To call it that, however, is not to dis-

qualify it or answer it. We don't think there is ever going to be much real comparison between the real meaning and the real importance of the two documents, but the Declaration of Independence, as it first was launched on the world scene of the time, must have seemed pretty much a propaganda In making propaganda, the policy

statement from the National Liberation Front is not lacking in talent and capacity for catchy phrase and expression. Its sentiments are, for the most part, noble and exalted. Where it descends from the exaltation of its own virtues to the description of the sins of others - like the imperialistic Americans - it will have, unfortunately, a fairly sympathetic readership in many corners of the world.

Finally, there is relatively little capacity, anywhere in this country, for judging what the impact of this particular statement of aims and policies and objectives may mean over in Vietnam, in the context of the complex struggle which is being waged there. One thing we do know, which is that we are afraid that the main decision in the conflict over there is going to be political rather than military. This statement may, then, be good warfare among the people of Vietnam itself; we cannot be sure it is not because it may seem to us wild and propagandistic and remote from hard, reliable fact. It is a statement of a kind of dream. The fact that it may seem an evil dream to us does not mean that it necessarily interprets itself that way to the people We grow less uncertain, less sure of

from the question of the content of the statement, and from the question of what it may mean over in Vietnam, to the significance of the fact that this statement has now been put forward at

the United Nations. This is a fact of considerable unquestioned importance. This particular importance has relatively little to do with the content of the statement, or its possible complexity of purposes.

The importance is this: that the Vietcong political organization has decided upon this particular activity at the particular site of the United Nations. Whether it is 90 per cent propaganda and 10 per cent policy, or the other way around, the thing is that the Vietcong, for some reason, comes to center of the world's set-up for debate, propaganda, negotiation and political maneuver and seeks to present and argue its case

If it is insincerity, if it is attempted trickery, it is at least in the right place. If it is false argument, it is at least being presented in the right forum. The Vietcong at least seem to know that the United Nations is there. We could wish the United States, which is not only a member but a founder of the United Nations, had managed to remember the UN was in existence, before it moved into Vietnam as if there was no

In short, it is evident that public opinion on the war-other than for those who are either hard-core hawks or hard-core doves-is delicately bal-

arroed and easily shiftable. This change in the public's view of the war shows one further thing: a very considerable residue of public willingness to believe official statements on the war's progress, notwithstanding a general feeling that most earlier statements were over-optimistic and even misleading. But this carries with it a strong risk. We believe that, if there is further distillusionment with the accuracy of such official statements, the swing against the war will be sharper than at any time in the past. This underlines the inescapable need for absolute accuracy and frankness on the situation in Vietnam. — CHRISTIAN SCI-

Bob Hope Arrives

DA NANG, Vietnam (AP) -Bob Hope brought his 18th annual Christmas show for U.S. servicemen to Da Nang today to the cheers of 12,000 GIs. The cheers were matched by wolf whistles when Hope trotted out his miniskirted female en-tourage, including actress Ra-quel Welch.

Hope and singer Phil Crosby, wigged and carrying antiwar signs, drew roars of approval as they ribbed the peace demon-strators back home. Hope told the Marines, soldiers and airmen, many of whom came to the show car-rying Mis rifles: "Don't worry about the riots in the States. You'll be sent to survival school before you go back there."

It was Hope's 18th Christmas with the troops overseas since the Berlin siriff of 1948. His schedule calls for 22 shows in 13 days plus visits to field hospitals and hospital orange gown drew roars as she sang, "I am a woman." At the end of the two-hour show, she led the huge audience in "Silent

Night."
Then Hope and the others went to talk to wounded servicemen aboard the hospital ship Sanctuary in Da Nang harbor, at the Navy station hospital and at the 1st Medical Detachment.
