The 37th annual Christmas Concert brought a large but by no means capacity audience to Bailey Auditorium to hear the musical efforts of the high school students under the direction of Martha White and Steven Podgorak. Miss White handled the vocal groups while Mr. Podgorak was in charge of the instrumentalists.

Things started with an overture by the orchestra. Frankly, it didn't go too well. It was a very difficult, modern arrangement of Christmas tunes with which a fully trained, professional orchestra would have had trouble, and the choice was unfortunate for it was the only number the orchestra was to play.

The band was also featured and sounded better, of course, but then it stuck to rather conventional arrangements that were nothing like so difficult as the orchestral offering.

As usual, most of the evening was devoted to vocal music. The Round Table Singers were featured in the first half of the program, offering "Adeste Fideles" as a processional, and half a dozen other numbers. Well, Of these, I enjoyed the carol "Auf dem Berge" (sung in German) and Gustav Holst's "Christmas Day" the most. The 50-member group did everything well, though there were perhaps a variety of music ranging from Bach and Palestrina to Leroy Anderson. Naturally, the audience enjoyed Anderson's "Sleigh Ride" best, but I would give the nod to Palestine Pro's "Adoramus Te Christe." There were nine other numbers, all done with a fine sense of style. 70 Seeking Curtis' Job

A total of 70 "contenders" have been made in the search for a successor to Superintendent of Schools William H. Curtis, and the applicants are now being narrowed to six or eight of the best qualified persons. The school board learned last night.

Walton Dool, chairman of the personnel finance committee, reported that the board can expect to receive a synopses and recommendations on the candidates around the middle of January.

Those seeking the post are first being screened by a professional consultant hired by the board in October at \$1,000 fee.

He is Fred A. A. MacKinnon, dean of the School of Education at Trinity College, Hartford.

Dool, who is acting as the board's liaison during the preliminary phase of the selection process, quoted Prof. MacKinnon as saying there appear to be "some very good candidates" for the position.

After the screening weeds the list down to the half dozen or so best qualified men, the full board will hold face-to-face interviews with the remaining applicants.

The final selection, by secret ballot vote of the members, will probably take place in February.

Sgt. Curtis will retire at the end of the current school year. He has been Manchester's superintendent since 1960, and is serving this year as president of the American Association of School Administrators, the national superintendents' organization.

Rham District

Basic Building Plan Gets New Vote Jan. 30

The Regional District Board of Education voted last night after lengthy discussion to bring the basic plan for building additional educational space at the Rham Junior-Senior High School to another referendum in the three towns on Jan. 30.

The plan to be presented to the voters of the three towns will be the same basic plan that was defeated by a 7-0 margin in the Dec. 4 referendum.

Two letters were received by the board on the defeated referendum. The first read was from the Board of Selectmen which proposed that a study committee be formed to include one member of the Board of Finance and one member of the Regional Board of Education from each town to study the possibilities and needs prior to any construction at Rham.

Hebron First Selectman P. John Perham attended the meeting and entered into discussion with the board on the reasons for disapproval of the plans was that it did not include a large enough auditorium. He suggested that voters would accept a plan that included a 1200-seat auditorium and gym with facilities for the additional rooms needed to expand the educational facilities.

Low Vote Noted During discussion, Board Chairman Robert Petre commented that he did not feel the vote was the true feeling of the voters. Less than 25 per cent of the eligible voters cast ballots during the referendum and the board was in agreement that the referendum language was confusing. It was also pointed out that many meetings were arranged for informing the various town agencies and the public but were poorly attended.

Colonial Rd. Private Way

The extension of Colonial Rd. into Green Manor's Industrial Park is not a public way and will remain a private road until it is accepted by the town.

That acceptance date will be sometime in the future, perhaps a year or more, and depends on the construction of the proposed Oakland-Parker Sta. connector.

The extension, completed except for some grading to east of Green Manor's private road crossing, was constructed at a \$94,282 cost. The town contributed 50 per cent, or \$47,141, under a June 4, 1967 appropriation, the first under the town's Industrial Guidelines.

Projected plans call for the abandonment of that section of Parker St. which runs past Colonial Board and Lydell & Foulds from Colonial Rd. to the New Haven Railroad's public crossing.

FOUND OF TURTLE

HILO, Hawaii (AP) — A 76-pound turtle, possibly a record for local waters, was brought in in November by a fishing boat.

The turtle was identified as a Pacific leatherback, so named because the exterior of the shell has a leathery rather than bony texture.

The species has been found to grow as large as 1,000 pounds in waters further south.

The turtle in question was bought by a restaurant, where it will appear on the menu as cutlets and soup.

HARTFORD (AP)—The Connecticut Supreme Court criticized a judge today for trying a case after he failed to arrange an out-of-court settlement.

However, it upheld the judge's decision. The ruling by the state's highest court affirmed the public some idea of what goes on in a judge's chambers when he meets with lawyers on both sides of a lawsuit.

This case was a \$85,000 suit brought by Marilyn Krattenstein of Hartford against G. Fox & Co., Inc. Mrs. Krattenstein claimed she suffered burns on her arms and leg when a waitress in a G. Fox restaurant spilled coffee on her.

Superior Court Judge Aaron J. Palmer was assigned to try the case, and just before it was to come up for trial, he invited the lawyers for Mrs. Krattenstein and the department store to discuss the case in his chambers.

At the conference, the law court "explained the nature of the case, each stated what he expected to prove at the trial and each disclosed his opinion adjusting difference and coming to the value of the case for promising and setting suits at the conference," the court said.

But since Mrs. Krattenstein's lawyer did not raise the issue of Palmer's qualifications until after the case was decided, the supreme court said it would not reverse Palmer's decision.

Antique Business in Home Denied by Zoning Board

The Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) last night denied a request from Mrs. James Lettice, 2 Al-pine St., for permission to convert her home to an antique business in her home.

The vote to deny was 3 to 2 and was on the basis that an unusual hardship stemming from the topography of the parcel was proved.

The ZBA, by unanimous vote, tabled one application and approved all others.

The tabled application was from the State of Connecticut, for a variance to diminish the property of Edward J. Preziosi at 10 Kestey St., in the path of Rt. 6.

The tabling action was required because no representative of the State Highway Department appeared to plead the case.

The ZBA, apparently annoyed at what it considered a discourtesy, instructed Town Planner Joseph Tamany to send a letter to the State Highway Department, expressing the agency's displeasure.

A new hearing will be scheduled for next month.

Preziosi was present last night, ready to voice his opposition to the variance request, which would take 500 sq. ft. of his property and which would cause his front entrance to be only five feet from the new highway.

State regulations require the State Highway Department to acquire the entire parcel when a request for diminishing the area is denied. The ZBA, in all previous actions, has followed the wishes of the property owners in its decision on the possibility of requiring certification of plot plans in the future, to prevent a repetition of the error.

S. Jale A. Wallin, a variance to divide a parcel at 760 Center St. into two lots, each with less than 100 feet of frontage, was denied.

The existing parcel has 140 feet frontage and is 120 feet deep. A dwelling stands on the westerly portion, to be made into a lot with 70 feet frontage. The other lot will have 75 feet frontage and a new dwelling will be constructed on it. Regulations require lots with 100 feet frontage.

One lot will have an area of 9,000 square feet and the other will have an area of 8,400 square feet. Regulations call for a minimum area of 12,000 square feet in that Residence Area.

The variance was granted on the basis of topographical hard-ship.

S. Sun Oil Co., a special exception and a Certificate of Approval for a new three-bay station at 50 Tolland Tpke. The new station will replace an existing one, erected in 1925. The Kinsmen of Jesus 2

The Critical Clan in Nazareth

Editor's Note—Jesus lived in the midst of a warm and protective family. Although compassionate, the relatives in Nazareth were sometimes skeptical and sometimes critical. The following is the second of a two-part Christmas series dealing with the kinsmen of Christ.

Like intermittent scenes clipped from film reel, the poignant domestic drama unfolds. It shows Jesus in the midst of a large, close-knit and concerned clan.

The home folks didn't always understand him, and were sometimes critical. But it was a fervently affectionate tribe there in the upper village of Nazareth, including at least a half dozen members Jesus' own age, a vigorous brood growing up "like silver shoes around the table," as the Psalmist declares.

Young and old, they clung together, even when disagreeing. They sought to shield Jesus in that fold.

A succession of swift, brief glimpses interspersed through the gospel accounts, show both the strong attachments of that Davidic clan, and also the painful pull of duty beyond it.

Scene I: A familiar episode, it took place in Jesus' boyhood on one of those ritual pilgrimages to Jerusalem for the Passover celebration, a merry, festive trip which drew economically able Jews made each spring.

Scene II: "He came to his own home, and his own people received him not," the gospel of John reports. This happened after the initial phases of his ministry in the outlying towns of Galilee had stirred wide attention.

Returning to Nazareth, he proclaimed release to the captives. He chose a trenchant passage from the prophet Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord has anointed me to preach good news to the poor..."

Relieved, but annoyed at the distress he had caused them, his mother demanded, "Son, why have you treated us so? Behold, your father and I have been looking for you anxiously."

He looked back toward them, his eyes caressing them, but that other wider responsibility held him. "Who are my mother and my brothers?" Gazing about at the people, strangers from far and near, he spread his arms and added:

Hebron Conditions Adopted on Nurse Plan

The Hebron Board of Education at its meeting last week adopted the several conditions which will be a part of any relationship between the elementary schools and a Public Health Nursing Agency as is presently being proposed by the Public Health Advisory Committee.

Although these conditions are being adopted, the board still feels that it would prefer to provide for the school health program and nursing service as it has in the past.

If school nursing services did come under a Public Health Nursing Agency as is presently being proposed by the Public Health Advisory Committee, all educational policies and plans regarding the school health program would be approved by the Board of Education, and mutual planning by the nurse, school medical advisor and the school administration should be helpful in the development of board policy.

Also, school administration would be responsible for the administration of the total school health program; the nurse would be directly responsible for service to the school administration and the functions of the nurse would be essentially the same as though the board was the employing agency.

In addition, the school board would be represented on the Public Health Nursing Board and a written contract would be drawn between the school board and the nursing agency. The contract would include the amount of time allocated to the school nursing service within and outside the school building, staff responsibilities of the nurse, provision for procedure in the event problems arise on nursing personnel, policies of quality of service, the health program and policies, the responsibilities of the Board of Education, the nurse and the dates covered in the agreement.

Lunch Program The Board of Education has named an advisory committee comprising Gordon Lassow, Marvin Ross and Edward Patrick to look into the serving of hot lunches in the two elementary schools. The school lunch program will not be started until the school year begins in September.

The board has instructed the secretary to write the Board of Selectmen asking it to inquire of state authorities about recommendations for safety of school children and buses entering and leaving school grounds. An eighth bus will be added to the school bus fleet when the two schools open on Jan. 2, 1968. Bus schedules will be posted this week.

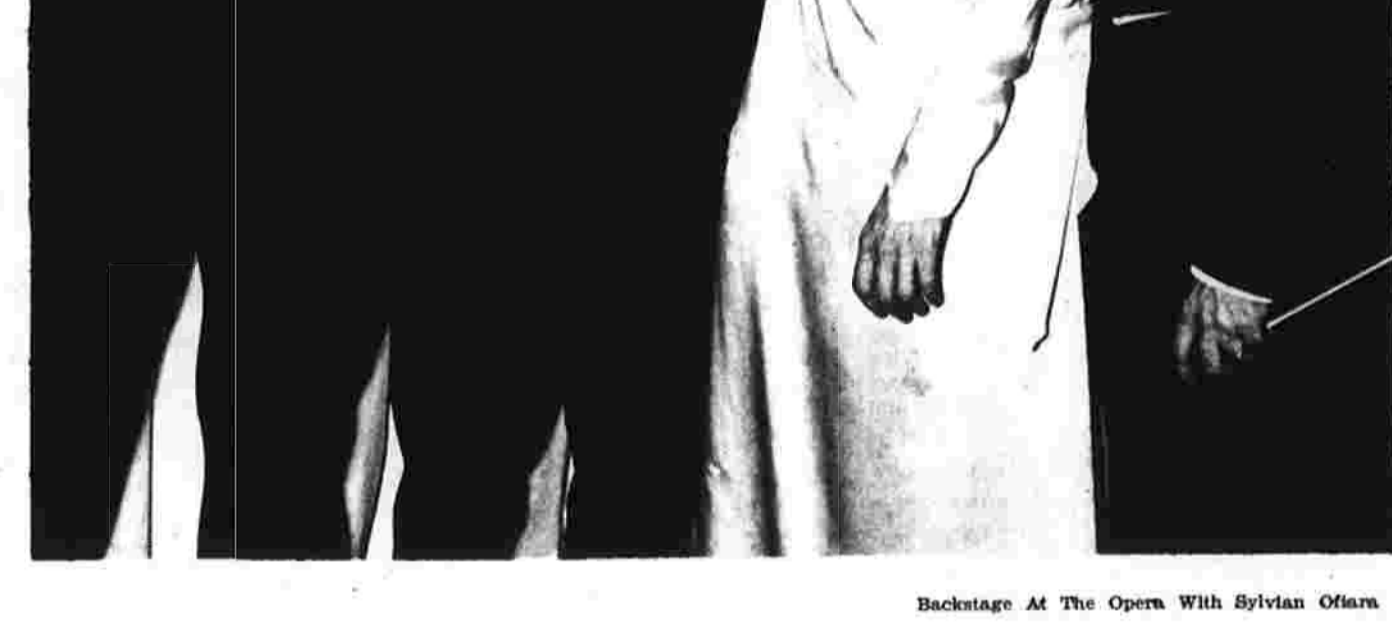

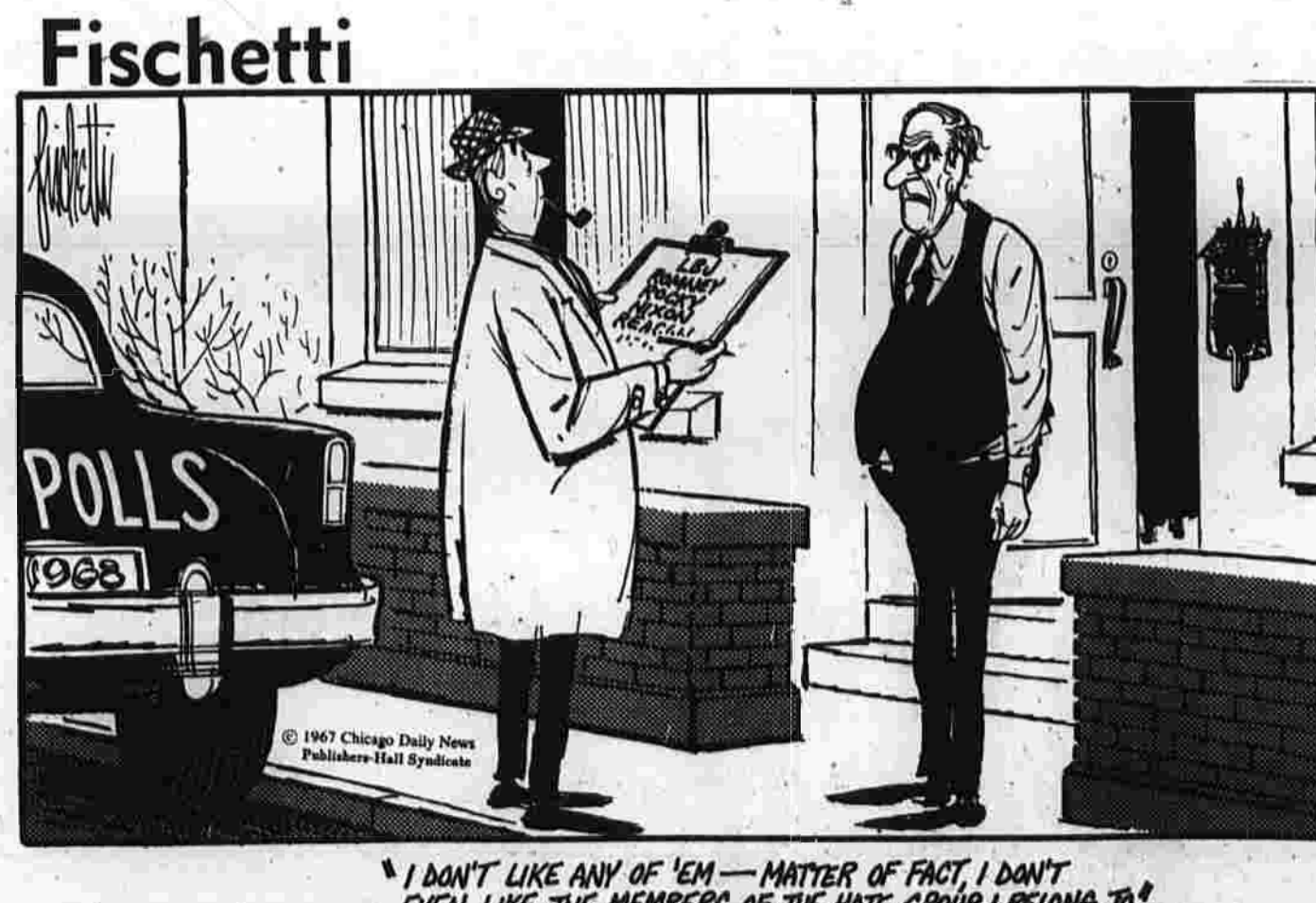

Vernon \$5,000 Insurance Benefit Retained for Town Firemen

On recommendation of the Insurance Advisory Board, the Board of Representatives last night voted to retain the \$5,000 accidental death benefit for the town's volunteer firemen.

The board also voted that all coverages of the existing policy "Group Accident Disability" be cancelled.

A special study was made by the fire department committee of the board after it was advised that the firemen were covered under the Workmen's Compensation Act instituted Oct. 1 of this year.

Atty. Frank McCoy, chairman of the committee, pointed out to the board that the benefits under the new legislation are considerably in excess of those which were available under the old policy.

Under the old policy, weekly benefits for total disability were based on 80 per cent of the firemen's average wage at his regular job. Full payment was included of all related medical expenses, payment of limbs, loss of use of limbs, cosmetic disfigurement. Also included was payment of benefits to a dependent widow for life.

McCoy said a review of the coverages for other town employees reveals that they all have workmen's compensation and also have at least \$5,000 life insurance coverage.

The chairman further pointed out that although the firemen are volunteers, and in a sense, part-time employees, it would certainly seem reasonable, especially in view of their hazardous work, to continue the \$5,000 accidental death life insurance coverage. This actually covers them only while in the performance of their duties.

The insurance underwriters Association is now in the process of doing a survey on the overall fire department situation in town.

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3 Killed As Molten Iron Dips

"I believe I saw the bodies of two children, three women and a man," he said.

Randall said he was able to aid several of the panic-stricken persons inside. "I was just inside the store when a woman ran in from outside. I think she had a child in the rear of the car in a house behind the market. There was nothing but flames there. I grabbed her. When she struggled to get free I pushed her out of the store," he said.

Warren Bebbington, who was shopping with his wife and child inside the market told how they escaped.

"I looked up and saw this huge ball of fire at the rear of the store," he said. "I grabbed my wife and child and ran out with them. Someone ran out with me. One of the dead was identified as Sherry Tilton, 15, who lived alone in a house behind the market. Firemen said the girl was trapped in a back bedroom of the home, when the roof fell in on her.

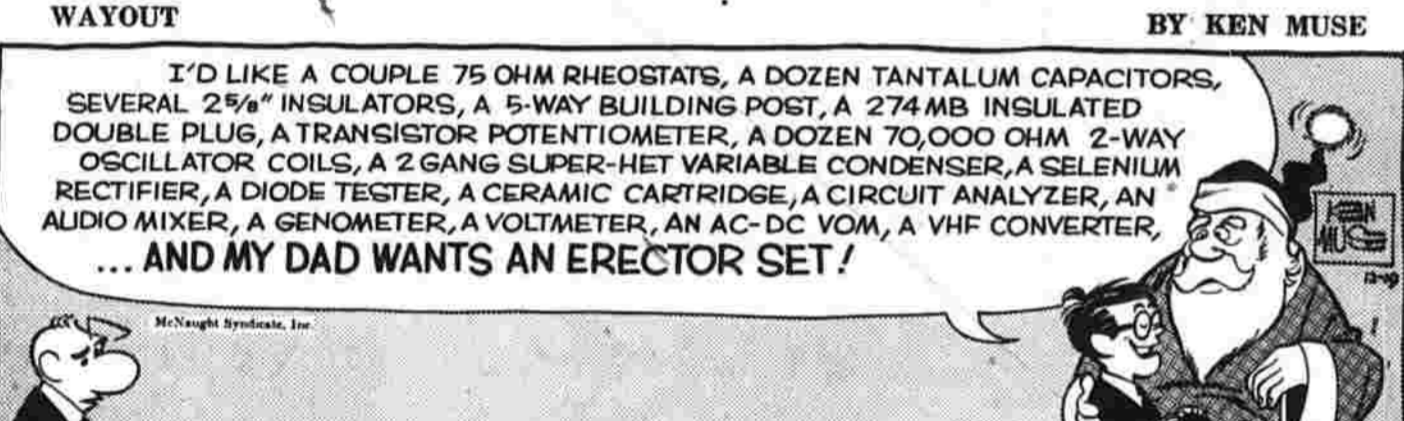

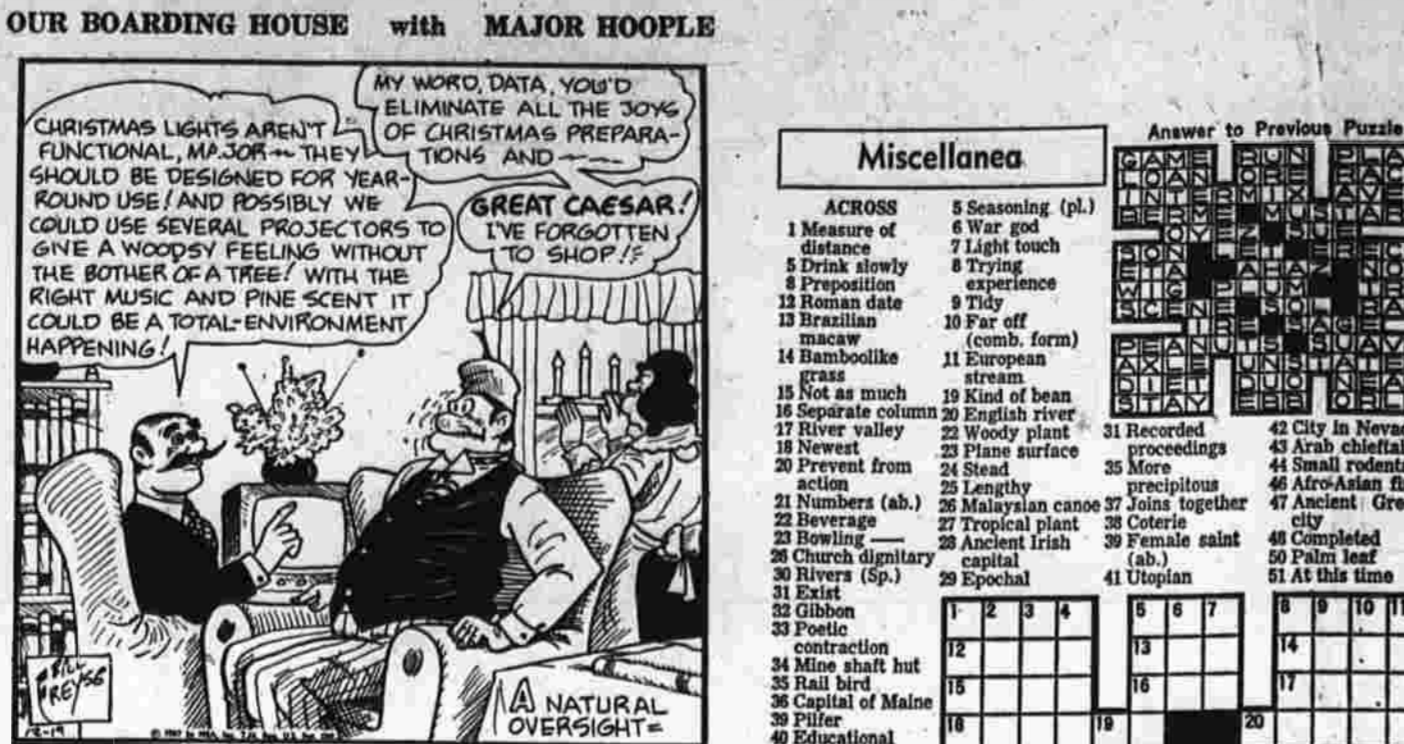

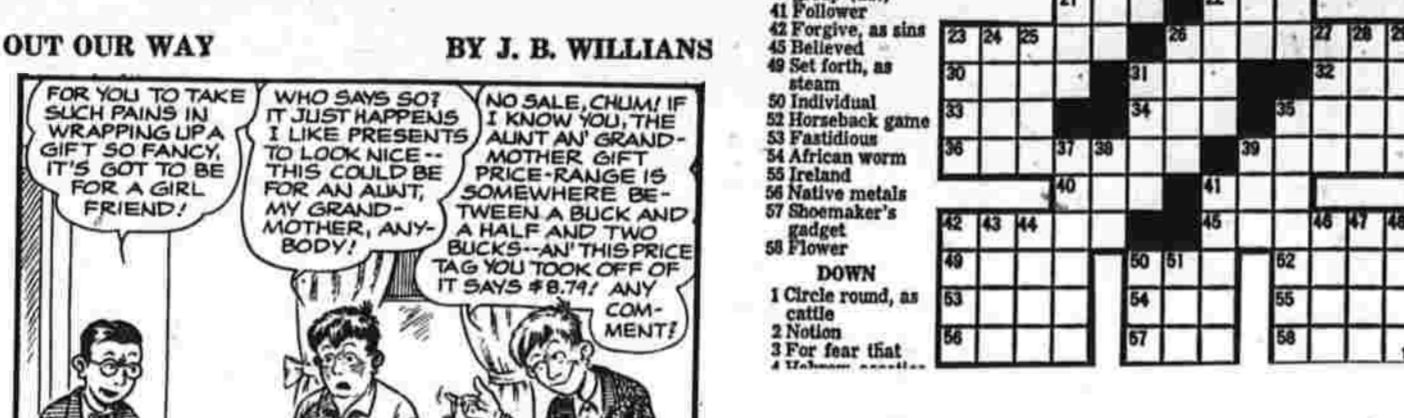

MORROW (AP) — Gov. George Romney said today his four of five European capitals, including a long talk with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, has encouraged him to believe in the possibility of finding a political solution for the Vietnam war.

"A satisfactory solution for Vietnam must be reached not purely military but also political means," Romney said as he left Moscow for Israel.

"Broadly speaking, on my European trip I found uncertainty and concern about our foreign policy," said Romney, who has visited Warsaw, Paris, Bonn and London, as well as Moscow.

"In none of my talks," Romney said, "has there been any criticism on my part of American policy in Europe."

Beausire was married and the father of three children.

An autopsy performed at Hartford Hospital revealed the cause of death was a 3.2 caliber bullet wound in the chest. A second and reportedly struck Beausire in the thumb.

Police said indications were that Beausire had been shot at close range. They speculated that he had been killed somewhere other than where the body was discovered.
