Helping to speed Christmas mail to its destination is the conveyor belt with a "brain" at the new Air Mail Facility at San Francisco's Airport. Both incoming and outgoing mail drops down chutes and is carried by belt to a control panel which reads the proper switch-off point, an electronic device reads the code on the belt and triggers a blade (right) to sweep the mail in a different direction. Belt's message is automatically erased. Bags can be sent to any of 20 destinations in or out of the building without any hand labor. Similar but smaller systems, developed by Goodyear, are in use in Memphis, Tenn., and New York City post offices. The belt also serves commercial firms in sorting and dispatching of packaged items.

**Negro Comic George Kirby Recalls The Tough Times**  
NEW YORK (AP) — In 1940 where's my foxhole? I told him, "You're standing on it, sir. All you have to do is remove the big dream."  
I wanted to become the first Negro comedian to stand flat-footed in front of a microphone and do my act without having to break into a buck and wing dance, roll my eyes or wear funny clothes," recalled Kirby, recently appearing at the Royal Ellington, Sophie Tucker, Cab Calloway, Lena Horne, Coontz, Basie, and Nat King Cole.  
Now famed for his impressions, Kirby has a repertoire of more than 100 impersonations, ranging from Zsa Zsa Pitts and Betty Davis to Charles Boyer, Jimmy Durante and Peggy Lee. He spends up to six months studying the voice and personality of a celebrity before incorporating an impression of him into his act.  
Although he had pioneered in adding stature and dignity of role to Negro entertainers, he is profoundly grateful to past stars of his race.  
"I owe a lot to the old-time performers, such as Stepin Fetchit and Bill Robinson, and many, many others," he said. "They were in the back door so that we could walk in the front door."

## Is Christmas Unconstitutional?

NEW YORK (AP) — Debate has broken out in various parts of the country this holiday season over the question: "Is Christmas unconstitutional?"  
A number of people argue that some aspects of it are, including Christmas decorations with a religious motif in public places such as schools.  
Others contend that school singing of Christmas carols as a part of the Christmas program is unconstitutional and should be avoided. Reaction in general was outraged. Said Sheriff Lehigh Wilson of Bevard County: "If I am handed a warrant to arrest some teacher, somebody else will have to serve it—won't it?"  
In Eugene, Ore., defenders of the constitution obtained a court order forbidding the city to light up a 60-foot cross which is erected each year in a municipal park. City officials turned on the lights and appealed to the state Supreme Court.  
The Florida branch of the American Civil Liberties Union looked unbrave when one of its children brought home a program indicating that traditional carols would form a part of a school Christmas program.  
Mayor Norman A. Myers of Overland, Mo., was stunned by a letter from two lawyers demanding a ruling on constitutional grounds, the removal of a nativity scene from the City Hall lawn.  
The mayor said he would ignore the letter and commented: "If this is the type of constitution we are living under, it certainly is in line for revision."  
In Duluth, Minn., an unbeliever named Garry DeYoung, 44, took umbrage when one of his children brought home a program indicating that traditional carols would form a part of a school Christmas program.  
DeYoung asserted that "the school's use of a religious holiday to present a religiously oriented program constitutes an affront to non-Christians and is a direct violation of the first amendment."  
After taking counsel with the school board attorney, Principal Donald Olson deleted the carols from the program.  
The Florida branch of the American Civil Liberties Union advised school officials throughout the state that Christmas programs with a religious content are unconstitutional and should be avoided. Reaction in general

Funeral services will be Thursday.

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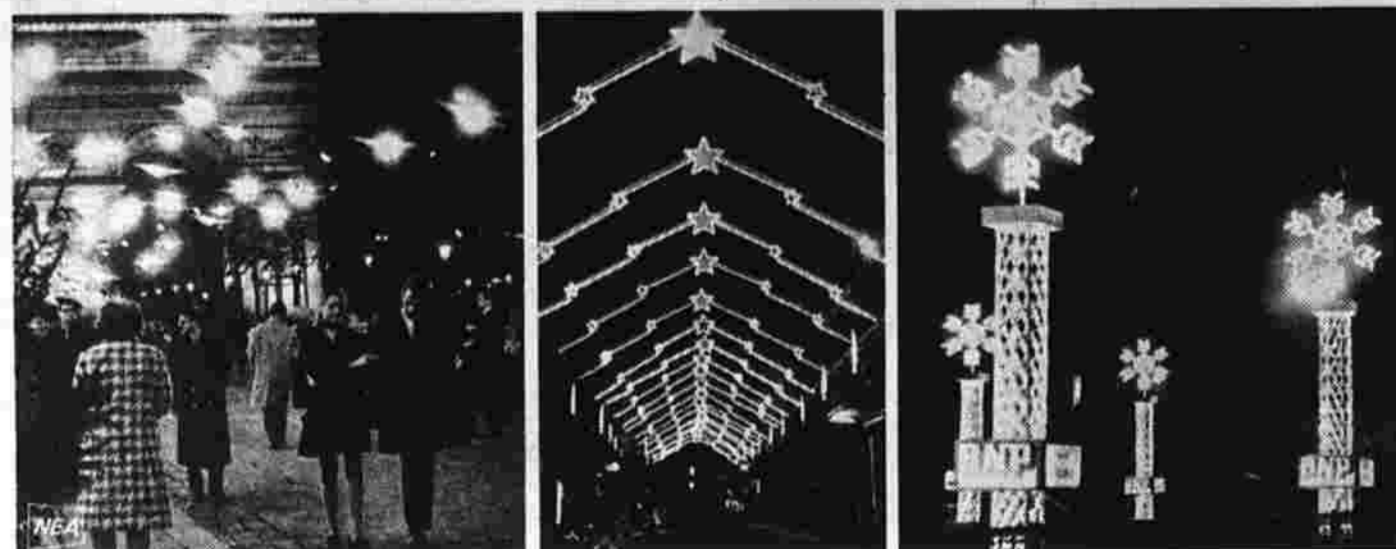

**Stamp Face Change**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — The change in postal rates, effective Jan. 7, also will mean a change in presidents portrayed on first-class stamps, with Franklin D. Roosevelt replacing George Washington.

The letter rate will go from 5 to 6 cents. The Post Office said the present 6-cent Roosevelt stamp won't be changed when the new rate becomes effective. Washington has been on the 6-cent, first-class stamp since 1962 when the letter rate went from 4 to 5 cents.

Although Washington no longer will be portrayed on the first-class stamp he remains the president whose likeness has appeared on more stamps than any other chief executive—33, with 26 for Abraham Lincoln and 13 for Thomas Jefferson. Traditionally, but not always, Washington has been on the basic letter-rate stamp.

**Language Courses**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — A new survey says Russian-language courses are being offered in one-third of American public schools systems which have 12,000 or more pupils.

No African languages are being taught in the 400 schools surveyed by the National Education Association. Eleven of the schools reported they offer courses in Chinese, 6 in Hebrew and 1 in Arabic. Almost three-fifths of the elementary schools surveyed offer instruction in one or more foreign languages.

### Number Worries Bankers

#### About 17 Billion Checks Written in U.S. This Year

NEW YORK (AP) — American banks wrote about 17 billion checks this year, an amount bankers seriously believe is close to the maximum that can be handled efficiently. That, however, is only the beginning of the problem. It gets worse. Americans add another billion checks to that total each year, threatening to inundate the bill payment system in a flood of signatures. How long can it go on? Nobody dares to guess, but some banking authorities feel the system of using checks is no more up to date than the Post Office. A vice president of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, John Clarke, says the system originated as an improvisation of paper does clog the arteries of commerce, alternatives are ready. And, as has been publicized widely, the soundest alternative may be to substitute electronics for paper.

essential information regarding personal and business finance. In effect they would be utilities. From the utilities would run communications lines to electronic devices at retail stores, banks, other commercial outlets and even private homes. And from these sites instructions would go to the computer to debit one account and credit another.

This would take place, for example, when a person bought a car or even a pair of shoes. The computer would be instructed to transfer funds from the purchaser's account to that of the car dealer or shoe retailer. The transfer would merely be a bookkeeping one. No check or money would change hands. As a result, fewer checks would be used and the strain on banks would be relieved.

Much still needs to be done, or the system could be tried. Poolproof methods of identification must be devised. Hardware must be developed to activate the computers. Legal safeguards against access to personal information must be developed. And, finally, who would run the computer utilities—the public or private sector?

proceeds. Clarke is among those seriously studying this new method. In his view, as described at a recent credit conference here, the less-check society—we might never have a checkless society, he feels—is now becoming technologically possible. The reward, as he sees it, could be a discount to consumers who use the instant pay system. Such discounts for early payment already exist in the commercial world. The criterion is there.

"It seems to me," said Clarke, "that the cost of a consumer discount to the retailer is to be preferred by him over that of a delayed payment, simply because it's less expensive for him."

The retailer would receive immediate use of the funds instead of waiting for the check to be deposited. He would save on bookkeeping costs. He would save on paper work. He would save time and energy.

The mechanics of the system might appear complex, but only because there is nothing with which to compare it. Basically, it would involve the use of high-speed communications wires and electronic computers. These computers would be located throughout the country and filled with data on credit records, bank balances and other

Personality Is Based on Yesterdays

NEW YORK (AP)—Which is more important—yesterday, today, or tomorrow?

Well, tomorrow may never come, so one can't be certain of its value.

Today is here now, but it tapers so briefly and flies so quickly that it is gone, often before we are fully aware of its meaning.

And that leaves us yesterday, the day which, as we grow older, comes to have the biggest imprint on our lives. It is all our memorable yesterdays, incessantly strained through memory's bright sieve, what has given the individual pattern to our personalities and made us what we are.

You've sipped a lot of yesterdays' yourself if you can look back and remember when: Every few years some bewhiskered, addled old-timer would announce he was the famous bank robber, Jesse James, still alive.

A mother who wanted her son to grow up to be a genius stuffed him with fish as often as possible because fish was supposed to be good brain food.

Butchers almost had to give calves' liver away, because it was eaten only by cats and people so desperately poor they could afford nothing else.

No French leader dared knock the United States, because he knew here was where he had to float a loan to keep his country from bankruptcy.

Kids had as much fun sliding down a snow-covered hill on a pair of barrel staves as their own children do now going to an expensive ski resort.

Men worked hard 50 or 60 or more hours a week and looked forward to Sunday, because it was the one time in the week they could take a long, restful afternoon nap.

Without those naps they couldn't have faced another Monday. In 1927, Grete Garbo and John Gilbert appeared in "The Flesh and the Devil," and lanky young Gary Cooper got his first leading role in "Arizona Bound."

Until then Gary had specialized in being shot of gasping horses for \$10 a day, plus free studio liniment.

Practically every boy in America carried in his pockets a top, some string, several marbles and a pocket knife. No one worried about the knife, however, as it didn't contain a switchblade, and the boy used it only to whittle or play mumblety-peg.

More men smoked cigars than cigarettes, and probably more chewed tobacco than smoked either.

There was no more delicate joy on earth to a small lad wearing itchy woolen underwear than to pause on his way home from school in winter and rub his back against the rough bark of an oak or elm tree.

The lamplighter came by at dusk and lit the street gas lights with a match affixed to a long pole. He could usually do it without having to dismount from his bicycle. What ever happened to those long-gone lamplighters anyway? Do they still have the same job in heaven, or did all their ghosts become fireflies?

Most of the mail a farmer got from Washington, D.C., contained free seeds from his congressman, not government forms to fill out.

Salome.. Ambitious Aunt of Jesus

Editor's Note—Some deserted Christ, but throughout his brief ministry on earth, Salome, his ambitious but faithful aunt, stayed by him, steadfast to her faith. Following is the third of a five-part Christmas series dealing with the Kinsmen of Christ.

She was daring, venturesome, idealistic, brimming with energy. She was a woman of property. She apparently was ambitious and something of a firebrand. She also was Jesus' aunt.

They shared the same blood, by descent, and he, by commitment, joined it with others—the hungry, the strangers, the naked, the prisoners.

"As you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me," he said.

The fervent Galilean linked himself by intention with the down-trodden, the poor, the pursuers of peace and justice, but he also had natural ties given him by birth. Not all of them condoned his chosen involvement.

But his aunt did. She did so with majestic expectations, and eventually, with sobered realism.

She stuck close to him during the three years of his swift, momentous ministry, and was among the well-off women who, as reported in Luke 8:30, financed it "out of their means."

He would build a bigger, nobler line. She could depend on it. After all, he was her nephew.

Things hadn't turned out as Salome had expected, or wanted. But whatever kind of dynasty Jesus was establishing, she believed in it. It would be a good one, including all those unfortunate sufferers he equated with himself.

She recognized that Jesus and John held a special place of confidence with Jesus, along with Peter. John especially was the "disciple that Jesus loved."

He was readily attentive. "What do you want?"

She put it bluntly, like an older, counseled, accustomed to being heeded. "Command that these two sons of mine may sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your kingdom."

It seemed entirely reasonable to her, considering not only the family connections, but also the able diligence of her sons. It also was sound organizational planning to get major cabinet officers picked in advance.

Jesus looked fondly at his aunt, and slowly shook his head. "You do not know what you are asking." He turned to James and John. "Are you able to drink the cup that I am to drink?"

Salome matched the fervor of her sons, absorbing the fervor of power, and she was a practical

WASHINGTON (AP)—Which federal department aids the elderly, helps the member-man and promotes livestock production—all at the same time? It's the Treasury Department and it does these and other jobs through tax relief and tax incentives. Officials don't particularly relish the task and would like to give it up to experts in these fields.

They relish the long list of bills awaiting Congress' return next year which would provide a variety of tax credits ranging from undergrowth transmission lines to anti-pollution devices and higher education. And they have a strong ally in Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the House Ways and Means Committee, who contends a tax incentive to mobilize more than back-door spending

million yearly alone. Other forms of tax relief run into the billions. President Johnson could ask for an overhaul of some tax incentives when he submits his promised tax-revision bill to Congress next year.

Stanley S. Burry, a former Harvard University professor and now assistant Treasury secretary for tax policy, has placed his department on record against tax incentives to solve the nation's social ills. He and other Treasury officials, like Mills, prefer the direct approach. "The immediate leap to the tax solution serves only to stultify thinking about these social problems," Burry has said.

And once the leap is made there's no chance to explore details of a program each year as urged by the rest of the nation's taxpayers and increases the deferral of spending were involved. The Treasury has no overall estimate of the tax loss from tax credits and other incentives but "Our progress in space exploration is not really an appealing one to the Treasury Department," he added.

A tax system, Burry said, is presumably designed to raise money but at present is more like a spending system couched in tax language.

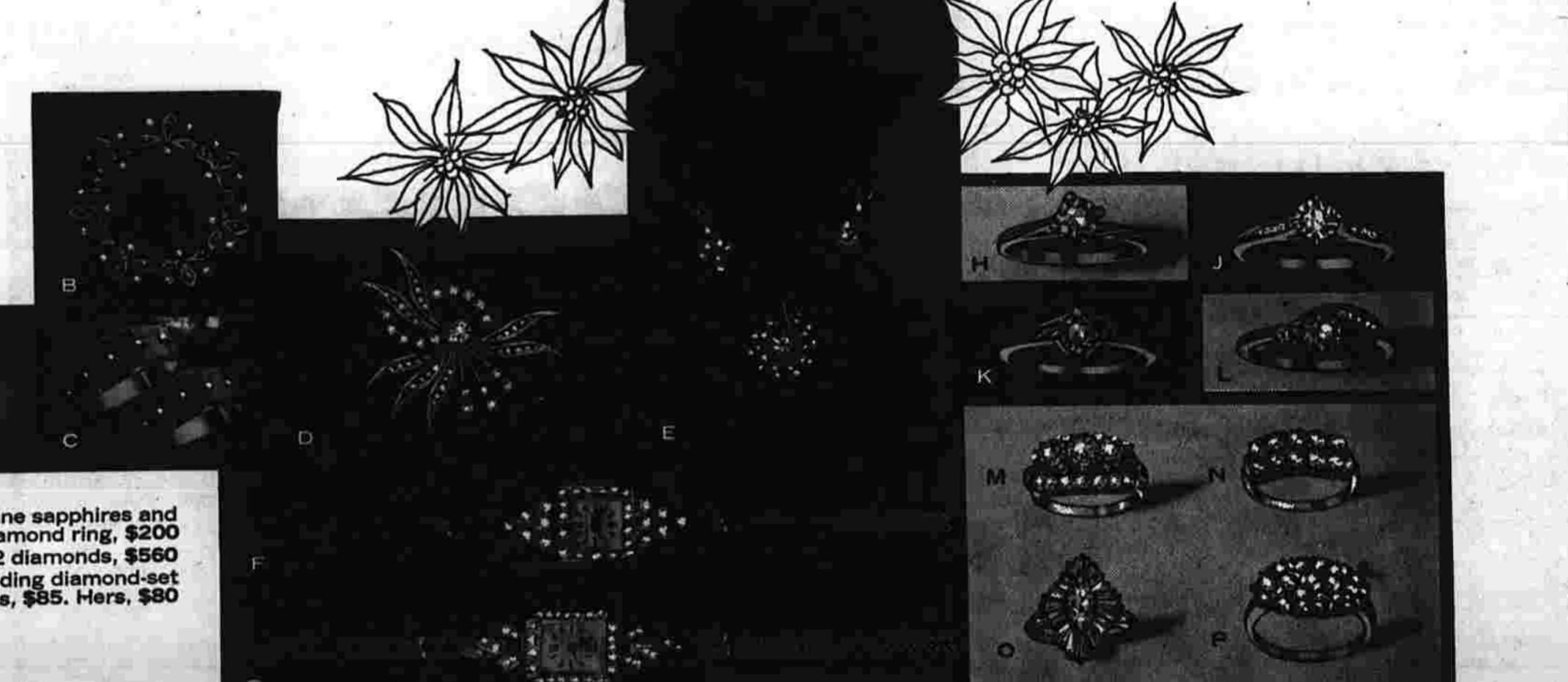

### Xmas Sales Should Show Consumer Purse Loosening

NEW YORK (AP) — If the loosening of the consumer purse strings is to take place on a large scale, as forecast and anticipated by merchants for months now, it should show up in Christmas sales.

The retailers have a lot going for them this year. Not the least, perhaps, are credit cards, which make impulse buying almost "dangerously" easy and conveniently postpone payment until after Christmas.

These plastic disks have been handed out like calling cards this year, many thousands of them having been mailed without request to individuals who need only affix their signatures before using.

A factor that tends to make merchants merry is the rate of consumer savings. For more than a year Americans have been banking at a very high rate. They now have the money to spend and merchants hope to tempt them.

On the other hand, if the tight-fistedness prevails through Christmas it is going to be a lesson for everyone in just how serious is the malaise that some claim has afflicted the acquisitive American.

For reasons that sociologists and economists have been studying with growing curiosity, the November retail sales were distinctly higher than in October.

The November total of \$28.8 billion—which includes everything from cigarettes to cars—was an increase of \$60 million over October. But still it wasn't all that good, for October was a terrible sales month.

The upward trend, however, has brought much joy to the hearts of merchants, and the National Retail Merchants Association forecasts that Christmas shoppers will spend about \$4.5 billion in department stores alone.

The importance of Christmas to merchants is appreciated when it is realized that the figure projected by the N.R.M.A. is equal to about 17 per cent of a

"I was able to learn Western instruments in six months, but it has taken me years to master many African instruments."

Kubik already has visited 14 African countries in his search for music for the phonographic archives of the Austrian Academy of Science in Vienna, the world's oldest music library.

He plans to spend three months in Uganda, where his studies include a group of blind African musicians who have a deep knowledge of the musical traditions of some of this country's tribes.

"I have just finished recording 1,200 musical items in Malawi," he said. "Even then I could not cover all the country's musical heritage."

Dragging In River Continues

POINT PLEASANT, W.Va. (AP)—Small boats continued to drag the Ohio River today downstream from the collapsed suspension bridge here while divers attempted to free wrecked autos from the mangrove and concrete 40 feet under water.

The divers use torches to cut the sunken steel girders into workable lengths, which are then hauled up by 100-ton floating derricks. Officials estimate it may take several months to clear all debris from the river bottom.

Searchers recovered two more bodies Tuesday night, raising the number of known dead from the bridge collapse last Friday to 22.

The latest victims were identified as Julius O. Bennett of Rt. 3, Walnut Cove, N.C., and Gene Mabe of High Point, N.C.

The bridge was loaded with bumper-to-bumper traffic on Tuesday when it was built to be broken. Civil Defense personnel estimate 38 persons are still missing.

An emergency shuttle service across the New York Central Railroad bridge 300 yards upstream of the collapsed bridge is continuing. Officials hope this will ease some of the traffic on the Pomperoy, Ohio-Mason, W.Va. bridge 20 miles north of here.

Meanwhile in Washington, Highway Administrator Lowell Bidwell announced he would appoint a federal panel to investigate the bridge collapse.

Sen. Jennings Randolph, D-W.Va., said the Senate Committee on Public Works and General Investigations would investigate bridge construction standards throughout the United States.

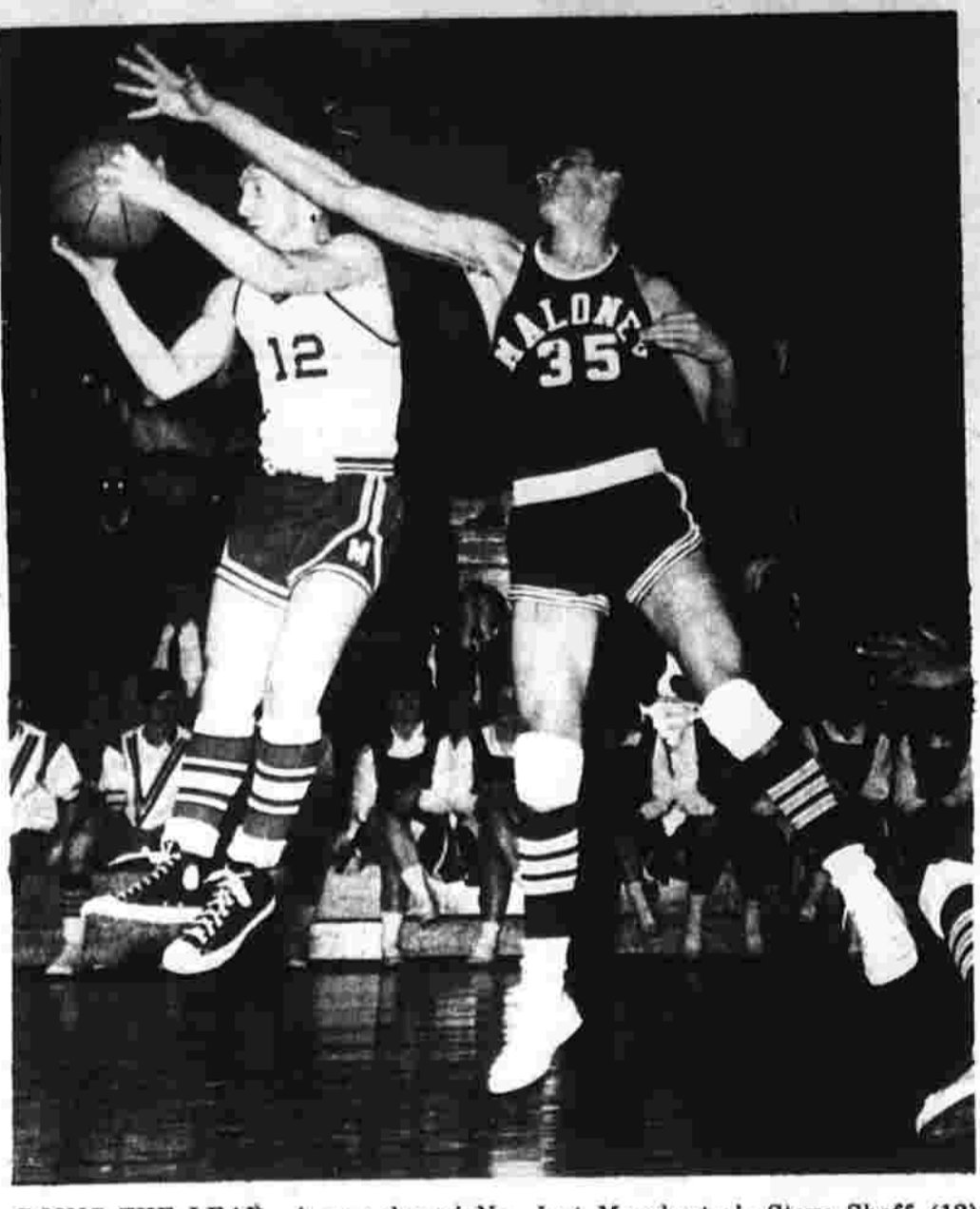

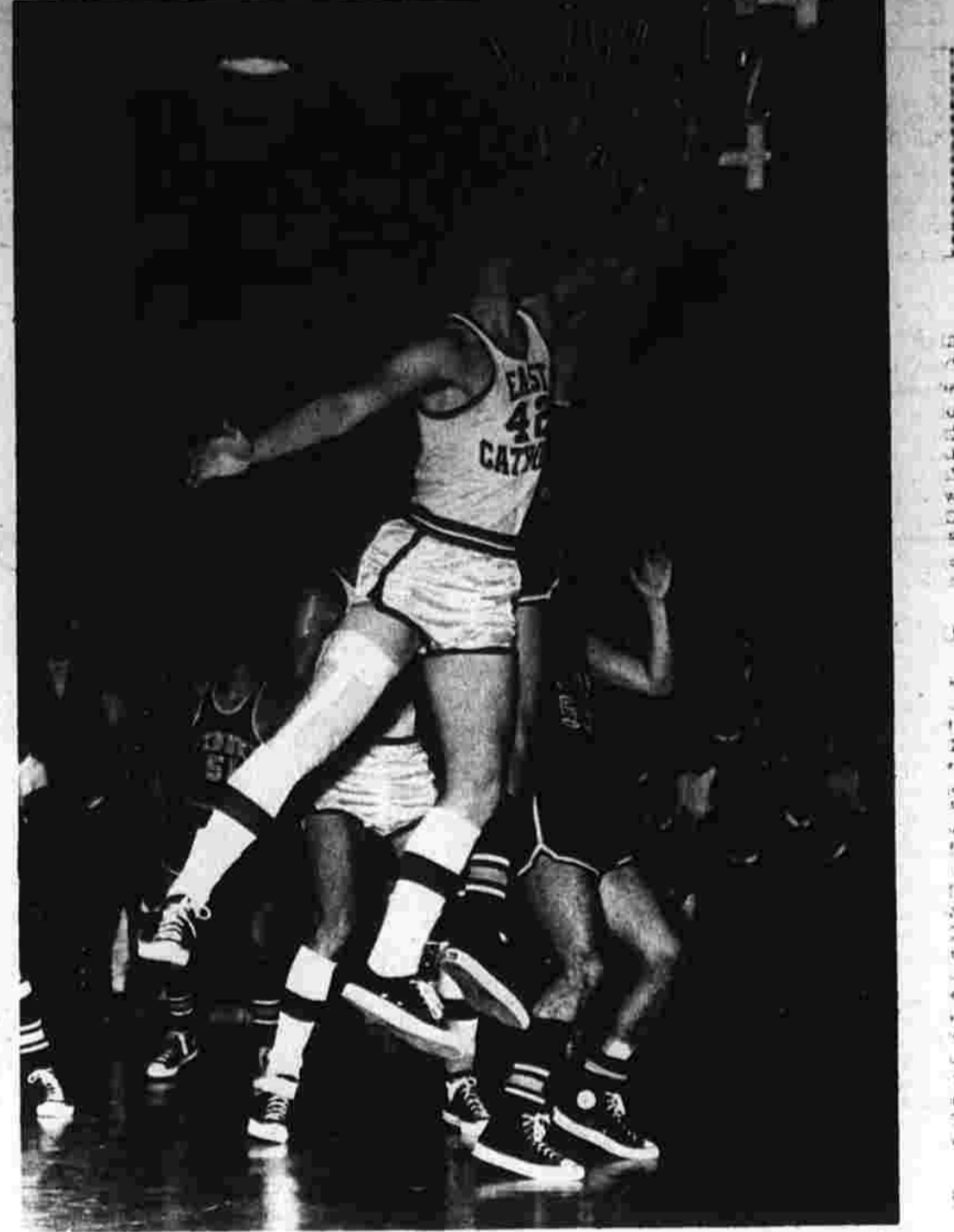
