Are The Five Points Real?

If peace in Vietnam could really be attained on the basis of the five simple points President Johnson outlined in his television interview the other night-if hey are really his and our five points then, as he said, peace in Vietnam could come within a matter of days. For the points he offered should constitute no great difficulty for the Vietcong or for North Vietnam.

n fact, if President Johnson really means that these could be our terms for peace in Vietnam, that represents something of a sensational new turn in American policy toward Vietnam. It so happens we do not believe that

American policy has made such a sharp,

abrupt turn, or that the Vietcong or North Vietnam are really going to have an opportunity to take peace on such But this much is certain; either this

stand is something of a sensational new turn for the President's policy, or it was terribly misleading as it was presented the other night. Perhaps, for the moment, no one can

be really sure which was the case. It has to be pointed out, however, that whatever the President was doing, he intended doing it. He used his five points to answer the first question asked him. Then, with the second question, he repeated them, this time from previously prepared notes. His statement of these five points was, then, intended to his interview.

Now for the five points The President said, first, that violation of the demilitarized zone set up by the 1954 Geneva Agreement must be halted. He said, second, that the infiltration

of Laos must stop. He said, third, that the one man one ote principle of democracy must be accepted in South Vietnam, even by that section of the population now under Viet-

The President said, fourth, that "the unity of Vietnam as a whole must be a matter for peaceful adjustments and ne-The President said, fifth, that it would

be useful for the government of South Vietnam to undertake informal discussions with the Vietcong, or the National Liberation Front, because, he said, such discussions might bring "good results." In setting forth these conditions, the resident several times referred to the

fact that the points he set out were points which had once been agreed upon by the other side, at the Geneva Conference of 1954. He did not discuss the fact that one of

the most important points agreed to at Geneva was that one-man one-vote elections would be scheduled, within a year, to decide the question of the unification of the two Vietnams, and that South Vietnam, on the advice of the United States, reneged on that point because it seemed obvious that any one-man, onevote election would be won by the Communists or their sympathizers.

But, although he did not discuss that particular breach of the Geneva Agreement, President Johnson seemed to be offering to include something like that in the reconstitution of the Geneva conditions he was demanding as the main requisite for peace.

All this adds up, then, to something almost unbelievable, because, on paper, taken at its surface value, it seems to represent a right angle turn in American policy in Vietnam.

in Praise Of The Shortest Days

The cheerful news from the Farmer's Almanac - which is where we some times, in these busy seasons, find out what day and time it is-is that our days began getting longer on the importan end last week, even before the total length of the day stopped getting

If that isn't confusing enough, let's phrase it another way. We are now in the shortest days of the year. But the shortness has been increasing at the sunrise, not at the sunset. Last week the time for sunset began getting a minute or two later every second or third day On Friday, at 8:17 a.m., we pass the signpost of the beginning of winter, But we will keep on losing a minute or two of daylight-at the morning end-for several more days, even after the total length of the day begins to increase, the day after the day after Christmas.

Right now, when we are where the day is only a few minutes over nine hours long, no matter how unevenly it trims itself at its ends, is a good time to reflect on the virtues and pleasures of the short day.

It is not just that, by compressing us all inward, behind doors, between walls, and into that closer swirl of contac which generates more human warmth, short days can be said to be good for the holiday season. There are times when short days, and

long, closed-in nights are quiet, and full of that pleasant, long-limbed, stretched out boredom which invites the soul, sooner or later, to venture a thought for itself. Occasionally, there develops a strange and unfamiliar capacity to cur up for an evening and do nothing but browse, lazily, in one of those appur-And there are great, noble days and night when, with doubleheaders in both contest thrown in, one can watch five football games without missing more than three or four hours of daylight. Above all, between thoughts, between chapters, or even during actual play on the field, short days are good days for

occasional napping.

ures and virtues it begins to seem strange indeed that we should spen half our year pretending to dread their arrival and then, when we find them or us, speak of them as if they represented deprivation rather than a luxurious enrichment of our living. But then, how often does our casual conversation reflect the real direction of our appreciation? We always come back to duplicating the very same invention which has been our inspiration. We keep reinventing the hole in the Life Saver, or the steam kettle, or the can opener, or the hula hoop. Somehow, we never get on to the next thing, whatever it is going to

Nevertheless, we are impressed by one detail in the career of the inventor of a hole in the Life Saver. He did have a college education, and he did work hard all his life, aside, that is, from his moment of inventing the hole. That is comforting, for we'd hate to think that he did it just by being an otherwise no-

How About That Code of Ethics? Senator Thomas Dodd is undoubtedly deriving bittersweet consolation out of a disclosure by Sen. Charles H. Percy of Illinois that Chicago businessmen are raising a special fund of \$100,000 to help defray his senatorial office ex-Senator Percy was one of Senator

Dodd's outspoken floor critics during the latter's censure proceedings in the U.S. Senate last June Senator Dodd sees no difference be-

tween the funds raised for him in Connecticut through testimonials and the fund-raising drive being conducted in Chicago for Senator Percy. In questioning the posture taken by Senator Percy during the censure proceedings, Senator Dodd in effect ascribes to his col league a bit of the pot-calling-the-kettle

In Senator Dodd's case, the Senate found that money supposedly contributed for campaign purposes had been diverted to such non-campaign, nonsenatorial uses as home repairs, parking tickets and liquor bills. The circumstances surrounding th

Percy fund appear to be quite different, from what is known about them. Apparently, this is a direct appeal for contributions to help pay the cost of staff offices maintained by the Senator in Washington, Chicago and Centralia, Ill. During the Dodd censure affair, many sensed a feeling of "there but for the grace of God go I" hovering over the conscience of many a senator and congressman. The Percy fund is already the second or third disclosure of fund raising and handling by or on behalf of members of Congress which called for

Still, committees established in both houses to draw up a code of ethics continue to drag their feet on this assignment. Nothing which may happen now later can vindicate Senator Dodd But it doesn't help the congressional image either, when questionable disclosures keep cropping up against a background of stalling on a set of standards. - NEW HAVEN REGISTER
