Explosion Fatal in Hanover

HANOVER, Mass. (AP)—Fire and explosion today ripped a frame building at the Atlantic Research Corp., manufacturers of anti-personnel mines for use in Vietnam, killing one person and injuring at least 14 others.

Twenty seven persons were reported in the building and fire touched off the explosion. South Shore Hospital in South Weymouth received 12 victims and at least 10 were held for treatment. One man was reported in critical condition.

Two persons were taken to Brockton Hospital from the plant located some 25 miles south of Boston.

The explosion tore off the roof of the building, one of several in the sprawling industrial complex.

Reporters were denied admission to the area, all being stopped at the main gate about half a mile from the plant.

Richard E. Mitchell, an executive of Atlantic Research Corp., said the plant is a subsidiary of Susquehanna Corp., Alexandria, Va. The complex formerly was occupied by the former National Fireworks Co.

An employee who was passing by the building as the explosion occurred said she was shocked.

"All I could see were big plumes and black fumes and smoke," said Barbara Boyle, 19, of Hanover. "I heard a big loud roar and a boom."

Another employee, Albert Rabinovitch of Rockland, said, "I was not too far from it. I saw a cloud of smoke, plaster and the roof flying."

The explosion occurred about 8:32 a.m. in the center of the building which has a wooden frame and metal walls. The explosions are concrete blocks.

Stored within the structure separately were 25-paloo drums of raw lead acid, primary explosive for the mines, and RDX, secondary explosive which are kept in subfreezing temperatures.

The blast apparently occurred in an area where the two explosives are mixed.

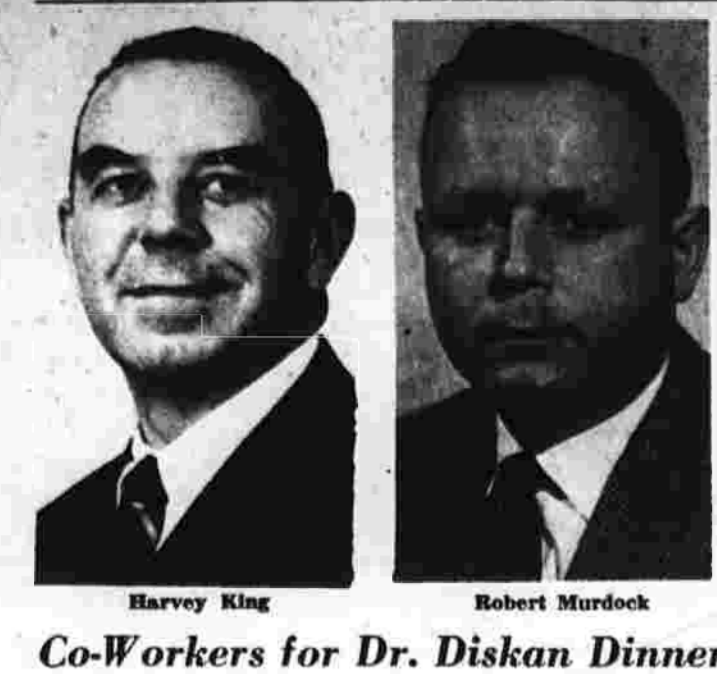

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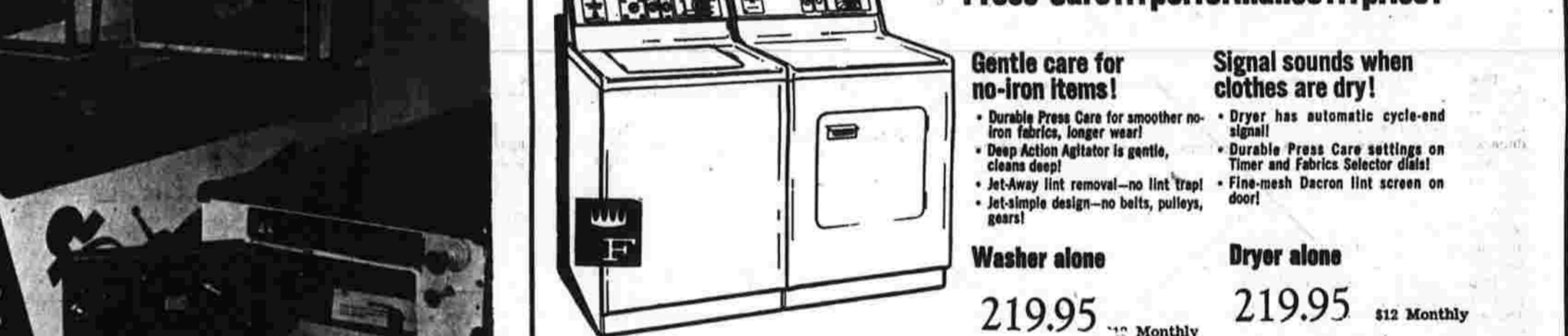

Area in Proposed Zone Change Around Laurel Lake

The Town Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on a proposed zone change around Laurel Lake at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building on Wednesday, Jan. 3.

The property under consideration is located north of a Hartford Electric Light Co. right-of-way and includes property owned by Case Bros. and Charles Treat, and the Laurel Lake area.

Town Planner Joseph Tansky notified the Capitol Region Planning Agency (CRPA), of the proposed zone change Dec. 4. The CRPA's Land Use Committee will meet tonight in Hartford to review the proposal. The CRPA is required to report its findings on proposed zone changes, when the area is

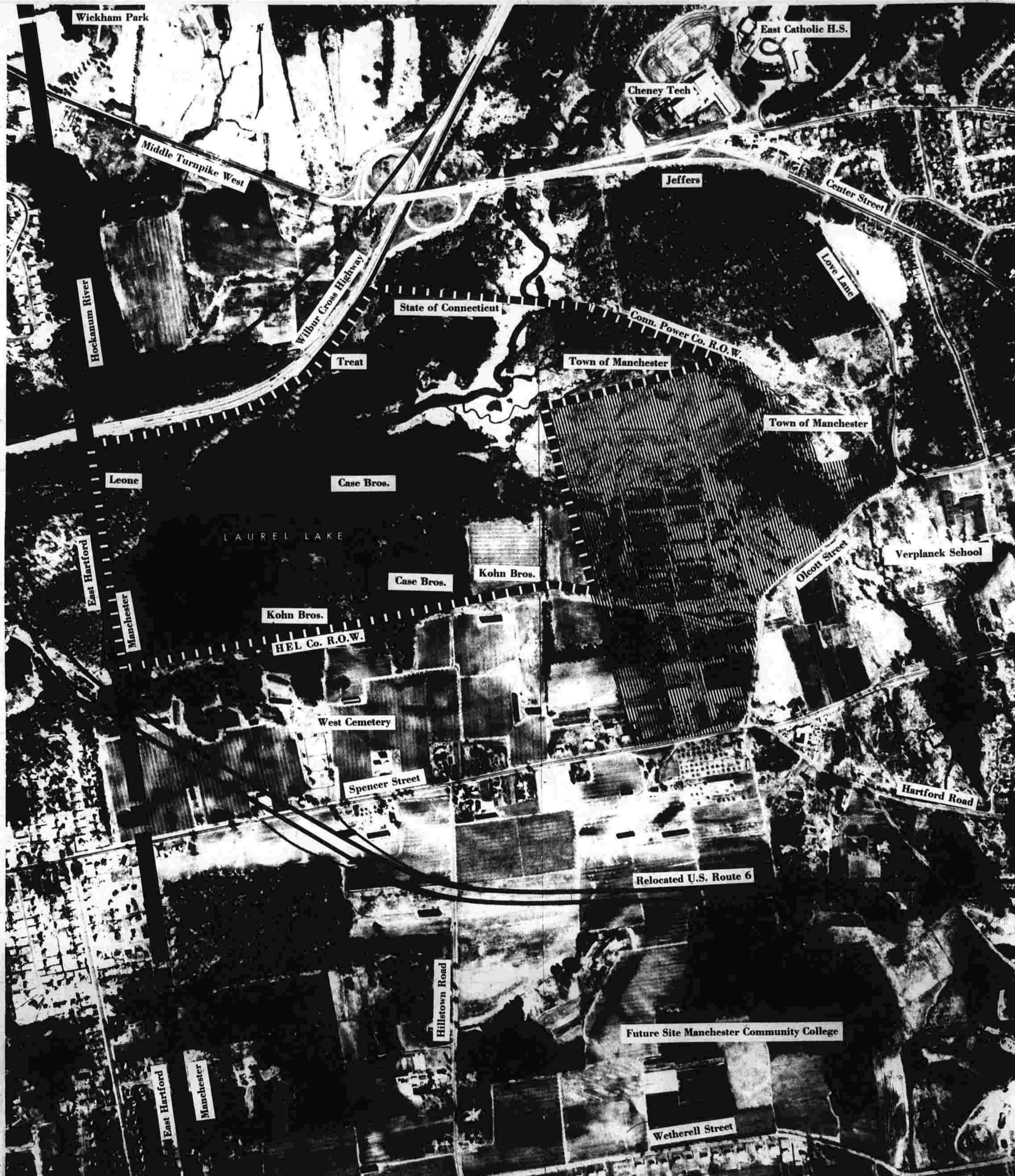
terminates and until the land use changes.

The town would provide a right-of-way to the area from Olcott St.

Case Bros. would permit the town to plant a linear park along the perimeter of Case Bros. land.

The agreement with Case Bros. will be subject to Board of Director's approval.

Builds Variety Show Bits Photographer John Urie Subcontractor for TV

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Just as the construction of parks, television now has its subcontractors. One of the busiest is a former news hound who builds bits of variety shows and will gross this year about \$3 million.

John Urie photographs rock 'n' roll groups performing in unlikely settings—beachhoses, jungles, stairways, rooftops—and combines their gyrations with equally wild visual effects like dancing lights and floating flowers.

The results—which he calls "minifilms" or "songs to see"—are blended into the studio-audience shows of the Smothers Brothers, Jonathan Winters and other stars.

The advantage, says Urie, is "getting the show off the stage and giving it space, feeling, dimension and form." For even a viewer to whom all rock groups look and sound pretty much alike, the results are palatable or, at least, interesting.

Urie, 38, is a St. Paul, Minn., native who estimates he had 200 jobs before getting into television—Paco, Wash., fireman; an Alaska construction mess hall superintendent; Iowa corn hybridizer.

He delivered animated films for a Hollywood producer, got into writing and animating television commercials and seven years ago opened his own commercial factory.

He operates in an old building production.

cluttered with props, 50 employees and signs like "In there tonight after 10:30 and 'Please, let's not cloud this discussion with logic.'"

At the end of a sound stage where actors do scenes extolling beer, cigarettes, automobiles, cereal, diet drinks, cameras and many other products, commercials are still a vital part of his business.

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Floor Finishers Are Fussy But Pleasant to Deal With

Try this New Year tonic for the home blues: have your floors retouched.

Floor finishers have poetry in their methods.

A tree never dies, it is breathing, you are constantly reminded. But now it is exposed in its beautiful grain for all to see on your floor. That is the message, and it gets through.

"I never use a machine to lay floors," long-time carpenter Oliver Davis of Norwalk, Conn., said. "I use a hand plane and sandpaper. It's just about any carpenter (or other) who floors from floor to floor but he loves floors. After meticulously laying narrow floor boards, he observed, "If you put down by hand, you won't have marks or scratches."

He then put a white oak plank floor in 4-8 inch widths with pegs. He nailed boards to gages, leaving a smidgen of space (about the width of a putty knife) between so that floors could breathe. Then he scooped along the board and end boards three for eight-inches. He sanded the surface to remove all the old finish and then he coated the peg with glue before inserting it. "But I don't want a speck on the floor as it will show when the pegs are stained," he observed.

Walnut pegs are a wee bit higher than the oak planks, but sanding flattens them.

No. 2 Crosby Bobbing Along

NEW YORK (AP)—Since Crosby's talk about other Crobys, Bob Crosby and I are discussing writer John Crosby, who is explaining how, early in my writing career, several of my stories wound up in print with John Crosby bylines.

It was funny the first time, less funny the second and not at all funny the third.

"Now you know what it is like to be Bing's brother," Bob smiled.

It was a joke. But it also made a strong point. All his life he has been No. 2 with no chance of getting to be No. 1. "I spent 3 1/2 years in Hawaii and I was very happy. I went to Hawaii. Getting away and being the only Crosby on the island helped."

In January of 1966 I went to Australia where, in Sydney and Melbourne, I did a kind of Tonight show. It was called The Bob Crosby Show and I did it for seven months. I went there to do it in the first place because it was the only thing offered to me. But it was a tough grind. On Monday I would do a show in Sydney, finish late, fly 400 miles to Melbourne and do another show Tuesday, then fly back to Sydney to start over again. It knocked me out.

The Crosby name has probably done more harm than good for Bob.

"Where it really hurt," he said, "was with the producers and distributors. I signed a contract with MGM and made several pictures for them. One day they called me in and said the contract was over because 'one of the Crobys' was in the picture. I'm not being a cry baby here. It's just a fact."

"How do you feel about the name?" he asked.

"I'm satisfied with my career? Only as a band leader. Musically, what I have done with the help of some great players has given me something to be proud of. In other words, I've just drifted along."

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Vernon

Etlinger Sees a Need for Changes

By BARBARA REICHMUND

The title of Director of Administration is synonymous in Vernon with the term councilman. Jay Etlinger came to Vernon three years ago as the first director under a new form of government.

Last Friday, Etlinger terminated his work in Vernon, having resigned over three weeks ago, and reviewed his work to the town.

First he looked back on the incidents taking place since he came here and secondly he tried to look ahead for Vernon in some constructive fashion.

"I'm sure there has been considerable progress made," he said. "Basically, the integration of the Board of Representatives into one, representing an important progressive step for the town."

Reflecting on the many problems created with the new government and its charter, Etlinger deemed these as something that should be taken in stride. They were and are a secondary nature.

Pointing out the alternative of providing the town with a mayor and a council, Etlinger said, "This is where all of the practices of cost versus service ultimately get into conflict."

Burden of Taxes

The people in the former city who had all of the services are not now eager to accept the burden of taxes to provide the people of the former town with the same services. "This must be accomplished by the director said, "if the town is to raise itself collectively, both in imagination and in practical matters."

"This has to be done," he said, "if it is to create the kind of place people will deliberately go out of their way to make their home."

"Given the proper education and understanding of the problem, I'm convinced the people of Vernon will respond to what has to be done to accomplish these goals," Etlinger said.

What of the problems of the future? "One of the most important things we have to face up to, Etlinger predicts, is what the governmental structure ought to be. He said the present governmental arrangement has accomplished, to a considerable extent, the objectives of the consolidation effort."

Commenting on the town charter, Etlinger questioned whether it has been truly effective by the standards of a political scientist as measured against the standards of a politician. He said much is expected to be accomplished with too little to work with.

Worn Many Hats

During his three years in Vernon, Etlinger has not only been the director of administration, he has worn three other hats also, that of the chief fiscal officer, purchasing agent and principal advisor to all of the officials, boards and committees.

The charter is structurally defective in that it involves the relationship between the mayor and the director of administration," Etlinger pointed out. He cited this as being a question of whether a professional concept of management can be effective where there is a twilight zone of understanding as to who does what.

He said a politically elected chief executive will look upon government in an entirely different light than a professionally trained administrator. He emphasized that a large

phased this has nothing to do with personalities or politics.

He further explained he does not particularly think a professionally trained administrator, by title, is important but he said he thinks the concept is important.

Pointing out he was making these suggestions in a purely constructive manner, Etlinger said an alternative would be to have a full-time administrator responsible for the elected legislative body and an elected mayor who would be a ceremonial officer for the town with some other stipulated, contractual responsibilities.

Headed of Director

The former officer said he had been asked what his opinion was concerning the section of the charter which spells out that the director cannot be dismissed until at least six months after he has served under a particular Mayor.

He said he was thinking that this should be of no concern to any administrator who is doing a good job and is in the interest of the town.

Etlinger urged that the people of the town be given the opportunity to re-vote the charter now that it has been adopted for three years. The goal should be to produce a charter that would be a good one for the town, he said.

Asked of his plans for the future, Etlinger, who has the reputation of being a "human dynamo," said his first goal would be to teach given number of college courses and then to some selected municipal officials on a consulting basis.

He points out this would satisfy a two-pronged objective. One is teaching people who are interested in the field of public administration and the other, assisting communities.

During his final week on the job, Etlinger set up budget procedures for the general fund for the new fiscal year. He also turned over to the town planner, John McAlmont, the Capitol Improvements budget which is now in the consulting fiscal year.

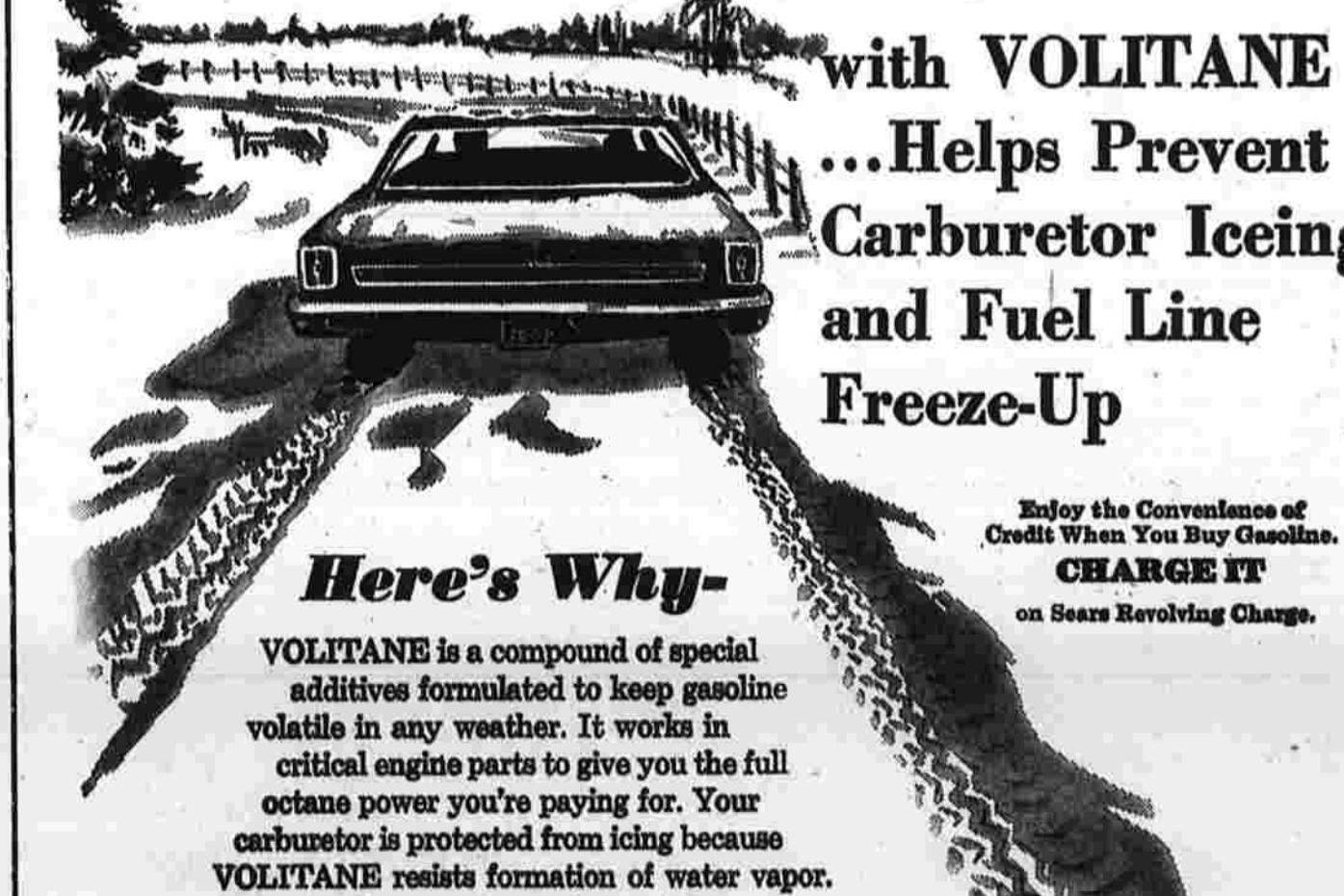

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Kicked, Spit Before Shot

French Magazine Describes Incidents of Che's Death

PARIS (AP)—Elio Che Guevara kicked one Brazilian officer and spat in an admiral's face before he was killed, according to a French magazine.

The report was written by Michel Rey, a French newspaper reporter who was once captured by the Viet Cong.

It said Guevara, handcuffed in a schoolhouse after his capture, was shot dead by a thin-faced, mustached sergeant named Mario Tera and a second lieutenant named Perez.

The account said:

After an argument, Tera shot Guevara twice with a carbine as the Cuban revolutionary stood—refusing to sit down—in the main room of the schoolhouse at Higuera. Perez then came in and finished him off with a shot in the neck.

The next morning, a Sgt. Huanco then shot two other guerrillas.

Miss Rey spent six weeks in La Paz and in the Sierra Mountains putting together the story of Guevara's capture and death, the magazine said.

The officer Guevara kicked was identified only as Espinosa, who had taken his gun out and yanked a pipe out of his mouth as a souvenir.

"With his only valid foot," (Guevara) sent Espinosa stumbling against the benches with a forceful kick.

Guevara spat in the face of sergeant, attached Adm. Higuera, who arrived by helicopter with several other officers to question Guevara, Miss Rey reported.
