





The case of the opposition will be reakened, however, by the realization hat Hartford can hardly refuse to do for itself what it has already asked its neighboring suburbs to do.

As for us out in the suburbs, we will be measuring the proportionate weight of Hartford's proposed contribution against what we ourselves have been doing for Hartford during the experiment of the past two years. Perhaps we will find Hartford still doing relatively little. And perhaps we will refuse to be influenced, as Superintendent Bair so obviously hopes we will, to take a more kindly attitude toward future extensions of Project Concern, now that Hartford itself is going to practice a little of the solution its own leadership preaches. And we will be wary, all we suburbs, of that obvious willingness on the part of Superintendent Bair to think up endless ways in which we can contribute more and more to the solution of the problem which, by most logic, seems to be Hartford's problem, since Hartford is where the great and terrible threat of too much segregation exists.

Actually, although we may not always speak and react first as if we knew it, all of us do know that whatever problem there is in Hartford is also inevitably a problem which involves us too.

We also know, in our saner, more realistic moments, that if we don't help Hartford solve the problem which i seemingly still confined to Hartford, the problem will eventually leap out toward us and perhaps flood us out of all the relative security we now imagine ourselves to possess. How to modulate between the fateful inevitability of our involvement and the natural instinct to preserve the separate distinctness of our own lives and institutions is the perpetually anguished problem of our times But, as time goes on, both inside and outside Hartford, the probability is that most of us will get passing grades, by coming closer to the right answers than we think we will.

Another Method Needed

The latest collection and projection of figures from government hospitals in South Vietnam-the only rough source there is for statistics on the civilian casualties of the war - says that the 1967 total is going to end up around 100,000, of which 76,000 will be wounded civilians, and 24,000 deaths.

The estimated number of civilian deaths this year—at 24,000—exceeds the 19,000 estimate for American and South ietnamese military combat deaths. Officials and doctors at these hosoltals have hazarded a guess as to the origin of these civilian casualties. They redit the Vietcong, with its raids, booby traps and mines, with causing 40 per cent of the casualties. They estimate that American and South Vietnam bomb and shell account for 30 per cent of the civilian casualties. And they credit another 30 per cent to small arms fire in direct engagements between the
