Fire Kills 9 Children In Quebec

MONT LAURIER, Que. (AP) —Fire engulfed the home of a couple with 18 children early today and nine of the children—aged 1 to 18—perished.

Three older children of 36, and Mrs. Roland Girouard were away when the fire was discovered by a daughter at 11:30 a.m.

Four of the children—twins Jean-Claude and Jean-Marie, 18; Dennis, 15, and Roger, 13—were sent to a hospital along with their parents.

One of the children who jumped from upstairs ran to a neighbor's for help. Neighbors sought to pile chairs on the side of the wood frame house in an effort to reach the trapped children, but the fire was too intense and the house began to collapse.

Police identified the dead children as Carmen, 18; Marie Claire, 17; Bernard, 12; Jeanne, 10; Raymond, 7; Marie-Jeane, 6; Clemente, 5; Chantal, 4, and Solange, 3.

Not long after Rachel, 21; Norman, 20, and Andre, 18—were sent to a hospital along with their parents.

The flames went so fast that there was nothing anyone could do. The house was destroyed after the fire, but by that time there was little left of the building.

"We don't know how it started. The place burned down in no time at all. It might have been an electrical short circuit," said a neighbor.

Bank Holdup In Stamford Nets \$28,000

STAMFORD (AP) —Two armed men emptied a savings and loan association's vault of \$28,000 in a woman teller's yellow car.

It was the third time the Broad Street branch of the Stamford Federal Savings and Loan Association was held up.

The two robbers, described as Negroes, about six feet tall, walked in at five minutes to 10 and one of them pulled a pistol in the face of Ralph Martino, 63, manager of the branch.

"Everybody lie down on the floor," the bandit ordered. According to Martino, the robbers were not satisfied until he and the other three employees in the office pressed their faces against the floor.

The gunman used Martino's keys to open the vault. After stuffing the cash into a shopping bag, they handcuffed Martino, assistant vice president George Holmes, and teller Dolores Costenoble, 37, and fled.

THOUGHTFUL TRUMP PLAY KEEPS CONTROL OF HAND

By ALBERT SHEINWOLD

You don't expect to lose control of trumps when the opponents hold only the K-4 or your trump suit. There is little sympathy, therefore, for one of the experts in the Team Selection Tournament a few months ago. Opening lead—king of spades. After taking the ace of spades South "naturally" led out the ace of trumps. On seeing the bad trump break, South led his other spades. West took the queen of spades and returned a diamond in response to East's signal with the ten of spades. (An unnecessarily high card call for a lead in the higher of the two other suits.)

When South next led the queen of hearts East abruptly refused to take it. South still made the contract by leading a third trump, ruffing the diamond return and leading a second dummy for a club finesse. But if the club finesse failed, or if South had led the ace of clubs and then a low club. He still had the chance that either opponent had started with just Kx of clubs.

Actually, East got two club tricks and the king of hearts, defeating the contract. "Sorry, partner," South apologized. "First I was careless, and then I was chicken."

When New York expert Ira Rubin played the hand at four hearts at another table he took the first trick with the ace of spades and immediately returned the queen of hearts.

This ratcheted play enabled him to reach dummy with a third round of trumps instead of a fourth round. He could try the club finesse without risking a two-trick defeat because he had enough trumps to ruff the fourth round of clubs in dummy if the suit happened to break badly.

Daily Question
As dealer, you hold: Spades, A-K; Hearts, A-Q-J-8-2; Diamonds, A; Clubs, A-Q-2-2. What do you say?
Answer: Bid two hearts if you use game-forcing two-bids. Bid two clubs if you use "weak" two-bids, with two clubs as your game-forcing bid.

Sanctuary for Reds Tops U.S. Problems

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials say Communist troops in the thousands make periodic use of sanctuaries in Cambodia and Laos in their battle against American and allied forces in South Vietnam.

The use of these sanctuaries is viewed in Washington as a matter of major military importance.

President Johnson's advisers are reported to be on whether the United States should use "hot pursuit" and search-and-destroy tactics against the enemy hideouts beyond the South Vietnamese borders.

Some State Department and other civilian officials say that they believe the cost would be too high in terms of worldwide political reaction, but military men say the problem will have to be met.

The dominant Washington view at the moment appears to be that the Secretary of State Dean Rusk cannot get a diplomatic solution—at a minimum some understanding with the government of Prince Norodom Sihanouk in Cambodia—President Johnson will have to decide in the first months of the new year what U.S. military action may be taken.

This issue, which carries the risk of expanding the war in Southeast Asia in 1968, is one of various unpredictable possibilities of guarding the borders against encroachment by Communist troops. Prince Sihanouk in a note late last week rejected the U.S. approach and strongly denounced the U.S. role in Southeast Asia.

The United States declared its intention to persist in seeking a diplomatic solution and officials disclosed Thursday efforts are being made to get help from numerous other nations, including the Soviet Union, to solve the Cambodian problem.

Washington authorities were also reportedly interested in reports that despite his tough line in the note to the United States, Sihanouk might be willing to concede that his small army could not guard the borders—and that if U.S. forces chased Communist units over the borders in remote jungle areas there was nothing he could do to stop it.

The State Department also had reports through unofficial channels that Sihanouk would be prepared to receive an emissary from President Johnson to talk over the situation.

It was clear that the conflict could easily assume international dimensions and that decisive action must be taken to avert this danger.

Loas demonstrated that international action was possible, even though the role of the major powers' collaboration in Indochina was a study in frustration, and arrangements to deal with the dangers were so full of holes as to be nearly meaningless.

Communist designs on all of Indochina seemed clear at the time of the 1964 Geneva conference which partitioned Vietnam. Ho Chi Minh's North Vietnamese regime demanded recognition in Cambodia, Laos and Communist-ruled Laos.

The Geneva agreements required the Viet Minh to withdraw from Laos. Pending settlement, the Pathet Lao was supposed to be a neutral force in the northern provinces, Phong Sai and Sam Neua.

The Communist objective seemed to be to persuade both the Russians and the Red Chinese to support the Viet Cong.

The picture became more complicated in 1960 when the Viet Cong led a revolt against the government.

Turpin envisions the private sponsorship of a corps of what he calls "nation builders"—young technicians recruited from around the world to teach medicine, sanitation, engineering, agriculture, animal husbandry and cottage industry.

"There are other people in near and distant parts of the world who are very sick and very weary. Their need is our opportunity to share with them our relative abundance," he said.

Debates on King Secret LONDON (AP) — Official secrecy will continue to veil the 1966 Cabinet debates on the abdication of King Edward VIII despite a new law that could have made them public.

Minutes of the debates on the crisis over the king's decision to marry the divorced American, Wallis Warfield Simpson, are not expected to be released until the death of the king, says the Duke and Duchess of Windsor.

The request for continued secrecy was believed to have come from government officials and not the duke or the royal family.

Under a law passed this year, the period of secrecy for government and official papers covering the years 1923 to 1957 was shortened to 30 years. But the keeper of public records on Thursday night the lord chancellor had signed an order restricting access to the cabinet records "for a further period."

Insurrection Planned NEW DELHI (AP) — The pro-Peking wing of India's Communist party is planning an armed insurrection in the Vietnam pattern and (1) will be intensified in areas bordering China and Pakistan, the Hindustan Times reported today. A front-page story said the plan is outlined in secret documents, circulated among the adherents of Peking. The Indian government has gotten hold of some of these documents, the report said.

The documents show the party will soon make a special effort to infiltrate into the army and police, the report said. "This, according to party planners, will serve two purposes: The party could rely on disaffection by sections of the army and police at crucial moments, and establish clandestine sources of arms."

Influence on Arabia CAIRO (AP) — President Gamal Abdel Nasser's newspaper voice admitted today that the United States does not influence internal policy as much as Egypt. "We have to admit that the Arab-Israeli conflict, no matter how we may view it," wrote Muhammad Hammad Hikal, editor-in-chief of Al-Ahram.

Hikal has emerged from the June war "almost an equal partner with the United States, whereas in the past it was a tool of American policy in the Middle East," he said. This means, he continued, that the United States will have to at least to extricate the present situation in the Middle East territory it occupies in June-1967 Washington decided to exert pressure.

Messengers Detoured WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The Russians have told 10 Italian carriers a peace message in the name of Pope Paul VI to Red China and other countries they will have to detour to the Soviet Union because of snow-clogged roads. The group set out from Rome Dec. 11 in four cars with former U.S. ambassador to Poland, the Middle East and Southeast Asia to Peking. The group is carrying a message from the Vatican secretary of state, Alfredo Cardinal Cipriani, in the name of the pope. Maser Luaidi, 85, leader of the group, said Chinese officials in Peking assured him of admission to China.

Deaths in The Nation

John Lucian Savage, 88, chief design engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation for 21 years and the man who designed Hoover and Grand Coulee dams, died Thursday after a long illness. Savage directed the design of more than 40 major dams and other structures while with the bureau. He also worked on water resources projects abroad.

James M. Johnson (AP) — James M. Johnson, 72, chairman of the board of the Washington Redskins football club, died Thursday of cancer.

Iowa Corn Fertilized DES MOINES, Iowa — Farmers in Iowa have been using more fertilizer faster than the rest of the United States. 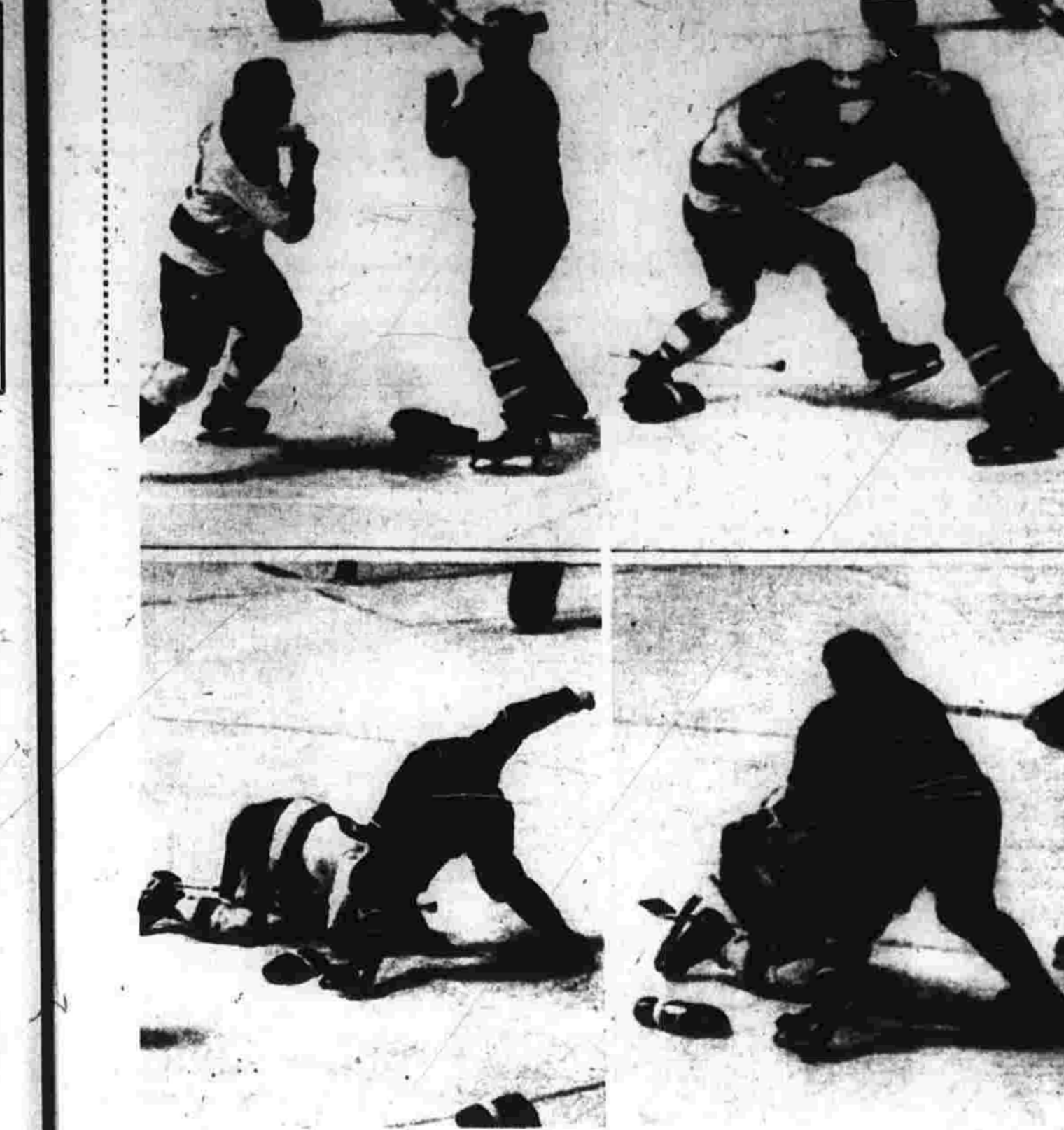

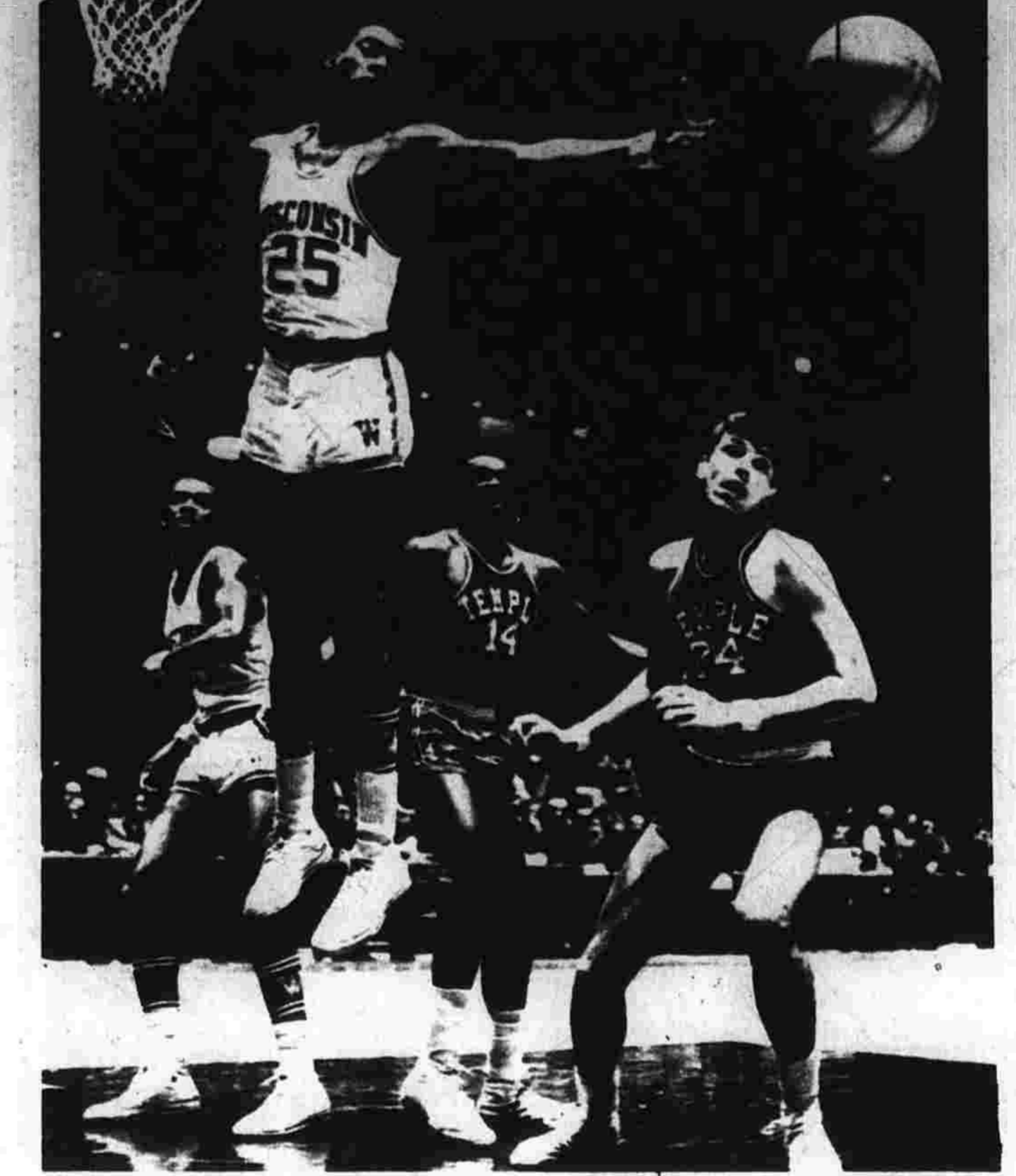
