



The Threshold Of Wider War There are observers who think the war in Vietnam is now approaching a new area and level of decision, and who

think they can see two alternative possibilities shaping up. One of these possibilities is that both sides of the war, seeing mutual expansion of the war just ahead, may seek some negotiation between themselves, before the expansion takes place. For this possibility, those who have grown cynical watching the progress of the war to date will have little respect. The war has moved in only one direction-

The other possibility is the possibility that both sides of the war will now proceed, by mutually stimulated rationalizations and movements, to an extension of the war into a number of neighboring countries.

This is the thing we self-styled realists expect to see happen. The news of the moment is that both siders are now looking more directly at such potential expansions of the war and heating up the pretexts they will need to justify and cover their expansionist

The three countries into which the open expansion of the war is most likely to take place are Laos, Cambodia, and

ening to move into it more openly, in actual ground action against the North Vietnamese or Vietcong routes and bases we know to be there. The increase in our threat to do this has now been matched by news of some stepped up activity in Laos on the part of Communist ground forces maintaining pressure against the government of Laos itself. What this adds up to is that our threat to begin fighting the Vietnamese war inside Laos is being responded to by a Communist threat to open a war for con-

trol of supposedly neutral Laos itself. The situation with regard to Cambodia is a little different. We have been convinced, for some time, that our ene mies in Vietnam are using Cambodia as a sanctuary. We have been, for some time, building up our claim to the right to hot pursuit into Cambodia, and we have probably exercised this right now and then, in limited fashion. But now our attention to this situation has become so emphatic that Prince Norodom the baffling neutralist, ruler of Cambodia, is openly threatening to appeal to

China and Russia for help if he finds us

extending the war to his territory.

Thailand is one of our allies in the war in Vietnam. We have now established ourselves a massive military presence in that country, not primarily to nelp that country deal with the relatively small threat from Communist guerrillas in its northern provinces, but to provide secure and convenient bases for our bombers for their operations in South and North Vietnam. It has always seemed inevitable that, sooner or later, our own presence in Thailand would have the result of drawing increased guerrilla activity in Thailand, and this is what is threatening now, with signs that the evolution of our intervention in Thailand could follow the pattern of our original intervention in Vietnam. In one respect, it has already caught up. Bangkok's most influential newspaper other day said "Americans are enemies of the Thai people and of the Thai nation," which would indicate that our popularity in Thailand has already begun to match the trend our popularity in South Vietnam has been taking as the weight of our presence there has

In all three of these countries bordering the existing war in Vietnam there are the same mutual stimuli by which the belligerents in Vietnam are challenging and taunting each other to add an additional theatre to the war already

being waged. There are, as we say, some observers who think the prospect of such an expanded war may stimulate both sides to present negotiations to smuff out the present war before it can get into this expansion. In such a hopeful mood they are paying great attention to Presiden nson's recent oratory about the possibility of dealing with the Victoria instead of Hanoi, and to the strange presence in Paris, at the same time, of two

side does not think it is in danger of losing in Vietnam, but it is beginning to doubt that it can win unless it is free to go into Laos and Cambodia. Each side, then, has its own military reasons for expanding the war into these adjoining countries. That, then, is the thing to expect.

No Feeling At All?
Adhering strictly to logic, we suppose there can be no great quarrel with the position of Dr. Louis Frederick Fieser, the retired Harvard chemist who, the other day, discussed his own lack of feeling of any "guilt" over his work in pioneering the development of napalm.

"You don't know what's coming," said the "Father of Napalm." "That wasn't my business. That is for other people. was working on a technical problem that was considered pressing. "I distinguish between developing munition of some kind and using it. You can't blame the outfit that put out the

rifle that killed the President. I'd do it

again, if called upon, in defense of the political or moral questions. That is a very involved thing. Just because I played a role in the technological development of napalm doesn't mean I'm any more qualified to comment on the moral

This is essentially the same logic that has been used by the developers of the atomic bomb. One can add one further comment. It

is entirely possible that, some day, both napalm and the bomb may develop peace-side capacities far more impor tant than their ability to fry people down to instant spots of grease. Still, even when one accepts the logic

of the scientists who invent such dread ful powers for us, one cannot help think that just a minor twinge of conscience, some momentary, passing shadow of a sense of responsibility and involvement. would become them.



NEW YORK (AP) — Those New Year's Eve celebrationsand New Year's Day hangovers —will cost just as much and maybe more than ever this year, and, in most states, won't be slowed down a bit by the fact that 1967 ends on a Sunday. Last-minute legislation and is-suance of special licenses will permit the sale of liquor in many places where alcohol nor-mally can't be sold on the Sab-

bath. Other places will sell only beer and wine until midnight, then switch to hard liquor.

Nightclubs and restaurants,
particularly in the large cities,
report a brisk reservation business, even at prices close to \$100 per couple. Many have been sold out for a week or longer. Bargain-hunting would-be re-velers can still celebrate and

In St. Louis, Mo., one place is charging only a \$1-per-person cover for which favors will be provided. New Haven, Conn., celebrants can pay \$18.50 per couple for a buffet dinner and a show. And for \$17.60 per couple, Pittsburgh residents can get dinner, see a stage play and dance. They also can drink, thanks to a special law passed by the state legislature. At the other end of the scale

are clubs in the big cities.

The Persian Room in New York's Plaza Hotel has been sold out for two weeks at \$40 per-person for dinner and a show. The Rainbow Grill, overlooking midtown Manhattan from atop and dancing for \$35 per person tax and tips included. The same celebration last year cost \$27.50 per person, but the figure did not include tax and tips. New York City, which has no Sunday closing law, is issuing special permits allowing clubs to stay open until 8 s.m. Mon-
