Anything Next Has To Be Better The year to which we are now saying farewell has probably been unique in

We would describe it as a year which between the private status and experience and fortune of all of us, or almost all of us, as individuals, and the public situation and fortune of which we are also a part. Never have so many people traveled

so far in so short a time toward their own disaster with less disturbance to their normal routines. This is, of course, a subjective conclusion, posed by the special feeling, at

this moment, of the particular human

being who is writing this particular editorial. It can be accepted or rejected by other members of the race. It cannot be either proved or disproved. One can say, for instance, that the world, and its presumably most civilized, enlightened single nation are behaving, in Vietnam, precisely as if they had learned exactly nothing from the previous history of mankind, and that they are doing this at a period in history when the risks and dangers are a thousand times greater than they ever were

individual opinion and judgment. The to come after waiting for the story in Vietnam to play itself out to its end. And quite conceivably, in the way of many supposed great final crises in the affairs of men, Vietnam could somehow rubside and peter out without coming to any great dramatic result, either plus or minus, that could be taken as proof of anything except the infinite resilience of human nature.

Or one can say, for another instance pertinent to the experience of the year 1967, that that same great nation, presumably the world's most intelligent and civilized, has failed almost totally in the business of getting a real solution-headed grip on its own domestic problem of the social and economic relationship between people who happen to have skins of different hue. Again, this is a subjective judgment; we may be doing better than it seems to some of us. We may not already have lost the engagements upon which the final outcome of the battle depended. Or we may somehow, with that apparently inexhaustible escape artistry of ours, avoid the final terror and tragedy ahead of us, and find the mercy of gradualism and postponement available to us once

So the fatefulness of our public predicament remains a matter of judgment, not any confirmed certainty. There is less division of judgment and opinion, however, as to the other side of the equation, where we measure and appraise the private lives we have

been living while our world wobbles on

Except for the relatively few among us where the course of one or the other of the two great tragedies has hit home in a casualty in Vietnam, or in some preliminary brush against the savagery of either black or white power at homewe have never had it so good. The statistics prove it. Our living rooms prove it. Our garages prove it. Our bank accounts prove it. And more important than any of these, although supported by them, there is an actual warm and com fortable sense of well being which has somehow worked its way into our very

Never has quite so much private optimism, so much touchingly human euphoris, flourished in such proximity to so much public doom. Who wants to disturb the euphoria?

Who wouldn't rather play the possibility that somehow we can be saved and be spared in something like our accustomed world without ever really trying to do anything drastic ourselves?

Finally, how does any private individual have the slightest chance of influencing the course of such great and fate ful events, even should be let himself be worried into trying to do something

about something? Such have been the problems posed the moods responding, the inconclusions left dominant, in the year 1967. Being entirely subjective again, we no

longer find it possible to say, as we se farewell to that 1967, that things will have to get any worse before they begin to get better. The year ends with all of us facing unparalleled danger and degradation with two contradictory emotional feelings, the one of unceilinged euphoria, the other one of bottomless powerlessness. Anything next has to be an improvement of some kind,

### Whose Facts Do You Read?

If a newspaperman has any special message for today's inquiring young people, he would say: Use the utmos care in ascertaining your facts. Remember that normal, honest individuals may differ, not only concerning the opinions and conclusions to be derived from today's facts, but concerning what are the facts themselves. Don't accept only such facts as agree with your own preconceptions.

Suppose you were to note the factsas regards Vietnam, China, hippies, the welfare state, the Pentagon-implicit i the articles in the New Statesman (London) or the New Republic (USA). Compare these with the facts on the same subjects as seen by U.S. News & World Report or Time magazine. You'd find a wide divergence. will color your views and conduct. on Vietnam. It centered on the hard ships, and sufferings of the refugees, caused by bombings and uprootings Suppose you supplemented this with an eye-witness story of refugee plight in your favorite news magazine or newspaper. I don't know about you, but after about three such encounters, I am ready to conclude: "This war is disastrous. Let's get out fast."

All right, but suppose instead you've watched a television documentary which zeroes in on American-Saigon victories, and some very worthy rehabilitation ef forts among the rice paddies. And you've supplemented this with a dispatch detailing respected Ambassador Bunker's reasons why the war is going better, why constructive rebuilding is now possible. One may well come away from this experience with a belief that the struggle is worthwhile. The point is, both sets of documen-

taries and dispatches could have been factual, accurate, from where the reporter, the cameraman, stood. Recently a student came in to discuss a column. He had marched in a number of peace demonstrations. He told how TV cameramen had walked down the file of marchers, photographing only the long-haired, the hippie-dressed, the unkempt, avoiding the earnest, the neat, the middle-aged. This happens. The effort is not intentionally to deceive, but to catch the dramatic, the spectacular. I recall two dispatches, appearing about the same time in the New York

Times and a news magazine. Both concerned the over-all Vietnam picture. One reported the United States forces thin-stretched, their strategies spoiled The other said the American effort, a long last, was beginning to succeed. Which is one to believe? Perhaps you are familiar with the well-known journalism class exercise. A

simulated hold-up takes place; police burst into the classroom. Afterward, the students are asked to write their versions of what happened. Believe it or not, they differ markedly, and these students have been in training to become

What's the answer? First of all, read a newspaper or news magazine that you feel you can trust. Next, read more widely. If the New Republic is your journal, read U.S. News & World Report, as a countering force, or vice versa. Distinguish between journals of opinion and newspapers. When you're watching a television newscast, ask yourself if you're seeing the whole picture. Cultivate a healthy skepticism. I said healthy. Not hate-filled. Compassionate. Discerning. Remember that most newsmen are trying hard to "get it straight." So are most editors. And if some have built-in biases, maybe you have too. Too often we seek out, take in, just what we

want to believe. Man has the gift of insight and intuition. "Seek and ye shall find." An accurately informed public opinion is a strong bulwark in any nation. You can help build that kind of opinion.—WIL-LIAM H. STRINGER IN THE CHRIS-
