Can Two Words Make Peace? Two words-one noticeable for its ab sence—the other drawing attention to itself by its presence—constitute the key to renewed interest, at Washington and elsewhere, in the possibility that Hanoi is once again moving its position with regard to negotiations over the war in

tion of heat is going to feel better, for the moment, than the application of ice. But for getting the muscle in question back to normalcy, ice is supposed to save lots of time. And, if you want to get philosophical about it, try to accept the description of one doctor who says that, if the extreme cold does seem to strike rather sharply, one might regard it as an "exquisite" pain.

The best thing for the layman in all this is that the next time he comes up with a lame wrist he doesn't have to agonise trying to remember which it should be-hot or cold. He can, according to the latest fashion, use either. The ice treatment has been given a fancy new name, Cryokinetics, which combines the Greek words for cold and
