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School Board to Hear Report on Closed Contract Talks

The Board of Education, which has not convened since Dec. 18, faces a lengthy agenda for its first meeting of the new year tonight at 8 in the board room at Bennett Junior High School.

It is expected that a major portion of the session will be devoted to a report from the personnel-relations committee on the status of salary-contract negotiations with the teachers.

Several closed bargaining sessions between the committee and teacher representatives have been held during the past two weeks since the board reversal of a long-standing policy favoring open negotiations.

The reversal was taken without an official vote; therefore, board members will be asked tonight to formally adopt a policy for closed sessions.

Spokesmen for both sides in the negotiations were to have issued joint reports of progress made in the closed talks, but little information has been forthcoming—indicating a probable lack of agreement on major items.

Teachers' salary requests for next year have not been made public to date. Salaries comprise about 87 per cent of the total Board of Education budget.

The schools are operating this year on a budget of \$6,200,000. The board will also face a decision whether to hear the third teacher grievance to be submitted this year.

According to School Superintendent William Curtis, five teachers at Keeney St. School filed a request for a board hearing after he rejected their grievance at Level II.

Curtis said the teachers, who have not been identified, want a board ruling on their request to be released from classroom assignments when special teaching (art, music, physical education) is working with their classes.

The teachers are said to feel they could use such periods more effectively for planning other classroom activities.

In other business, the board is expected to discuss faculty recent consensus to balance the books.

Cars Greatest Casualties Area Temperatures Plunge

If you think it was cold in Manchester this morning, you are so right, and you have plenty of company in town, in Connecticut, in New England, and in many parts of the country.

Actually, the best that can be said about the temperature this morning is that it set a record for the coldest Jan. 9 in the area in the weatherman's books.

Forecast for the rest of the day were for high temperatures in the high teens and low 20s this afternoon, with little change tonight. Snow forecasts for the afternoon were a probable 50 per cent, and were 50 per cent for tonight and 20 per cent for tomorrow.

An accumulation of one to three inches was forecast. The greatest casualties this morning were cars going to bed, others with battery troubles, and others that just couldn't start.

Most stores and dealers sold out their stocks of anti-freeze early last night, and service stations reported a brisk business in starting cars. Service was backed up about two hours there.

Don Wulfs of Don Wills Garage said that he closed up at 9 last night and that, when he returned for work at 6 this morning, he heard the phone ringing even before he had the door open.

He said that he was four hours behind on towing and a couple of hours behind on battery-trouble calls.

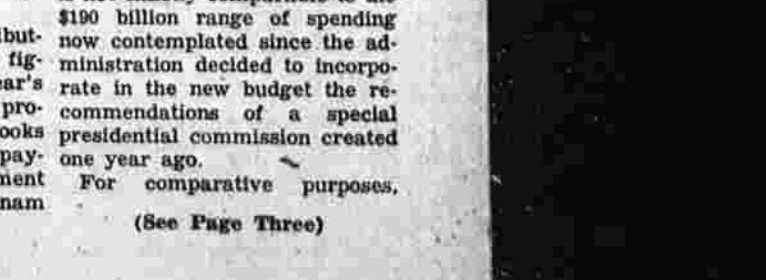
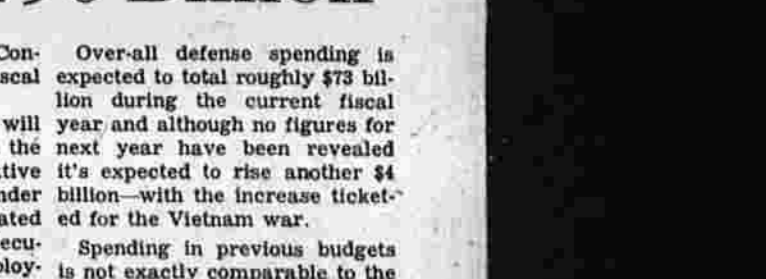
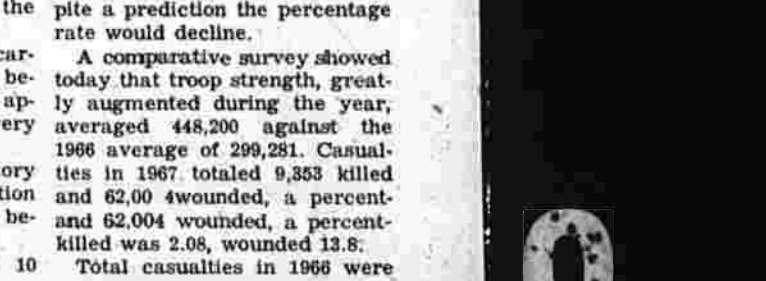
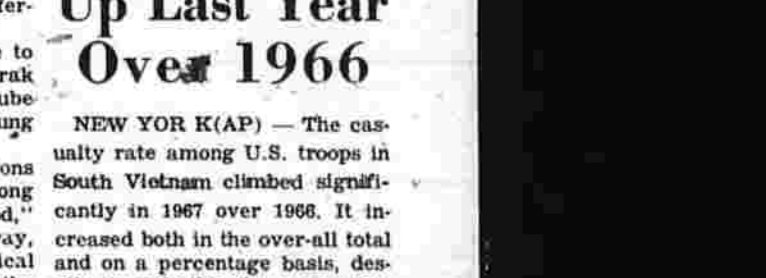
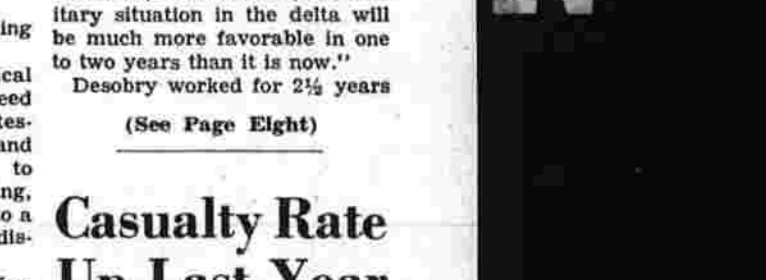
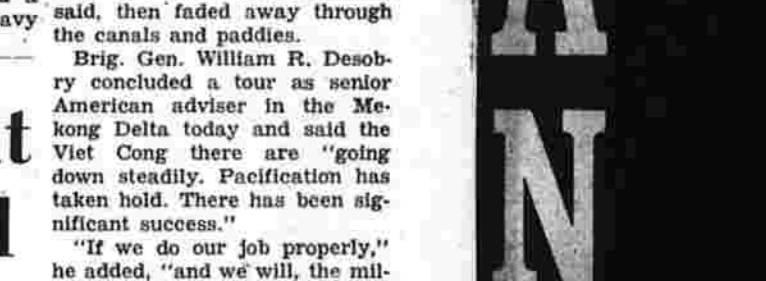
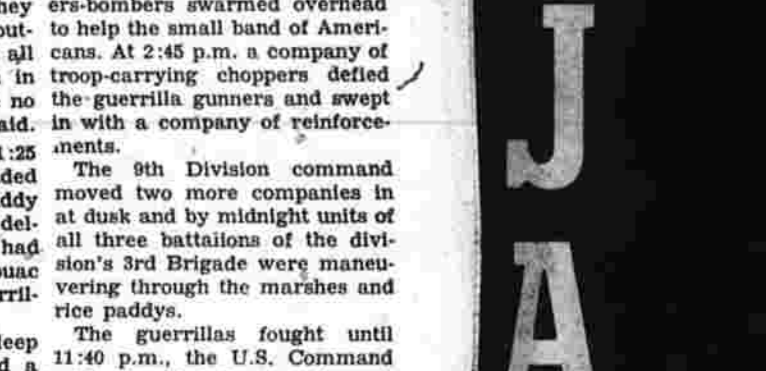
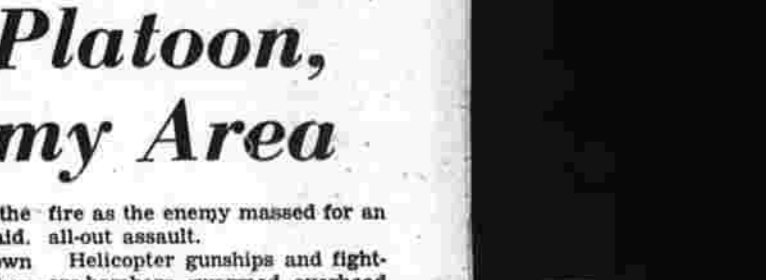
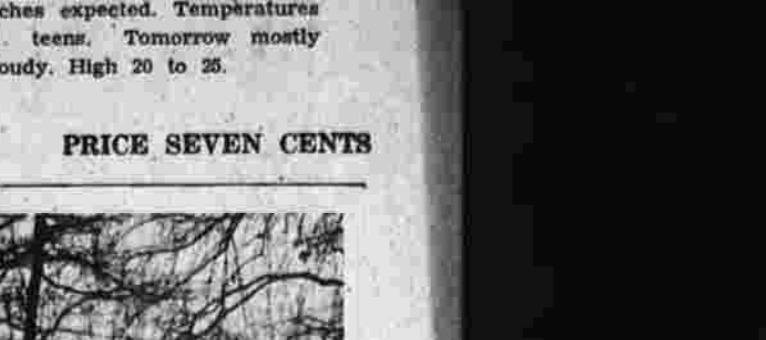
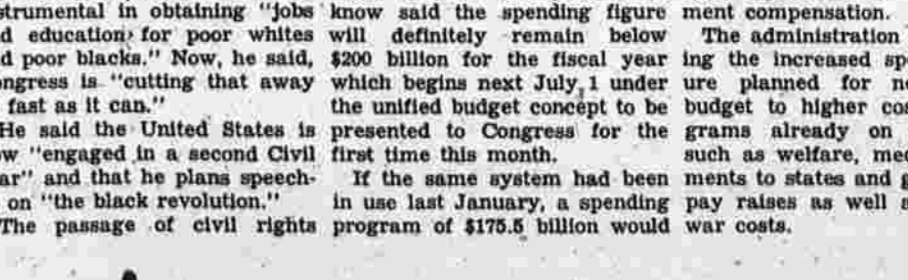
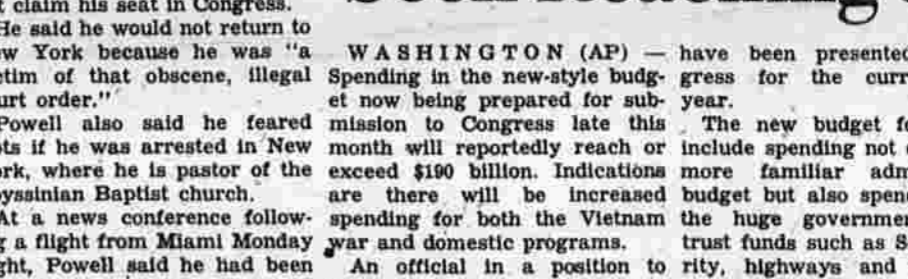
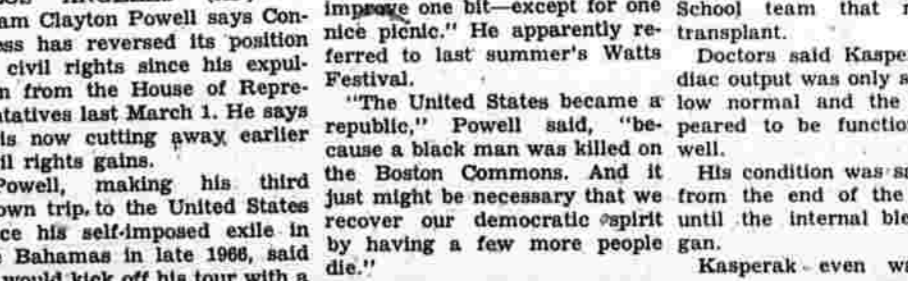
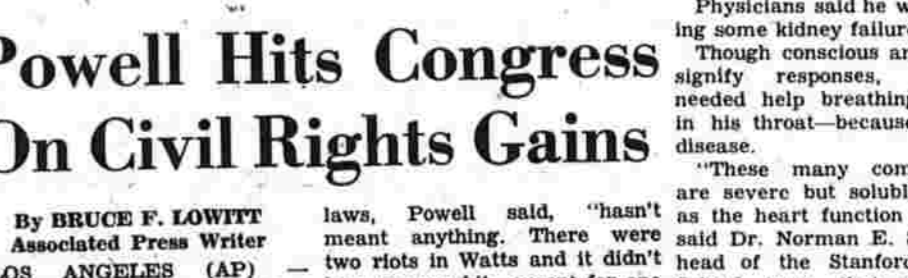
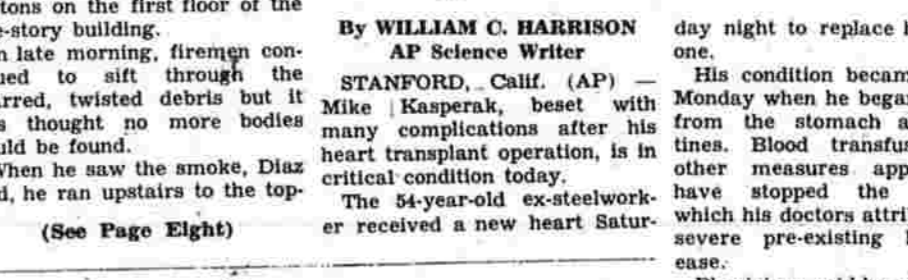
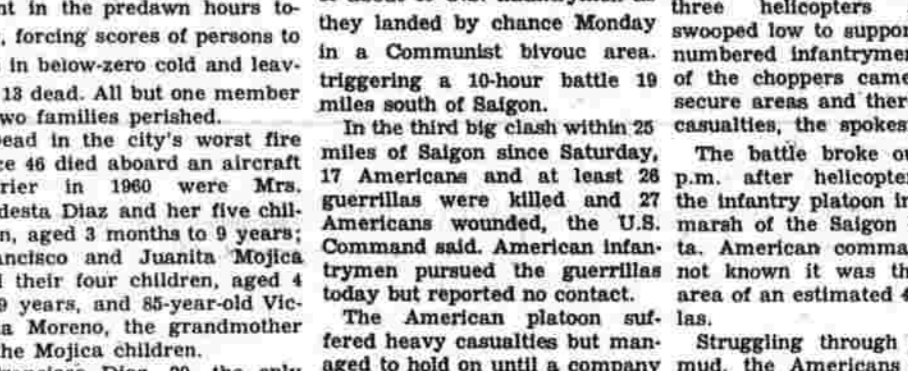
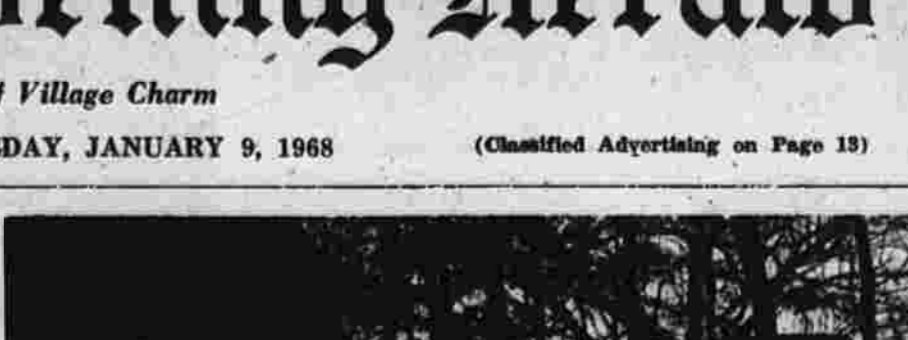
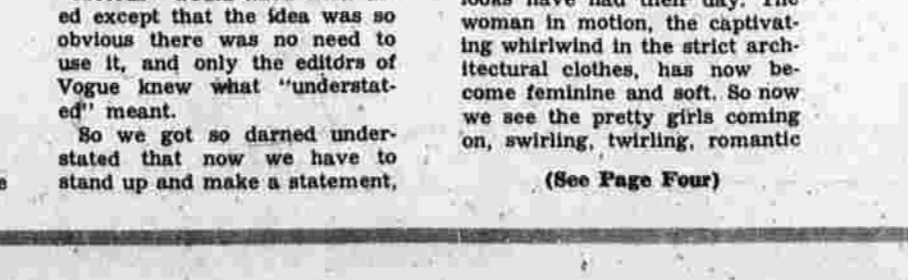
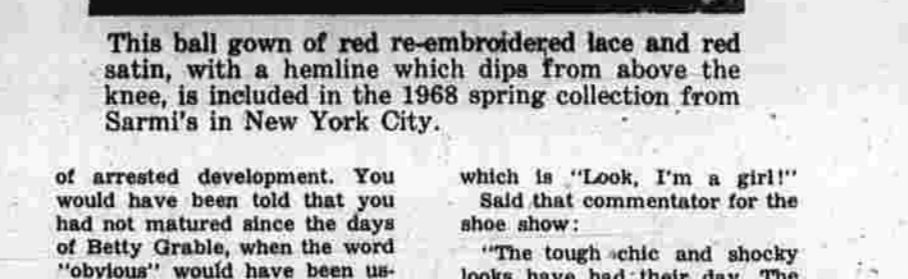
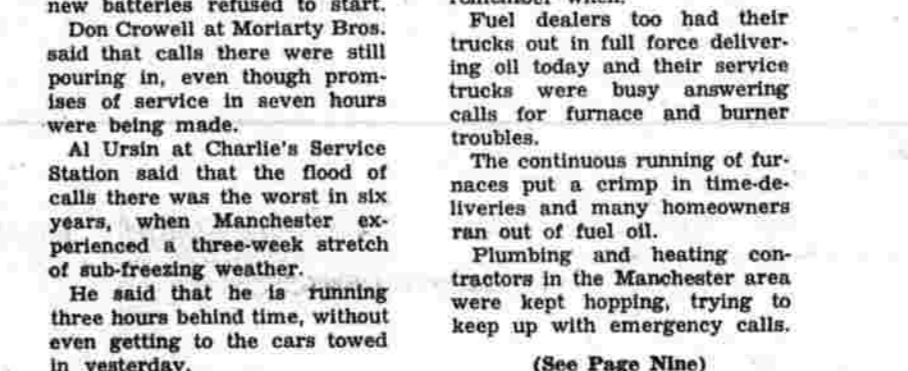
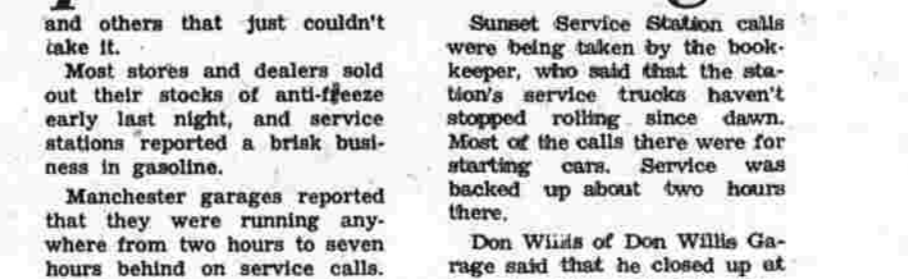
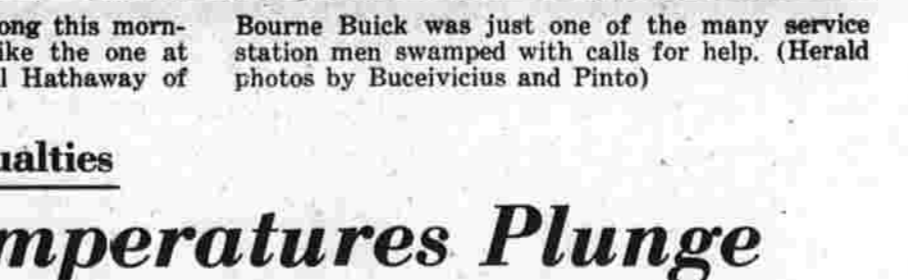

Blaze Kills 13 Persons in Brooklyn

NEW YORK (AP) — Flames raced through a Brooklyn tenement in the pre-dawn hours today, forcing scores of persons to flee in below-zero cold and leaving 13 dead. All but one member of two families perished.

Dead in the city's worst fire since 1960 were Mrs. Modesta Diaz and her five children, aged 3 months to 9 years; Francisco and Juanita Mojica and their four children, aged 4 to 9 years; and 85-year-old Victoria Moreno, the grandmother of the Mojica family.

Francisco Diaz, 29, the only surviving member of his family, was watching television with his children when he saw smoke flowing under the door of his second-floor apartment. In minutes the building was engulfed in flames, he said.

Firemen snuffed the five-alarm fire for 4½ hours before getting it under control. The 85-year-old osteologist received a new heart transplant.

VC Pounce on Platoon, Landed in Enemy Area

HAIGON (AP) — Viet Cong guerrillas pounced on a platoon of about 40 U.S. infantrymen as they landed by chance Monday in a Communist bivouac area, triggering a 10-hour battle 19 miles south of Saigon.

In the third big clash within 25 miles of Saigon since Saturday, 17 Americans and at least 27 guerrillas were killed and 27 Americans wounded, the U.S. Command said. American commanders had not known it was the bivouac area of an estimated 400 guerrillas.

The American platoon suffered heavy casualties but managed to hold on until a company of reinforcements arrived by helicopter and laid down heavy fire.

Brig. Gen. William R. Desobry worked for 2½ years as a senior American adviser in the Mekong Delta today and said the Viet Cong there are "going down steadily. Pacification has taken hold. There has been significant success."

"If we do our job properly," he added, "and we will, the military situation in the delta will be much more favorable in one to two years than it is now."

Casualty Rate Up Last Year Over 1966

NEW YORK (AP) — The casualty rate among U.S. troops in South Vietnam climbed significantly in 1967 over 1966. It increased both in the overall total and on a percentage basis, despite a prediction the percentage rate would decline.

A comparative survey showed today that troop strength, greatly augmented during the year, averaged 448,200 against the 1966 average of 299,251. Casualties in 1967 totaled 9,353 killed and 62,600 wounded, a 10 percent increase over 1966's 8,470 killed and 56,000 wounded, a 10 percent increase.

Spending in previous budgets is not exactly comparable to the \$100 billion range of spending planned for next year's administration budget. The rate in the new budget reflects recommendations of a special presidential commission created one year ago.

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Powell Hits Congress On Civil Rights Gains

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Adam Clayton Powell says Congress has reversed its position on civil rights since his expulsion from the House of Representatives last March 1. He says it is now cutting away earlier civil rights gains.

Powell, making his third known trip to the United States since his self-imposed exile in the Bahamas in late 1966, said he would kick off his tour with a walk today through Watts, Los Angeles' primarily Negro district, "to meet with all my brothers."

The 58-year-old Powell, from New York's Harlem district, still faces arrest in criminal contempt charges stemming from his failure to pay a libel judgment against him. He won a 1967 special election but did not claim his seat in Congress.

He said he would not return to New York because he was "a man of that obscure, illegal creed."

Shifting Classes Approved To Avoid Double Sessions

A plan to offer interim relief for the expected school enrollment increase which will eliminate the double session sessions was approved by the Board of Education last night. The proposal, which will make the fullest use of Bykes School, Rockville High school and the Vernon Center Junior High, was presented to the board by Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools. The proposal to hold double sessions in the 11th and 12th grades next year was given reluctant approval by the board last night.

Under the new plan, Grades 5, 6 and 7 will be housed at Vernon Center Junior High. This will give an enrollment of 1,446 to a 1,500 capacity school. The high school, which now houses the freshmen class of the high school, will be used for all eight grades, plus half of the freshmen. This will make a total of 697 pupils, the capacity of the school is 700. The other half of the freshmen class will be divided between the two schools. This arrangement will mean that the schools will have speech and hearing and audio-visual departments will be re-housed. Dr. Ramsdell's plan leaves just three rooms empty in the six elementary schools. He predicted enrollment gains. Dr. Ramsdell expects the enrollment to be 1,446.

Assuming, as many observers believe, that this has been a pattern of policy, Washington could have two reasons for such behavior.

It could sincerely believe the possibilities for negotiation to be merely a deceptive bad dream, representing no real or sincere approach to peace by the other side.

Or Washington could persuade itself that if the enemy had turned out to a certain degree, an even stronger application of military pressure could make it turn still more in the direction of a final surrender.
