The reality is that when the ponds get themselves full early, and the high wind patterns set themselves to blow straight across us instead of down to the south and around us, the old-fashioned winter that is certain to result can prove a grim and nerve-straining experience.

It does not produce just a variety taste of what it is like to have a cold night, or a strong wind from the north, or snow blowing into the face and into the driveway. It gives you cold until you are sick of it, and wind until you cry both rage against it and mercy from it, and it gives you snow which seems almost artificial because it is so permanent, so

these things until you doubt that you can withstand one more night, one more wind, one more fall or blow of snow, and then it gives you some more.

If, eventually, the old-fashioned winter reduces you to a non-being, vegetable-like state of mind in which you find yourself rendered mert and paralyzed merely by the sound of the next weather forecast, then that is a sign, the cycles are, that there may at last be some meliorating change not more than two

or three deep freezes away. You will live, even as, in the latest science fiction imaginings about the possibilities of medical techniques, it is now being speculated that human beings can be put into deep freeze storage and kept there until the laboratories have produced the cure for whatever ails them and then taken out again. You will live, but it will not feel very much like living. The only thing that really lives and preathes and exults and leaps and runs and enjoys its earth during the real onslaught of an old fashioned winter is the old fashioned winter itself. What power What vitality! What joy of onslaught! No wonder there is neither energy nor emotion left for people.

to negotiation, and Washington's reply seems to be some new escalation which blasts the possibility of negotiation back into its bomb shelters. Assuming, as many observers believe,

that this has been a pattern of policy, Washington could have two reasons for such behavior.

It could sincerely believe the possi bilities for negotiation to be merely a deceptive bad dream, representing no real or sincere approach to peace by the other side. In that case, the merciful, realistic thing would be to blast the false hope as quickly as possible.

Or Washington could persuade itself that if the enemy had turned soft to a certain degree, an even stronger application of military pressure could make it turn still more in the direction of a final surrender.

By either reason, the Washington practical decision remains the same no negotiation now, and some new escalation to emphasize that decision.

This having been the pattern of the past, and this now being a period of sudden new speculation about the possibilities of negotiation, the routine development might be for Washington to unloose some new escalation binding the war more tightly to itself, and chasing thoughts of negotiation out of both Vietnamese and American minds and hopes. It was this pattern of past experience

which led the New York Times, the other day, to notice that "within the pas few days there have been indications of possible serious new escalations of the war, involving an alleged American air attack on a Russian ship in Haiphong harbor and United States air attacks on roads and bridges only nine miles from the China border. Both of these incidents, if indeed they occurred, involve air actions in areas which would be off limits without express approval of the White House."

"It may be," the New York Times editorial continued, "that neither the peace overtures nor the air actions-if ndeed they occurred-will prove to rep. resent substantive changes in policy. It may be they bear no relation to each other, Nevertheless, in view of the frustrated peace hopes of the past and of the pattern of military escalation that has appeared to accompany at least some of these diplomatic failures, there is cause for concern. This is surely a moment for the United States to hold the war tightly within existing limits, avoiding all possibly provocative new actions at least until whatever new possibilities for septiations exist can be fully explored." ____

In all the intervening centuries, we have made relatively little progress back toward the peace and security and freedom which were possible, once, when each individual was in some degree a citizen of all his known world. But now and then, instead of fighting over boundaries, or trying to raise and expand them, we see a boundary being lowered somewhere, and the spectacle stirs hope.

The Waterbury Teachers Association by its overwhelming strike vote has completed the process of alienation between itself and the community. By this action, cloaked in the polite language of not reporting to work, the WTA has firmly hammered home its message o. self-centered concern at the expense of the city's children. It will be years before this message is forgotten and the resulting steady trend toward educational decay arrested.

Why did the teachers vote not to go to work? They say it is because the Board of Aldermen violated a contract between the WTA and the Board of Education. But is this so? Has any court ruled on the legality of the Aldermanic

The answer is no because no court has been asked, though the WTA as an aggrieved party could easily have done so. If the court found that there was a violation, and most informed persons in the city seem to think that this would be the finding, then the city would be forced to find the money to meet the terms of the

Instead of taking the path normally followed between two parties in a dispute, the teachers smarting from an admittedly rude reception at the public hearing on the budget, have flexed their collective bargaining muscles. By so doing, the teachers are using amateur trade union tactics while they plead for the respect due a profession. Most unions would have authorized a strike and sent the negotiating team back to

It is to be hoped that an injunction will be quicky granted to halt the strike. Such an action will prevent a lengthy interruption in the schooling of the city's

But, an injunction cannot repair the harm done by the strike vote which has erected a solid wall between the teach ers and the public. For this, the WTA must stand responsible and it is the children of school age in the city who will surely suffer. - WATERBURY RE-


