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Weiss Asks Pay Hikes For 26 Major Aides

Immediate pay hikes for 26 of Manchester's department heads and assistant department heads, estimated to cost \$4,018 for the remainder of the fiscal year, have been proposed by Town Manager Robert Weiss.

He has asked the Board of Directors to approve the raises, retroactive to Jan. 1, in order, he said, to place the 26 in salary schedules comparable to those paid in West Hartford, East Hartford and Eastfield.

All but one of the 26 department heads and assistants received a raise as of July 1. The lone exception was the recreation director. His salary, by order of the Board of Directors, remained at the 1966-67 level.

Weiss has submitted a proposed new salary range of six steps for each of the 26 positions. He is recommending a raise for each to the closest step above the current salary. One of the 26 positions recommended for a pay raise is that of assistant town manager. This marks the first time that Weiss has acknowledged that when John has an assistant manager.

The town has hired a year ago and was designated development coordinator. Weiss insisted that he has not advertised for or hired an assistant manager. He said that Harkins would be his liaison with town agencies and would fill the vacant post of personnel manager.

Harkins is down for \$8,008 a year. Weiss is recommending that he be raised to \$8,788 immediately and that his salary range be \$8,788-\$10,988.

Viet Reds Start New Offensive

Vietnamese divisions are conducting forays into the coastal valleys, an area known as the southern coastal zone. The Viet Cong has been active in the area since the new year began.

Allied commanders expected the regional-size assault along the Cambodian border in November and December. They had plenty of intelligence on the enemy intentions.

North Vietnamese divisions thought to have been destroyed earlier in the year along the central coast, and the sudden appearance of locally recruited Viet Cong battalions that had been lying low through 1967 and appeared to have disintegrated.

TPC Zones Small Part Of Laurel Lake Area

The Town Planning Commission last night rezoned to industrial about 30 acres of the land involved in the proposed Laurel Lake zone change, and, in effect, rejected the request to rezone the entire area.

The land rezoned industrial is mostly town owned. Most of the other land involved in the zone change is owned by Robert and Wells Dennison, who acquired it recently from Case Bros.

The TPC limited the change to land adjacent to land now zoned industrial where the town sewage treatment plant, the disposal area, and the dog pound are located. Commission Chairman Adler Dobkin said in approving the zone change that the TPC feels it is a natural extension of industrial zoned property owned by the town.

The 30 acres includes 21.8 acres owned by the town, 6.4 acres owned by the state, and about 4 acres owned by Dennison. The zone change will enable the town to use the area for garbage and refuse disposal in its sanitary and landfill operations if filled to a height of 30 feet for four to six years.

During a lengthy session the commission members discussed the pros and cons of the request to rezone 175 to 200 acres of land in the Laurel Lake area to industrial from Rural Residence.

A two-man city water crew had been digging in the front of the house. Bowers said he was checking to see if they could have hit a gas line.

Non-Graded Classes Set in Two Schools

Language arts will be held at the same time for all primary levels and the same will be true for math. This system will allow the children to be shifted around without upsetting the schedule.

Education Panel to Continue Contracting for School Buses

The Board of Education voted this week to continue to contract for school bus transportation rather than to consider buying its own buses and to re-evaluate this decision at the end of the next contract period. The board also took part in a language lab demonstration, heard results of the Iowa Tests and proposed curriculum changes, and left the decision on whether or not to switch kindergarten sessions up to administration.

The transportation committee's report to the board recommended that the board continue its present policy of contracting for school buses, but that the contract be updated and include safety provisions and the provision that the board has authority over the employment of bus drivers.

Committee chairman Dana Hanson said that the committee reached its decision, by majority vote, after much study. He listed some of the towns and companies contacted, and said that the advantages of the town's owning its buses did not appear to outweigh the disadvantages, especially with such a small number of buses. Also serving on the committee were James Grunke and Mrs. Virginia Butterfield, who had done much of the original contract work as a member of the Board of Finance.

Robert Treat praised Mrs. Butterfield's work, and said that

Weather in The Nation

Winter heaped new weather miseries on the country today, snowing snow with zero cold in the Northeast, glazing highways in the south and stinging the plains with still another arctic chill.

The latter stage of snow, ice and record cold claimed 74 lives since Saturday in a variety of weather-related circumstances ranging from traffic accidents to exposure.

Shortages of natural gas used to heat homes developed Tuesday in parts of New England in the wake of some of the coldest weather in 40 years. Residents of South Portland, Maine, were without heat Tuesday as gas shortages also were reported in Manchester and Concord, N.H.

The Southern Connecticut Gas Co. cut back gas to four industries to fill increased demands by homes in Bridgeport.

Although the intense cold which gripped the region Tuesday eased somewhat today, a new batch of subzero temperatures rolled eastward toward the northern states toward the Northeast.

Snow fell through much of the Northeast during the night. Accumulations ranged up to 3 inches in parts of New York and New England. The snow was scattered westward into the Great Lakes region as well.

Temperatures again fell below freezing across the Southeast, and rain turned to a treacherous mixture of freezing rain, drizzle and sleet from northern Georgia to Virginia. Icing conditions extended across all of North Carolina to within a few miles of the coast.

Some western North Carolina communities were reported "locked in" by icy roads. State police requested that travel be limited to emergency traffic only in the northern inland section of the state.

The storm of ice which began in the Southwest Tuesday glazed Georgia from Atlanta northward. Numerous power failures were reported throughout the Atlanta metropolitan area as ice-coated tree limbs crashed down, dragging utility lines with them.

"As soon as we get them fixed in one spot, it happens again somewhere else," said a frustrated Georgia Power Co. official.

More than 70 persons were treated for injuries suffered when they fell on Atlanta's ice-coated walks and pavements. Authorities looked to rising temperatures forecast today to melt the slippage.

Far to the West the same storm system met a wave of cold weather in the southern plains and glazed portions of Texas and Oklahoma. Much of Texas still had not recovered from a sleet and ice storm which hit the state last week-end.

The southeastern Oklahoma town of Kiowa became a temporary boomtown Tuesday night when more than 150 motorists became stalled by the ice on U.S. 69. Police estimated early today some 100 trucks alone in a three-mile line of stalled or blocked vehicles along the hilly road.

No serious injuries were reported in the immediate area of Kiowa.

A fresh invasion of arctic air sweeping across the northern plains, meanwhile, plunged temperatures far below zero once again in the Dakotas and northern Minnesota. The mercury settled to 21 below zero at International Falls, Minn., before dawn.

Events In World

16 Escape Gallows

OTTAWA (AP) — Seven convicted murderers in Canada have escaped the gallows as the result of a Cabinet decision to commute all pending death sentences to life imprisonment. The commutations, announced Tuesday night, follow Parliament's enactment of a law to limit the death penalty for murder to killers of policemen and prison guards for a five-year trial period.

The death penalty in Canada also remains in effect for convictions for acts of treason, violence against the Sovereign, cowardice in battle, mutiny and a few other offenses outside the civil field.

The Liberal government has sent no one to the gallows since taking office in April 1962. Canada's last hanging occurred in Toronto in December 1962, when one man was hanged for shooting a policeman and another for two underworld slayings.

Kuwait Aide Arrives

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — The Emir of Kuwait arrived today for a four-day state visit and talks with the Shah of Iran on the Persian Gulf, oil, trade, security and the defense of the Persian Gulf.

The Emir brought his ministers of interior, defense, foreign affairs, finance and justice with their Iranian counterparts. Iran and Kuwait both border the Persian Gulf, along with Saudi Arabia, Iraq and Qatar. Iran has been building its military strength to protect itself, contending it is threatened by Egypt.

Kuwait backed Egypt and other Arab nations which fought Israel in the June 1967 Arab-Israeli war. Some of its oil revenues to help them rebuild.

Enters Canada Politics

MONTREAL (AP) — Eric Kierans, Quebec politician, economist and former president of the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges, Tuesday night became the first nationally known figure to enter the race for prime minister.

He proposed a "new federalism" aimed at national unity and increasing productivity and income, would reject what he termed such foreign interference as the U.S. government's "job guidelines" for American subsidiaries in Canada.

"We set the rules here," he said.

Kierans, 53, resigned as president of the 100,000-member Quebec Liberal Federation to campaign to succeed retiring Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson.

The Liberal party will choose a successor at its convention April 4-6 in Ottawa.

Kierans said he felt uniquely able to work for greater English-French harmony in Canada because he has been an "English-speaking Canadian working in the political life of the province of Quebec."

Regime Sets Decoration

ATHENS (AP) — Greece's military decorations presented Tuesday night for the first time since King Constantine II's departure Dec. 14, an American got it.

Premier George Papadopoulos made Adm. Charis Griffin, retiring commander of NATO forces in Southern Europe, a Supreme Commander of the Royal Order of George I. It is Greece's highest award.

Making the presentation, Papadopoulos reaffirmed Greece's alliance with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and said: "Our faith in the alliance is firm, and you have our assurances on that."

Mailmen Get Dog Spray

HAMBURG, Germany (AP) — West German mailmen are getting a new weapon against the traditional foe — watchdog. They are being equipped with a spray can that shoots a mixture of pepper and mineral oil.

The declaration of war is being served in letter form on all West German dog owners by the mailmen themselves.

The federal post office claims that last year 2,000 employees were bitten by dogs. Their injuries meant 824 days sick leave, and dog owners had to compensate the post office \$120.

A post office spokesman said the new spray offers off attacking dogs of every breed but canine suffers no lasting effects. The sting goes away in 10 to 15 minutes.

Transport Unified

HAMBURG, Germany — In rebuilding Hamburg, which was heavily bombed during World War II, unified transport stations have been designated. They permit the construction of an electric or underground railway station, a bus station and one parking lot, all interconnected by escalators and walkways.

LBI, Mansfield Agree WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has agreed to a request by Sen. LBJ and Sen. Mansfield to present the administration's legislative proposals to Congress as soon after the opening of the new session as possible. Mansfield also asked his colleagues to take a longer work week and to work harder to speed action on key bills. He asked committee chairmen to schedule early hearings on essential legislation, such as authorization bills to allow financing of existing federal programs.

Power Official Sure WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Lee C. White of the Federal Power Commission says he's confident Congress will pass legislation increasing the reliability of the nation's electric power system. A bill to give the FPC "considerably more voice in the manner in which decisions are reached," is now pending in Congress. White said it might be improved in committee because "discussion of it is taking a constructive turn."

New Postal Service WASHINGTON (AP) — A new service will enable postal customers to obtain the new address for first-class forwarded mail. The Post Office Department announced. To get the new service, the mailer of a first-class letter must write the words "Address Correction Requested" under the return address. If the mail is forwarded the Post Office will deliver a form bearing the new address. A 1-cent fee will be charged for the service.

Bureau Chief Hits Ouster From Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — Everett G. Martin, Saigon bureau chief of Newsweek magazine, left South Vietnam for Hong Kong today after South Vietnam's government refused to renew his visa.

Martin told well-wishers at the airport: "I think it's a very ominous thing for the American press corps. If the Vietnamese government is going to start intimidating us, trying to control what we are reporting, that's back to the American people, this can't be. I hope it isn't a trend."

The troubles involve critical articles in Newsweek about the Saigon regime and the South Vietnamese armed forces. Newsweek issues containing such articles were seized last October and again Jan. 3.

Martin and his wife Linda had been informed last week that their visas would not be renewed, a government action tantamount to expulsion. Later, informed sources within the government indicated that the order would be changed and that Martin would be allowed to stay.

But Vietnamese newspapers printed reports several days ago that Martin was being allowed to stay because the U.S. State Department had intervened. Sources within the government then let it be known that the government could not appear to be bowing to foreign pressure and that Martin would have to leave.

"I disagree with that," Martin said. "The fact that the U.S. government made inquiries doesn't mean it was exerting pressure or that it was intervening—that's exactly what any nation does when its citizens are involved. The Vietnamese government is being far too touchy."

The American people are spending \$20 billion a year in Vietnam and they have the right to have us out here reporting what's happening."

Martin is the first foreign newsman asked to leave by the present South Vietnamese government. In 1965, Jean Ageorges of the Agency France Press was given three days to leave the country. Françoise Bully of Newsweek and James Robinson of the National Broadcasting Co. were expelled in 1962.

This is the 14th year that Manchester and area churches have participated in the UNICEF collection.

Town Requires House Repairs

Manchester's Housing Code inspector made 119 inspections last month and ordered 18 corrections made, according to a report from the town's Health Department.

Inspected were 2 single-family dwellings, 40 two-family dwellings and 11 multiple-family dwellings.

The violations ordered corrected were seven for the removal of accumulated refuse, four for maintenance requirements, three each for lavatory and electrical repairs, and one for replacing a broken window.

During the first six months of the current fiscal year, the Housing Code inspector has made 1,015 inspections and has ordered corrections for 48 violations.

He reports that, as of Dec. 31, only 18 of the 48 corrections have been made.

Manchester's Housing Code is a mandatory requirement under terms of agreements for federal funds. The agreements cover such projects as North End Renewal and housing for the elderly.

The purpose of the code is to prevent deterioration and blight, even while blighted areas are being replaced with new construction.

A special license for deer hunting, bow and arrow, may be obtained for \$5.35 provided the hunter also has a hunting license.
