The Leap-Look Administration

"It is clear," writes a Washington correspondent of the Christian Science Monitor, "the move was a sudden one and has not been thought through in the administration. Officials most responsible frankly admit they are not at all clear how they plan to do it, or what the real effectiveness or economic im-

What this Washington newspaperman was writing about was the President's request to Americans to defer "all nonessential travel outside the Western Hemisphere' while this country improves its currency situation abroad. In addition to asking individual Americans to postpone their travel voluntarily, the White House is expected to ask Congress to do something more realistic about putting enough curbs on travel abroad to cut our tourist expenditures abroad by \$500,000,000 a year.

Aside from its immediately distasteful impact—it is, this time for supposed economic reasons. — another attempt on the part of Big Brother at Washington to put curbs on what ought to be the traditional freedom to travel—the travel curb program seems, then, one more of hose impromptu pieces of decision and action for which the Johnson administration ought to be famous.

The whole world is alert to the Johnson administration's capacity to leap before it looks with regard to both the war-making and the peace-making policies it has applied to the problem of Vietnam. Such decisions as bombing a whole country because a few hand grenting a surprise "peace offensive" into operation before determining what kind of peace might be involved, or inviting one's self to the Vatican while in midair circling the world have been noticed because the issues they touched have

been world headline issues. But the truth is that this is not mere ly the way the leadership now in the White House wages policy on great is sues of war and peace. It leaps before it ooks on other matters too. Quite obviously, quite conspicuously, once Waehington newsmen begin looking closely at the situation, President Johnson leaped into his travel curb program without there having been the slightest advance determination of how it could be done whether it would be worth doing, whether the country would lose more than it gained by doing it, or whether it

really could be done at all. The more the question is explored, the more it is suggested that this country could really get itself into a beautifu snarl of both bureaucracy and principle if it tried to enforce the President's

we have noticed is one which says that the best possible way to try to deal with the dollar deficit situation so far as tourism is concerned would be to increase our efforts to get people of other countries to bring dollars back to us here and spend them here. Foreign tourism to the United States went up some 29 per cent last year. A few enticements like more package tours, more special rates, might increase foreign spending here enough to satisfy the President's dollar goals. That would be a sane and civilized way of meeting an issue—the kind of solution a less impulsive regime in the White House might have figured out even before it threw the problem out the front window for whomever it might concern to solve.

The Enemy Escalates Too

It should be no great news to any real students of the behavior of men and nations to discover that the enemy in Vietnam is currently engaged in doing exactly the same thing the United States has so frequently been accused

The enemy is accompanying talk of negotiation with acts of escalation. Just before, and ever since, the opening of the current North Vietnamese emphasis on the possibility of negotiations, which signal was given on Dec. 30, there has been a pattern of special activity on the part of the North Vietnamese troops in South Vietnam and on the part of the Vietcong. It has been a period of fierce assaults of various kinds, ranging from the direct harassment of American bases up to the infil-

tration and sometimes temporary occu pation of district capitals. The pattern has included some savage and costly direct attacks on American entrenched units, in which the enemy has seeme willing to incur heavy casualties himself in the effort to make Americans at

ome take the war more seriously. In all this, the enemy is doing pre cisely the same thing our own military and our own diplomatic leadership conider the essential part of any willingness to talk peace - trying to demonstrate that it has achieved a position of strength, from which it can make us pay heavily if we don't choose to talk

is common to both sides is this: if you are going to talk soft, hit the other side narder while you're doing it. Obviously, such a tactic, from either

side, is not going to create that atmos phere of benevolent sincerity normally onsidered essential to the creation of he thing called peace. And so long as one side thinks it does have any part of real chance of crushing the other side down to the point where it will have to ry mercy, such talk and hit tactics represent little more than temporary sops to the opinion of mankind.

When, however, neither side can see conclusive victory very likely for itself, there can come a moment in which two eace offensive insincerities can merge into one grudging, wary, unhappy mutual acceptance of some arrangemen which, neither peace nor war in reality, does at least permit the cessation o

The present moment in Vietnam-in which we have been hitting harder and closer with our bombings in North Vietnam-and in which the enemy has been lemonstrating a suddenly stepped-up capacity to mount a variety of small ofensive actions all over the map o South Vietnam-may be such a moment

Reform Without Violence?

General Douglas MacArthur, it develops, has the reputation as the greatest land reformer in all human history. He gained this reputation not because e himself was socialistic by conviction, but because he held supreme power over a whole nation at a moment when land reform seemed a highly practical way of giving that nation a social and economic structure which could make it resistant to future militarism.

The nation was, of course, Japan, and MacArthur was its regent during our post-war occupation, and the land re form American policy and MacArthur's orders then decreed was the most thor ough and inclusive and peacefully achieved land reform program of al

The struggles it takes to bring about land reform in other Asian, Eu ropean or American countries make the MacArthur achievement seem like a miracle by comparison. Obviously, the most efficient way to institute a great democratic reform is to get a whole na-

That made Japan a model, for land reform. What was accomplished there, by simple executive order, has become the envy of all those responsible for bringing land reform to other nations by more democratic processes, like the passage of laws, the negotiating of terms, the careful concern for the best possible degree of justice for all concerned, even, in extreme cases, justice for the rich landlords whose lands are to

Next to Japan, the world's best example of successful land reform seems to Formosa. There the regime of Chiang Kai-shek apparently felt itself obligated to prove that it was just as liberal and progressive as the Communists who had chased it off the Chinese mainland. In Formosa, too, the reform was accomplished by government decree which prevented any really effective opposition by the existing landlord class. But the procedures for the reform seem to have been worked out intelligently and carried out with honesty and ability. and this has made Formosa the model

The prelude to reform had to be the massive defeat, by military means, of an existing social and political order. It was, to speak with what is perhaps a momentary excess of realism, the atomic bomb which ripened Japan for land reform, and the superior way the Chinese Communists handled the weapons we supplied to Chiang Kai-

shek which converted him to his new concern for the welfare of the peasant. What the world still waits for is the formula which can approach sweeping fundamental reforms without requiring wide violence, bloodshed, and destruc-

Think well before you volunteer to say that somebody has already demonstrated such a formula.

pression of an engaging kind of energy. He is precise and thoughtful on finance and the mechanics of welfare, quietly dogmatic about the social ferment. He talks no jargon, which is a rare relief. He chants few slogans. He does not preach or intone. He sounds like a decent, deadly serious, baffled middle class professional man. This, as an executive geared for social rebellion and reform, may be his weakness.
