





Arrest The Bishops Too? The Associated Press transmitted the following dispatch from Danang, Vietnam, the other day.

"Vietnamese police arrested about 100 refugees Monday, saying they were taking part in an anti-American-talk campaign in a produce market in downtown The demonstrators were not carrying placards but were conducting a 'conversation campaign,' talking to other

people about anti-American sentiments,

said A. Wilson Edwards of Louisville,

Ky., public safety adviser to the Danang Police Department. "These people are demonstrating against the American presence in South Vietnam," Mr. Edwards said. "They are demonstrating against bombing by American planes both in North and

South Vietnam. "Mr. Edwards said there had been signs of discontent among the refugees in the Danang area for the past two months. Other American and South Vietnamese sources, however, said the signs had been developing over a longer pe-

Some of the conditions pertinent to such an episode have been a routine part of other news from Vietnam, Many of these same refugees have either fled from United States bombing actions, or have been compulsorily removed from their villages by our military.

But the most important feature of the episode was obviously contained in the news story itself. The arrest of these naof talking against the American presence in Vietnam, was apparently made under the advice and direction of an American official, who held the title of "public safety adviser to the Danang Police Department."

Or, to draw the ironical chain of circumstance out plainly, we, who are in Vietnam to protect the freedom of its people, are giving the orders which arest natives who exercise freedom of speech against our presence.

About the same time our "public safe y adviser" was supervising such arrests in Danang, the 17 Roman Catholic Bishops of South Vietnam were meeting in Saigon, and adopting a resolution calling for an end of United States bombing in North Vietnam. Are we going to have the Bishops arrested too?

The Transplant And Our Beliefs Does what we believe result from what we preach or from what we do? How long can a particular belief with-

stand the onslaught of a common practice which seems to deny it? What, to be specific, becomes of the fundamentalist ideas of immortality in the age of the transplant heart? It will take considerable living, in the new medical climate, to drive out of

human minds (and hearts we might as well say) the idea that the heart is somehow the site of the human spirit. And it will be even more difficult for us to deal with the reconciliation between the civilization of the transplant heart and the supposedly dominant philosophical concept of western civilization-that of the preeminent sacredness of the human individuality.

When the hearts have been switched around here on earth, what happens is the great fundamentalist hereafter? Are the hearts sorted out again, and re

turned to their original owners? And when, as we may soon see it, the heart of one human being walks around in the torso of another, just what is that going to do to our concept about the imperishable uniqueness of each individual?

As such questions are asked among us, it would not be surprising if some fundamentalist denominations began classifying the medical transplant as an unethical, irreligious practice, to be shunned as an offense against the intended order of things. The majority of us may reject any

such view when it arises. But we are all going to look at one another a little differently, when we no longer know which heart is beating in whose chest. And if the way we look at one another then may be embarrassin to some particular religious concepts, i may honor others, like that of human brotherhood

Six Tickets To Leicestershire After getting two-way statistics, the London Zoo has posted signs forbidding

the feeding of its animals. A fair statistical sample of the intake, for the animals, under the old system, showed that in one week the elephants were given five pounds of bread, four pounds of cookles, two pounds of sugar five bags of potato chips, two pounds of nuts, 15 pounds of bananas, 21 pounds of apples, eight heads of lettuce, one conv of the Evening Standard, a gentleman's umbrella, and 15 paper bags. what the animals did in return, or in gratitude. These statistics, accumulated on a yearly basis, show that the animals gave bites to 200 visitors, snatched 14 coats, 12 handbags, 10 cameras, and six return tickets to Leicester. That last item persuades us of the

vision of the Zoo's management in seeking to decrease the degree of contact between visitors and animals. Bites can be medically treated, coats mended, handbags replaced, and cameras repaired, but the only thing to do with six return tickets to Leicester is to turn them over to some novelist or playwright like J. B. Priestley or Thornton Wilder and see what plot of meaningful human happenchance can be woven from them. - Had the six stranded characters trav-

eled down to London together? Did they, perhaps, try to feed their tickets to the animals on purpose? Did some one disappoint their real wishes bitterly by taking up a collection and paying for new fare home? What does it feel like to have London and the whole world stretching before you, and an insignificant piece of pasteboard labeled return ticket to Leicester holding you back? All this is merely an advance, journeyman's exploration of all the pathos and drama which might lie behind that stark simple statistic of six return tickets to Leicester. And if being able to feed the animals at the London Zoo can lead into heartache and trouble as extensive and far-ranging as this, it is indeed a practice as should be shut off.

Morality And Politics

The recent row over selling arms to South Africa illustrates some important points about the relationship of morals to politics. One is the falsity of the commonly held notion (it can hardly be called an argument) that the two have no significant connection and ought to be kept apart. The issue was quite rightly seen by most people as both moral and political. What was wrong about the discussion was the implication, made by many people, that in this, the issue was somehow unusual: one of those odd questions where "conscience" has some contribution to make. In fact, all issues of any importance are both political and moral: for morality is simply the inside, and politics the outside, of every human problem, "Only connect" ought to be the politician's motto as much as

the novelist's. Some of the opposition arguments struck home. If it is wrong to help the regime in South Africa why is it not wrong to support that of Greece or the oil sheikhdoms? Why indeed? Not that these references to other problems even begin to stand up as arguments for selling arms to South Africa. But they are arguments for political and moral consistency, for connecting world problems. Yet there is also a sense in which 'only connect" can be a stultifying injunction, if it means that nothing can


e done unless everything is to be done To demand that we recognize the conction between support for evil regimes in one continent and those in another, is an argument for consistency but it is in that respect a revolutionary rather than a conservative demand. The olitical and the moral conservative both want to divide issues to order to rule. The political conservative wants morality confined to the exercise of some peculiar inner light called conscience, which afflicts some people (notably Left-wing intellectuals), but

which luckily fails to contaminate Some of these other healthy souls escape the moralizing disease. Others have neroically given up the addiction (like smoking in Lent) for the sake of a higher calling-namely economic calculation in the "national interest." But the mcra! conservative assists his political fellowtraveler by demanding that, before his absolute moral principles can be applied to any real situation the full facts must be made perfectly clear and indubitable. Until that moment is reached, he says, the matter is still "open to

argument," and cannot also be open to

categorical moral judgment, which is designed precisely to close the argu-It was against the weight of all this that Mr. Michael Stewart's speech in the Commons on the South African issue last month was set: and it was hardly urprising that such a speech should be hailed as a breakthrough for morality against narrow self-interest. Mr. Stewart, almost alone in the Government, seems to have got hold of the really important point. This is that every public action, and above all every Government action, is a sign as well as a substantive accomplishment in changing the world. He recognized that no matter how loud the disclaimers, selling arms to South Africa is a sign of support for that country's Government and it cannot be made otherwise just by some private internal reservation, by the infividual. Signs are public language. The Humpty-Dumpty view of politics, according to which the economic benefits of the arms deal can be wholly divorced from its significance as a token of moral support for apartheid, is mani-

Thus, the Tory establishment has suffered an agonizing double champion and best vote-getter, Connally, but feels deserted by the man in the White House. The strong possibility then is a transfer of power in Austin next vear to a Republican or - much worse from the Tory viewpoint - to liberal Democratic Senator Ralph Yarborough as Gov-

The role played by President Johnson can be fully understood only by examining Connally's shrouded motives. His associates are convinced he was by no means adamant against a fourth two-year term. Even his wife, Nelly, unenthusiastic about his 1966 third-term try, was willing this time.

But the electoral magic displayed by Connally ever since he was wounded at Dallas was dimming. In 1967, he infuriated the growing Mexican vote by sending Texas Rangers to a rural farm strike and diluted his rural prohibitionist backing by proposing liquor-by-the-drink. Althrough he remained a favorite for 1968, this would not be another walkaway as in

1964 and 1966. What Connally wanted was the kind of White House boost that Yarborough enjoyed in his 1964 Senate re-election: Presidential intervention keeping everybody else out of the primary. Instead Mr. Johnson remained aloof. Just 24 hours before Connally astrounded Texas politics in November by disavowing a fourth term try, a close Connally associate tipped off the White a Texas Tory himself, urging
