Problem Of Aggressive Driver More people have died on the roads of the world than on the battlefields of both world wars. The killing continues at a yearly rate of 200,000 and five million

Road deaths are almost never attributed, except in cases of dangerous driving, to personal violence. The great majority are described as accidents, the weather conditions and a score of other plausible causes ranging up to Acts of God. The psychology of the motorist is usually ignored, yet every time a driver gets into his car he has at the touch of his foot or hand the most dangerous weapon he is ever likely to handle. In

As aggression is one of the primary instincts of man, it is not surprising that many drivers under stress, become dangerously aggressive, cursing, racing, and "carving-up" other drivers. Unfortunately the motorist's environment is accurately calculated to provoke just this sort of conduct. Anonymity and lack of social contact—the joy of the driver as he speeds along in his sealed tin box -are strongly conducive to aggression. Add the classical catalysts of frustration and overcrowding and you have ac-

dangerous driving continue to rise sharply and that nearly five times as many adults are convicted in magistrates' courts for driving dangerously as are convicted for breaking and entering It is also perhaps no coincidence that male motoring offenders outnumber females by more than twenty to one. . . . Support for the theory that aggression is an unaccounted factor in many socalled accidents is lent by psychological studies of the most lethal car driving group in the world, the Ute Prairie Infer greatly from an excess of aggres sive drive which under the peaceful conditions of present-day North American Indian reservations they are unable to discharge. Many of these Indians feel

and describe themselves as ill, but when asked what is the matter with them, they can only say: "I am a Ute." Konrad Lorenz in his book "On Aggression" cites their case as an extreme example of the malaise of modern civilized man. The Ute's accident proneness, he argues, is the result of centuries of selective breeding producing a warrior stereotype, whose repressed

aggression makes him as dangerous at the wheel as he is neurotic in life. Though clearly not as acute, the situation facing all drivers today, is of a similar kind. How to control innate aggression when circumstances and one's ellow-drivers all combine to provoke

"An excess of aggression" is probably too simple an answer to the puzzle presented by such men. For that matter, the scorn that many men profess for women drivers is perhaps less to do with compartive skills than with the sexual symbolism of the car. The remark of a senior police officer quoted by Dr. Willett is apt: "Most men think that criti-

cism of their driving is criticism of their manliness." The point has not been missed by the car manufacturers. Much car advertisng is still firmly directed toward the

gods of virility and violence. Advertising is only the fringe of the problem, an indication of its extent rather than a primary cause. The worst cases of aggressive driving are almost certainly linked to mental illness. This has been recognized in the United States, where certain cities for more than 30 years have had psychiatric clinics at-

tached to traffic courts. Mr. Alan Canty, director of the Detroit Clinic, found in a survey of more than 800 traffic offenders specially re ferred to the clinic by the Courts that 90 per cent of them were mentally ill. The sample contained a large proportion of drivers of very low intelligence and of unstable and immature person-

"It has often been said," Mr. Canty pointed out, "that a person behaves in a manner totally different from his usual pattern when he is behind the wheel of nis car. This is not so. His personality does not change. There is one significant difference; when a driver is in his own car there is more freedom to demonstrate the presence of unsocial, irresponsible and even antisocial traits. 




