Andover Lake Group Will Appeal Decision

A Superior Court decision reported not to have used since the issue was brought into court. The next step in the appeal are drafts of findings by both sides on the facts of the case as each side sees them. Following is the text of McPhee's letter to members of ALPOA: Fellow Member: As you have doubtless learned our suit to restrain a non-member of our association from trespassing on our lake and beach was not decided in our favor.

The trial judge concluded that as the lake beach and rights of way were shown on the same map as the lots which were offered for sale by the Andover Lake Corporation, it was implied that any lot owner has the right to use the lake, beach and rights of way without specific grant and without becoming a member of our organization, and therefore cannot be restrained from exercising this right.

The decision, though, not only affected the minister, but appeared to make the use of the lake for anyone dependent on the language of property deeds rather than membership in ALPOA.

McPhee said in his letter this week, "we will be faced with many questions, such as how these areas will be maintained, how the cost of maintenance is to be paid and the extent to which the use may be exercised. In view of this immediate deadline and in view of the fact that we are faced with lengthy and costly court proceedings to determine the rights and obligations of nonmembers if the decision stands, your board of directors recommended that an appeal be taken to the Connecticut Supreme Court of Errors. Following this recommendation, the board of directors of the Andover Lake Management Association, instructed their attorneys to file such an appeal.

Hebron Townspeople Vote Monday On Public Nursing Program

Voters in town will have an opportunity on Monday to decide if they want to have a general public health nursing program for the town. This will be the first item of business on the agenda of the special town meeting to be held at the Hebron Elementary School Monday at 8 p.m.

In September of 1963, at the request of the Board of Selectmen, a public health nursing pilot program was instituted in the town under the direction of the State Board of Health. It was set up to run not less than three years nor more than five years.

A committee of interested townspeople was organized to study the health needs of the town and make recommendations to the Board of Selectmen on their conclusions.

The committee, assisted by the Public Health Nurse assigned to the area, co-ordinated clinics, arranged transportation, attended mental health conferences and became involved in other activities involving the health of the town.

In January 1967, the committee recommended to the Board of Selectmen that a plan for a general public health nursing program in conjunction with Andover, which was also working under a similar program, be adopted. It also recommended that efforts be made to include a third town with similar interests and goals to assure Hebron services for the long spring.

In the late spring of 1967, the state notified the town that because of personnel shortage that the pilot program would be discontinued in June. But Andover and Hebron were granted an extension of one year, with a limited program, to enable the committees and Board of Selectmen to prepare a presentation, and inform residents before bringing the proposal for an agency to a vote.

According to Mrs. Robert Cafazov, Hebron Public Health Advisory Board chairman, a general public health program would provide a family-centered nursing service and include nursing care and restorative services for the sick, disease prevention and health promotion service for all age groups as well as provide nursing service to the schools.

A public health agency would assure all residents eligible for Medicare of all proper and full services. The town is obligated to provide Medicare services such as therapeutic care, home nursing and physical therapy. These services are being extended.

Heavy Caseloads

The committee and the Board of Selectmen have looked into purchasing the health services needed for Medicare patients from neighboring agencies but they are unable to assist the town due to heavy caseloads in their own areas.

The estimated cost for a three-town unit is estimated at \$27,588. The cost would be shared by the three towns based on population. Andover has approximately 2,100 residents, Columbia has approximately 3,100 and Hebron has 2,800. Hebron's share of the total would be approximately 33 per cent or an estimated \$9,171.

From this \$9,171 the study committee deducts \$769, anticipated income from the agency; \$2,900 state re-imbursment and less the present elementary school nurse salary of \$6,966. The total deduction comes to \$10,324, showing a saving to the town of approximately \$1,153 over having a school nurse for a five-day week.

In order to provide information on the operation of an agency, Mrs. Shirley Fox, the Columbia public health nurse, will attend Monday's special town meeting to answer questions. The advisory committee and the Board of Selectmen will also answer all questions and clarify the issue for those attending.

The other item on the agenda Monday will be whether or not voters wish to accept as town roads, a portion of Elizabeth Dr., and all of Walnut Dr., Oak Dr. and Hickory Dr. in Elizabeth Heights better known as Forest Park.

A Princess on TV: 'I'm Scared'

On Wednesday, Jan. 24, a princess will become an actress — reversing the usual procedure.

"Whether I'll be a good actress remains to be seen," admitted Lee Bouvier (Princess Lee Radziwill and the sister of Jacqueline Kennedy in real life) who stars in the television version of "Laura" on that night. ABC will televise it from 9 to 11 p.m. (It was scheduled for this Wednesday but was postponed to allow coverage of the President's State of the Union message.)

Involved with her, in turning the classic thriller into a TV special, is a heady array of professional talent. The show, taped in London last month, co-stars George Sanders, Robert Stack, Farley Granger and Arlene Francis. It was produced by David Susskind and directed by one of Great Britain's most skillful directors, John Moxey. The script was adapted by Truman Capote.

"But when that tape rolls Wednesday night, there's no question all eyes will be on Miss

Bouvier," stated Susskind. "It's tough enough for a veteran actress to take that sort of limelight. Imagine how a neophyte — and let's face it, this is only Miss Bouvier's second professional role and her first on television — must react."

There was no need to imagine. Miss Bouvier was frank to admit, "I'm scared."

"There were days when I walked into that studio so frightened my knees quivered," she went on. "I told George Sanders about my nervousness because he seemed so much at ease."

Sanders' reaction surprised her. "I'm shamming," he confessed. "I've had butterflies in my stomach before every performance for thirty years, and expect to keep having 'em. If you're not 'up tight' for a show, you'll never be any good as an actress."

As "Laura," Miss Bouvier portrays the victim of a brutal murder, whose memory haunts several men, including a tough New York cop, an acid-tongued newspaper columnist, and a

professional gigolo.

"I saw Gene Tierney in the original movie," Miss Bouvier disclosed. "But Truman — Truman Capote — has so updated the story, that I wasn't influenced by her performance."

It was also Capote who set the wheels in motion for Miss Bouvier's first TV role. When he flew to Chicago to watch her make her stage bow in "The Philadelphia Story," he brought David Susskind with him. Afterward, they agreed to join forces for a TV version of "The Voice of the Turtle."

"But that was too much like 'Philadelphia Story,'" said Miss Bouvier. When David suggested 'Laura' as an alternative, "I jumped at it."

Miss Bouvier recently viewed the finished show.

"But I won't venture an opinion on my performance," she smiled. "I'm hardly an actress, let alone a critic. I just hope those who think I can act are in the majority."

And those who don't? "Please," she sighed, "let them be merciful."

'Peyton Place' at 400: Honors for Persistence

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Peyton Place" marks its 400th chapter next Monday night, passing what seems to be a record for filmed television series.

The ABC serial has not only appeared more times than any other show on film but also has pursued its inexorable course winter and summer with nary a rerun.

Thus "Peyton Place" wins

honor for persistence, if not for excellence. Nobody has ever accused it of being a prestige show. But it is a well-made series, with competent if not inspired acting. Hence it has held a solid core of viewers, though not in the same numbers as before.

"Our ratings this season have been good enough to keep the show on the air, but not good enough to allow any further attrition," admits executive pro-

ducer Paul Monash, who has guided "Peyton Place" from its very beginnings. "We've done well on Monday nights, holding our own with two popular shows, 'Family Affair' and 'Dragnet.' But the movies have hurt us on Thursday night, as they have hurt all series this season."

To avoid further decline in the ratings, Monash plans innovations.

"We can't continue to move

the same characters through the same environment," he remarked. "I plan to send one of the major characters to Boston for a story that will take place there. A young minister and his wife, will be introduced, and they will be linked to the Boston story."

"The purpose is to give the show a broader geographic axis and to start new and dynamic stories. The series must get involved with new characters because frankly, some of our established characters have told their stories. Now we are forced to invent for them what we call camping scenes—scenes in which they stand around and observe the action, just so we can keep them apparent."

"I fear we will lose some established characters before long. I can imagine what the clamor will be, 'Peyton Place' viewers don't like to have the show tampered with."

The series has had a solid core of performers from the start—Dorothy Malone, Ed Nelson, Ryan O'Neal, Barbara Parkins, Chris Connolly, Paul Langton, Monash admitted that it was sometimes a problem to keep them happy.

"There is an increasing restlessness among the actors, naturally so. Mia Farrow left the show and made it in pictures. Leigh Taylor-Young is doing the

same thing. It's only natural for those who remain to wonder if they shouldn't be trying their luck in features.

"My own opinion is that they never had it so good. None of them is overworked, and they are paid very handsomely."

How long can "Peyton Place" go on?

"I see no end to it, though the show may take a different form," said Monash. "As long as it gives pleasure, it might as well go on and on."
