other complications killed Mike Kasperak on the 15th day after his diseased heart was replaced. But doctors believe his experience will help future patients. Kasperak, 54, died at 1:48 a.m. Sunday.

"We think that we are in the process of making observations of tremendous importance to other possible (heart) recipients and to the medical community as well." Dr. Norman E. Shumway told newsmen afterward at the Stanford University Medical

Kasperak's substitute heart, taken from the body of Mrs. Virginia White, 43, after she succumbed to a stroke, apparently functioned well to the time of his death.

Dr. Shumway, who headed the transplant team, said that what should be emphasized is that during this time he survived a fantastic galaxy of complications which we have seen before in other kinds of cardiac patients, but never in such pro-



Time To Talk—Or Hit Some More? same reason, it would appear, Washington is currently engaged in refusing a new concession from North Vietnam. We would like, first, to construct the

case which argues that Washington is doing the right thing. It is actually-the automatic emotional reactions of the peace-seekers aside a very formidable case.

A year ago, the word came from Hanot that Hanoi might be willing to talk if the bombing of North Vietnam should cease. This was enough of a shift away from the previous Hanoi position, which had put the basic conditions for peace in Vietnam ahead of talk itself, to be viewed and accepted, by Washington

analysis, as a concession. The decision then made at Washingon was, that if we had finally brought the North Vietnamese to the point where they were ready to make a first concession to us, the smart thing to do, now that we had begun to soften them up, was to apply even more military pres-

Therefore, although the Hanoi concession of a year ago conformed to something we ourselves had been demanding a year before, we stiffened our position, and went back to bombing and to renewed military pressure everywhere. Now, a year later, Hanol is in the of its statement that talks could follow our halt in bombing to the statement that talks will follow. Even more significant than the change in language is the way Hanoi, this year, has been reiterating and pushing forward its own slight but potentially significant new conces-

In short, Hanoi seems more serious about peace this year than it did last. On that basis, then, it could be argued that it was a wise thing not to take the opportunity that was open a year ago, and a sound thing to keep pounding away at the war for another year, because the additional year of pounding away has produced an additional degree of concession and an increased willingness for peace on the part of Hanoi. Accept all this argument up to this

point, and what do you, or Washington, Do you take this new concession, and move toward negotiations? Or do you decide that now, above all, is the fruitful time to get tougher still and apply even more military pressure until the enemy is hurting so much more he is willing to come even closer toward

Now, for the other side of the picture, how does one argue against such reasoning, and against such a decision? Mainly, one says that pressing for the unconditional kind of victory in an historical situation which demands live and let live compromise is a tragic folly in itself, first because that kind of victory is likely to prove elusive beyond all applications of intensified military force, second because the search for that kind

war sooner or later, and third because even if that kind of victory could be obtained it would be nothing but the seed for future war later on. Further, one could argue that the more force and effort we put into the search for the unconditional kind of victory the more we tilt against ourselves the mind and heart of the very people we are trying to save.

peace when it can be had. About half the people of this country may think that way. Perhaps another half think the other way. This terrible thing did not happen. It was the invention of a blind man who is commissioner of the Office of the Blind in the Pennsylvania State Welfare Department. His invention and false documentation of the hoax was motivated, it would appear, by the intensity of his own feelings about what he imagined to be the real dangers of the use of drugs by young people these days. On being suspended from office as punishment for his act, the commissioner entered a hospital for mental reasons.

So the truth was set loose, to try and catch up with the original story. It will be all right with us if, this once, the truth never does quite catch up with and eliminate that feeling of horror which swept across the nation when the story of the fictional tragedy first appeared. A pervasive survival of a portion of that dreadful fear could probably do more than a thousand other sermons, or a thousand laws, or a thousand arrests, to cut down the resort to drugs at the most important and decisive point of all-at the moment of possible intake. We hope the hoax has spread far enough, and lasts long enough beyond all denials to make it almost certain that any young thing reach-


