At Khe Sanh Bombers Pound Foe
SAIGON (AP) — An armada of American bombers pounded North Vietnam today as they sought to destroy the defenses of the heavily fortified Khe Sanh base. The day's barrage followed on the heels of a two-day attack of heavy artillery, rockets and mortars that Communist gunners slammed into the base and the adjacent peaks Wednesday night, killing seven U.S. Marines and wounding 77. Of the 77 wounded, 37 names, enemy gun positions to hit at the Khe Sanh base and the three strategic hills the Marines control just to the north.
By noon today, the North Vietnamese had dropped another 30 mortar and rocket rounds on the Khe Sanh. But the heavy Marine positions protecting the

Air Quality in Area Found Widely Varied
Air quality in the Manchester area ranges from "questionable" to "acceptable," according to findings in the Capital Region Planning Agency Air Pollution Study report released today.
A band of "questionable" air extends through Manchester, southern South Windsor, and the eastern portion of the western half of Windsor. The "questionable" air rating, however, has not changed. Future development of the area, as projected to the year 2000, will drastically change the air pollution pattern, according to the report.
A major portion of the Manchester area will come under the "unacceptable" air rating, with the exception of part of Hudson, which has "questionable" air quality at this time.
The report warned that "action should be taken now" before pollution levels become unbearable and more costly to abate.

University Research Money For Defense, Space Is Cut
WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense and space agency spending for research and development is being sliced by 20 per cent this year. A private government memo says the cuts threaten programs and jobs at some schools.
Other government agencies also are reducing research spending, putting an additional squeeze on the academic community.
Universities that routinely receive the government research money are being hit hard. The private memo reported: "The cuts have just not hit them yet but are only beginning to be felt."
Schools "realize it is going to get worse, will probably be cut next spring (when contract negotiations will be made)."
"Because impacts haven't hit yet, no firm plan of how to deal with them has evolved at any institution interviewed."

As Tension Continues Over Pueblo
SEOUL (AP) — As tension continued following the capture of the Pueblo, North Koreans tried to break through the American sector of the Korean front today and wounded eight U.S. soldiers.
The North Koreans also attacked a watch tower just south of the demilitarized zone with hand grenades but caused no damage, a U.S. Army spokesman said.
The shooting continued from about 2:30 a.m. until early afternoon. The Communists claimed to have killed 11 Americans and wounded 12.
The Communists' initial claims were all repudiated but it was known if they suffered any casualties, the spokesman said.
Besides the eight Americans wounded, he said, two South Korean soldiers attached to the U.S. 2nd Infantry Division were killed and another was wounded. This brought the American total to one dead and 12 wounded.

Rockefeller Is Subject Of Romney
NARBUA, N.H. (AP) — Michigan Gov. George Romney ran an early-morning mile at the Narhua YMCA today then advised New Hampshire voters who admire New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller that "the second course" is to support the Rockefeller campaign for the Republican presidential nomination.
"Nelson Rockefeller has indicated in every way he can that he's supporting me and will continue to support me," Romney said in an interview on a local radio station (WFSB). "And I think that if the people who regard him as highly as I do will listen to him, they will recognize that the sound course is to do what he's telling them to do."

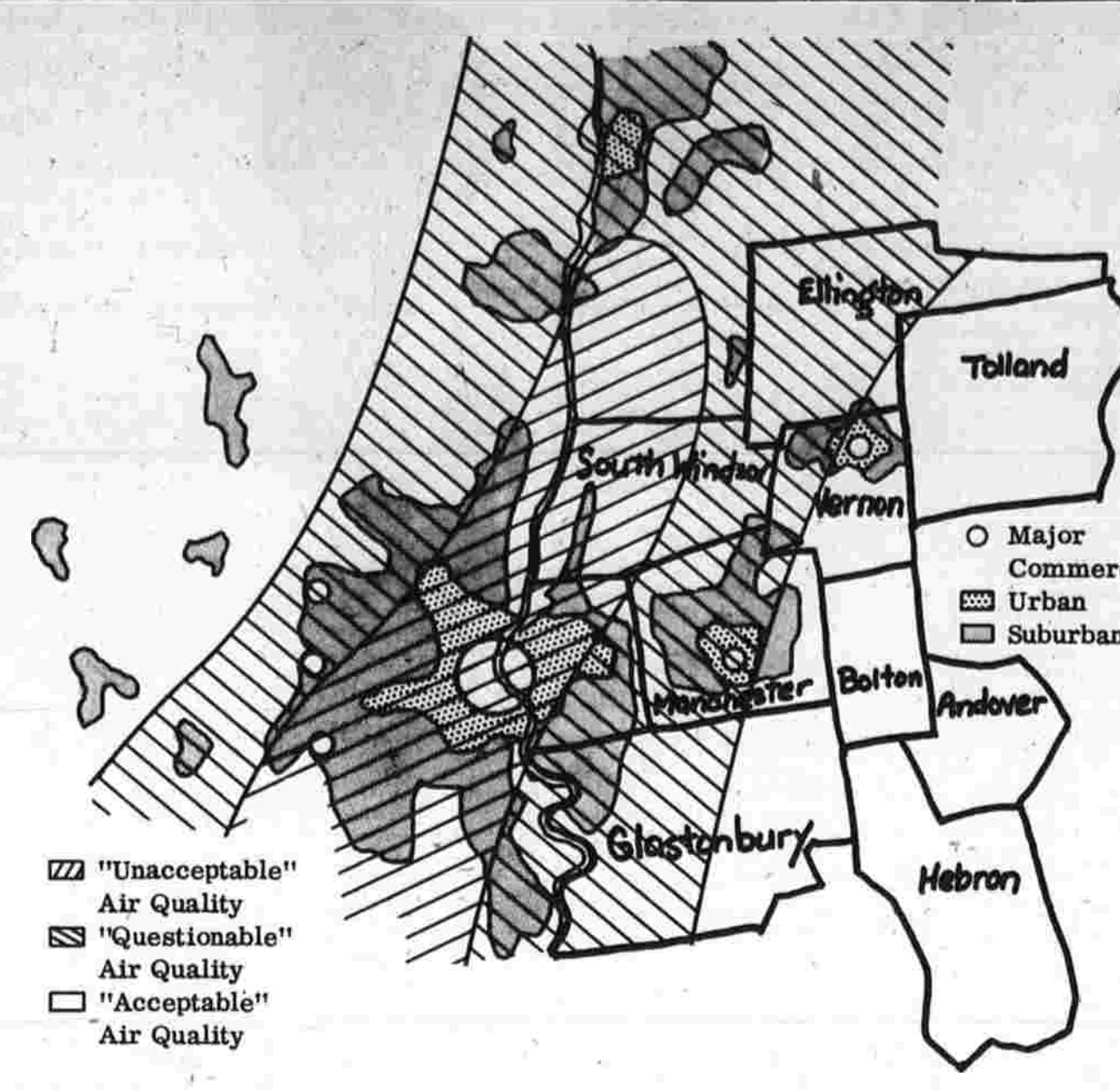

Air Pollution: Region Reflects U.S. Problem

Air pollution results from the particular problems and goals of each region or district. The districts would operate under minimum state standards to be established by the State Board of Health.

The report predicted that various modifications and controls of present pollution violators such as cars and electric generating plants; will be offset by other sources in the 20-year region air quality plan.

The amounts of pollutants produced each day in the region equals the amounts emitted by some of the country's well-known trouble spots on a per capita basis. Emissions in parts of downtown Hartford are as dense as in New York City, according to the report.

The only sure way to deal with the air pollution problem is the immediate establishment of a vigorous air pollution control program to prevent any increase in pollution and to reduce present pollution, the report said.

If no adequate control of air pollution discharges is established, a severe air pollution problem in the region will develop, the report said.

The report noted the need to extend the controls outside the region, as pollutants "are no respecters of town or regional boundaries."

The establishment of regional air pollution control districts for nitrogen oxides are caused equally by cars and heating systems, while sulfur oxides are produced mainly in industrial heating and power generation plants burning high sulfur fuel.

Town Educators Take Part In Workshop TV Program

"The Stamped for College Admissions" is the topic for the first in a series of live "audience participation" television programs to be broadcast throughout the Northeast this evening under a regional educational project in which several persons from Manchester will be participants.

CRPA Study's Plan: Control Areas, Laws

The Capitol Region Planning Agency's air pollution study of the region calls for the adoption of air pollution control districts and legislative enactments to fight the growing air pollution problem.

A multi-faceted approach, similar to steps taken to combat water pollution, is recommended in the report by Stanley Leven, chairman of the Natural Resources Commission of CRPA.

The report noted the continuing increasing problem of air pollution in the region, and the need to include industrialized areas outside the region.

"The opportunity now exists to initiate a control program before pollution levels become unbearable and more costly to abate," Leven stated.

The report recommended CRPA establish a regional air pollution program for the Capitol Region's 23 towns. It suggested this be accomplished through the formation of an "air pollution control district" under the Connecticut Air Pollution Control Law.

The district should be defined by the State Health Department and should include the Capitol Region towns plus New Britain, Bristol and Plainville.

Any board created to manage the district should be made up of representatives from the towns.

The report urged the Regional Council of Elected Officials (RCERO) to work toward the establishment of a regional air pollution control district and promoting the passage of amendments to the 1967 State laws.

These amendments as suggested by CRPA would call for the definition of air pollution control districts; the organization of the districts including the question of appointment or election of district representatives, and an outline of the powers and duties of the districts.

The CRPA report called for several actions to be undertaken by the State Board of Health including the defining of air pollution control districts; the establishment of statewide air quality criteria, and minimum air pollution emission standards.

These findings would serve as the basic minimum for regional air pollution control enforcement programs.

CRPA also asked the expansion of the State air pollution laboratory and monitoring programs, particularly in the monitoring of air quality in the Capitol Region and other trouble spots in the state until the districts can be established.

The report also stated that the findings, conclusions and recommendations contained in
