The Pre-Shortened Truce A year ago the Tet truce in Vietnam lasted longer than it was supposed to There was, on our part, an informal extension of the bombing pause. It was a period of letters to Hanol of rumors from Moscow, of various diplomatic activities which seemed to have the purpose of trying to parlay the holiday pause into cease fire and negotiation. The bombing pause came to a halt by sudden and unexpected order of the

President, at a moment when there was actually great speculation that it might continue indefinitely. Much cynical analysis since that time has calculated that what concerned Washington was not the possibility that the enemy might use a prolongation of the bombing pause to step up his preparation for more war, but the possibility that he might really be seeking peace on terms cheaper than we might be able to

impose if we bombed him for another year or so. This year things are different from the start. There is even more than the normal amount of seasonal diplomatic activity. British Prime Minister Wilson is in Moscow, to see if the Russians can be of help in opening high level moves

for peace in Vietnam. There is apparently a secret Johnson message to Moscow, probably, the cynics will say, to warn the Russians that Prime Minister Wilson isn't authorized to speak for the United States in matters of peace and war.

Prime Minister Pearson of Canada has envoy heading for Hanoi, to see i there are possibilities for peace there that Washington is refusing to see or failing to disclose. But whereas, last year, the same kind

of activity had the effect of forcing the United States into a temporary and unwilling extension of the bombing truce, the result this year has been a shortening of the Tet truce before it even begins. It had originally been scheduled to be a 48 hour affair, but now the Saigon government, which can be assumed to be reflecting our own will in such a matter, has cut it to 36 hours.

Again, although the surface explanation of such a decision concentrates on the possibility that the enemy might be using its truce period to prepare for harder fighting afterward, the real American fear of the truce would seem to be the fear that it might promote new pressures for peace before the enemy has been punished severely enough to make him ready to take our terms. We cut the truce to show how tough we are.

Around The Clock Forever? In Copenhagen, Danish beatniks took the news as the occasion for a demonstration against the United States. In this country, reaction was mainly one nudging our own realizations, back to something we would rather forget. It is still-who really ever thought dif-

ferently—the kind of world in which we make it a regular business to keep hydrogen bombs always in the air so that when the signal for war comes, they can be on their way in one split second Why do we, the American people, feel that we have to keep hydrogen bombs in the air 24 hours every day of every year to be ready to respond to the pos-

sible launching of hydrogen bomb against ourselves? Because we, of all people, know that it is possible for one nation to drop nuclear weapons on another. We were the first to do it.

There is perhaps serious question whether, ever since we dropped our bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945, it hasn't been the main purpose and absorption of our living to wait and prepare for the moment when the bomb comes back to us. We can never quite believe it, any of us, that it isn't coming to us sooner or later, that we aren't fated to reap some of the whirlwind we

It is part of our curious national psychology with regard to the nuclear that these perpetual in-flight hydrogen bombs of ours frighten us, ourselves, much more than they frighten any of our po-

And the question they pose to us is frightening, too. It is this: Are we ever going to be able to convince ourselves it will be safe to give up keeping these hydrogen bombs peramounts to our number one national nec-

essity so long as we shall remain a nation? How can we ever stop?

'It was just what they put on everybody who goes on a TV show,' an aide said defensively." Incidentally, the net result of the new hair dress and the deep sea-going tan seemed to be the closest impersonation President Johnson has yet given of one Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The President was using a teleprompter, but also had a text in hand in case the machine went haywire. At one stage in the speech, he turned the text forward, a dozen or so pages at once, to the point he had reached on the teleprompter.

These are some of the details which, by after the speech curiosity, comment and speculation, seemed to be of much more public interest and importance than anything in the speech itself.

Food For Satire In theory democracy ought to benefit from mass communications. In practice it is not working out that way. Here in Britain there seems to be almost a total breakdown in communications between the political leaders and the people. Indeed, the politicians seem to have given up trying. Mr. Gunter, the Minister of Labour, prophesies disaster unless, etc., etc., but for the rest of the Cabinet gets on with its cuts debate in private, planning a programme of tourniquet and surgery, which can only bring down the

standard of living. That there is another option is barely understood. We could work our way out, but the politicians and the economists have all decided that output is the most uncertain of the variables in the economic equation. It now seems to be taken for granted that you cannot raise output rapidly without dangerous increases in demand—that is to say, you cannot hope for growth without the

wages and profits front. If we could get greater output without an increase in distributed profits and wages and salaries, then the benefit of higher productivity could be passed back to the community in stabilized or reduced prices. But the "if" is treated as so hypothetical that it is discounted as

economy boiling over again on the

Exhortation has become one of the dirty words in post-war politics. It has failed since Sir Stafford Cripps's time and our political leaders now are not going to risk losing face by making appeals that look as though they won't come off. Considering the power of perspasion that is accessible to politicians through broadcasting and the press, it is astonishing to what small effect it has

From the politicians' point of view television has been counter-productive At elections it seems to have had little effect in shifting votes, and between elections it has reduced political leaders to objects of derision on the satire programmes. The effect has been to diminish the self-confidence of political lead-

This is a great disappointment to any one who believes that the political debate ought to be opened up, whether on television or in the press, and that a democracy will function better if fully engaged in the argument. One begins to wonder, and to generate dangerous thoughts. Is it a good thing to have Ministers chatting up David Frost on Christian name terms? Would not the Ministers be better advised to preserve


a certain mandarin dignity? I hope not, yet perhaps the political leaders themselves are to blame for exposing themselves continuously to the buffoonery of the hustings. At any rate we ought to ask why derision has become the conventional stock response

Is this to be put entirely at the door a mood rather than create it. And is it a good and necessary part of democracy that politics should be treated simply as so much raw material for Private Eve? But could not a democratic Govern

ment make itself felt more effectively? think it could, but in politics as elsewhere actions speak louder than ministerial broadcasts. The failure may have been not so much in the use of mass ommunications as the assumption that words can alter the facts and change events, and can be used a substitute for

For a Government to say that certain conduct is anti-social or politically motivated or whatever (the seamen's strike, the docks strike, restrictive practices, inefficient management), and do little or nothing about it is to devalue its own

The Labour Government was elected on a tide of goodwill and a substantial measure of public altruism. To let the altruism and the aspirations for a better Britain evaporate into the present mood of defeatist cynicism seems to me to have been due to a failure to recognize that altruism and aspiration should be the springboard for political action. 
