In Spite Of The Bombing? Defense Secretary Robert McNamara

seems to be leaving office with at least a paper victory in one of his arguments. The departing Cabinet member has consistently held that the American bombing of North Vietnam has been a strategy of limited result, incapable of imposing any tangible limit on the ability of North Vietnam to operate south of its own borders.

And, in the past few days, the reports of our military establishment in South Vietnam have been sustaining McNamara's contention. These reports all concerned what may

be the greatest regular style battle of the whole war. They began by crediting the enemy with moving a force of 10,000 men down into the Khesanh area in search of a major battle.

That force of 10,000 was augmented by daily reporting until, at one point, it had reach a 40,000 figure in the estimates of our own generals.

Not only was the enemy reported moving 40,000 men into one particular sector. There were also mentions of something never before reported in this war—the apparent movement of military armor, even including tanks, along the roads to the area. At the same time, what have been thought to be the opening phases of the battle have featured extensive ahelling of Marine positions near Khesanh. To meet all this threat, extensive emergency movement American reinforcements has been considered necessary, with at least 15,000

airborne troops being shifted to the area. The proportions of the enemy forces reported in this early paper reporting of the potential battle may shrink later on, and the battle itself may never take place. If it should take place, it would reveal the enemy moving into a striking new phase of the war, reflecting either confident boldness or last ditch desper-

ation on his part. Perhaps no one really knows which it may be—a lead from strength or a lead from desperation.

But there is one thing it does not reflect. It does not indicate that anything has interfered with the enemy's ability to move south into South Vietnam with as much force as he pleases.

This actual experience, this tardy lemonstration of what Secretary McNamara claimed in his testimony before Congress, may prove the McNamara point, so far as the practical physical re sults of our bombing are concerned. Actually, however, neither the claims

of our Air Force enthusiasts nor the downgrade evaluations of Secretary Mc Namara have discussed the real purpose of the bombing of North Vietnam. That real purpose, in our opinion, was always intended to be mainly psychoogical. It was intended more to make he North Vietnamese afraid to keep on lighting in the South than it was to in terfere with their actual physical movement South. It was designed to break heir resolve as well as blow up their

Our bombs were aimed more at their minds than at their roads. We knewor should have known from the Korean war-that it was impossible to halt their transport, but we did hope to blast their will. But our own military reports of the moment credit them with both the physical ability and the will to send their largest concentrated force of the whole war into something close to a set battle with us. If these reports are reliable, and not merely some weird kind of inverted propaganda on our part, they would indicate that the bombing of North Vietnam has failed on both counts.

A More Fallible Detroit?

The news from Detroit is that our automobile manufacturers are planning to have themselves something like 9,000,000 car year in 1968. This would compare with a 8,300,000

car year in 1967, which was the lowest sales figure since 1964. It would still fall short of the all time record year, which was 1965, when sales

totaled 9,300,000 cars. The kind of year Detroit is expecting something short of the all-time record -and the atmosphere in which Detroit is forming its estimates—are both interesting indications of some minor development of maturity on the part of

this nation's biggest business. There was a time when it was auto matic, not to be questioned, that each year had to be bigger than the last Each year's production had to be scheduled as if a regular, normal, guaranteed expansion of the market were certain to

Not only does Detroit refrain, this year, from binding itself to a goal larger than anything it has ever reached before, but it demonstrates a commendable degree of uncertainty about the complete validity of the production schedules it is setting up. It is debating with itself whether they are not indeed too high for what the public buying instinct may actually prove to be in the new year. Such debate at least is new, and in contrast to the old blind euphoria with which Detroit felt itself compelled to operate in its own combined manufacturing and salesmanship functions. There is at least on record, as the new year opens, some admission that people. not computers, are likely to have some thing to do with how many cars are sold this year. That happens to be the first law of good salesmanahip—the creation of the illusion, in the mind of the target, that he is going to be the one who makes the decision.

Too Sane To Stay?

One of the stories about the resignation of John W. Gardner as Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare recalled a fragment of his writing, which went as follows:

"The society which scorns excellence in plumbing because plumbing is a humble activity, and tolerates shoddiness in philosophy because it is an exalted activity, will have neither good plumbing nor good philosophy. resigned. No one with that amount of sanity still left in his makeup should be left exposed lonesome and defenseless in the midst of our official White House As for the supposedly veiled reasons

why Secretary Gardner chose to go, and why he was let go with such unceremonious short ceremony of pretended regret on the part of the White House, we think it well might have been that Secretary Gardner found he didn't like either the plumbing or the philosophy where he was.

The United States will never extricate itself with honor from its Vietnam involvement unless it achieves a better comprehension of how it became entrapped. - NEW YORK TIMES




