There are two important musical events scheduled for the week. One will appeal to symphonic buffs, while the other is of interest to opera fans. Specifically, we have Russian composer Aram Khachaturian as guest conductor of the Hartford Symphony in a program chosen entirely from his own compositions. And we have Puccini's "Manon Lescaut" with Tabbald, Bordello and Domingo.

Directly speaking, Khachaturian is of Armenian extraction and Armenians from far and wide will make up a goodly portion of his audience; many will arrive by chartered buses from out of state, for he is making only a limited number of appearances in this country. He is a colt by training, so it is no surprise that the program will include his new cello concerto which he premiered recently in this country with the brilliant Rostropovich as soloist. Hartford will hear Karlene Georgian in this part. She is the latest Chaklovsky competition winner in Moscow, the same competition that launched Van Cliburn on his career.

Khachaturian is best known, of course, for his ubiquitous "Sabre Dance" which has been danced by everything from dance bands to symphony orchestras, and it will be included on the program as a matter of course. It is as excerpted from a large ballet called "Gayane" and was composed in 1904 by the composer himself. It is a thoroughly associated with the field of

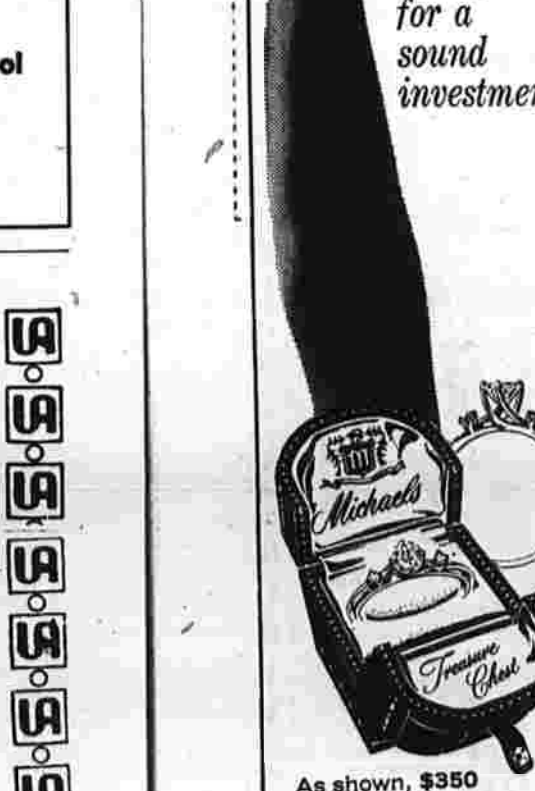

Mishaps Kill Three in State On Weekend

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Two persons died on Connecticut roads during the weekend in separate traffic accidents, and a kitchen fire took the life of an 82-year-old Groton woman.

In an incident related to a car crash, a 66-year-old man collapsed and died in Lisbon. Dead as the result of a one-car crash Saturday on Interstate Route 81 in Middletown was 21-year-old Catherine Morrison of Thomaston. The police said she was the passenger in a car driven by Arnold Adler, 20, of Colchester.

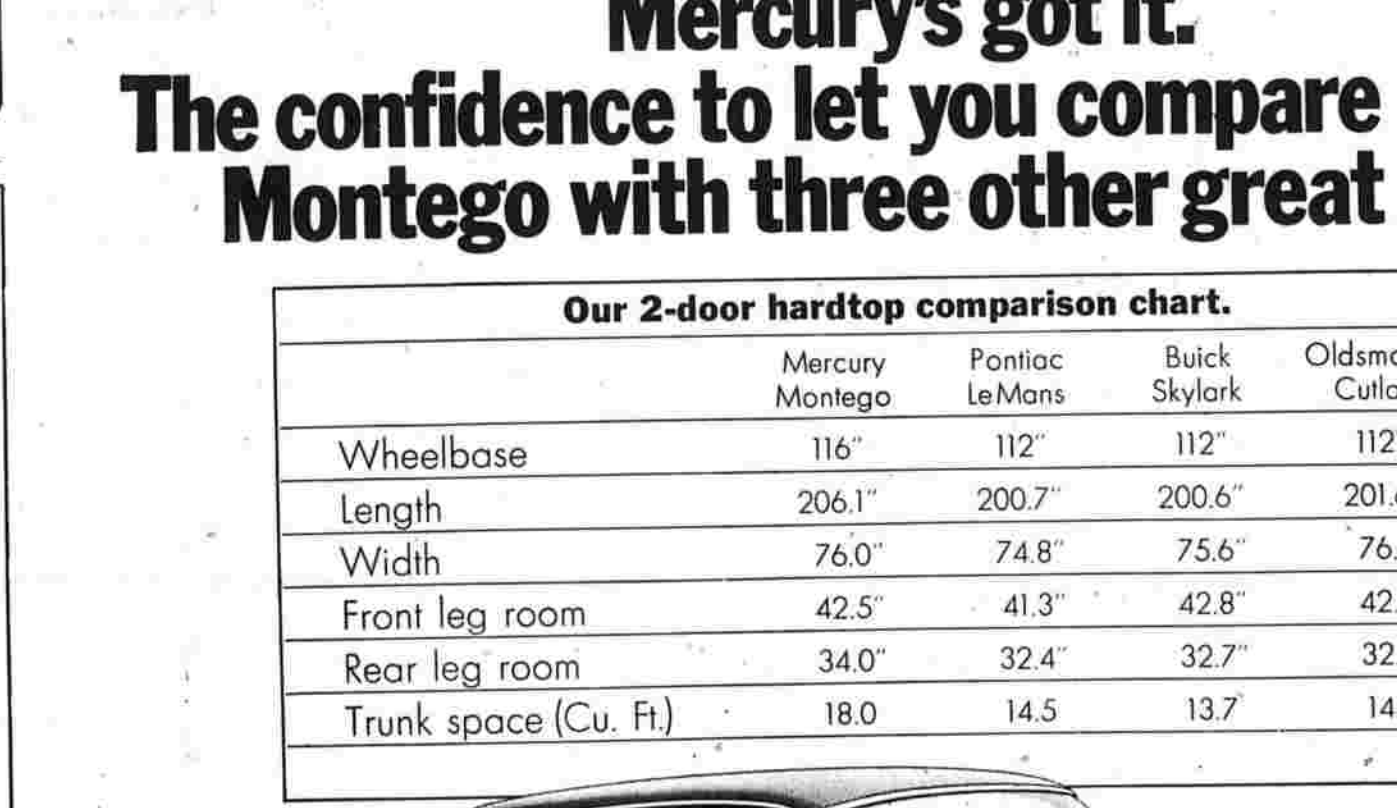
The car swerved off the highway and crashed into a concrete culvert, authorities said. Adler was reported in satisfactory condition in Middlesex Hospital after the incident. Kenneth Griffith, 19, of Newington was killed late Friday night when a car he was in collided with another on Route 72 in Berlin. Three others in the mishap were injured, one of them seriously, police said.

Mrs. Mable Henderson was burned fatally when a fire broke out Sunday in the kitchen of her two-story house in the West Mystic section of Groton. The victim was carried unconscious to the hospital and died eight hours later in Lawrence Memorial Hospital of second- and third-degree burns. Several rooms were badly damaged by the blaze.

Dominique Bennett, 66, of Northville collapsed and died Saturday, minutes after his car veered off Mill Road in Lisbon and struck a stone wall. The police said Bennett apparently suffered a heart attack after reporting the accident on a nearby telephone.

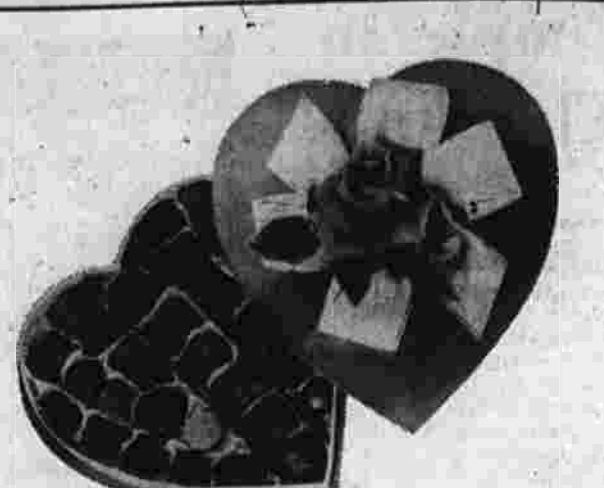

Education Board to Adopt Operating Budget Tonight

The Board of Education will have its review of departmental requests tonight at 8 in the board room. The school budget for the current year is \$6,268,000, and annually amounts to about 85 percent of the total General Fund budget. A raise for teachers and a \$30,000 hike for custodians. 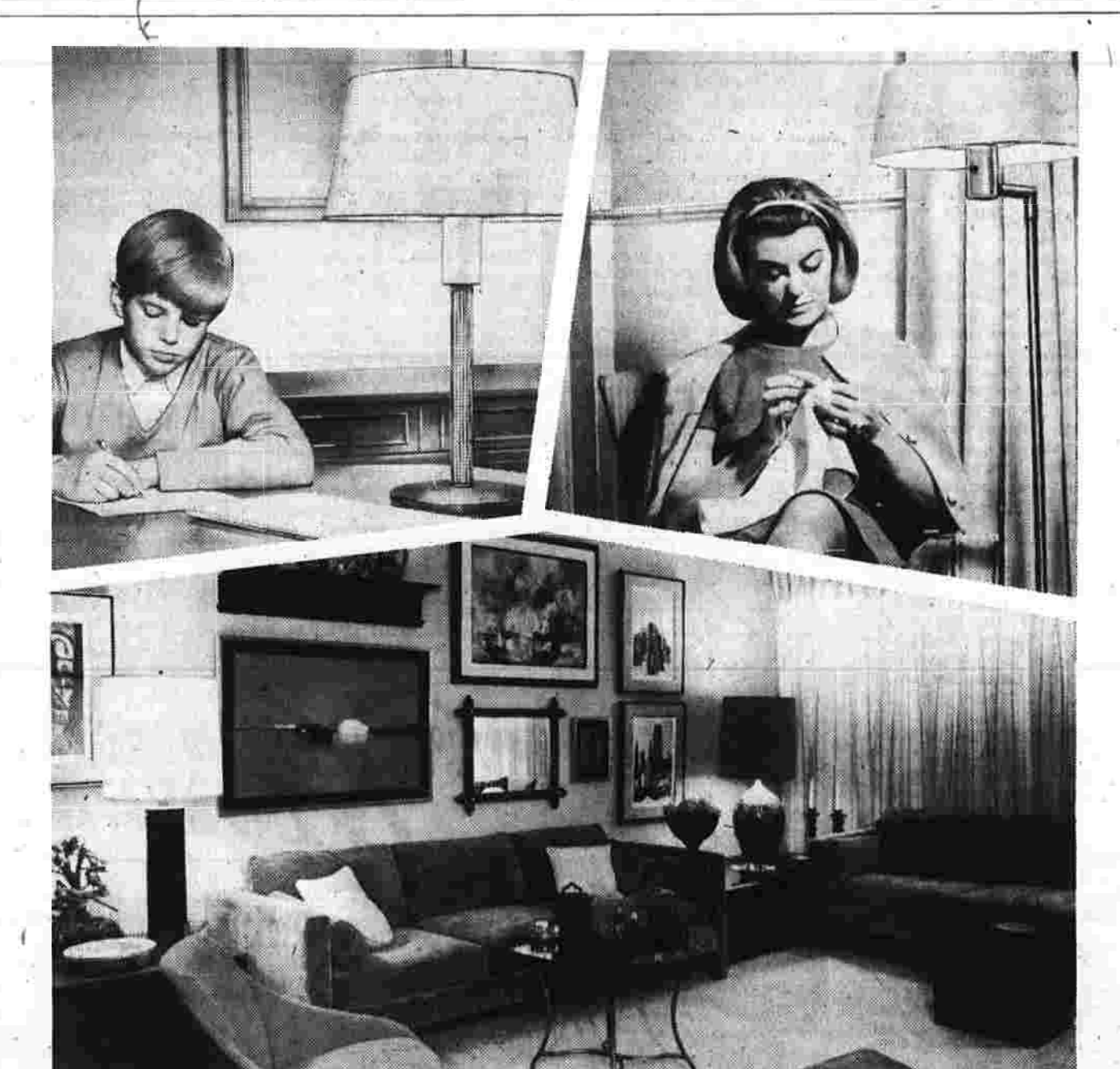

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Contrary to the euphoric propaganda coming from President Johnson's political advisers in Washington, the California Democratic party is scarcely in better shape today than six months ago when Democratic leaders were privately predicting certain disaster ahead.

Both the powerful speaker of the State Assembly, Jesse Unruh, who runs the Democratic show at the state capitol here, and Sam Yorty, maverick mayor of Los Angeles, are boycotting the Johnson-pledged delegation headed by State Atty. General Thomas C. Lynch.

As of this writing, there is no chance that either one of these political power brokers will join the delegation now being put together by Mr. Johnson's White House and California operatives. The Lynch delegation will run against a left-leaning slate of delegates headed by Senator Eugene McCarthy of Minnesota, whose name, unlike Mr. Johnson's, will appear on the Presidential primary ballot next June.

The significance of the Unruh-Yorty snub to the White House can only be understood in the light of the intense White House efforts to get to join. In fact, the erroneous assumption in the White House even today is that Yorty will come around sooner or later and allow his name to be included on the delegation. There is only futile White House hopes for Unruh, who has been urging State Atty. Robert F. Kennedy to challenge for the Presidency. But that's only the start of the President's deep problem in this snare pit of losing Democrats.

At a meeting in a locked room at San Francisco International Airport early last month, leaders of the Johnson delegation held a strategy session with one secret attendee: former Gov. George Miller, who has been more heat and friction than campaign strategy.

The meeting included the party's high command: former Governor Edmund G. (Pat) Brown, National Committee Chairman Eugene McCarthy, State Chairman Charles Warren, Rep. Carl Albert, General George Miller, and key state legislators (not including Unruh, of course). Starting smoothly enough, the meeting soon developed into a primrose path between Brown and Albert, General Miller, and Albert.

NEW YORK (AP) — Howard Lindsay, actor and playwright who collaborated with the late Russell Cross on several Broadway hits, died Sunday of leukemia at his Manhattan home. Lindsay, 78, was best known for his writing and acting in "Life with Father" which ran on Broadway for 7 1/2 years. In 1946 Lindsay and Cross won the Pulitzer Prize for their play "State of the Union." Lindsay won the 1960 Anthony Perry Award for writing the book for "The Sound of Music."

Snowy Owl Comes South to Bolton

This visitor to the Birch Mt. Rd. area of Bolton must have felt right at home in the white deep-freeze this weekend. He's a snowy owl, who normally inhabits the arctic tundras. His appearance this far south is said by the experts to be quite rare and occasioned by his search for food when the cupboard gets bare at home. His usual food consists of lemmings, other small rodents or birds. The big fellow stands about two feet tall, has a wingspread of 54-56 inches, frequents open country, and is one of the few owls who can see equally as well in the daytime as at night. All of which may prove helpful information if you plan to search for the Bolton visitor, whose presence in the Tinker Pond Rd. area was reported Thursday afternoon by Mrs. Howard Swiney. week, whatever is lesser. If the employer on such a reduced income basis during illness or injury is hospitalized at least one day his exclusion begins from the first day of such reduced absence.
The first 30 days of his exclusion goes up to the weekly amount upon the length of his absence and the percentage of normal pay received.
Let's consider first the income earner who in 1967 received more than 75 per cent of his regular pay (it could have been full salary).
In his case, sick pay exclusion begins after a 30-day waiting period. The statement should show the full wage payment up to a weekly maximum of \$100.
For periods less than a regular full week compute the exclusion on this basis: If you normally work a six-day week the normal actual daily exclusion is \$20 or pay, whichever is lesser.
In such cases the waiting period is reduced to seven calendar days.

Aged Cardinal Resigns

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI today accepted the resignation of Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro, one of the leading figures of the Catholic hierarchy, as archbishop of Bologna.
The resignation of the Cardinal was stepping down because of his age and his health. He is 78.

Thailand

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — The Communist Party of Thailand recently headed the Vatican's Special Commission for Liturgical Reform, which has decreed sweeping changes in worship services.
The Communist government and the cardinal often warned against the dangers of Communism. But in 1966 the Communist major made him an honorary citizen of the city.
In his last public statement on Jan. 2, he declared that the church was obtained by cop-reference to ask the United States to stop bombing North Vietnam.
The Vatican has accepted the resignation of a number of aged cardinals who held high offices in the Vatican Curia, the central administration of the church, but most of them have been conservatives.

Paraguay Head Is Re-elected

ASUNCION, Paraguay (AP) — Gen. Alfredo Stroessner was re-elected Sunday to another five-year term as president of this landlocked nation that he has ruled with an iron hand since 1954. His Colorado Party was collecting about 75 percent of the vote.
The Colorado won control of the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate, which was created under a new constitution last August. The constitution also removed the limitation of two terms for a president, allowing Stroessner to run for a third term.
Presidential candidates for the February 15 election were Radical Liberal parties all issued statements saying the election was a step toward democracy. It was the first time Stroessner had allowed active opposition in an election.
The 55-year-old authoritarian willingness to allow a limited return to democratic practice was generally viewed as a refection of the solid control he has over this impoverished nation of 2.5 million people.

The offer was made by the Very Rev. Francis B. Sayre Jr., dean of the Episcopal cathedral, who called King "this generation's apostle of nonviolence."
King, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, said Sunday he would be honored to speak in the cathedral but added he did not desire it to be worked into his schedule.
The march is scheduled for April and plans for participation exceeded by about 5,000 poor persons, mostly Negroes, in a demonstration aimed at persuading Congress to enact legislation to provide jobs or income for the destitute throughout the country.

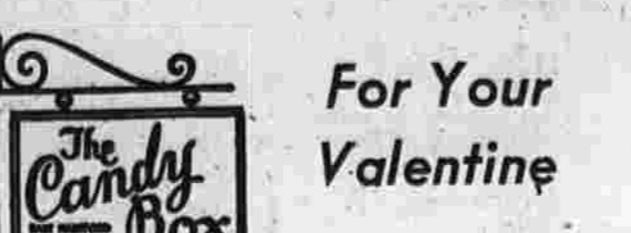

WASHINGTON (AP) — At least one Southern Democrat in the Senate will join Republicans today in honoring the birthday anniversary of Abraham Lincoln, GOP patron saint and Civil War president.

Amid preparations for "Lincoln Day" observations around the nation, traditional occasions for speech-making and campaign fund-raising efforts by Republican politicians, Sen. Harry F. Byrd Jr., D-Va., said of Lincoln:

"He was one of our great presidents." "Had he lived," said the senator in an interview, "the plight of the South would have been much less severe."

Visitors to his Senate office find a portrait of Lincoln in a prominent position on Byrd's desk, emblazoned on the front of his leather-covered appointment book.
