

## LBJ Recounts 2-Day Tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson gave an enthusiastic account today of a six-hour meeting with Dwight D. Eisenhower that climaxed a transcontinental tour. During his week-end tour, Johnson said more troops will be sent to Vietnam if needed.

Johnson visited the former Republican president Sunday at Palm Desert, Calif., before flying back to the White House. Their marathon get-together embraced both serious talks about Vietnam and an 18-hole round of golf. "He did beat me," Johnson said. "He's really a professional."

Before flying by helicopter to the luxurious Eisenhower winter home, Johnson bade personal farewells to Vietnam-bound Marines and Army paratroopers and spent Saturday night aboard the carrier Constellation off the California coast.

He also told newsmen during his busy, secrecy-cloaked travels that troop strength in Vietnam will be raised beyond the authorized level of 525,000 "if we need to."

Talking with newsmen aboard his jet transport as it neared Washington, Johnson described his journey as "very interesting and helpful."

He talked about his personal sendoff of Army and Marine troops headed for Vietnam from Pope Air Force Base, N.C., and El Toro Marine Air Station, California.

As for Eisenhower, it is to be assumed Johnson was not unimpressed with the political implications of his friendly meeting with the only living ex-Republican president in this election year.

"I really honestly believe he has been as helpful to me as any one person since I've been President," Johnson declared.

At the outset of his visit to the Eisenhower home at the El Dorado Country Club in Palm Desert, Johnson was accompanied by Lt. Gen. Lewis W. Walt, deputy commandant of the Marines and a Vietnam veteran, and Walt W. Rostow, the President's special assistant for national security affairs.

These men, Johnson reported, briefed Eisenhower on crises in Vietnam and Korea for about an hour.

CHICAGO (AP) — Detective John Manley was driving an unmarked police car Sunday when an auto with flashing red lights and blaring siren pulled up behind him and signaled him to the curb.

## U.S. Warns Of Pueblo Treatment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department has said once again the captured Pueblo crew members should not be treated as war criminals, but declines to comment on the significance of the new statement.

The department reaffirmed, without elaboration, Sunday that North Korean treatment of the 82 survivors would be considered "a deliberate aggravation of an already serious situation."

A similar statement was issued Jan. 26, three days after the intelligence-gathering ship was captured near Wonsan Harbor, North Korea. One crewman is reported dead and some others injured but details are not known here.

The department quoted from a "joint letter of apology" which North Korea alleges was written by the crewmen. The letter says in part, "We know that when one is captured for conducting espionage against a foreign country, he should be severely punished in accordance with the law of that country."

The Pueblo case is expected to come before Congress Tuesday when a CIA representative appears at a closed session of the Senate Appropriations defense subcommittee.

A principal topic at that session is likely to be the progress being made in efforts to negotiate the release of the men.

There has been talk this might take a year or more.

The Joint Military Armistices Commission at Panmunjom has been discussing the Pueblo case.

The commission held a session today during which the United States admitted two American planes violated North Korea's air space and expressed regrets. The U.S. spokesman said bad weather, the pilots' un-

# Battle-Wearied U.S. Marines Push Through Citadel Ruins

SAIGON (AP) — Battle-weary U.S. Marines moving behind a protective umbrella of artillery pushed 400 yards through the rubble of Hue's Citadel today to the brink of one of the last Communist strongholds in Vietnam's old capital.

Elsewhere, the Viet Cong slammed more rockets and mortars into Saigon and a few other cities today, but the Communists' "second wave" offensive appeared to be easing off considerably in its second day. One rocket hit a passenger terminal at Saigon's Tan Son Nhut Airport, killing one U.S. serviceman and wounding 21 as they waited with 180 other GIs for planes home after a year in Vietnam.

As the bloody battle for Hue raged through its 20th day, the Marines pushed to the southeast corner of the old walled Citadel. Then they turned right to begin a drive along the south wall toward the former Imperial Palace, where desperate North Vietnamese troops were dug in.

The Marines advanced about 400 yards and cleared the north-east wall of the old city.

South Vietnamese forces continued to battle their way along the stone wall on the western side of the Citadel, but the rate of their progress was not known.

The Viet Cong flag still flew on a towering radio mast rising from the inner Citadel.

Low clouds prevented strikes today.

But the light cruiser Providence, flagship of the 7th Fleet and commanded by Vice Adm. William F. Bringle, turned her six-inch guns on suspected Communist command posts, tunnel complexes and the 15-foot-high wall ringing the Citadel.

Allied guns also hammered a Communist pocket just outside the southeast wall of the Citadel, near the Dieu De Pagoda, the last holdout during the 1966 Buddhist uprising against the South Vietnamese government.

This area is about 10 per cent of the northern half of the city and has been totally overrun by the Communists. They were expected to put up stiff resistance even if the North Vietnamese were driven out of the Citadel.

The U.S. Command said 53 Communist troops have been killed in Hue in the last 24 hours. U.S. casualties were not reported. Since the battle began Jan. 31, South Vietnamese forces and the U.S. Marines claim they have killed a total of 1,512 Communist soldiers. More than 200 government troops have been killed, and American losses are reported to be heavy.

Capt. George W. Smith, 27, of Meriden, Conn., an adviser to the 1st South Vietnamese Division, reported his men found the bodies of three North Vietnamese chained to machine guns on the west wall of the Citadel, presumably to keep them from fleeing.

Smith also said he had received a report that a North Vietnamese battalion commander inside the walled city had been killed three days ago and his replacement had asked per-

## Sets Record \$800 Million Order For McDonnell Jet

NEW YORK (AP) — American Airlines announced today an order of more than \$800-million for a new McDonnell Douglas DC10 jet liner. It was commercial aviation's biggest single order.

American said it has placed a firm order for 25 McDonnell Douglas DC10 three-engine transports of a type called the Airbus in airline circles.

American said it has also purchased options to buy an additional 25.

George A. Spater, president of American, and James S. McDonnell, chairman of the aerospace firm, made the announcement of the first order for the 252-passenger jet liner. The order calls for delivery of the first 25 in late 1971 and the additional 25 during 1973.

McDonnell Douglas thus beats out Lockheed Aircraft Co. in a competitive battle for the first Airbus order.

The aircraft is so named because of its capability of carrying large numbers of people on distances up to 3,000 miles. It is designed to cruise at about 600 miles an hour.

American said it has committed money it would lose if the

options for the aircraft were not exercised.

"It represents a firm indication of our intentions," Spater said.

The engine for the DC10 trijet will be selected within the next few weeks, Spater and McDonnell said.

General Electric and Rolls-Royce are competing for the engine orders.

The DC10 carries one jet engine slung beneath each of its wings with a third high in the tail. Two aisles will run the length of the jumbo size coach compartment.

The DC10 is 179 feet 8 inches in length with a wingspan of 155 feet and a tail height of 57 feet.

The largest previous single aircraft order was \$223 million announced by Pan American World Airways in April of 1966 when it ordered Boeing 747s, a plane capable of carrying 490 persons. Last July United Airlines announced a \$600-million purchase for 79 jets to be built by both Boeing and McDonnell Douglas.

American and McDonnell Douglas said they will spend about \$200,000 per airplane on sound suppression devices to re-

## Teacher Walkout Paralyzes Most of Florida's Schools

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Much of Florida's public school system was paralyzed today by an unprecedented teacher walk-out. Organizers of the move claimed more than 35,000 teachers stayed away from their classrooms "despite frantic threats of reprisal" by school officials.

Leaders of the Florida Education Association said early reports showed 35,000 of the state's 60,000 teachers attended mass rallies instead of going to school.

"It would appear at this time that the teachers of Florida have successfully made their point," an FEA statement said. "We regret having to close schools but it proved to be the only course left to the profession after the politicians of this state

failed to meet their responsibilities to the children."

First reports were spotty. Checks made by The Associated Press indicated teachers from the Florida panhandle to the southern peninsula took part.

The FEA leadership submitted 35,000 signed resignations Friday, vowing Florida's schools would be closed until its demands were met.

Florida has some 60,000 teachers in 2,000 schools. More than 1.5 million pupils are involved.

At issue was a \$284 million educational package passed last week by the legislature in a special educational financing session called by Gov. Claude Kirk.

The FEA contended the sum was not sufficient to give the state a first rate educational program and provide adequate salaries.

FEA leaders insisted teacher pay, which generally ranges from \$4,000 to \$8,000 in Florida, was not the main issue.

"We're not asking for anything right now except quality education," said Don Pierce, assistant executive secretary of Dade (Miami) County's 8,400-

## Winds Smash Miami Beach, Twelve Hurt

NORTH MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Tornado winds skipped through a 60-block area along North Miami Beach early today, injuring more than a dozen persons. Damage was estimated at \$2.5 million.

The winds—described by one resident as making a whistling sound—knocked down power lines, overturned cars, damaged businesses and homes and ripped merchandise from stores.

There was wind damage over wide sections of the resort-minded city on the Atlantic coast. But the storm's main force was concentrated along store-lined Northeast 167th Street for some eight blocks.

Three people were hurt, authorities said, when a house was knocked over by the winds. Others were cut by broken window glass and battered by debris.

Police with dogs set up road blocks to prevent looting and to keep out sightseers.

The storm touched down briefly on the narrow strip of beach east of Miami shortly after 5 a.m. EST.

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## Irony of American Life Posters Now Private Passion

WASHINGTON — It is one of those ironies of current American life that posters, that most public of all art forms, have become a more or less private passion.

Ironic, because posters, precisely because they are an art form, are surely the most attractive means of advertising. And of advertising we have no dearth.

To Mrs. Lady Bird Johnson's well-known chagrin, we will permit far too many of our highways to be cluttered with billboards (which are to posters what a housebroken pet is to a savage rhinoceros), to say nothing of the commercial pollution of our airwaves.

But we provide preciously little space for posters in public places.

Walter Tobriner, former D.C. commissioner returned from a trip to Europe enchanted, as are so many American travelers, by the gaiety and color that well placed posters lend to cityscapes across the ocean. Tobriner talked bravely about handsome kiosks all over town. But the committees that labored busy mountains of potential visual delights finally

produced but one mousy and rather ugly little pavilion in front of the district building and that was the end of that.

Now the designers of Washington's proposed subway, or rather "metro," have banned posters from both the trains and the stations. That will give us nothing to look at down there but each other or architect Harry Weese's ever so tastefully designed ceilings.

So, all but banned from public places, the current American poster revival—"Postermania," one critic has called it—is essentially and unfortunately a private affair. The medium that is most directly meant to convey the message to the masses is reduced to decorate bachelors' pads, student dormitories, basement recreation rooms and, at best, little corner restaurants on the make.

To satisfy this new craving for posters, little shops that specialize in them along with other gay and inexpensive paraphernalia of the new "psychedelic" iconography, have mushroomed all over. Bookstores and museum sales counters do a brisk poster business.

On much too rare occasion some staid institution, such as

New York's Lincoln Center for the performing arts, will even commission a new poster. The idea, one suspects, is more to win friends among artists than to influence any sizable number of customers.

As might have been expected, the ever alert Museum of Modern Art in New York, has instantly taken note of the trend. And much like a good newspaper, it has hastened to provide its editorial comment, as it were.

MOMA's visual editorial presents some 300 posters, illustrating the history of the art from the 1880's right up to the current "psychedelic" art nouveau revival, selected from its own extensive collection by Mildred Constantine and superbly mounted by Arthur Drexler, who has a knack for making an already interesting show exciting.

"Word and image," as the exhibit is called, is a titillating smorgasbord that offers samples not only of the amazing variety of totally different styles we have lived with and through in but two or three generations, but also of the variety of social and political causes posters are being called upon to expound.

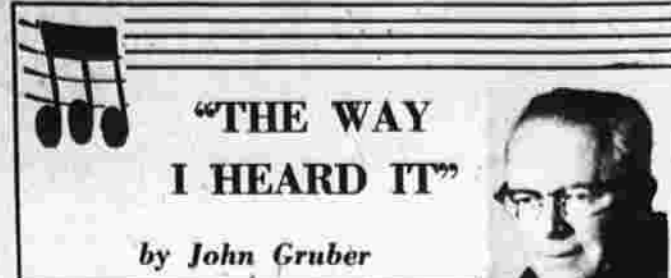

# Posters Are Now Private Passion

MOA might have called the show "The power of graphic design." For in the end, Henri Van de Velde's art nouveau posters for "Troop," a long forgotten dietary food (little more than a collection of the artist's autobiography, that a make-all gimmick prompted at the turn of the century by a pair of German artists out to make money) is just as evocative as El Lissitzky's advertisement for a Soviet art and crafts exhibition in 1920 or Lester Beall's still topical "Sigma Breed Crime" of 1941.

Surely Adolf Hitler, who made posters his foremost campaign weapon (and may well have done so, considering his fabled "Führer" posters) had been available to him when he said that good posters "must be aimed at the emotions and only to a very limited degree at the so-called intellect."

It must, of course, be emotionally content which is what most of our humdrum advertising graphics are not. They are not passionately created by artists who fervently believe in the ultimate redemption by "pop."

The most obvious reason, of course, is that a lot of people want a nice, bright poster to display in their homes. Some may find the trend almost obscene, but whether the poster rate, is what MOA suggests. It presents a good many posters designed by well-known artists at Laurence, Bonnard, Beardsley, Kokoschka, Picasso and Miró, who, at one time or another, used their own exhibitions.

I don't think that is quite correct. Though technical posters (they do incorporate words with the image), "art posters" are really something else again. They are, in a way, free samples of the "fine art" we are supposed to come and view. Nor do these artist posters account for the poster's popularity of the medium. If all the people wanted were inexpensive reproductions of paintings, they would find plenty of them in the stores and without the commercial. Since the invention of lithography and other methods of color printing (and before that the mass produced before-glass paintings) there have been plenty of inexpensive pictures around, particularly religious ones.

Neither do most of the new poster fans seem particularly intrigued with the poster's message. There are exceptions, of course. Some of the garish art nouveau revival posters, printed in crude day-glo inks, advertise the "Wellenhausung" of psychedelic detachment. The posterized portraits of people like post Alan Ginsberg or Humphrey Bogart imply a protest

BERN, Switzerland (AP) — Women of Bern Canton stepped away from the polls over the weekend to give the women the vote on local matters for the first time in 100 years.

Four of Switzerland's 21 other cantons let women vote in local elections, but they still have no say in national affairs.

The vote in Bern Canton, in the east, was held on Feb. 17. It was 64,118-58,806. Backers of the art and the artist-organizer, and only 46.6 per cent of the men turned out to vote.

ABA Votes For Curbs On News

CHICAGO (AP) — The American Bar Association has endorsed recommendations that judges, lawyers and policemen restrict the flow of information about criminal cases. But news officials, turned down in their plea for a delay for study, predicted new battles in the courts and state legislatures.

Said one J. Edward Murray, Chicago's press relations director, "The press will have no recourse but to fight back."

The recommendations, put forward by a pre-trial advisory committee headed by Justice Paul C. Reardon of Massachusetts' Supreme Judicial Court, were adopted by a vote Monday by the ABA's policy-making House of Delegates.

Minutes before the delegates turned down by a 176-68 vote an appeal by three top news executives that action be left for white studies are made of the effects on newspaper and television accounts of crime.

"There is no good reason for delay," Reardon said during the two-hour debate. And J. Edward Lumbard of the U.S. Circuit Court in New York City said the news media would only return in a year with talk of new studies.

"What are the surveys going to show?" he asked. "Are they going to tell us that human nature has changed?"

Once the guidelines are incorporated into the ABA's ethics code, lawyers could run the risk of severe discipline—even disbarment—for making public during trial operations and information that were not part of the record.

Police departments, meanwhile, were advised to adopt regulations to restrict the flow of information about criminal cases.

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnamese military headquarters reported today that aerial observers had sighted several Communist anti-aircraft gun positions in the area of the city. The gun positions were spotted about 2 1/2 miles south of the city, one of the busiest in the world, which came under heavy rocket attack Sunday during the Communist "second wave" offensive.

A government spokesman said he did not know definitely how many guns were spotted. He said they were seen 2 1/2 hours after a battalion of South Vietnamese Rangers patrolling the area had detected the guns. The Rangers were reported to have distributed leaflets in several areas, urging people to support the government.

The "second wave" Communist offensive last weekend has subsided, but there was no assurance it wouldn't heat up again. Intelligence reports reaching the U.S. Mission said that in the Mekong Delta province of Kien Hoa, the Viet Cong province committee received a directive from the Communist high command to prepare mass demonstrations to support the government.

Unofficial reports circulated that the Communists were planning another attack tonight on the South Vietnamese capital, a city of nearly a million people. The Viet Cong were reported to have distributed leaflets in several areas, urging people to support the government.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP) — The vice president, said a starting point for selection of pro-Humphrey leader, is "definitely concerned, for he considers Humphrey to be a serious contender." Failure Of Heart In Bombay

BOMBAY, India (AP) — King Edward Memorial Hospital announced today that its surgeons last Sunday performed the first heart transplant in Asia. It said the patient lived three hours after the operation.

The hospital said a 35-year-old man who was doomed because of a heart ailment was given the heart of a 20-year-old man in a 2 1/2-hour operation.

The woman had been admitted with a brain injury after a fall while running for a train. Despite surgery she died, and her body was immediately placed in a heart-lung machine to keep the blood circulating. Then the heart was transplanted to the man and continued to beat for about three hours, the hospital said.

The man died because of a lung complication, it added. Prof. K. Sen, the chief of the surgical team, said the hospital would try another transplant battle for the future.

Phan Thiet, 90 miles east of Saigon, was seized by the Viet and held in a prison camp. An sniper fire was reported today after U.S. paratroopers overcame light resistance and took the hospital where enemy forces had dug in.

Earthquake Kills 13 On Greek Islands

ATHENS (AP) — A shattering earthquake hit the northern Aegean Sea region today and reports said 13 persons were killed and 18 injured. The quake was centered in the northeast Aegean Sea between Greece and western Turkey.

Reports to national police headquarters said 70 per cent of the houses in the island of Lesbos were destroyed or made uninhabitable, but there were no reports of serious casualties there.

The quake was felt over a wide area in Turkey as well as Greece. Strong aftershocks were reported in western Turkey, along the Aegean coast and in Istanbul. Turkey's Kandilli Observatory said the biggest quake had a force of 9 on the 12-point Mercalli scale, which rates tremors according to potential damage effect.

In Limnos, residents fled from their homes. There were reports of slight damage in Turkish areas along the Aegean and the Dardanelles, and the population panicked in Adagapari, near Istanbul, where more than 100 persons were killed in a quake last July.
