Sheinwold on Bridge

Even your partner beats Sheinwold. The stegosaurus, which weighed over 10 tons and had a brain weighing only 2 1/2 ounces was probably only dimly aware that it was alive. This record for brainlessness may be unapproachable even by bridge partners, but don't overlook East's defense in today's hand.

Opening lead - ten of hearts. West led the ten of hearts and South won with the ace. Declarer led a spade to dummy's king and returned the jack of diamonds for a finesse. West casually played his low diamond, since it was obviously useless to win the trick.

South was tempted to repeat the finesse at this point, which would have about him out of his own hand, but saw no harm in taking the high hearts first. East had a disarming problem on the first of dummy's high hearts.

East had already thrown a spade on the first trick and since South had bid clubs, East in that suit too. Since only diamonds were left, East threw a diamond.

Interesting discard South was fascinated by this discard and threw the six of spades to avoid giving East any clue. Declarer then led the queen of hearts from dummy, and East discarded his last diamond.

The situation was now clear. South smiled commiseratingly at West as he cashed dummy's winners and then ran the diamonds for a total of 12 tricks. West made some bitter remarks about his partner's diamond discards. East should have thrown two clubs on the assumption that he was not in the contract if South had two top clubs in addition to two spades, four hearts and one diamond.

Concerned Bystander Role Romney, Nixon Urge U.S. To Limit Itself in Wars

Gov. George Romney and Richard M. Nixon, political opponents for the moment, both are urging that the United States try to limit itself to the role of concerned bystander in the future wars.
In a speech Thursday at a women's college in Hooksett, N.H., the Michigan governor called for establishment of a 10,000-man United Nations peacekeeping force that would be sent to conflicting areas to try to prevent them from blossoming into full-scale wars.
The United States could help with equipment and training assistance, Romney said, adding: "I would think it advisable for the U.S. to contribute technical personnel for such purposes, rather than combat troops to the standing forces."
In his basic message that direct involvement is to be avoided, Romney's proposal was similar to things Nixon has been saying repeatedly on the primary campaign circuit.
"In Korea and Vietnam," the former vice president has said, "we furnished most of the arms, most of the men and most of the money. In the future if a nation is attacked and requests American help we should give them the assistance to fight for themselves—but we should not do the fighting for them."

Columbia Selectman Board Considers Microfilming Town Records

Selectmen spent the greater part of their meeting this week with the town to discuss the pros and cons of having town records microfilmed. William Rogers, a representative of IBM, told the selectmen that chief benefits of microfilming are for security and space saving.
He added that the cost would be, in his opinion, only for a viewer for \$3,000 and 10 to 15 cents per frame, plus about seven cents for a card on which the frames are mounted.
Rogers said that the space reduction is about 90 per cent.

everything else than verbal skills.
These ethnic patterns have more than academic importance. Judges and legislators are now working toward definitions of equal opportunity in education. Most of them assume that inferior performance in school necessarily means retardation and lack of opportunity.
But each culture has its own idea of what is important. Some emphasize one skill, some another. It turns out, simply considered, that the cultural values of the school are not necessarily the same as those of the home.
Schools usually react to these uneven abilities by trying to raise all children to a basic minimum standard in each subject. Perhaps, in the future, schools will work to adapt curricula and teaching methods to the cultures with which they are dealing.
This, then, of course, flies in the face of the strong and wholesome tradition that regards the public school as the great pathway out of ethnic inferiority to a common American culture. Current research is showing clearly that the ethnic patterns are far stronger than the school's influence.
Coleman's concept of equal achievement for all groups seems the very essence of fair play.
"However, it is our contention," writes Mrs. Stodolky and Lesser, "that Coleman's analysis does not go far enough. It does not tell the whole story or consider all the evidence."

Halt Bombing North Viet Seen Clear On Starting Peace Talks

LONDON — The government of North Vietnam has made it clear that all it requires before proceeding to peace talks is a declaration by the United States that the bombing has stopped. This emerges from a cable sent by the foreign ministry in Hanoi in reply to a cabled inquiry from the Guardian.
In a cable to Hanoi, this correspondent sought clarification of a statement made by Nguyen Duy Trinh, the foreign minister, on Feb. 8.
Trinh was asked then to explain what North Vietnam meant when it maintained that talks could begin "an agreement at time" after the cessation of bombing. At that time he replied: "The talks would begin as soon as the U.S. has proved that it has really stopped unconditionally the bombing and all other acts of war against the Democratic Republic of (North) Vietnam."
This seemed to suggest that Hanoi was still holding out for a long bombing-free period before engaging in talks, for only this would have constituted effective proof that the bombing had actually stopped. The Guardian cable therefore asked: "Could you please now say what form this proof should take?"
The reply from the foreign ministry said: "Please find the answer" in a statement made last month by the North Vietnamese representative in Paris, Mai Van Bo, which the Hanoi cable then quoted as follows: "This unconditional cessation of bombing and other acts of war... the government of the U.S. can announce it by a declaration, or use any other means which could prove its reality."
But this statement by Mai Van Bo in Paris was not concerned with the question of "proof" which was raised only subsequently by Trinh in his Hanoi statement.
For the North Vietnam Foreign Ministry to say now, as it has in effect said in the cable, that the only proof of bombing cessation necessary is a declaration—and that talks would start "as soon" as this declaration had been made—is to put an altogether new complexion on the matter.
Secretary General U Thant of the United Nations has said, after his recent talks with North Vietnamese officials, that he was more than ever convinced that talks would begin two or three weeks after the cessation of the bombing. This, however, is unacceptable to the U.S. because during these two or three weeks Hanoi could so greatly reinforce its divisions in the two northern provinces of South Vietnam as to be able to take power easily if the U.S. forces there, particularly the Khe Sanh garrison.
This is why President Johnson's San Antonio formula—under which the bombing would stop and talks would begin if

the talks, then the cessation of total bombing would remain in effect as long as the negotiations should not accompany its declaration. If they did not agree to ration that the bombing has "frozen" the level of infiltration, it would be clear that they intended to use the talks only to facilitate the reinforcement of their troops, in order to inflict a major military defeat on the U.S. forces below the demilitarized zone, the war would therefore have to be resumed with all its former ferocity.
The Hanoi formula says that the bombing must stop "definitively" and "unconditionally." Sometimes, however, the cessation is omitted. The term was not used in the interview with Nhan Dan in an article earlier this week rejecting the San Antonio formula.
This repeated changing of the formula appears to reflect an awareness on the part of at least some Hanoi leaders that the U.S. would not agree to a "permanent" cessation of the bombing so long as the war lasted. The demand for an "uncon-

The U.S. Marines reported killing 21 Communist troops in clashes Thursday as they fought to east wall of the Citadel. But AP correspondent George J. Arthur reported from the Communists in strength still held the east bank of a canal running parallel to the east wall.
Just to the north and west of Hue, more than 1,000 U.S. air cavalrymen and paratroopers were fighting a running battle to block Communist advances. Helicopters and supplies headed for Hue.
The U.S. Command reported that the Americans force had killed 183 enemy troops in the past two days and captured 82 gas masks apparently consigned to the Communist forces in Hue where the Marines have been using tear gas on enemy positions. Twelve Americans were reported killed and 137 wounded in these operations.
On the northwest frontier where an estimated 40,000 North Vietnamese troops are poised, Communist gunners shelled 377 rocket, mortar and artillery rounds Thursday into the U.S. Marine combat base at Khe Sanh and Marine positions flanking it.
The barracks killed nine Americans, wounded 22, destroyed a big CH53 helicopter and damaged a two-engine C130 cargo plane.
Twenty miles to the northeast, nearly 200 mortar and artillery rounds hit the Marine outpost at Con Thien, just below the demilitarized zone. But the bunkered Marines reported only two men wounded.
Air Force B52 bombers made two more today on the enemy gun positions around Khe Sanh.
Other waves of the big B52s pounded suspected enemy troop concentrations and base camp areas 29 and 31 miles northwest of Saigon and 17 miles north-west of Dak To, in the central highlands.
For the first time in three weeks there was no report of gun. But deep in the Mekong Delta 100 miles south of Saigon, a U.S. Army-Navy riverine force backed by helicopter gunships reported killing 60 Viet- Cong and said only four Americans were wounded.
In the Mekong Delta Thursday, South Vietnamese infantrymen of the 9th Division killed 40 guerrillas in a battle two miles northwest of My Tho. Nine government troops were killed, 37 were wounded and three armored personnel carriers were destroyed or damaged by enemy rockets, a government spokesman said.
U.S. warplanes flew through the moonless overcast in North Vietnam to attack the Hoa Lac Airfield 20 miles west of Hanoi. Pilots used radar to guide them because of the murky weather. Other strikes were aimed at two radar sites 85 miles northwest of Hanoi and at highways and storage areas in central and southern North Vietnam.
Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, arrived in Saigon, presumably to determine whether the number of U.S. troops in Vietnam should be increased above the present allotted quota of 500,000 because of the setback dealt by the Communist offensive against South Vietnam's cities and towns and the threat to Khe Sanh and the other Marine posts along the demilitarized zone.
Informed sources in Washington said the call of 50,000 National Guardsmen and Marines reserves is one of several options being considered.
