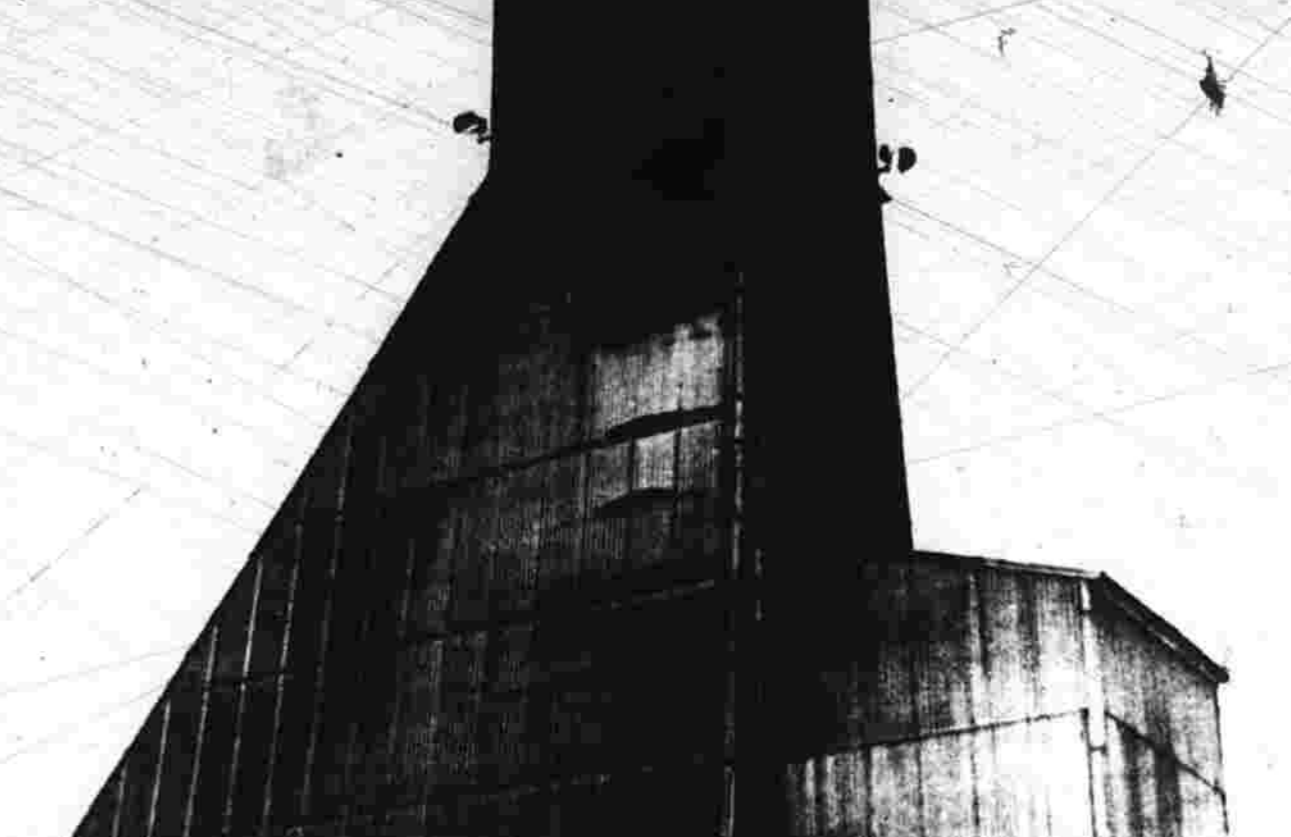

Earlier in the week we went back 44 years to see how an expert muffed a simple safety net in a world championship. We didn't have to look so far and so hard. Experts miss playing all the time. Opening lead—three of clubs. When today's hand was played in the match between Norway and Great Britain in the 1967 European Team Championships, declarer won the first trick with the king of clubs and led a spade to dummy's queen. Washington Schools Are Ordered Closed

Public schools in Washington, D.C. were ordered closed today because of a teachers' walkout outside city schools in violation of a court order against picketing.

The Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers struck last Thursday in a demand for a collective bargaining election — a election which the school board contends cannot legally sanction.

In Florida, an official of the huge Dade County Classroom Teachers Association said that he believed the 13-day-old walkout would be settled Friday.

The teachers, members of the Washington Teachers' Union, plan a public demonstration to urge Congress to approve a pending bill that would start starting salaries from the present \$5,800 to \$17,000.

Some parents in Pittsburgh said they would move in court to have schools closed until they have been made unsafe by the strike by 1,000 of the city's 4,000 teachers.

Interview On Drugs

EDITOR'S NOTE: A program on narcotics and controlled substances presented by Robert C. Grier, Chief of the Connecticut Health Department, "Narcotic Control Section," attracted more than 300 people to the first of a four-part symposium on "Society and Controlled Drugs Abuse" sponsored by the Connecticut Lutheran Church Tuesday evening.

The following is the content of a Herald interview with Grier which was conducted after his talk. The questions were directed to Grier in his capacity as a law enforcement officer.

Q. Is there a drug problem in Manchester and if so what is the nature of it?

A. There is a drug problem in Manchester and it is the same as in any other community of this size, nature and racial makeup in the state of Connecticut. Any community of Orange, for example, I have names of 40 persons who are currently before the court. Orange is much smaller than Manchester.

Q. Do you mean that the number of drug users in Manchester is much greater than in other communities?

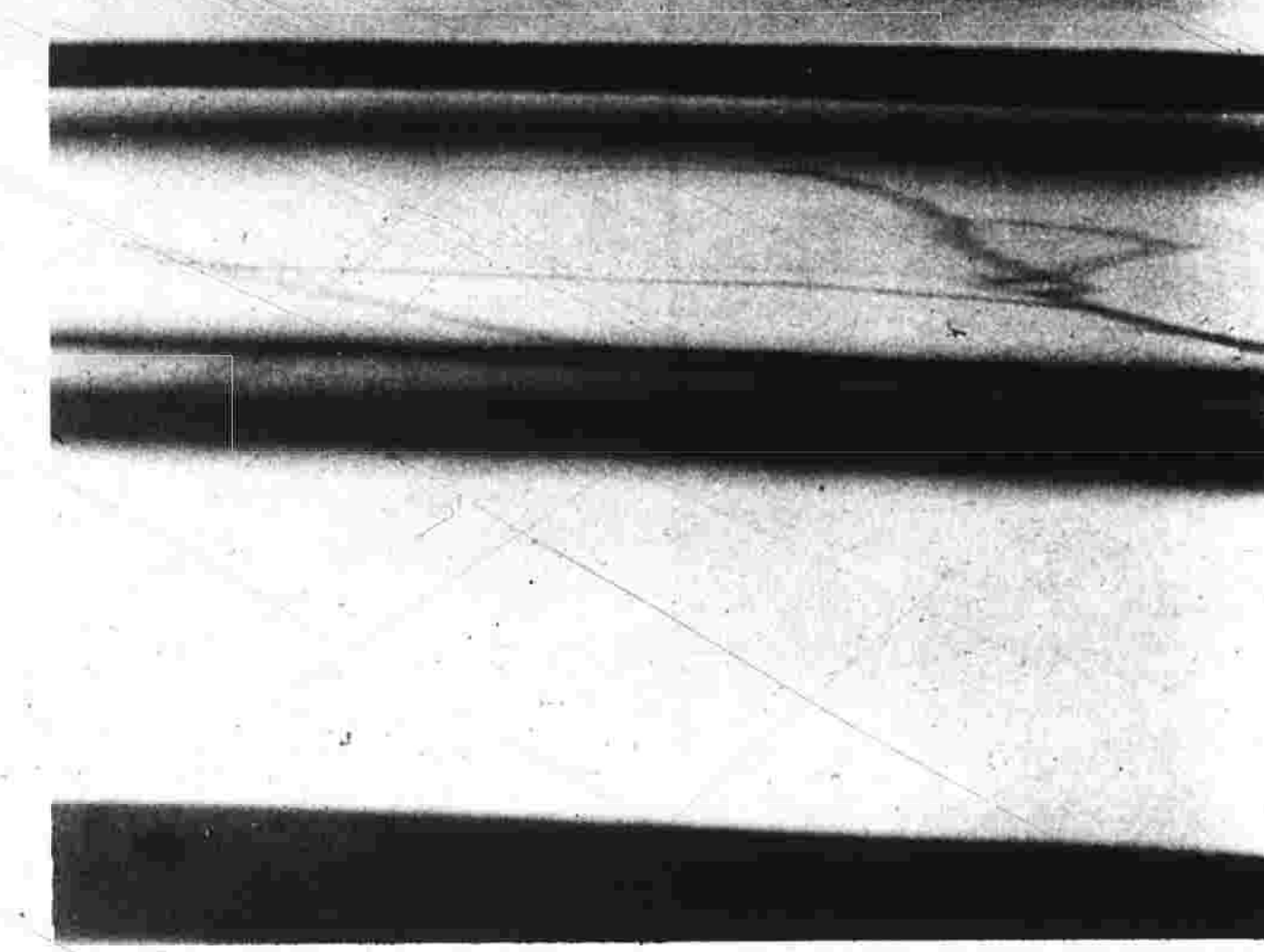
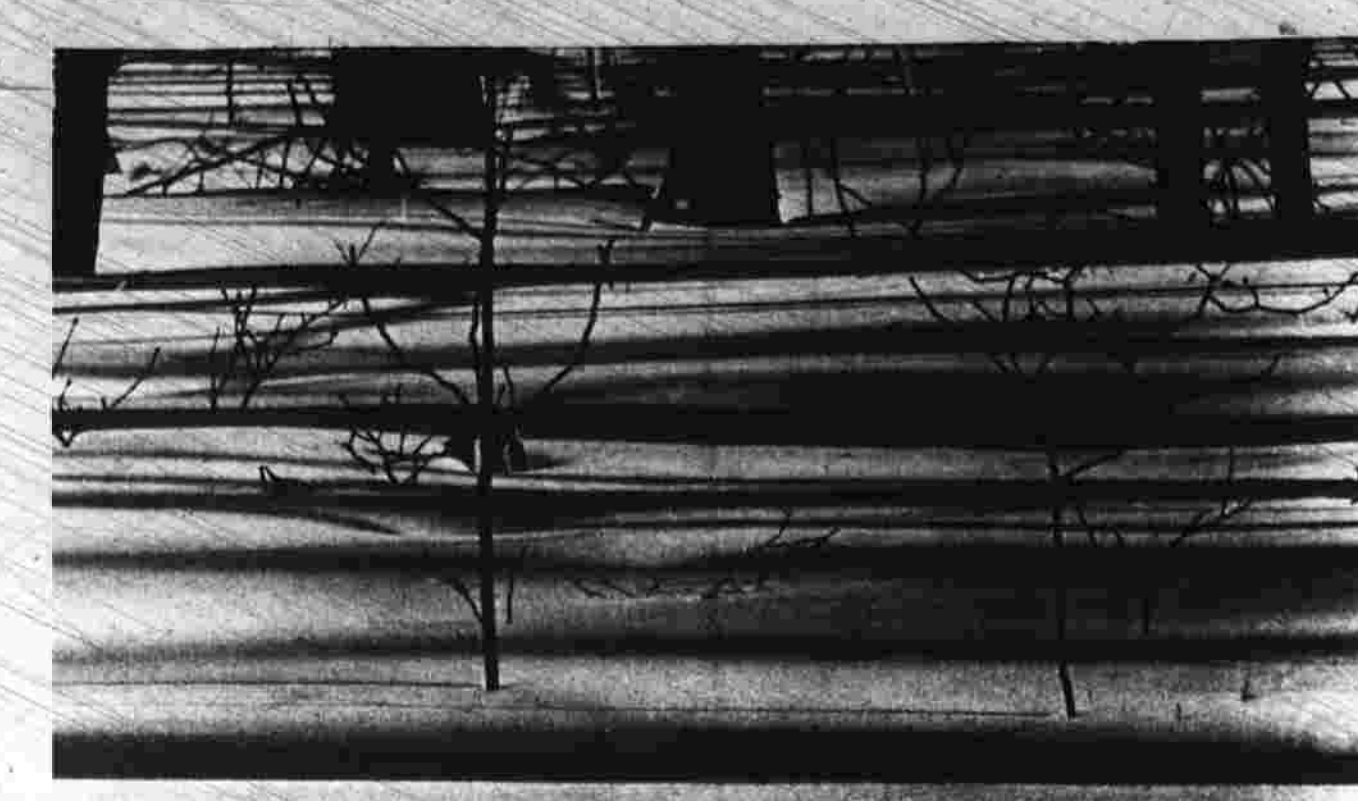

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Connecticut Yankee

Since this column first alerted Democratic State Chairman John Bailey and the organization known as the Connecticut Yankee, they had more McCarthy sentiment on their hands in Connecticut than any normal fringe trouble, but now the McCarthy movement has increased rapidly and considerably.

The first few visible tests took place, with what must have been electrifying impetus toward political McCarthy adventures in other places, in several small towns where the McCarthy forces proved themselves capable of dominating the caucus which were selecting delegates to the Democratic State Convention.

The number of formally labeled McCarthy delegates selected was, however, only part of the story in the Democratic caucus. There were, here and there, careful inclusions in the delegate slates selected of some known McCarthy supporters.

Both factors together, the surface, visible triumphs for the McCarthy people in some isolated precincts and the concessions they received in some other instances where they were not open caucus voters, are preliminaries, but perhaps tonic preliminaries, to the next option open to the McCarthy forces.

That is the option of challenging organization delegate slates during the caucus period by filing for party primaries. A month ago, the normal procedure would have been that any McCarthy primary slate filed anywhere would have been defeated by the Bailey organization forces. Today the amount of McCarthy sentiment uncovered during the caucus period among regular Democrats has taken the routine out of that calculation. It is still assumed that Bailey can win, and easily, in such a location as Hartford, where a big city type organization can be sent marching to the polls. But making book on potential primary contests elsewhere is not so easy. The possibility is that organization victories might be so close the moral prize would still go to the opposition.

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Beyond that, the Johnson blood oath shatters the political pragmatism that has made the Democratic party dominant for 35 years. A year ago, a leading Illinois Democrat bluntly warned Mr. Johnson he would lose Illinois unless a vote-getter were added to the ticket. Not only did he reject that advice but he slatemakers were happy to accept it. In Chicago, they are now revering a party stalwart to the intransigent Stevenson. It is just such insistence on ideological purity that has put the Republican party where it is today.

South Windsor's New Town Hall Going Up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Wright Patman has demanded a congressional inquiry into a reportedly profitable tip on supposedly "secret" information leaked to securities dealers by a federal employee.

Patman, the Texas Democrat who heads the House Banking Committee, called a government investigation of the leak "highly incomplete" and "obviously an attempt to whitewash a highly serious situation."

The Treasury Department said Tuesday a tip by a 41-year-old employee of the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia gave some securities dealers advance knowledge of terms for a \$2.5 billion treasury borrowing last August.

The employee, who worked for the bank for 46 years, was suspended and later died of a heart attack, the government said.

Both the Treasury and the Federal Reserve said no procedures to prevent further leaks of this kind were suspended and later died of a heart attack, the government said.

MOSCOW (AP) — Citing the case of a 17-year-old boy sentenced to two years in prison for trying to steal 22 cents, the Soviet Union's leading literary journal urged an end to judicial "cruelty to those who do not deserve it." The hapless teenager, Mikhail Sapozhnikov, wanted the money to go to a movie, said Literaturnaya Gazeta (Literary Gazette). His parents, who lost their two other sons in the war, pleaded for mercy but to no avail. Attorney Arkady Vaksberg argued in the article that maximum sentences are handed down more often than circumstances warrant, mainly because judges fear lenient sentences will be overruled by higher courts. When this happens, the lower court judge gets a reprimand harmful to his career.

On hand were the Most Rev. Henry J. O'Brien, archbishop of Hartford; the Most Rev. Joseph Donnelly, auxiliary bishop of Hartford; the Rt. Rev. Walter H. Gray, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut; and Dr. Nathaniel Gupill, minister, Connecticut Conference of the United Church of Christ. The agency, with offices in New Haven, will have the following functions: To educate communities, especially religiously-affiliated groups, to the need for and approaches to the housing shortage among low and low-moderate income families. To increase non-profit ownership of housing and to provide additional senior citizen housing. To serve as a liaison between local housing sponsors and state groups such as local and federal government agencies, financial institutions, and management agencies. The corporation will be funded by the churches—the Archdiocese of Hartford, the Diocese of Norwich, the Episcopal Diocese and the Connecticut Conference, United Church of Christ—and each has pledged \$3,000 for the first operating budget.

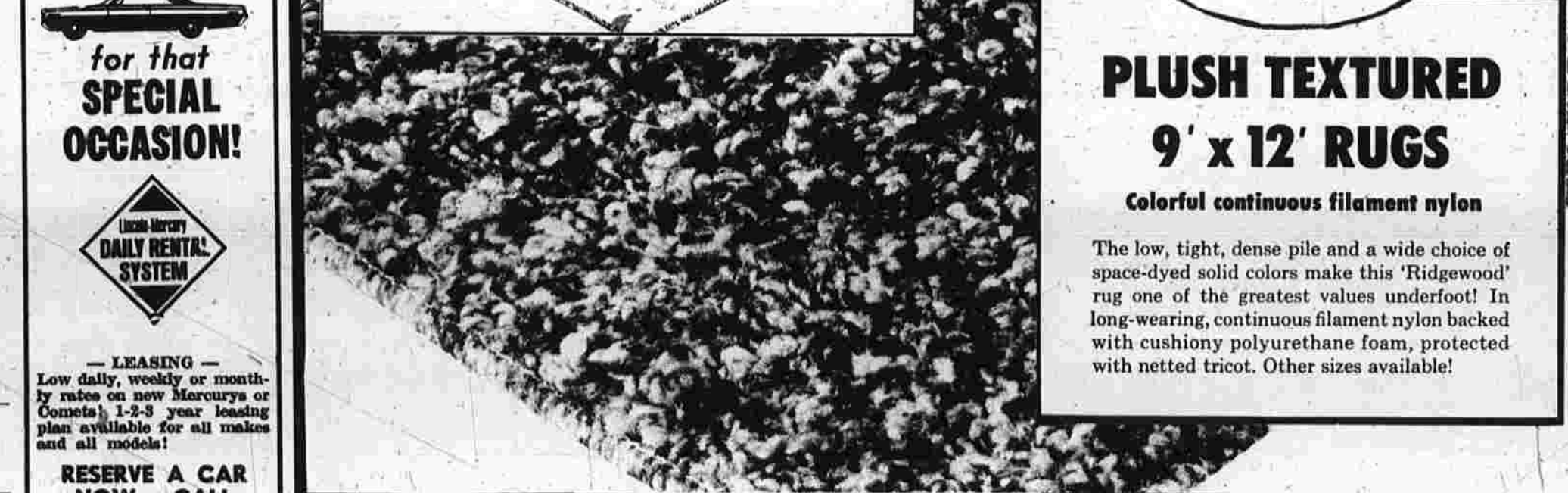
